Infant Boy Is Detained Over Citizen Status

NEW YORK, April 19 (AP)—A six-month-old boy, born abroad of an American mother, was held as an alien today on Ellis Island while immigration officials tried to determine if he was eligible to enter the country.

The child was his mother, Mrs. Julia C. Bonati, 38, born in Rochester, N. Y. She is the mother of three other children, all foreign-born but held to be American citizens. Also with her was another son, Frank, 12.

Law Changed
Immigration laws previously excluded foreign born children of American born mothers to American citizenship but this provision has been repealed, an Ellis Island official said. This change was responsible for the detention of six-month-old Richard.

Frank and the two other children who have not yet arrived from Italy, are not affected because they were born before the present law went into effect.

Mrs. Bonati told immigration officials she went to Italy 18 years ago, married Ruggero Bonati and became the mother of four children. The father and the two other children, Ernest, 16, and Maria, 14, are expected to arrive soon in New York. The mother will come under the Italian immigration quota.

Care of Returning War Dead And Reception Told by Boyle

NEW YORK, April 19 (AP)—"You're not my very eye."
"He was just your color."
"You look so much like my brother."
These are the remarks that next-of-kin make most often to the military escorts who accompany American war dead being brought home from overseas.

Not a flight buddy goes home lonely.

Each dead soldier, sailor or marine is escorted home to a military center—there are 15 of them in the United States—by his final declaration by a fellow serviceman of his own rank.

Approximately 65 to 70 per cent of the war dead to be returned to America will pass through the New York port of embarkation and more than 10,000 have been brought back here since last Oct. 15.

There is a slogan in the army: "If you're dead in the metropolitan area, an emergency base volunteered for assignment as military escorts for war dead passing through the metropolitan area."

Most escorts are combat veterans themselves—like Pvt. Sgt. Bernard Tolson, 28, of Conland, N. Y., an aviator in the Battle of the Bulge, or Tech. Sgt. Robert Joralemon, 26, a U. S. Army operator from Elmira, N. Y., who made 45 missions over Europe. Or marine Staff Sgt. Arthur H. Greenberg, 26, of Detroit, who was captured on Corridor and spent 3½ years in Jap prison camps.

All are given a training course before they begin the task of escorting the dead heroes to their families.

"It's a sad duty," said Tolson, "and your first mission about breaks you to pieces."

"But the family usually wants to take us right into their home until the services are over. They try to make us feel like we are their own son, and the mother often says, 'You look just like my own boy.'"

"A lot of them ask us to come back and spend our next leave with them," said Joralemon.

Escorts who saw combat themselves are particularly sensitive to the dignity of their missions. They feel that except for the way their luck went on the battlefield they might themselves be among the dead passengers now making the long journey home.

"If I have been very fortunate," said Greenberg, a slim quiet man who was only 20 when the Japs took him, "I feel it is a real honor to take home men who died for this country as bravely as I."

He said it very simply.

Only one escort was asked to be relieved. He was a sergeant in his late forties who was assigned to army camps in this country during the war.

"It wasn't my fault I didn't get across," he said. "But I couldn't stand the look in the eyes of parents of the dead boys when they asked me if I'd served with their son."

One embarrassing feature of the assignment is that relatives try to force money gifts on the escorts to show their gratitude.

"When we refuse, they try to slip it in our pockets," said Tolson.

In 45-and pleaded with the escort \$100. An elderly Polish woman told Tolson: "From her purse—all she had to it—and pleaded with the escort who had brought her boy home to take the money."

Another family wrote to the commanding officer of one young escort and asked permission to adopt him.

The escorts say they have met with no bitterness among survivors.

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Novel 'Plastic Powder' Aids Heart Patients

CHICAGO, April 19 (AP)—A new plastic powder promises many heart disease patients the boon of again eating foods with salt, two scientists reported today.

The powder is emulsified with water, like medicine. It then removes salt from food passing through the intestine. Dr. J. J. Greenblatt of Beth El hospital, Brookline, and M. E. Oldwood of the Permutit company, New York, told the American Chemical society's national meeting.

It has been used successfully, they said, on some persons who otherwise could not eat salted foods. These patients had heart troubles marked by dropsy, excessive water in body tissues, and swelling of the joints. Salt aggravates this condition, so they had been put on diets almost entirely free of salt.

The diet is tasteless, and boring. Patients taking three tablepoons of the powder before and after each meal have been able to eliminate some of the excessive water without restricted diets or medicine, they said. The treatment still is being studied, Dr. Greenblatt stressed.

Witnesses said the moving loop rope became entangled in the girl's knit sweater. She tried frantically to free herself for several minutes, but the twisted sweater finally broke her neck. Nearly 50 other skiers, farther down the slope, were unable to save the girl.

The girl's death was witnessed by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Noah B. Springs, and her sister, Vivian, 15. The verdict of accidental death was returned by Dr. Freeman Fowler, Clear Creek county coroner.

