### Talk on Trip In Europe to Be Broadcast

Radio stations KVMY and KTFI will broadcast at 7 p. m. Sunday O. J. Botline's report on conditions as he saw them in Germany and Austria while serving as the American representative on the Christmas ship delegation. Botline will speak at the American Legion on Monday night. The public is invited to the talk which is sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce. Persons wishing to attend are urged to be in the hall by 6:30 p. m. Botline will speak for approximately one-half hour, after which a question period will be conducted.

#### Tells Experiences

Botline, Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce secretary, will speak on highlights of his experiences as a Christmas ship delegate. He made the tour of war-torn areas in central Europe with other delegates from Oregon, Washington, Montana and Alaska.

In his talk, Botline will particularly discuss relations between Germany and Russia and the Soviet program as it affects the United States. While Botline traveled mainly in the American zone, he also visited French zones of occupation. He had opportunity to observe the conditions of persons under Russian control.

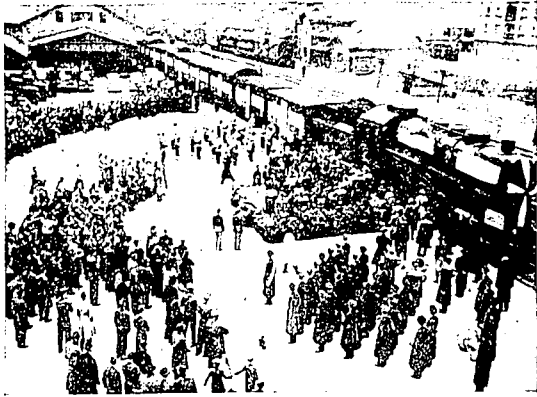
#### Notes Tension

During a four-day stay in Berlin, Botline had a good opportunity to study the Russians as the city is completely surrounded by Soviet territory. Shortly after the Christmas ship party left Berlin, the Russians clamped down on all allied transportation through the German capital. Botline will discuss the mounting tension that existed between Russian and American command at that time.

He will tell of a stop-over in Münster, a receiving station for German prisoners of war, where an average of 27,000 former German soldiers are received each month. He also will describe conditions in Düsseldorf (British zone), Coblenz and Metz (French zone) in Germany. While in Austria, the Christmas ship party visited Vienna and Salzburg. Botline will tell of a threat to bomb a Vienna hotel in which the representatives were staying.

On his return home, Botline stayed several days in Paris and one day in London. He flew home on the same trans-Atlantic plane that crashed Wednesday in Shannon, Eire, killing 30 persons.

### Latin America Seen as Front In 'Cold War'

### Idaho Solons Vow Schools Aid Support

All of Idaho's senators and representatives in congress have pledged to support federal financial aid to education as set forth in Senate bill 472 and House bill 2553, Res. Hays, Hols, reports.

Miss Hays represented Idaho's education in Washington recently when Senate bill 472 was before the Senate for final consideration.

"Each of our representatives graciously granted me the courtesy of an interview," said Miss Hays, "Senators Davenport and Taylor not only pledged support, but each provided me with a written statement to that effect. Senator Davenport voted for Senate bill 472 when it came up for action, but Senator Taylor was absent on state business."

Representative Sarnburn gave assurance that he would support the federal aid bill when it came before the House, as did Representative Cliff. Miss Hays stated that her statement is corroborated by George N. Green, Pocatello, superintendent of schools, on Representative Sarnburn's statement. Green stated that he also was a letter supporting federal aid, to Marlin Bingham, leader of the local education association of Blackfoot.

"None of our delegation," said Mrs. Hays, "apparently was impressed with the fiction of a recent state news release to the effect that Idaho taxpayers would be asked to pay for the education of children in other states."

"While every person of intelligence knows that taxpayers provide all funds from federal sources, every such person knows also that since the federal money will be distributed on an equalization basis and Idaho is one of the poorer states, rather than the reverse, while the federal aid is appropriated according to needs as measured by the number of children to be educated."

"Accordingly, all of the states ranging below the average in wealth per pupil to be educated, receive more federal funds than do other states, and more funds than they actually pay out in taxes for this purpose."



WASHINGTON, April 16 (AP)—A proposed wool research program to expand the uses of medium grade fibers was outlined at a capitol luncheon for lawmakers from large sheep growing states.

