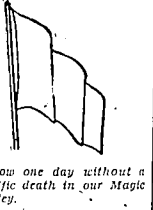

Bothne Tells Chamber Unit Of U.N. Work

JEROME, April 14—An outline of a United Nations general assembly meeting was presented to a quarterly general membership meeting of the Jerome Chamber of Commerce Tuesday night by C. J. Bothne, secretary of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce.

More than 100 persons attended the meeting.

Bothne and other delegates of the Pacific northwest Christmas ship attended a general session of the U. N. before they left for Europe to distribute food and clothing on the Christmas ship.

Describes Bread Cost

Bothne described a broadcast from the United Nations last week which children of all nations participated on behalf of the United Nations appeal for a children drive.

Bothne said the drive for funds in Idaho would begin early in May. He pointed out there were 250,000,000 children in the world today who are living under sub-standard conditions because of the need of food.

"These children would be easy prey for disease," he said.

In what he described as one of the most fitting tributes paid contributors to the Christmas ship, he quoted an address given by Capt. Charles R. Jeff, director of military government in Bremen.

Address Given

In his address which he greeted the Christmas ship, Captain Jeff said:

"There exists no doubt that the gifts of food and clothing stored in the holds of this ship will be most gratefully received by the hungry and needy people of Germany and Austria.

"But the most valuable cargo that ship carries, it seems to me, and the cargo which will be more appreciated than even the highly priced material gifts is an intangible substance into which the stewards will be unable to sink their hooks, but yet to be found in all of this ship's holds.

"It is the spirit of helpfulness, encouragement and good neighborliness which prompted and attended the collections and dispatch of these gifts," Captain Jeff said.

Bothne explained his opinion on the political significance of Russia's stand in international affairs. He said Russia's influence has reached a critical stage in the European occupied territories.

He was introduced by Tom McLean, secretary-manager of the Jerome Chamber of Commerce.

U. S. Lack of 'Solid' Plans Is Predicted

It looks as though the Russians will have the United States over a barrel when the U. N. general assembly meets to reconsider the Palestine question.

Observers already are predicting that the session will open in much the same atmosphere as did the recent "little assembly." The United States has sponsored that body, but had no program ready to meet. Other delegations were pretty quiet, merely "for discussion."

For the Palestine session the U. S. suggested, on a mere "for discussion" basis, a trusteeship to replace the partitioning which is now sponsored. But there is no indication so far that the U. S. delegation will be ready with definite motions.

Informal survey indicates that the required two-thirds vote cannot be obtained for abandonment of partitioning until something else has been worked out. There is an equal lack of enthusiasm for trusteeship unless the U. S. will agree to accept responsibility for enforcement. There is no indication that we will.

Federations suggested. There is some talk of a cautious or federated states action, with U. N. assistance to supervise elections and minority rights. But this is close to the Arab viewpoint—may have little with them and would have to be put through against Jewish wishes. So it also runs up against the question of Soviet Propaganda Plans.

In the meantime, the Russians will be using the U. N. to spread anti-American propaganda and promote discussion. Russia didn't refrain from vetoing the special session because she was interested in peace for Palestine, nor because she knew the U. S. could obtain two-thirds consent over the veto anyway.

We committed ourselves last fall to partitioning, the Soviets will say. Do we keep our pledges? Is it the Soviet who's tending on enforcement?

Crime Prevention Is Cheaper Than 'Cure,' Boyle Discovers

By HAL BOYLE
NEW YORK, April 14 (AP)—When a gun-toting youth on a rampage shoots and kills a cop here, it costs the state about \$25,000 to send him through the courts to the electric chair.

"And if he gets a life term it eventually costs almost double that," Edwin J. Lukacs, executive director of the Society for the Prevention of Crime.

"But if one-tenth of that amount had been spent on the same boy when he was a youngster, the crime would never have happened. The boy would still be free and the policeman alive."

"It is cheaper—much cheaper—to prevent crime than to punish the criminal."

"Incurry of any kind is perhaps the beginning point of all antisocial behavior. Crime is always a symptom of a purely personal maladjustment in the offender's life."

"I have talked to hundreds of child criminals, and I don't know of one who felt that when he was a child he was loved and wanted by his parents."

"How can you prevent the criminal?" "A Utopian may wish to train people for parenthood," said Lukacs. "If we could do that—train them to be parents just as they are trained now to become cooks and lawyers or doctors or bus drivers—it would be the most significant step ever taken in the prevention of crime."

"We need to be able to take kids who need special treatment out of their homes, train and redirect them, and then return them back to the community able to carry on under their own efforts," said Lukacs.

"If only 25 per cent of the \$6,000,000,000 a year we put into law enforcement was spent on scientific crime prevention measures, in a short time the national crime bill would be cut considerably."

