Judge Postpones Further Fine on Lewis and Union

WASHINGTON, April 23 (AP)—Judge T. Alan Goldborough today postponed indefinitely any further contempt penalty against John L. Lewis and the United Mine Workers union.

Goldborough accepted a government recommendation that he impose no further punishment at this time.

Asst. Atty.-Gen. Graham Morrison said no useful purpose could be accomplished by new fines against Lewis and the union now.

Last Tuesday, Goldborough fined Lewis \$20,000 personally and the UMW \$1,100,000 for criminal contempt of court. The contempt finding was based on their disregard of an April 3 court order to stop the coal strike.

There also was a finding by the judge that the union was guilty of civil contempt. Today's court session was for pronouncing on the civil contempt charge.

85 Per Cent Returned Morrison told Goldborough that 85 per cent or more of the soft coal miners have returned to work. Therefore, Morrison said, he moved his contempt order against Lewis and the union to "indefinitely." The judge agreed.

Morrison said "the government is quite happy" over the back-to-work movement in the coal fields.

Might Renew Charge The government attorney indicated that the justice department might renew its contempt charge if there is a resumption of the walk-out.

Goldborough has frozen an injunction under the Taft-Hartley labor law which prohibits any strike, forbids continuance or renewal of the strike on grounds of force from the national labor and safety.

Lewis' attorney, Wesley K. Hopwood, said he would appeal the ruling that the civil contempt sentencing be put off indefinitely.

Westinghouse Joins in Cuts To End Spiral

PITTSBURGH, April 23 (AP)—The electrical industry joined neatly today in a bid to slash moving to inflation.

Weinhouse Electric corporation announced a price reduction on a wide range of electrical products which will save industrial customers about \$500,000 annually.

The action came after U. S. Steel corporation delivered one of the biggest price cuts in the history of the industry. The corporation yesterday slashed prices by about \$25,000,000 on a myriad of steel products.

Mixed Opinion The nation received U. S. Steel's price-cutting plan with mixed opinion. A number of President Truman's cabinet held the action as "inflationary" but some smaller manufacturers were optimistic.

Westinghouse said "reduced efficiency and improvements in manufacturing methods." The firm reduced prices an average of 10 per cent in electrical products which control and regulates the distribution of power.

Similar to GI Cut The Westinghouse cut followed by a similar cut in the price of five per cent price reduction by General Electric corporation on the same items.

U. S. Steel slashed prices as an alternative to granting the CIO United Mine Workers a 30-cent raise. The move was "desperate," said U. S. Steel president, said they simply "didn't work."

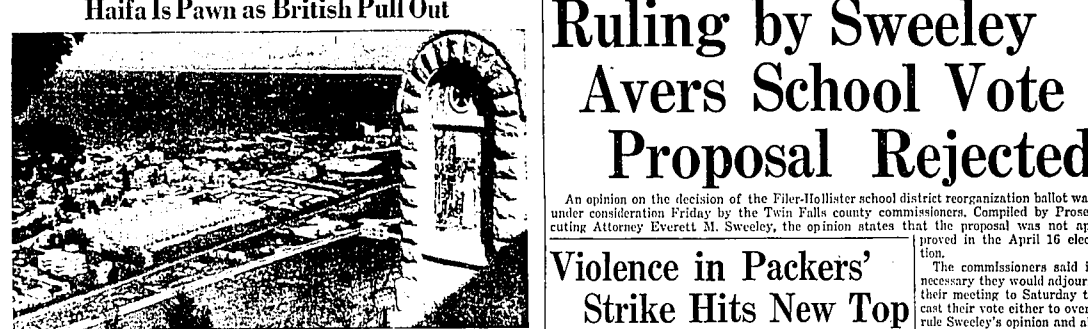

Violence in Packers' Strike Hits New Top

CHICAGO, April 23 (AP)—Wilson and company, one of the big four meat packers, asked the government today to cancel a proposed Washington conference designed to end the nationwide meat strike in which violence reached new heights as club-swinging police dispersed pickets at Kansas City, Kans., and a Chicago detective was shot by a striker.

Minor picket line violence also was reported at Denver, Waterloo, Ia., Ottumwa, Ia., and other big packing centers. The new outbreak of violence came 16 hours after the government, in another effort to end the 39-day walkout, summoned officials of the striking CIO United Packinghouse Workers and the big four meat packers to Washington for negotiations Monday.

The big strike, which had begun peacefully March 16 when pickets in a holiday mood closed many of the nation's big packing plants, apparently broke on a different completion. As the strike dragged on, tempers of both pickets and police were both piket.

