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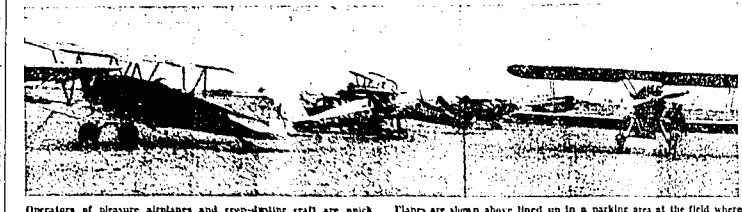

Steel Refusal On Pay Hike Detours CIO

PITTSBURGH, April 24 (AP)—U. S. Steel's refusal to grant wage increases has put a detour on the road for many labor leaders by forcing a national to "third round" pay hikes.

A national pattern for pay boosts was set in 1946 when the CIO-United Steelworkers agreed on raises of 18 1/2 cents an hour. In 1947, U. S. Steel again led the way by granting 15 cent pay hikes.

Balks at Increases
But this time, U. S. Steel balked at any increase. The corporation broke off wage discussions with the union and said it was cutting prices instead. "Steel" said it was not interested in setting the stage for a third wave of pay-war pay boosts.

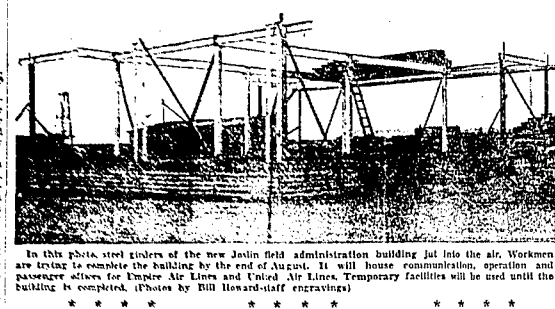
Electrical Talk Resealed

Burley Man Regains Eyesight After Being Completely Blind

"Money can't buy it! Eyesight is the most wonderful thing in the world."

With those words, J. Nakamoto, Burley, expressed his joy at the result of an operation which restored him three years of total blindness. But Nakamoto, a 71-year-old Japanese-American, is not merely content to recount the pleasures of returned eyesight. He wants others to know of his case in the hope that someone else now enduring the black dread of blindness may also see again.

Nakamoto, for 23 years a resident of Burley, underwent a recent operation at the Twin Falls county hospital for removal of cataracts, and, as the only solution to her difficulties, Mrs. Oslund sent her small children to her sister in California. She returned to the Northern Idaho College of Education, Lewiston, to have her teaching certificate reinstated. Her "adopted" sons were not situated in school in town, working for their board and room. They and their mother returned each week-end to work on the farm.

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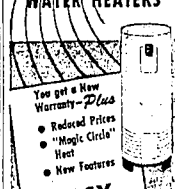

When the staggering amount received via slot machines for the first three months of this year was reported, it left me both stunned and disgusted. 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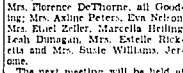

"Heavy Work" Completed on Canyon Links

First major accomplishment in the development of the Blue Lakes Country club in Snake river canyon just west of the rim-to-rim bridge was achieved this past week when the Duffy Reed and Hoops Construction companies completed the "heavy work" on all the golf course fairways.

Progress was in evidence all over the club premises and Saturday, Thomas C. Peavy, president, predicted that both the golf course and a new club house would be completed by early fall.

Works on Drawings
Cecil E. Jones, architect, is now at work on detailed drawings for the club house, bids for which will be called within the next month. It will be a frame structure finished in natural redwood and siding, with a living room, dining room, kitchen and club-lounge on the main floor and dressing rooms and showers in the basement.

First work to be done this spring was the construction of an entirely new road to the clubhouse location. This involved changing the course of the old road in the vicinity of Blue lakes and building a new driveway around the north side of Alpheus creek, the entire project being approximately a half-mile long.

Grounds Levelled
While in the canyon on this road job, the contractor, using heavy equipment were used to re-grade and level the main picnic grounds just at the entrance of Blue lakes road. These grounds were to be re-seeded this coming week.

Meanwhile, the club property generally was being cleared by George Orndorff, full-time caretaker who was employed last fall.
Work on the golf course, designed by Francis L. James, Moscow, started several weeks ago with the removal of rocks and sagebrush from the fairways. Then the heavy machinery moved in—bulldozers, carryalls, tractors and land levelers—to bring all the fairways to proper specifications. This phase of the work was completed last Wednesday.

Pipe Being Laid
Work of laying the pipe for the automatic sprinkling system which will water the course is already under way on fairway No. 1. Two high pressure electric pumps, one of which is already installed, will supply the water from Alpheus creek and the artificial lakes. The 100-pound-pressure sprinkling system will be equipped with specially designed nozzles at 100-foot intervals, each nozzle covering a 300-foot area. Early this week the other pump and all of the necessary pipe will have arrived and work on installation of the sprinkling system is expected to be finished within two weeks.

Power Lines Extended
The Idaho Power company is now extending power lines to the area and trenches for the piping are being dug through all the fairways.

