The engine caught the rear four feet of the truck, smashing the box, bending its frame and pushing the truck into a borrow pit. Damage was estimated at \$750.

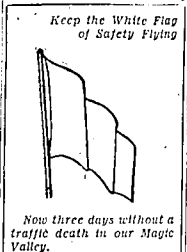

### Actress Files \$200,000 Suit Over Article

SANTA MONICA, Calif., April 16 (AP)—Hedy Lamarr of the movies today filed a \$200,000 suit against Look magazine, alleging that a Look article makes it appear she had a nose altered by plastic surgery.

This, she asserted, is untrue. Attorney Jerry Steiner filed the action, which alleges that the actress' reputation for natural beauty has been damaged, along with her standing before the film public and her three children.

"Miss Lamarr," the suit said, "has had up her professional standing and reputation as an actress, based on her natural and genuine endowments of beauty bestowed on her at birth."

The plaintiff accepted her as being a natural beauty. "But," says the suit, "a Look article in the April issue, entitled 'A New Face Through Plastic Surgery' used two photographs of the actress and 'represented them as a typical example of a 'before and after' operation."

"The article," it goes on, "states that this plaintiff had nasal plastic surgery performed on her and infers that the two photographs are illustrations of this fact."

"It is untrue that the plaintiff had ever, at any time or place whatsoever, had performed on her during her entire lifetime any form of nasal plastic surgery, and it is a positive fact that her features have been unaltered and have remained in their natural state since her birth."

### Crisis Looms For Schools, Speaker Says

A crisis in education within the next five years was forecast Thursday night by R. H. Snyder, president of the Southern Idaho College of Education, Albion, at a meeting of the Lincoln Parent-Teacher association.

Snyder listed three factors which are leading to a crisis. First, there is the present lack of teachers, particularly those who are experienced and qualified. Nearly one-fourth of Idaho teachers have had less than two years of college training, he declared.

Second, the lack of teachers will become worse, he pointed out, because there are now 27 per cent fewer teachers in training than in 1941.

Snyder emphasized that the third factor—an unprecedented increase in population—is the most serious. He warned that beginning next fall and continuing for seven years, elementary schools will be faced with more children, fewer teachers and inadequate facilities.

To meet this situation, the college president proposed more pre-school training, and the realization that more money will have to be spent to enlarge educational facilities.

### 'Spying' Charge Denied by Envoy

WASHINGTON, April 16 (AP)—U. S. Ambassador Walter Bedell Smith has branded as "false" Soviet charges that Robert MacGidoff, an American correspondent, spied for the U. S. embassy in Moscow.

Smith called his denial to the state department after MacGidoff had been ordered out by the Soviet government. The newsmen had been accused by Grevia Nelson, his American-born secretary, of having sent secret military data to this country in official U. S. diplomatic pouches.

But Smith said in his cable: "I have insisted and have insured that diplomatic, military and naval personnel of this mission restrict themselves implicitly and exclusively to legitimate and authorized sources of information."

### Battle Royal Is Predicted for Idaho Republican Conference

COEUR D'ALENE, April 16 (AP)—The north Idaho city today became the scene of Idaho Republican who started coming in from all directions for a good old-fashioned knockdown scrap over the officers and delegates to be selected at Saturday's GOP state convention.

The convention, held only on presidential election years, was called to elect a national committee member and committee chairman and select 11 delegates and 11 alternates to the Republican presidential nominating convention at Philadelphia in June.

NEW YORK, April 16 (AP)—Government officials have been saying the United States "should" have a stockpile of strategic minerals. Now they are saying it "must."

Metals industry leaders are being called to Washington as the military gear more urgently needed for the national shortages in copper, lead, tin, chrome, manganese, cobalt and molybdenum.

But dealers say there is still no sign yet that the government is ready to go into the market place.