Headly Battle Fought at Kansas City, Kans., police and pickets fought a bloody, 10-hour battle which began at the main gate of the stockyard. Gaudy plants were a scene of riotous activity. Headquarters as police charged the fleeing pickets and battered them.

The outbreak followed an order by Mayor Clark Tucker to clear the area of pickets. He ordered police to be ordered to the scene and participated in the fight. Police estimated that nearly 500 persons in the area.

Police Battered Down When the pickets sought refuge in the stockyard, they were battered down the door and broke in. Within minutes, the union hall was a scene of riotous activity. Smashed glass and blood-spattered walls.

At least a half dozen persons were taken to hospital. At Chicago, Detective Charles Roth, 41, was shot in the wrist, knee and abdomen last night when he and two other policemen tried to arrest a strike leader. They were spraying the union stockyard.

Ada Democratic Panel Refuses To Recognize "New" Delegates

BOISE, April 23 (AP)—Ada county Democratic central committee members refuse to recognize a slate of delegates named for the state convention in Idaho Falls by a group of avowed anti-Taylor forces. County Chairman Joe H. Williams said Thursday. Williams said the present Ada county organization was "not pro-Taylor" and the state convention delegates we selected April 6 is not pro-Taylor. He expressed the belief that the delegates elected April 6 would be selected by the credentials committee in Idaho Falls Saturday. James H. Hawley, ex. spokesman for the group which met last night, acknowledged there would be a fight before the credentials committee before either Ada county delegation was seated. Hawley said the name of Sen. Glenn H. Taylor, D. Ill., vice presidential candidate on Henry Wallace's third party ticket, was not mentioned at the second meeting. At the same time he said the list of delegates selected there was known to be opposed to Senator Taylor. Williams said the second group had no official standing in the county organization and did not have a quorum at the meeting. "I am certain the state organization will support the regularly elected delegates," he said. Williams declared that Ada county was on record as endorsing the domestic and foreign policies of President Truman. He added that

the county committee also had gone on record as opposed "to any deal for third party support." Hawley said the second group challenged the legality of the meeting called by the county chairman and further contended that delegates named at the April 6 meeting were not elected by a majority vote. Five delegates chosen for the state convention were common to both meetings. They were Mrs. Emma Alexander Simons, national committee woman; Williams; William McIntyre, former county chairman; Mrs. William Chatterlain and Warren Baker. Heading the list of delegates named by the second group was Robert Coulter, former state chairman and long-time foe of Senator Taylor—identified as such by personal statements and those of the Idaho senator. Coulter, however, is in St. Luke's hospital with a broken leg and will not be able to attend Saturday's convention. Another of the delegates named was Earl Coleman, Meridian, a former sheriff. He died of a heart attack shortly before the meeting. Adding further interest to the state convention was the announcement from Twin Falls by Dan J. Cavanaugh, state chairman, that he would be a candidate for national committee man. This place now is held by F. M. Blodgett, Pocatello. Cavanaugh predicted the state meeting would instruct Idaho's 12 national convention votes for President Truman. He also said he expected the convention to make a "decided effort" to wash Senator Taylor from the party.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS

WASHINGTON—Republican rivalry for the presidential prize has become so keen that the untested upstart leader by Harold E. Stassen that friends of the various candidates have begun to indulge in the harsh remarks directed against each other.

The trades are not particularly vicious, but they are unkind, and they forecast a smart, petty campaign.

The candidates themselves are not quite so friendly. There is no evidence that they have bridled voluntary or involuntary tongues. The more the candidates have uttered on a public stage or dispensed in official or confidential interviews.

The heated stories, suggestions and anecdotes are heard in congressional cloakrooms, at dinner parties, at the club, and wherever people with a professional or amateur interest in politics gather. And in Washington that is everywhere, for it is at the capital as much as a public whipping post.

DR. JEKYLL'S STALIN

Nobody ever referred to Adolf Hitler as Uncle Adolf. But Americans quite often refer to Josef Stalin as Uncle Joe. This probably isn't important. Yet it might be said to sum up a big difference between the two men.

Essentially they are of the same type. That type is the professional revolutionist, and the description of him will do for both subjects.

By nature he is ruthlessly ambitious. He is shrewdly intelligent, but narrow of mind and narrow of learning. He thrives on conquest.

First he conquers his own people—the opponents by force, the indifferent by words. He feeds them on promises that cannot be fulfilled. He fills them with false fears of enemies that never materialize.

That is the great Hitler-Stalin pattern. Yet there is a basic superficial difference between them. Hitler was an obvious fanatic, ascetic in his habits but hysterical by nature. His speeches were little more than ranting raves. Nobody, even as a joke, would have called him Uncle Adolf.

