Army Speeds Schedule for Return Task

BROOKLYN ARMY BASE, April 20 (AP)—The task of returning American war dead will be completed in half the expected time.

Originally the army thought it would take five years and \$400,000,000. This estimate was based on the belief that next-of-kin would request the return for burial in this country of about 10 per cent of the men who died overseas.

Today the quartermaster corps hopes to complete the program in about two years. Survivors of only 20 per cent of the combat dead of World War II are expected to be returned from the lands where they fell.

Slight Reversal
An interesting sidelight: Of 243,358 letters dispatched by last February to next-of-kin asking their wishes, some \$465 have never been answered.

What does this figure mean? It means that one out of every five persons hasn't taken the trouble to notify the government what he wants done with the body of a man who when alive listed him as his nearest or dearest relative.

A charitable interpretation of this inaction is that the 20 per cent who didn't reply merely took this means of indicating that they wanted their dead to remain where they are.

Relative Missing
In 10,162 other cases the letters of inquiry were returned as undeliverable. The next-of-kin no longer could be found.

Of some 115,377 forms returned and now classified, 70,754—or 60 per cent—requested the servicemen be returned here for burial in a private or national cemetery.

A majority of the forms passed through the New York port of embarkation on the way to one of the 10 distribution centers throughout the country, where military escorts are assigned to accompany them to their final resting place.

Task is Simplified
The task is simplified with simple dignity. Each transport is met by 200 to 400 survivors, representatives of veterans groups, and a Protestant, Catholic or Jewish chaplain. A short memorial service is held.

Each dead is listed individually on the transport's passenger roster. After each name is the notation—(deceased).

"One mother who came down to meet the ship bore up well until she saw her boy listed as a passenger," said Capt. Larry Phelan, combat veteran of the first infantry division. "Then she broke down."

Caskets Sealed
The caskets are sealed, as required by law in all states. The question troubled parents ask most often:

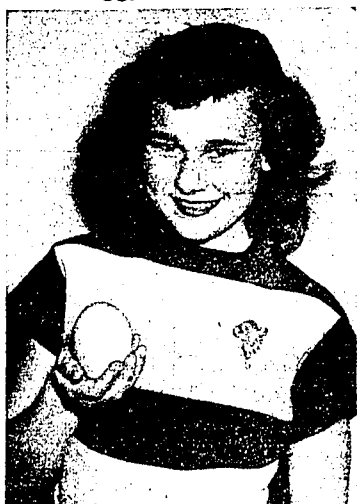
"You're sure it's our boy, and there's been no mistake?"
They are satisfied by the army's answer:

"You would never have received a letter of inquiry if the identification hadn't been positive."
Trains, Hearse Used
Bodies travel home by train from the distribution centers except when the burial site is within 40 miles. In these cases motor hearses are used.

Sometimes as one transport unfreezes its war dead at the bus, another is being loaded by troops sailing for overseas posts. The other day a line of trucks carrying troops assigned to duty abroad rolled into the base as a cortege of motor hearses departed, each carrying a serviceman down with life and war.

A man watching from a window as the columns of the quick and the dead passed at the gate said: "It seems symbolic."

Idaho Spuds Lasted Well, Even in Sea

IDAHO FALLS, April 20 (AP)—The keeping quality of Idaho tubers—this time in dehydrated form—received a bouquet from Norway today.

The tribute came by way of Erik Byrn Hesselberg, Norway, who recently had a meal on dehydrated potatoes produced by an Idaho Falls plant.

The potatoes he made were apparently lost either in a shipwreck or deliberate sinking and were found on a Norway beach. Plant officials here said the tubers were produced in 1942.

"On a lonely spot on the shore of Oslo fjord in Norway," the letter said, "I discovered two cases of wood lying deep in the water near land. They looked very old and heavy. After some trouble I got them ashore. Inside the cases were found four cardboard boxes with dehydrated potatoes. . . the cardboard looked . . . very wet but I opened one and was astonished to find that the contents were perfectly dry."

The Norwegian said he returned to the beach the next day and found more of the dehydrated Idaho potatoes lying further offshore. These too were still good, he said.

Truman Sure Of His Train Nomenclature

 WASHINGTON, April 20 (AP)—Casey Jones didn't make any old time engineer hump. His job was to get the spot on his nose into the barn and bed it down for the night. Most likely Casey, as he prodded "ST" down the grade at 80 or 90 miles an hour, wasn't fussed about the various humps of steel that go into a locomotive. As a matter of fact, few people were until around 1917. The question came up at the 38th annual convention of the Railroad Master Mechanics association at Manhattan Beach, there it was resolved that the Railroad Gazette be empowered to publish an illustrated dictionary giving the proper names of "each and every part" used in building locomotives.

Glossary Gains Weight
 The glossary of railroad terms put out shortly after that, has grown until today it's a volume weighing several pounds. The latest edition, came out recently, and contains 1410 pages, with thousands and thousands of terms.

It would be interesting to line up a dozen or so railroad presidents and ask them on some of their own complicated terms.

The indexed book quite properly starts with the "A's," the first being the accident report. It doesn't tell you right off what is meant by that, but says see "boiler inspection."

It goes on to "car," which means "alligator cross-bed," which looked rather interesting, it said to see "cross-bed."

White House Incident
 What first prompted us to call on Miss Elizabeth O. Callen, head librarian of the Bureau of Railroad Economics of the Association of American Railroads, was something which happened on the White House lawn last week.

President Truman countered to pose alongside a replica of a 160-year-old locomotive to help publicize the Chicago railroad fair. Mr. T, being famously curious, was nosing around the old engine. A newspaperman remarked in the President's earshot that that was a "snuffy looking" engine. The front end. The chief rubbed his chin and looked down over his spectacles at the speaker.