Eugene Ackerman of New York, executive director of the American Wool council, told the group the program calls for coordinated research by private industry, the agriculture department and the British government.

**British Studies Explained**  
Present at the luncheon to discuss studies carried on in England was Dr. Erich G. Carter, director of the International Wool Secretariat of London.

Industry leaders will go to California next week to discuss the matter with Dr. M. J. Conley, head of the agriculture department, regional research laboratory at Albany, Ackerman said.

He expressed the government would also official sanction to the cooperative program soon so studies can get under way by the end of this year.

**Wenatchee Research Set**  
The Princeton textile to state at Princeton, N. J., will carry on research on behalf of private industry, Ackerman noted, and said the objective of the study would be to develop a "quality area" for the lower grade wools.

"There is a continuing decline in the production of the wool," Ackerman said. "The aim of the program is in part ways of improving the quality of the medium grade wools."

He said wool production in the United States has declined 50 percent since 1912, while consumption for apparel goods has increased 70 percent.

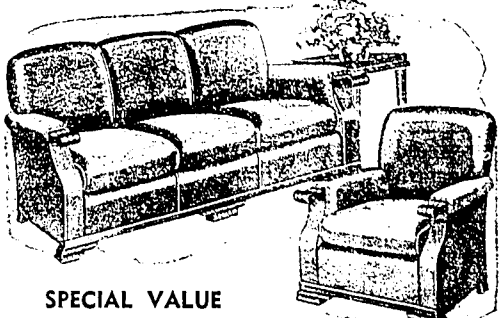

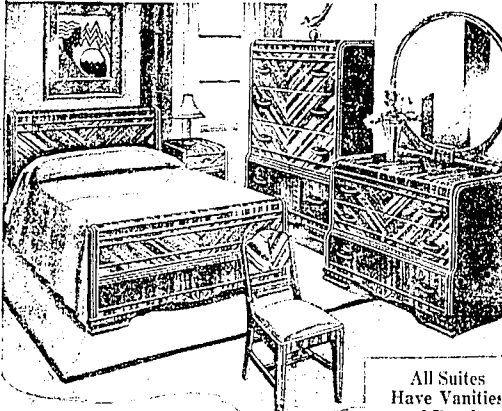

President Truman said the American people must not be misled by those who oppose a reasonable anti-inflation program and a reasonable defense program.

He has been said that the present administration is trying to create an economic crisis or an international crisis," he said. "The exact opposite is the truth.

"The welfare of our own people, the effectiveness of our foreign policy and the prosperity of the defenses all depend on our prosperity. Only if we preserve the soundness of our economy, through prompt and adequate measures to control inflation can we establish our full employment program in a freedom and democracy will be secure."

The President mentioned the rise in steel prices, the income tax reduction, the new tax on excess profits, and the coal strike as factors to be considered in the economic program.

He also referred to the millions needed for European recovery and additional funds for national defense.

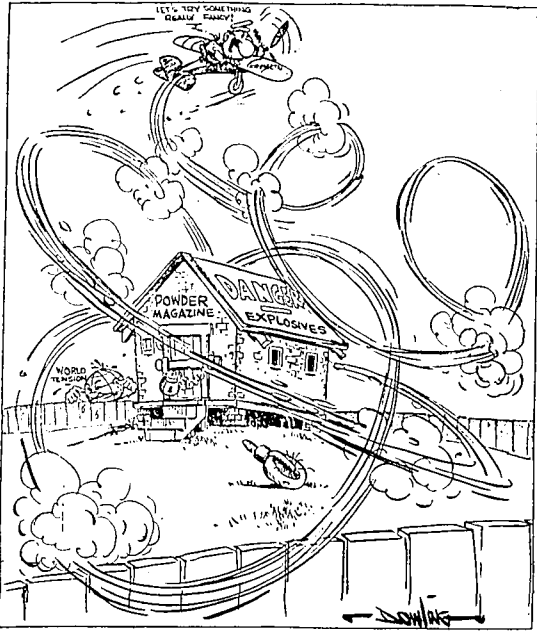

### New Sugar Beet Harvester Told

Plans for local manufacture of a two-row sugar beet harvester were disclosed Saturday by Herb E. Wundertlich, Twin Falls, who said he has spent 15 years in developing the machine. About 10 years ago, he said he invented a one-row beet harvester that has been tested in California, Wyoming and Montana.