But Uncle Joe can be quite disarming, even at a distance. He is a pipe-smoking, vodka-drinking old boy whose photographs occasionally show a pleasant twinkle of the eye. He permits—and probably orders—himself to be praised by his people with a fulsomehearted might almost bordering on sycophancy. Yet he dresses simply. He doesn't stare at Hitler did, and his public behavior seems to be marked by decorum.

Stalin can speak disarmingly, too. On more than one occasion he has confounded Americans by the openhandedness and general agreeableness of his talks with such men as Wendell Willkie, Elliott Roosevelt and Harold Stassen. He did it again, only a few days ago, in an address at a dinner celebrating the signing of the Russo-Finnish treaty.

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There are few politicians to be found among the great powers who would swing small nations equal to great nations," he boasted modestly. They sometimes are against entering into a one-sided guaranty for little nations, but these politicians, generally speaking, do not conclude treaties with small nations, since they do not consider small nations equal to great nations."

Thus spoke the politician who has made partners of small nations by ringing down the iron curtain on freedom and independence in his neighboring states. But if one were to judge only by his words and appearance, one might conclude that this pleasant emperor was really the Uncle Joe.

There seem to be only two explanations of the contradiction between Stalin's Uncle Joe-type speeches and the aggression and suppression of Russian policy. The first is that Stalin no longer runs the show, but is merely a figurehead. The second is that he somehow separates the two sides of his nature—with the stubborn Molotov, the surly Gromyko and the smiling Vishinskiy combining to play Mr. Hyde, while Stalin presents himself to the world as an amiable Dr. Jekyll.

WEAK REASONING

We don't know how many votes some well-meaning but hot-headed citizens of Indiana delivered to Henry Wallace, but we would guess quite a number.

The assault on three of Mr. Wallace's supporters in Evansville and the refusal of hotel accommodations to the third party candidate in Indianapolis are not in the American tradition. Further, they played right into Mr. Wallace's hands, giving him the chance to say that he is a target of discrimination and a political martyr.

Mr. Wallace shows abundant evidence of being unable to defeat himself without the help of his lack-outs. We hope they won't be used again.

It then quotes President Taft's description of the labor secretary's "duty of fostering, promoting and developing the welfare of the wage earners of the United States."

It seems to us that the article's author leaves room for question when he assumes that promoting the wage earners' welfare is the same thing as being spokesman for the labor movement. And when one thinks how well some of the labor movement's leaders have promoted that welfare—like the UMW's own John L. Lewis at the present time—the accusation borders on the ridiculous.

If Congress is looking to the public for guidance on the present Truman's recommendations for strengthening the armed forces, it can find it in yesterday's Gallup poll report.

The poll found that 61 per cent of the people want to increase the size of the army, 57 per cent of the navy, and 74 per cent want to boost its air force. While most, a minimum of 55 per cent say they are willing to pay more taxes to accomplish such increases in strength.

The public has consistently been far ahead of the country's political leaders in this regard. Before the last war, the same sentiment for increasing the armed forces appeared as early as 1923. Then the world crisis heightened, and the need of Congress was almost every issue.

"WASHINGTON CALLING" BY MARQUIS CHILDS

The inquiry into the central intelligence agency has thus far marked out only one small area of interest. As early as last January, reports were prepared by the agency telling of activities in Colombia and the presence of Soviet agents in that country.

This report was ruled out. The Russian engineers inspected the completed construction works by which pure water is brought great distances to such cities as New York and Washington. They returned home with drawings and blueprints of what they had seen.

What sabotage an accepted technique of world communism, this episode requires no interpretation. The existence of vast cities, dependent on complicated and costly machinery for the essentials of life, is one of the chief reasons why countries are so vulnerable to direct and indirect attack.

Here plainly was an issue to be resolved by top authority capable of appraising all the factors—both the complex and the simple—responsible for security and the problem of building a constructive foreign policy. It merits a degree of political understanding which the word political in its broadest sense—very rare in Washington.

Even more important, it means the creation, in congress and the country, of a confidence that decisions are being taken in the overall interests of American security. Naturally this will involve great risks in a time such as we are living through. Even in a police state, such as Russia is today, absolute security is a phantom that destroys while it creates.

Fine Soil Tested For Snowfalls by 'Weathermakers'

BY ALTON L. HAAKES—LEADER AP Science Reporter CHICAGO, April 23—Fifteen kinds of "backshot" to bring down snow were described today by an authority on man-made weather. This backshot is various types of the soil. Vincent J. Schaeffer of the General Electric company testing research laboratory told the American Chemical Society.

