# House Approves Billions Boost In Air Strength

WASHINGTON, April 15 (AP)—The house passed and sent to the senate today a bill providing \$3,195,100,000 to start expanding the air forces.

Most of the fund is in contract authority for the air force and the naval bureau of aeronautics. This means the actual cash will have to be put up later.

Included in the bill is \$923,000,000 added by the house to the \$2,273,100,000 proposed by the appropriations committee.

The addition is designed to finance the buying of modern new planes to expand from a 55 to 70 group air force.

Here's what the bill contained as it goes to the senate: A bill of debate that included sharp warning that the nation must arm to counter Soviet expansion.

**Air Force Fund**  
For the air force: Cash, \$600,000,000; and contract authority, \$1,600,000,000.

For the naval bureau of aeronautics: Cash, \$300,000,000; and contract authority, \$600,000,000.

The house voted 115 to 0 to add the \$923,000,000 to the bill. It was passed by the appropriations committee proposed.

**Number Unknown**  
No one explained, and no one in the house apparently knew, how many additional planes, just how many extra money will provide.

A 70-group air force, just now being authorized by Washington, although Secretary of Defense Forrestal has recommended a smaller force.

President Truman said today he is supporting Forrestal's recommendation for the smaller force, but he knows why Symington is differing with them.

# U. S. Ousts 15 Hungarians in Germany Zone

FRANKFURT, April 15 (AP)—Fifteen members of two Hungarian military units ordered to leave the United States zone of Germany within 48 hours.

The announcement said the expulsions were ordered because the units had been found to be in violation of an American treaty in January when Hungarian soldiers permitted Soviet troops to plunder the cars.

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# Admits Slaying Minidoka Test Well Approved

REPERT, April 15 (AP)—Increased evidence of the feasibility of irrigating the Minidoka north side extension from wells was noted Wednesday at the completion of test operations at the second experimental well drilled by the bureau of reclamation.

Results of the test of the second well were similar to those secured in the first well. At the end of the three-day test, bureau engineers declared the results far exceeded their expectations.

**4.7 Second Feet**  
At the end of the second well testing, the pump was delivering 1,225 gallons per minute. A total of 4.7 second feet of water was raised.

Engineers said this was accomplished without appreciably lowering the water table in the area. It is an ample supply of water, by way of comparison, the first well raised 4.3 second feet of water.

After the engineers had completed their tests, the pumping equipment was shut down to the site of the third test well.

**Clear Water**  
The water was described as crystal clear. Early in the test, the test well was inspired by the sight of the test water spreading over hundreds of acres of brush and undergrowth.

Ever since the bureau of reclamation started the test well project, there has been considerable speculation in the Idaho area as to the origin of the water in the wells.

The most popular explanation is that the water has seeped through channels carrying water from the Loess river.

7. \$100 a month old-age insurance for all men.

8. Higher educational standards based on federal aid to public schools.

9. Government planning through the President's council of economic advisers to eliminate the wastes of the business cycle and unemployment.

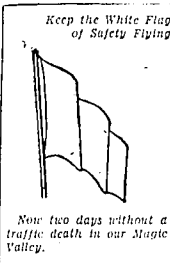
### Man Found Dead On Cabin's Floor

### Churchill Hits Allied Policies During Peace

NEW YORK, April 15 (AP)—Winston Churchill devoted the first installment of his war memoirs to weaknesses in the policies of the allied powers between 1918 and 1919. He says these weaknesses led to the resurgence of Germany and World War II.

Churchill is sharply critical of what he regards as the failure of his country, the United States, and France to live up to their responsibilities after the victory in the first World War.

He asserts that no contract would have been easier to prevent than the recent debacle which destroyed so much of Europe.

Among the allies' mistakes after World War I he lists the following:

**Restoration of the High Seas.**—The fixing of German reparations payments in the peace treaties and the subsequent lending of great sums to Germany by the United States—money which Churchill says never could have been repaid.

**U. S. League Deal.**—The refusal of the United States to enter the League of Nations, the complete withdrawal of this country from European affairs.

The failure of the allies to enforce almost sternly the total disarmament of Germany. The former prime minister views this as a "fatal folly which led directly to the future crimes of the once-beaten Germany."

### Gaming Case Petition Filed In High Court

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### Stassen Lead Raises Query On Its Effect

WASHINGTON, April 15 (AP) — What effect will Harold E. Stassen's modest popular support have on the Republican national convention when the time comes to pick a presidential candidate?