"It is much, much cheaper," Lukacs said again, "to prevent crime than to punish criminals."

"But if the same child shows symptoms of a bad behavior pattern few parents take him to a behavior scientist—such as a psychiatrist or psychologist—to get a diagnosis."

"Yet early diagnosis is as important in halting crime as it is in halting tuberculosis."

"He listed as danger symptoms in children: habitual lying, over-angeriness, stammering, habitual telltale of fire, exhibitionism, excessive shyness or extreme behavior of any kind."

Senator Sees Try for New 'Lend-Lease'

WASHINGTON, April 14.—Senator Dworker, R. Idaho, has introduced a request for a revival of lend-lease.

The Truman doctrine and the "Marshall plan," he said yesterday in a statement, "do not constitute a full program to eliminate the full information concerning their commitments."

"While economic aid and American dollars are now being sent to Europe and Asia, lend-leave military supplies will soon be requested and it is reasonable to assume that military personnel subsequently will become a part of the program to implement the Truman doctrine," Dworker said.

Dworker's Observations

He made three other observations:

— Armed forces — "Sentiment in congress indicates approval will be given to the additional \$3,000,000,000 requested by the President for preparation. About \$11,000,000,000 have been requested by the budget, so the total will be approximately \$14,000,000,000 to build up the various components of our armed forces."

— Manpower — "It is recognized that manpower must be made available and, if voluntary enrollment is inadequate, then the draft must be utilized. However, there is considerable opposition to universal military training because it provides only for a long-range training program and would not contribute to the current needs of the army, navy and air force."

Atomic Technicians

Scientific research — "If atomic energy is utilized fully, then the greatest need is for technicians and scientists."

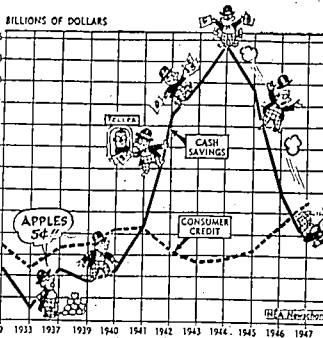
— Industrial mobilization — "If the Truman doctrine and the Marshall plan commit our nation to be fully prepared, then industrial mobilization is imperative. Strikes must be avoided. There must be no interfering. If necessary, excess profits taxes must be reimposed."

— Commodity control — "It may be necessary to restore controls over production and distribution."

2. An economic basis for peace, with no international debt burden or trade barriers.
3. Universal military training for Americans.

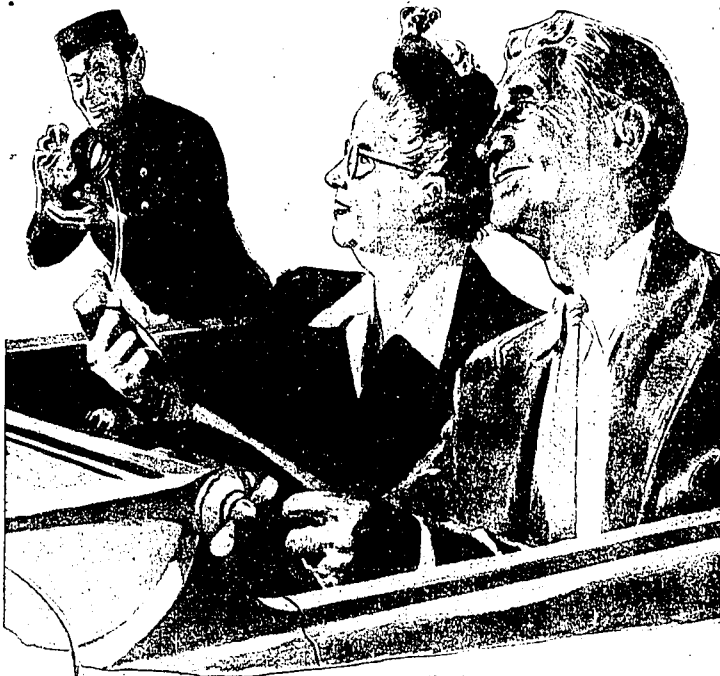

Yalta Blamed As Basis for Czech Stroke

NEW YORK, April 14.—The Saturday Evening Post laid today that Anglo-American conclusions to the Yalta pact at the end of 1945 "helped considerably to prepare the ground" for the communist coup in Czechoslovakia last February.

In an article titled "Roosevelt's Secret Deal," the magazine's editor, Drew Pearson, said that the late President and Winston Churchill agreed at Yalta that the liberation of Prague would be left to the Russian army.