In laboratory tests, he said, it can produce snow. But they aren't as good as "seeds" clouds with little pieces of dry ice. They do irritate that dust, covered up by vibrations or dust storms probably is one cause of snow. The dust particles act as seeds for the water in super-cooled clouds to form snow crystals, he said.

Surprised at interest

She slipped into town quietly with an armful of photographs and editorial matter about the new Sir Alexander Korda film "Anna Karenina" and tried to go unobtrusively about her business.

Traces ancestry

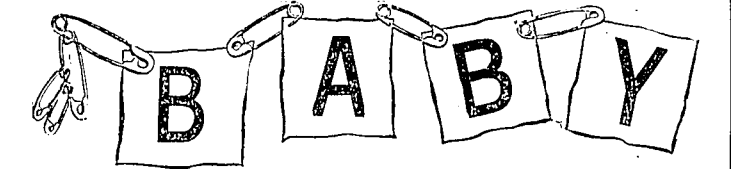

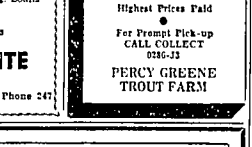

Next Sunday 'Gold Mines' in Aluminum Ore Found on Pacific Islands Formerly Held by Japs

By HARRY J. LAMBETH
HONOLULU (NPA)—A "gold mine" in aluminum ore deposits has been discovered in the Pacific Islands of the western Pacific, where U. S. marines and soldiers secured their last advance back in September, 1944.

Now, nearly four years later, American scientists prowling the Pacific trust territories have sent back reports to headquarters in Honolulu of bauxite deposits worth millions of dollars. The six major islands in the Palau group, which lie 600 miles east of the Philippines, are part of the former Japanese-held Caroline Islands.

Already the navy sees the possibility of American mining companies developing the area, adding profits to the native economy and helping defray the U. S. cost of governing the trust territories.

John Bridge, U. S. Commercial company geologist working in the Palau, estimates that an intensive survey would reveal a potential 50,000,000 tons of bauxite, the ore from which aluminum is extracted. Most of this is in 123 square miles of volcanic soil comprising Babelthuap, largest and northernmost of the Palau Islands. Lieut. Comdr. Woodrow Cleveland, USNR, a professional geographer, says 8,000,000 tons of bauxite are located in deposits of the island of Babelthuap, in the northern section of Babelthuap.

Cleveland believes that if the 8,000,000 tons were processed they would produce 2,000,000 tons of aluminum, enough for three years of U. S. consumption. At present the United States imports 47 per cent of its bauxite, obtaining 500,000 tons annually from Dutch Guiana.

If American commercial companies take over the mining and refinery work, yearly all new installations will be required. U. 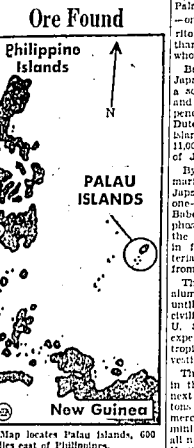

Reds Stirring Strife, Rioting In Korea Isle

SEOUL, Korea, April 23 (UP)—Communist factions spread rioting and sabotage across the island of Cheju off the southern coast of Korea today, and an extra battalion of Korean constabulary was rushed to the scene to meet a "serious situation."

Fragments of reports arriving from the so-called "Amazon Island" said Communist forces on the island were being cut off. Handbills arguing the constabulary and the military to retreat to the mainland also were being distributed.

Figures compiled by the United States army said at least 40 persons had been killed since the outbreak began April 2. It was believed that there were many more casualties, so far unreported because of faulty communications.

The tempo of the attacks apparently was increasing. They began slowly with isolated raids against police boxes. Later they shifted to concentrate on police regional offices.

Sniper fire was reported previously in the town of Cheju. Attempts to blow up five bridges were made recently. A small American military government team is at Cheju. There were no reports that any Americans were involved in the violence.

Reports of the rioting were accompanied by new Communist moves on the diplomatic front to disrupt the United Nations elections scheduled to be held in American-occupied southern Korea May 10.

National Park Modernization Funds Sought

WASHINGTON, April 23 (UP)—The nation's down-to-earth national parks and monuments can be made spic, span and comfortable at an additional cost of about \$20,000,000 a year for the next several years, the national park service estimated today.

To do the job, said authors of the agency's master plan, the service will need three amounts in addition to the normal funds for operation and maintenance.

Physical improvements—About \$15,000,000 a year for eight and a half years.

Roads and trails—\$15,000,000 annually for 12 years.

Parkways—\$2,000,000 a year for seven years.

No such allowances have been provided for 1948-49, but park experts hope to get the program under way in the years following.