Pulled by a tractor, Wundertlich's two-row device tows, pulls and clears the sugar beets, and then loads them into a truck. Individual levers control various parts of the machine. After they have been adjusted, the operator need use only a master lever.

The topping blade is bounced by a spring and is fully adjustable. Following it is an arm which cleans the ground before a scoop-shaped pulley lifts the beet out of the ground and onto a reel where they knock dirt off of the beet. The beet is then carried on an under-shung belt which leads it into a truck.

Retains Given

### 5-Year Dream Of Camp Fire Girls Realized

A five-year dream of Camp Fire Girls in the Twin Falls council will be realized this summer.

In 1933 the entire community prompted the site a plot of land in Shoshone Falls park. The girls were to add a south of the main building to the area by planting trees, shrubs and grass. In turn, Camp Fire groups were to be established in the area for recreational purposes and overnight camping activities. Mrs. Hull is now a senior in Twin Falls high school and is still active in Camp Fire work.

**Supervising Project**

Supervising the development of Idaho Glen are Mrs. N. O. Johnson, Camp Fire executive, Victor Gortzen, in charge of the camping project, and Pete Hickey, city parks superintendent.

We hope to have Idaho Glen ready for overnight camping grounds by this summer," Mrs. Johnson said. "We want to get trees and shrubbery planted as soon as possible and get a fireplace constructed. In addition, in succeeding years, we want to hold annual Arbor day observances in the Glen."

**Girls Have Plans**

Goetzinger reported the girls hope to give the Glen a touch of wild beauty by planting such native shrubs as rose, wild sumac, green wood, meadow, buck-brush, wild rose, native vines and wild flowers. To make the Glen a bird sanctuary, it was decided to plant purple willow, Russian olive, locust, juncos and cedars, all of which will help to attract birds, he said.

On their overnight outings, the girls will be able to obtain rain requirements by camping out and preparing meals out-of-doors.

Idaho Glen will be used by 20 Camp Fire groups and 12 Blue Bird groups in Twin Falls county. More than 500 girls in 15 units will enjoy the facilities of the area.

### Anti-Reds Are Confident for Win in Italy

By J. M. ROBERTS, Jr.  
AP Foreign Affairs Analyst

The world's anti-communist forces are sitting back comfortably today, confident that, barring a last minute outbreak of violence, the battle of Italy has been won.

Two months ago the situation looked black. The government, unable to cope with the problem of 1,800,000 unemployed, inflation, the black market and shortages, probably had less than half of the people behind it.

The communists, already strong in the industrial north, were going south in the south showing the farmers just what plans they would be given under land reforms.

To Get Powerful Hold

The communist-socialist coalition was expected to get 40 to 50 percent of the total vote, giving them a powerful hold on the government even if they didn't take it over completely.

The Russians struck a telling blow by coming out in favor of returning Italy's war-lost African colonies. The United States was awakened to the danger, rolled up its sleeves and for the first time in a European political campaign.

No Marshall plan help for a communist government, the Italians were told. "Tricite is yours if they agree. There were many other warnings and blandishments.

This brightened picture, however, is still framed with dark clouds of danger. Many people fear that the very organization of the communist political position will lead them into an armed uprising.

In the light of all this, the voting may not be definitive. Democracy's defeat in Italy might mean its death, at least throughout Europe, whereas the communists can lose a battle and still come back to continue the war.

That is why Pope Pius has referred to this as the "great hour of Christian conscience" for Italy and the world.

Islanders Plan to Build U. S. Plant

SAÑ JUAN, April 17 (AP)—Puerto Rican sugar interests had said today they probably would build two refineries at east coast United States ports soon if the proper sites can be obtained.

Jesus M. Rios, secretary of the Association of Sugar Producers said the refineries were badly needed because of a slump in sales of local sugar which had practically paralyzed shipments since the first of the year.

"Unless raw sugar leaves the island at the rate of 55,000 tons a month, it piles up here," Rios said. "Due to the present reduction of United States refineries to buy Puerto Rican sugar, we have fallen behind in shipments by about 200,000 tons since Jan. 1."

He added that producers frequently had to cut prices when storage space became unavailable, a fact well known to U. S. refineries.

### China Range Search Fails To See Peak

By TOM MASTERTON

LARCHMONT, Nev., Nov. 17 (AP)—We have just returned from exploring the Anne Machin mountains from the air and if there's a peak there higher than Everest we couldn't find it.