Truman says, "Look it up?"
 "Concaterchers?" he scoffed. "There isn't any such thing as a concatercher. It's called a pilot, look it up."

We looked it up; it's a pilot. And while we were in the biggest rail library in the world we looked up a lot of other things.

A "pratticoat pipe," for example, is a pipe in the smoke box over or surrounding the exhaust pipe for the purpose of causing a partial vacuum.

But some of the definitions are so simple even laymen can get 'em. A berth, for instance, is a "bed in a sleeping car." And of course a door is a door and a wheel is a wheel and an engine is a thing that pulls the rest of the train. In other words an engine.

Mumps Epidemic Continues to Rise

BOISE, April 20 (AP)—Mumps continued to race throughout Idaho with 141 cases reported during the past week.

John W. Wright, director of vital statistics of the Idaho department of public health, said the state total for the first 15 weeks of the year is 1,154 compared with 672 cases for the corresponding period of 1947.

Fifty-eight new cases were reported in Blaine county with 41 of the cases occurring in Power. Jefferson county reported 19, Idaho Falls, 16, and Boise 13.

Wright said 121 new cases of measles also were reported during the week, bringing the year's total to 410. During the same period a year ago only 27 cases had been reported.

Sixty-one of the new cases were in Jefferson county and 22 in Shoshone county.

In a complaint filed against Valentine Schokohl for a divorce, here Schokohl is asking the custody of two minor children, household goods, and support money. The charge is cruelty.

Eva E. Jones has filed suit for divorce from J. H. Jones on grounds of cruelty. The plaintiff asks custody of one minor child, certain real estate, while the defendant will retain his used car business.

Contracts Signed For Weed Killer

BOISE, April 20 (AP)—More than \$50,000 in noxious weed killer had been purchased by the state today.

The chemical will be used by county agents and county noxious weed bureaus for eradication purposes.

The Clippman Chemical company, Portland, was awarded a contract for supplying 222,500 pounds of acidium chloride for \$24,173. The California Spray Chemical company was given a contract for 110 gallons of 2-4-D, trichloromethyl ether. The low bid was \$9,431.70.

The Salt Lake Hardware company was awarded contracts for supplying 240 gallons of butyl-ester base 2-4-D and ester base 2-4-D. The contract price was \$2,078.

A contract for supplying 3,205 gallons of amine base 2-4-D was awarded Miller Products company, Portland, for \$14,542.

Blaine Man Hurt By Fall of Horse

HAILEY, April 20—Wayne Clark, Blaine county commissioner, was injured Monday noon from the Hailey Clinical hospital following treatment for injuries sustained Sunday morning when his horse fell on him.

Clark was coming after cattle about 6:30 a. m. Sunday on his ranch. While his horse was running, it stepped into a hole, fell and rolled over Clark, whose foot caught in the stirrup.

His left shoulder was pulled partially from its socket and the bone cracked in two places; his right thumb was dislocated and sprained. Clark also received facial lacerations and numerous bruises.

Century Fails To Change Ad On Farm Sale

Public farm sales have been much the same for 100 years. Even the advertisements for a farm sale have remained the same.

This familiar wording of the farm sale ad: "Having sold my farm, I am leaving for Oregon territory by ox team and will offer March 1, 1845, all my personal property," appeared in the Anderson, Ky., News in February, 1949, according to Arch Whitley, 23 Fourth avenue east.

Of course the items for sale differed in 1845, for then such things as ox teams, a 60-gallon soap kettle, 10 gallons of maple syrup, two spinning wheels, 25 pounds of mutton tallow, one large loom, and 100 empty barrels were offered.

Whitley said he saw the clipping of the 1845 farm sale published in his hometown paper from Arkansas.

Today people would be amazed to find for sale one 25-gallon barrel of Johnson Miller whiskey, seven years old; 20 gallons of apple brandy; one 40-gallon copper still; one 22-caliber rifle, bullet mold and powder horn, or 50 gallons of oregano molasses!

Reflecting the era of history this century appeared at the end of the sale ad: "At the same time I will sell my six Negro slaves, two men, 25 and 50 years old; two boys, 16 and 18 years old; two milk cows, 40 and 20 years old; and I will sell all together to come partly as I will separate them."

Characteristic of a farm sale, the ad assured persons attending the sale "breadth of food and drink."

Catholic Leaders Gather to Honor Seating of Bishop

SEATTLE, April 20 (AP)—Catholic dignitaries from all parts of the west coast converged on this city today for the Wednesday installation of the Most Rev. Thomas A. Connolly as coadjutor bishop of Seattle.

Bishop Connolly, auxiliary bishop of San Francisco since 1939, was scheduled to reach here by train this afternoon.

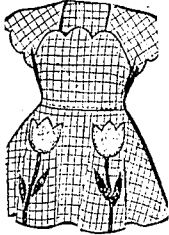

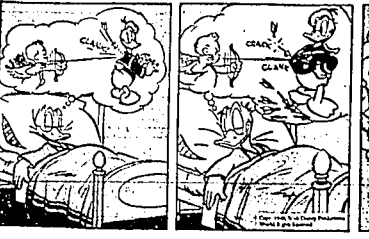

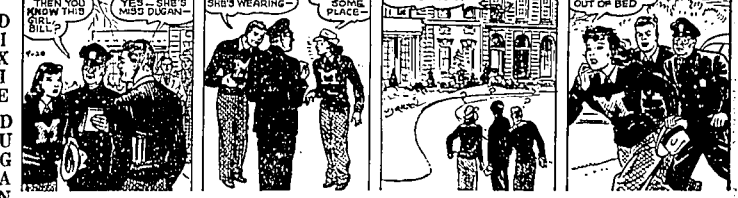