Based on interviews with several sources, the magazine said that since the war with Czech President Eduard Benes, which he previously was not free to criticise, Benes said the pact could have complete faith in Marshal Stalin's integrity, which Mr. Roosevelt fully believed in.

Benes wrote that Benes "rambled something on Stalin's personal pledge and lot."

"Franklin D. Roosevelt also accompanied himself with some rambles," Benes said, "and he, too, left the Prague revolution in thus an American tragedy as well as a Czech tragedy."

Miscalculations in the Anglo-American decision made at Yalta about Prague, Benes said, was partly based on his three miscalculations of what the military position would be there, was ended.

Benes continued: "The latest Roosevelt might have acted differently at Yalta if he had suspected that General Patton could have become the liberator. As matters turned out, however, the Yalta decision, as presented the Czech people, far more emphatically than either Mr. Roosevelt or Dr. Benes had intended, that their future lay with Russia and that the American government consented to this."

BOGOTA, April 14.—An estimated 3,000 prisoners, some serving long terms, escaped from the Modelo and other penitentiaries during the height of the revolution, it was learned today.

Some communist leaders here were arrested in a raid last night, it was reported. Meanwhile, the top local communist, Gustavo Viera, has been seen on the streets.

Food Situation Difficult
The food situation remains a difficult one in the city. A survey of food supplies showed only limited quantities available and those being rationed by the army. People were lining up to buy what they could get.

Some public markets reopened on a small scale selling stocks they had on hand before the revolution. Despite army restrictions that roads to Bogota were clear, very little food was coming in from the countryside except small amounts of meat and milk.

Farm Prices Near
Some grocery store prices jumped from 50 to 200 per cent over pre-revolution levels. Despite government threats to punish speculators, a food crisis is expected next week. Streets are now more normal.

There is now no rationing in the downtown area. More people are about although preliminary searches continue in the region of the American embassy.

Virtually nothing has been done yet to clear away debris from the streets except for removal of bottles of those killed in the rioting.

State Learns Highway Oil Costs Rising

BOISE, April 14 (AP)—It will cost Idaho more money this year to construct oil-purified highways.

Contracts awarded by the state purchasing office Tuesday for 2,700,000 gallons of oil mix show the cost has risen about 50 per cent over last year.

Bids awarded to six oil firms today range from nine to 14 cents a gallon for the oil mix, depending upon types of oil specified and the point of delivery, purchasing agency officials explained. Bids last year ranged from six to 9 cents a gallon.

Boosts Highway Cost

State highway department officials announced that the cost of roads will go up.

"They said the increased costs of oil mix may be reflected in construction of secondary highways," they added that should the current highway bill on federal aid not providing for concrete, the cost could be shouldered over an additional three-year period.

Most of the bids were awarded for about 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 cents a gallon, except contracts for some types of oil mix delivered to extending middle-eastern Idaho were as low as nine cents.

North, Central Highest

Highest contracts awarded called for delivery to northern and central Idaho, purchasing department officials said.

Contracts were awarded to the Washburn Oil company and the Idaho Oil company, Salt Lake City; Carter Oil company and Farmers Union Central exchange, Billings, Mont.; Inland Empire Refining, Boise; and Sinclair Oil Refining company, Denver, Colo.

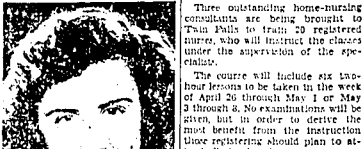

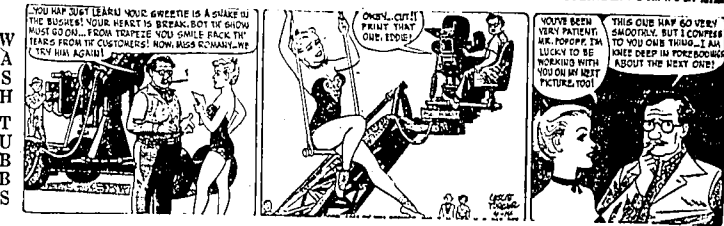

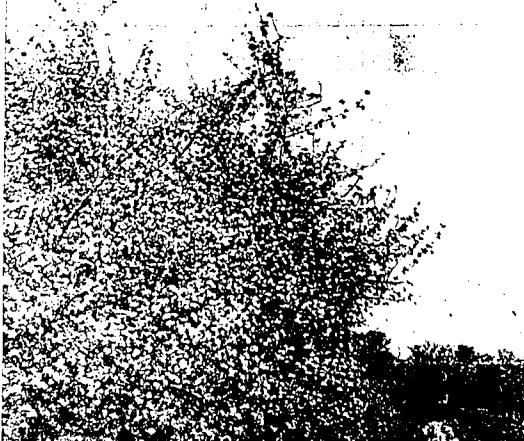