The big six of the national parks development program are Yellowstone, in Wyoming, to which the plan would allot about \$15,000,000; Mount Ranier, Wash., \$11,000,000; Blue Bend, Tex., \$12,000,000; Yosemite, Calif., \$7,000,000; Sequoia King's canyon, Calif., \$14,000,000; Glacier Mount., \$12,000,000.

The development program, as sketched in the master plan, includes:

Yellowstone—The present Canyon Lodge and cabin area, too close to the canyon's rim for expansion, is to be abandoned upon completion of a new "canyon village" including a lodge and cabins and camp grounds, about three miles distant.

Construction of a road into the area may begin this summer. The old canyon hotel will remain in use for some years. Plans also call for construction of about 200 new cabins in Mammoth Hot Springs, replacement of cabins at Lake, and installation of a sprinkler fire-prevention system at Old Faithful hotel.

20,000 Seedling Trees Delivered

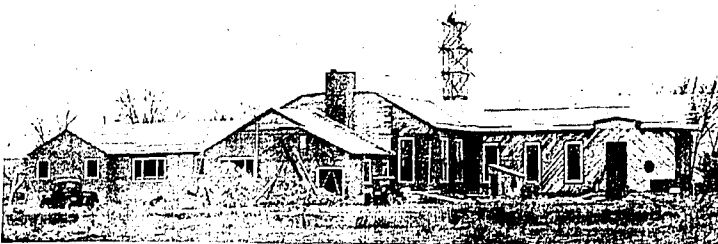
Nearly 20,000 seedling trees have been delivered to Twin Falls county residents in the past few days, according to figures given Thursday by County Agent C. W. Dalish.

The seedlings are grown at the University of Idaho nursery, and are handled by the county agent's office at cost for use in windbreaks, shelter and woodlots.

By far the most popular of the 14 varieties delivered in Twin Falls county is black locust, with 9,575 received. Other varieties and the numbers received here include Siberian pea, 420; tree spurge, 2,000; oriental arbutus, 2,350; honey locust, 625; Arizona cypress, 25; Russian olive, 2,230; redbud, 400; green ash, 1,200; Norway spruce, 725; Douglas fir, 1,125; juniper, 192; ponderosa pine, 1,750; and Russian mulberry, 275, for a total of 19,925.

LDS Church in Gooding Nears Halfway Point in Construction

GOODING, April 23—Adding to the beauty of Gooding is the new LDS ward church which is now about halfway completed. The structure is located on Main street about six blocks from the center of town.

The building is 120 feet long and 120 feet deep and will be covered with brick veneer.

The chapel tower, which is now being erected, is a 25-foot high. The chapel will have a seating capacity of 250 persons and is constructed so that it can be converted into a recreation hall by 60 feet with a seating capacity of 700 persons.

Included in the building will be a kitchen, banquet room, eight classrooms and a large work and business meeting room for the Relief Society. One of the classrooms will be a large, well equipped room for the Aeronic priesthood and Boy Scout groups.

A white, pre-cast stone, obtained from Salt Lake City, Utah, will be fitted over the doorway at the entry to the chapel. The stone weighs 600 pounds.

Building has been underway for the past 18 months. Most of the labor for the construction has been donated by members of the church.

First work started when members donated time and trucks to establish a camp in the hills north of Gooding where lumber was cut for the building. Women of the church operated the camp kitchen.

M. Stanley Chmy, recent counselor to the bishop and chairman of the finance committee for the building reported all electrical work is completed and the plumbing and heating installation will begin in the near future. The heating system will cost an estimated \$20,000.

Leonard Christopherson has charge of the construction. An auction sale to raise funds for the church's building fund was held in March and netted almost \$2,500. Earlier, a benefit ball yielded close to \$500 for the fund. Aid from contributions by members, many activities have been stopped to raise funds.

The present ward house is a frame structure located at Fifth avenue and Idaho streets. Approximately 120 families attend the church from

Rocky Mountain Shale Beds Seen As Fuel Reserve

CHICAGO, April 23 (UP)—A 150-year supply of vitally-needed oil and gas is buried in shale beds in Colorado, Wyoming, and Utah, a group of government experts said today.

Five scientists with the U. S. bureau of mines told the 113th meeting of the American Chemical society that "a recent estimate places the reserve in this formation at about 200 million barrels."

The area is located along the Green river. Scientists are attempting to determine how the field can be used profitably, they said.

Two other speakers said that "blast stagers," a disease which kills thousands of sheep and cattle on the west's dry plains, may be controlled by a new chemical.

Dr. J. Gordon Felt and Vernon H. Childers of Oregon State college said experiments they have undertaken have shown that amino acid methionine can counteract the poison that causes the disease.