These mysterious mountains of western China were reported by some war-time pilots to contain a peak higher than Everest. The recent Reynolds expedition, called off at the last minute, was to have explored this range.

Ten-foot-tall mountains observed during nearly seven hours of flight over the range was depone compared with 22,000-foot Everest, the world's highest.

This Anne Machin peak isn't even the highest in China. We saw two higher ones, the taller a good 21,000 feet, but neither was in the Anne Machin range.

Veteran Pilot Mervyn Chin, who made the calculations, said he believed the taller of the two peaks was in the Kung mountains to the south of the Anne Machins. The second peak was measured at 24,400 feet.

Without elaborate preparations or the fanfare that heralded the abortive Milton Reynolds expedition, this business of measuring the peaks was run off as if it were just another assignment. There was no extensive preparation, no extensive apparatus.

The crew's instruments were radar and four altimeters. The General Air Transport corporation furnished the plane and crew. There were no scientists along.

Chin, an American-born Chinese from Chicago, assured correspondents his navigation was true. Apparently he feared repercussions from the surprise discovery that the Anne Machin has no record-breaking peaks.

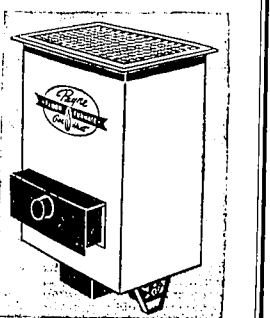

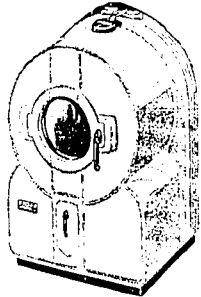

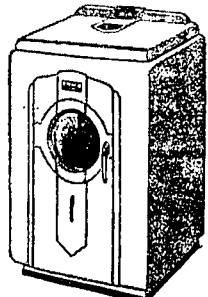

# Life in MAGIC VALLEY

By INEZ PUCKETT

**COOPERATION**  
"Alone, our work is of little worth; Together we are lords of the earth; So it's all for each and for all— United stand, divided fail."  
... From Jerome Cooperatives Creamery

"It's a lie!" That's what you can say next time you hear someone state that farmers can't work together. Magic Valley has an experiment in co-operation which might well be an example for the nation and the world. This is the Jerome Cooperative Creamery, a humming organization of milk men and machines, presided over by General Manager Roy Smith. It was back in 1918 that a small group of Jerome farmers got the idea of combining efforts to improve dairy operations. From that beginning developed the present "Co-op," an industry embracing two plants (one in Jerome, one in Twin Falls), a dairy truck route covering more than 15,000 counties, and an output of a hundred million pounds of milk a year.

This cooperative organization is one of the strongest in the west, and is controlled entirely by its producer members. "We put out three and one-half million pounds of butter yearly, also five million pounds of dry milk," said A. D. McMahon, Jerome "Co-op" treasurer. Mr. McMahon handles sales and advertising for the co-op, and had good-naturedly consented to "show us the works" at the plant. On the platform of the conveyor belts were carrying endless rows of filled cans to the creamery where the milk bottles and apparatus tested the contents of each can as it moved majestically past.

"We have 35 trucks in the territory," said Mr. M. "Each carries from 5,500 to 7,000 pounds of milk." He said some of the trucks drivers like Albert East and Hurly Smith, had been with the organization for more than 20 years. We went inside to watch the cans being steamed, washed, and dried. There was such a din of whirring, clanking, machines that our guide had to yell in our ear. He showed us the huge evaporators for the cream, the pasteurizing vats, eight of 'em, and the churns in which the cream is pumped.

"These hold about 2,400 pounds," he shouted, and motioned a white-cloth attendant to open a door. Inside by a giant glob of butter, yellow as gold. It takes more than looks though, each ball being tested for butterfat, and there's a little laboratory nearby for this purpose. We went into a cold room where neatly garbed girls were working.

"These big butter molds are called Fridays," yelled Mr. Mar. "The wires on top cut the butter into pounds and the stick wrap them up out." After that we went out and climbed a spidery stair to the condenser units which take the water out of milk. Twenty huge atomizers sprayed condenser's in the air, and nearby, we peered through a portable into one of the drying rooms. It was full of a creamy fog. In the adjoining lab was a friendly young woman named Fern Snow, who showed us how she tests bacteria, moisture, album and sediment tests. Down below stairs we saw the dried milk going into 25-pound containers. Our guide then pointed out the

hold approximately 85,000 pounds of milk which is pasteurized and then stored on its way.