**Prices Advance**  
Meanwhile, lead and platinum prices have advanced—lead to an all-time high of 17 1/2 cents a pound yesterday to 108 an ounce wholesale, a jump of \$26 in two weeks.

There is talk of copper going up again from the 21 1/2 cents a pound it has held for some time. Consumers are paying 22 cents in the world market, and trade sources are warning that domestic producers may not ask that price.

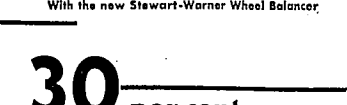

### Federal Loan Is Suggested To Aid Mines

WASHINGTON, April 16 (AP)—Mines development loans could be made by the government, House Speaker by Representative Hiram B. Dyer.

He has asked the House banking committee to consider an amendment to the Senate-passed measure providing the life of the program would permit such loans.

Under his proposal, loans could be made "in furtherance of the national economy or the national health."

The money could be used for "making accessible, examining or developing mine, placer or quarry resources; mining, milling or other processing; or quarrying and preparing quarry products for the market."

A limit of \$25,000,000 would be placed on the total of such loans.

### New Vitamin for Control of Blood Located in Liver

WASHINGTON, April 16 (AP)—Discovery of a new substance in liver, which has proved in initial tests to be 8500 to 10,000 times more powerful than previous treatments for pernicious anemia, has been announced.

Investigators reported on it in "Science" journal. They said they believe it may be the active substance—or one of the active substances—which has been sought for years to account for the fact that liver and liver-extract are effective in controlling this form of anemia.

Pernicious anemia—a blood disease—affects 50,000 Americans annually.

The new substance is tentatively called vitamin B-12, and it was isolated in crystalline form from liver.

Used so far on only three patients, it has done this:

1. It has shown indications of restoring normal blood conditions even though the quantity of material injected was 8,000 times less than the amount of an unpurified liver-extract required to produce comparable effects.

2. It has demonstrated these same effects even though the quantity employed was 10,000 times less than that required when another unpurified anemia treatment—the folic acid—is employed under the same conditions.

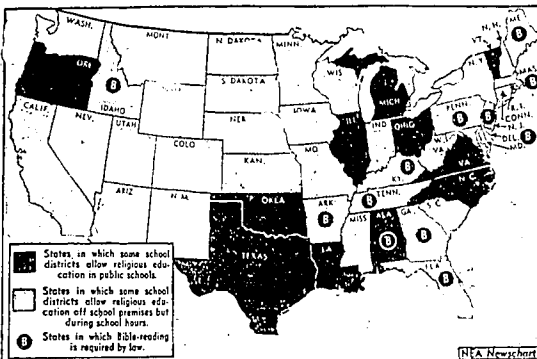

### Editors Lash At Peacetime News Censors

WASHINGTON, April 16 (AP)—The American Society of Newspaper Editors heard appeals for lifting up war of words against Russia and vigilance against any "bureaucratic menace" to freedom of news at home.

A special committee, reporting to the ASNE annual convention which opened here yesterday, urged also that the Associated Press and United Press let the government's "Voice of America" broadcast their reports during the world crisis.

**Deal With Censorship**  
ASNE is expected to decide its stand on the latter issue Saturday. One that during day it will vote also on at least three resolutions. The three, said Richard W. Clarke, the New York Daily News, chairman of the resolutions committee, "deal with censorship in one form or another."

They are:  
First, a condemnation of peacetime censorship except that covering scientific developments of a military nature.  
Second, a request that state legislatures—aside from the 11 which already have done so—pass laws to protect reporters from naming their news sources.

**Clearly Literary Rules**  
Third, a request that the post-office department "clarify" its ban against news of "integrity." The resolutions committee, said Clarke, feels that the rule prevents publication of some news which should be printed.

The ASNE committee on world dissemination of news, headed by Hamilton Cross, editor-in-chief of the Baltimore Sun paper, declared they convinced the government "of the necessity for carrying on and even intensifying" the government's overseas information effort.
