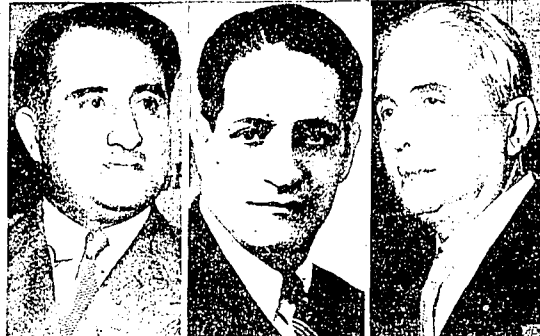

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### Puerto Ricans Take Study of Beet Methods

WASHINGTON, April 12 (AP)—Puerto Ricans have been taking a look at the United States sugar beet industry for their own protection—and have come up with this conclusion:

Virtually complete mechanization of sugar beet production and harvesting now seems to be only a matter of time.

A survey of beet growing and harvesting methods in this country undertaken by the Association of Sugar Producers of Puerto Rico. The report was issued this week by Dudley Smith, association director.

U. S. Pays \$5 Per Cent  
About 85 per cent of the sugar grown in Puerto Rico is sold in the continental United States, but this accounts for only about one-eighth of the sugar requirements of this country.

Smith noted this fact in his report, and added that the island "best can have only small influence in setting market conditions in the mainland."

"Accordingly," he said, "Puerto Rico must look largely to other areas to set the pace in sugar matters. The island must sell under price preferences in line with those which other domestic areas are willing to accept, and for that reason, cannot afford to lag behind such areas in technical development."

Far From Mechanized  
Smith said it was found that the sugar beet industry was far from completely mechanized at the end of 1943 but that "the equipment for practically complete mechanization had been developed and was under manufacture."

When more, he said, "sufficient experiments and field work had been done to adapt nearly all of the processes of planting and cultivating sugar beets in the equipment which was available."

Smith said the development in sugar beet mechanization "gives promise of bringing wide changes in the competitive relationships between the various domestic sugar producing areas."

### Solon Pleads For Speed in Power Plans

WASHINGTON, April 12 (AP)—Rep. Lowell Stockman, R., Ore., told the house today adequate national defense requires full and fast development of Pacific northwest hydroelectric power.

"We are neglecting the very foundation of our strategic position," he said, "the electric power required for resources and industrial mobilization."

He recommended that congress provide money to speed up construction of McNary dam so that its generators could produce power by 1952. He proposed planning Foster creek and Hungry Horse dam construction so that they would be generating power by 1953 and 1955, respectively.

Urges Other Speed-ups  
In addition, he said, Snake river power development and extension of Bonneville power facilities should be accelerated.

"I am not presenting these facts only as a sales talk for the Pacific northwest," Stockman said. "I am urging these electro-industrial requirements for the future security and economic needs of our country and the restoration of our modern resource foundations."

Importance Cited  
He called attention to the importance of electricity in the development of metals industries and in the conservation of dwindling U. S. oil resources. Stockman said he recently saw news dispatches indicating Russia was starting work on a hydroelectric development on the Volga river. Russia already has such a project on the Dnieper river.

"All of this adds up to the fact that Russia is building for the time that her scientists have solved the practical details of producing atomic energy," Stockman said.

### Sturgeon For Funds Drive

FRANK, April 12—Three Flere men are still talking about the sturgeon they caught on Snake river just below Crystal Springs grade.

The over-sized fish was landed by Alex Lantieri, Roy Elwood and Frank Loran on April 7. The sturgeon weighed 92 pounds and was 42 1/2 feet, 10 inches long.

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### FDR's Statue Is Unveiled in England Rites

LONDON, April 12.—Britain's memorial to President Roosevelt was unveiled by his widow and dedicated by King George VI today—the third anniversary of his death.

While thousands watched, Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt pulled a silver cord to disclose a 10-foot bronze statue of the late President, standing bareheaded, the cloak thrown back. Onlookers fell silent.

Then the king stepped forward past honor guards of American and royal Marines to lay a wreath at the foot of the statue, under the simple inscription, "Franklin Delano Roosevelt."

Following the king, Mrs. Roosevelt and then other officials placed wreaths at the statue's base.

Central Figure of Memorial

The sculpture is the central figure of memorial gardens in front of the United States embassy in Grosvenor square.

In inviting Mrs. Roosevelt to unveil the monument, the king told British listeners it would be a "permanent reminder of our camaraderie with the American people in the dark days of the war."

"It will remind us of the importance and value of that camaraderie," he said. "We shall, as we look at it, renew our pledge to continue to share with that people the ideals of peace and freedom for which President Roosevelt strove with such unflinching faith."

Ambassador Replies

In a reply to the king's speech, U. S. Ambassador Lewis W. Douglas termed the memorial a reminder of the American and British march away from "amalgamated anghosts" toward a victorious association "prophecy of future relations among us."

The sculpture is the work of Sir William Reid Dick; it was cast for with 40,000 pounds (about \$160,000) raised by the Pilgrims society in small amounts all over Britain. The society is a British-American fellowship group.