### Girl's Love of Radio Stories Nips Escapee

PORTLAND, Ore., April 17.—A 12-year-old girl's fondness for a radio program today had led to the arrest of a man charged with kidnapping a Missouri sheriff two and a half years ago.

The FBI announced that John Harvey Bush, 29, was arrested today under a baby's crib at Hillsboro, Ore., Friday morning, after a curious and courageous child's persistence led to a police search.

Special FBI Agent Howard L. Dobbitz said Bush has been sought ever since the Blue County, Mo., sheriff was kidnaped, rebelled, and left tied to an Oklahoma telephone pole in November of 1945.

**Tattoo Gave Man Away**

The letters "L-O-V-E" tattooed on the fingers of Bush's left hand, combined with the curiosity of 12-year-old Pauline Virginia as to why her riding teacher cut classes, were said to lead up, led to the arrest.

The man arrested today had been living since August at the Oregon coastal town of Gearhart and Seaside, working in a radio store under the name of Jim Williams. Constantly, he wore tape on his left fingers. He had short blond hair.

**Heard Description**

Pauline, the radio-lover daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roy V. Vreth, Gearhart, heard a description of Bush on a radio program, which described him as having cut fingers, the letters "love" tattooed on his left fingers.

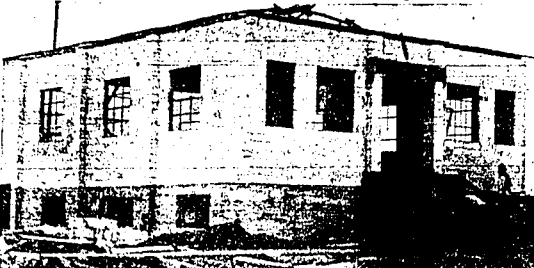
She promptly went back to the riding academy and challenged "Cooney Jim" about why he kept his fingers taped. "He was married," she told reporters afterward. "I was scared of him after that."

She told her 14-year-old cousin, Navarre Smith. Some adults were told, too, but they all scoffed at "childish imaginations."

Eventually, after most of Gearhart's children had been teased with the matter, Navarre Smith stopped a policeman on the small town street, and asked "where does the FBI live?"

Told the story, the policeman notified the FBI. Today FBI officials arrested the erstwhile riding teacher.

### After 30 Years, Gooding Unit Is Building New Grange Hall

GOODING, April 17.—After almost 30 years of meeting in homes, schools and other halls, the Gooding Grange will soon be able to hold all meetings and social functions in its own hall.

The new center-block structure will probably be ready for members by mid-summer. The building will be 10 by 100 feet, with a full basement and 10 to 12 feet meeting height. The kitchen and dining hall will be in the basement, which can be thrown into one large room or divided into smaller parts.

First real efforts toward building a Grange hall began about 12 years ago. The war slowed the plan and then post-war building restrictions hampered the group. Finally about three years ago the first lumber was ordered cut in the hills north of Gooding.

Most of the labor will be contributed by members. Leonard Christensen was the first contractor, followed by William Huff with a crew of three men who are doing most of the skilled work.

The main part of the hall upstairs will be 70 by 40 feet with a stage at the east end and rooms and lounges in the west. It is estimated that the building would cost about \$20,000 if it had all been contracted. Free labor contributed by members will have cut the cost about in half.

The Gooding Grange is using the construction as their entry in the National Grange contest. The entry will be judged partly upon the percentage of membership cooperation in the project. First prizes will be \$12,000 Grange hall or fire fighting equipment for that amount. Other prizes include \$1,500 worth of kitchen equipment or a prize of equivalent value. There are numerous other valuable prizes.

The new hall is located on the main highway into town. One of the greatest features of the building will be the parking lots in the rear of the building.

Gooding was the only Grange in the county of seven subordinate Granges without a hall.

Ralph Smith pointed out the hall will be for rent to other clubs and organizations. Many have already made arrangements.

Ray Stephens was master when the actual building plans got under way. Ralph Smith is now serving as master.

The centerblocks will be covered with a waterproof white cement on the outside and a smooth plaster finish on the inside walls.

LOS ANGELES, April 17.—A giant sunspot with a diameter twice that of the earth was observed at Griffith observatory.