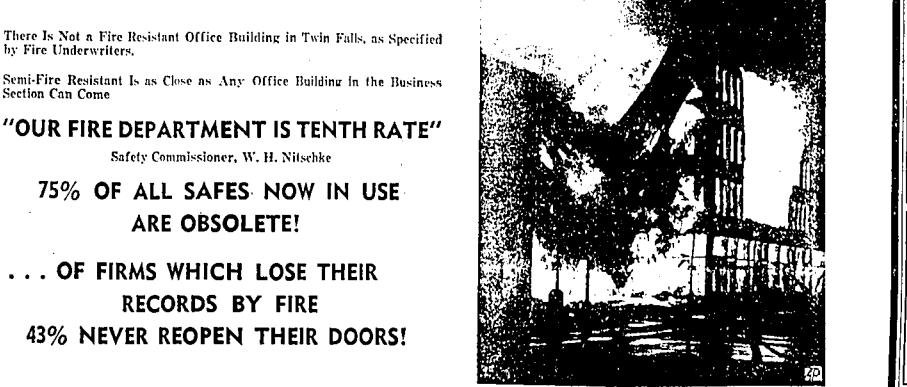

WASHINGTON—"If the communists take Italy in the election," says E. H. R. of Clinton, E. C., "what would we make it this should occur?"

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"WASHINGTON CALLING" BY MARQUIS CHILDS

New nominations keep coming in for the "ocean" for the year's most high-powered lobbying. With re-emergence of the tanks of the pressure boys from day to day in this era of bigger and better lobbying, it is not surprising that we have an almost impossible task.

CLAIM TO THE HONOR—The honor is being pressed in behalf of the big five—American, Eastern, Twin Falls and North-west—an increase in mail pay which will cost the taxpayer at least an additional \$200,000,000 over and above the \$21,000,000 they now get. The increase is proposed although Eastern rates are at present higher than those computed by CAB at 30 percent after taxes, and the other four at an average of 10 percent return.

There is a report that Sen. Homer Ferguson is getting interested in an increase in the rate of rest to the government. What is serious is that, so long as the custom of the industry in this nation is not likely to get the kind of expansion which is vital to industry capacity both at home and abroad.

A thoroughgoing investigation would look into the foreign field too. Postoffice records show that Pan-American always got its postoffice CAB for \$1,000,000 more.

In Joseph J. O'Connell, Jr. the CAB has a new chairman. It is a member is still to be appointed. There is a chance to break away from the course of least resistance which is increasingly to give everything to a few dominant companies.

Planning out the actual cost of carrying the air mail in relation to the subsidy payments, is something the CAB has never got around to. It is a question of the air mail subsidies and the tactics they employed.

With the new significant contract for carrying the air mail in relation to the CAB finds that the big five must get \$8 cents a ton more as a condition for carrying the air mail. At the same time the big five have applied for, and CAB has approved, rates for carrying cargo as low as 12 cents a ton mile.

Since the air mail is business and the air mail is business and since the ground handling is performed by the government, it is not surprising that the CAB should be carrying the mail costs almost five times as much as carrying cargo.

Put another fact alongside this. Ambitious young veterans have formed a new organization, the National Air Mail Carriers' Association. For two years three small companies have waited for CAB to act on their applications to operate chartered routes. This far the single application has been granted.

Some of the little companies have had to fold up. A few little ones of the big executives noted with much self-satisfaction not long ago.

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BOB HOPE Attack on West Toned Down by Russia's Press

MOSCOW, April 19.—The Soviet press has toned down its attacks on the United States and Britain. There has been nothing official on this, but foreign political observers in a number of Moscow's papers have noted a change in the tone of the news.

Criticism of the United States and capitalism in general undoubtedly will continue, but such news is neither as sharp nor as voluminous as it has been. The same is true of the criticism of both Britain and France.

Recently the newspapers have become much concerned with internal affairs. The daily big city newspapers devote much of their space these days to editorializing on their own news for agriculture and industry and news on lower prices and more goods for the Russian consumer.

There is a decided lack of war talk in the newspapers. The editorials seldom mention war at all in their columns at large.

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Forrestal Gets Defense Delay Blame of Solon

WASHINGTON, April 19 (AP)—Senator Dworkshak, R. Ida., blames Defense Secretary Forrestal and his staff for a delay in the new peacetime program.

The Idaho senator said in a statement the "inability of Forrestal and his aides 'to see across a program' has delayed the armed services committee in drafting a program.

"For this reason, Dworkshak said, bills for the program probably will not be ready for Senate action before the last of next week.

Dworkshak said he conferred with members of the armed services committee and found "that Secretary Forrestal has not yet presented figures on cost or manpower necessary for an increased air force."

The House has voted to appropriate funds for planes for a 10-group air force "completely disregarding the lack of official action," Dworkshak declared.

This action was taken even though "the chiefs of staff have not yet agreed on any program which is preliminary to congressional action."

Carey's Airstrip To Open in Week

CAREY, April 19—Carey's new community airport is expected to be ready for use next week, Leonard Howard, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce airport committee, reported.

Scheduling of the airstrip in grass has been postponed until next fall to allow the hills to settle. Originally, airport officials had planned to plant the entire area next spring, which would have barred planes from the strip until about July 1.

Chet Moulton, state aeronautical director, and federal civil aeronautics administration officials inspected the airport Friday. Moulton expressed satisfaction with plans for the early completion of the airport, pointing out that Carey is on the direct flight route between Idaho Falls and Boise, thus providing a refueling point for planes which would need gas between the two points.

Moulton conferred with R. E. Adams, local estate operator, on plans for installing facilities for refueling and servicing planes.