That appeared to be the main question in the minds of politicians trying to gauge the significance of the Minnesota's capture of Nebraska's preference vote.

Stassen's supporters claimed the Nebraska result on top of his sweeping Wisconsin victory, made him to "No. 1 contender" for the nomination. Gov. Thomas E. Dewey's backers replied that their man still is in the lead nationally.

**Count on Other Primaries**  
Dewey and Stassen, both of Ohio, who ran second and third respectively in the seven-man "popularity" race in Nebraska, are looking for future primaries to balance the ledger.

Senator Vandenberg, R., Mich., who ran fourth in Nebraska, is still regarded as a good "dark horse" choice in event of a convention defeat, although he is not a candidate.

Politicians familiar with convention tradition, say the big delegate vote states, such as Pennsylvania and Illinois, will decide the issue. And how they'll vote after the first ballot will not be known until after the roll call begins at Philadelphia.

The Stassen people are claiming 200 votes on the first ballot. Dewey forces challenge this.

**Delegates Listed**  
Depending on whether preliminary promises by Nebraska's 15 delegates are carried out, Stassen now has around 60 delegates among the 402 already chosen. Dewey is in front with 111.

Taft, who has the most votes in Illinois, has his own delegates to add his own state's 53 delegates in a primary May 4. Stassen is challenging him for 23 there.

Senator Taft said he was "disappointed," but predicted he would win over Stassen in Ohio. Taft's Nebraska manager also expressed disappointment, but said the Philadelphia convention's decision "may be a little different."

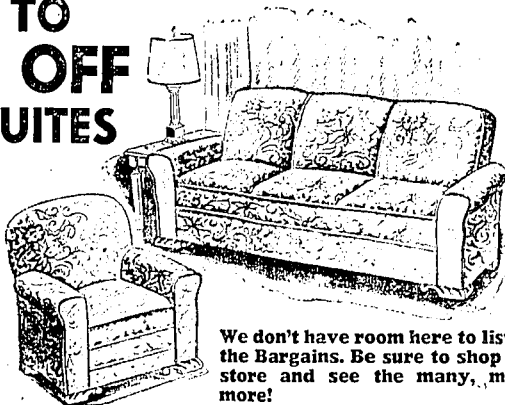

The Boeing Airplane company had announced today that the world's first bomber with swept-back wings has completed the initial phase of its flight test program.

Showalter said the 60-ton XP-47 will be turned over to U. S. air force material command pilots shortly for their second phase of flight testing. The company testing has been done from the Moses lake air force base by Pilot Robert M. Robbins and Co-Pilot Scott Oster, the two test pilots who flew it three other careful preparation in December.

Announcement of completion of the prolonged company tests came with release of the first dramatic photographs of the bomber taking off from Moses lake with all 18 of its jets for a rocket-assisted take-off.

It is approximately the size of the B-29 superfortress — 116 feet wing spread, 108 feet long and with a 28-foot high tail. It is designed to carry more than 10 tons of bombs.

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### State Industry Payroll Gains 137 Per Cent

BOISE, April 15 (AP)—Total annual payroll of Idaho industries increased 137 per cent from 1941 to 1947, the State Chamber of Commerce reported today.

Total payroll in 1941 was \$85,669,302 while the state's industrial payroll in 1947 was \$232,122,222, the chamber reported.

Figures supplied by the employment security agency were the basis for the comparison, the state chamber said. The number of employees jumped from 9,229 in 1941 to 12,608 in 1947, the chamber reported.

The chamber report stated the biggest gains in Idaho industry were in food processing, where payrolls increased 216 per cent between 1941 and 1947.

In truck transportation between those years, payrolls increased from \$3,074,029 to \$16,039,914; in the state's steel industry, payrolls increased from \$1,740,838 to \$5,114,000, the chamber reported.

### Industrialist Sees Spud Mart Threat

BOISE, April 15 (AP)—J. R. Simpson, Idaho industrialist, has said he believes the state could have marketed 10,000 additional cars of potatoes this year "if we had had them to sell."

Simpson said, "Our Idaho potatoes have good head and shoulders above all our competitors in all markets for the past six months, which is primarily due to our outstanding quality, advertising and post-shipment."

"I think with the support program for the coming year, every acreer should secure and plant his allotment and do the best job possible in raising the maximum number of good, health potatoes."

Simpson warned, "If we do not take care of our markets and supply our customers, somebody will take our place and we will possibly lose these markets with potatoes."