As soon as the sprinkling system has been installed the fairways and greens will be re-seeded and rolled. The committee in charge of the work—J. J. Winterholer, Fred Stone and Gordon Egart—estimates it will take 6,000 pounds of grass seed to do the job.

Construction of the greens also will start this week, under the direct supervision of Joe Ainsworth, who has been engaged full time as caretaker of the golf course.

Leading Parts
Elpho Bacon and Ed Utzig also have taken a leading part in construction of fairways and installation of pumps and pipe.

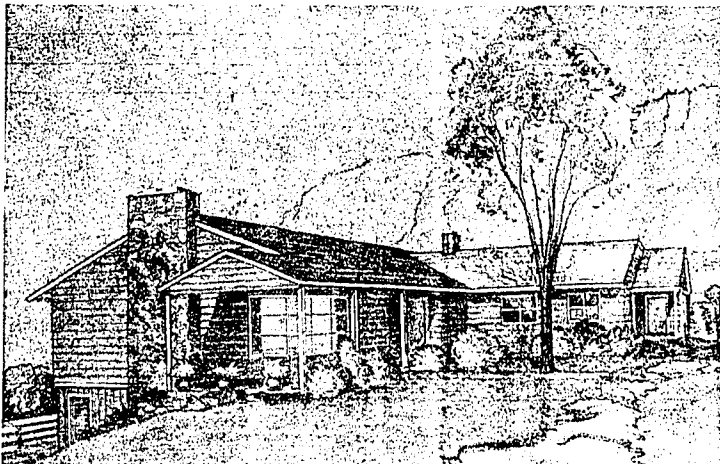
Just east of the old Perrine bridge and on the north side of the river a boat landing is to be installed, work on which also is scheduled to get under way this week. Slightly farther to the west are included in future plans.

Meanwhile the board of directors has purchased a new tractor and necessary tools for maintenance of the grounds, including mowers of the golf course when it is completed. A variable pumping unit for sprinkling the picnic areas and a spraying outfit to combat insects and poisonous weeds are other items of equipment already purchased and in service.

Big Job
"It has been a big job, getting all this work under way," said President Peavy in commenting on the progress of operations. "But now that the golf course is definitely taking shape and plans for the club house are being drawn, enthusiasm among the members has reached a high peak. Not only has the board of directors been meeting every Monday for the last six months, but dozens of members have been busy on committees, working out all the main details."
"Outdoors who have had an opportunity to inspect the Blue Lakes Country club's set-up have gone so far as to say it will be one of the main country. The golf course will be in a class by itself, the club average will be considerably above average, and the natural surroundings will provide a setting equalled perhaps nowhere else in the country."

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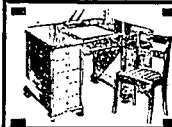

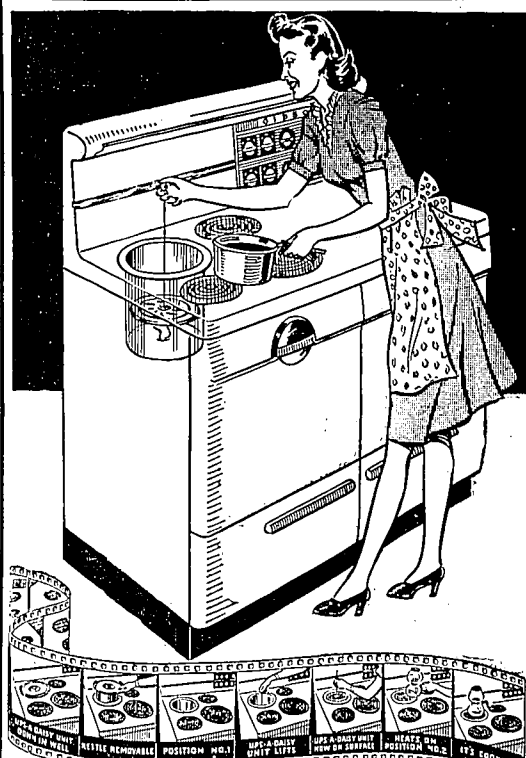

Wheat, Stock Prices Boost Value of Land

By MORRIS CLEAVENER
WASHINGTON, April 24 (AP)—Wheat and livestock prices helped to push up farm land values in the Rocky mountain states during the past year.

The increase in average value per acre of farm real estate during the year from March 1947 to 1948, according to the department of agriculture, was seven per cent.

Four of the mountain states topped this average. One tied it. And only two were below.

Wyoming in Lead
Wyoming led this move with a 14 per cent gain in values for the year. Colorado was next with 11 per cent, and Montana third with 10 per cent. Others were: New Mexico, eight per cent; Utah, seven per cent; Idaho, five per cent; and Arizona, three per cent.

The Wyoming figures are fifth best in the country, and Colorado's eighth.

When comparing farm land prices in March of this year with those of 1929—the peak year after World War I—however, the mountain states were arranged differently.

85 Per Cent in Idaho
Utah values were only 85 per cent of those of 28 years ago; those of Wyoming, 85 per cent, and of Idaho, 88 per cent.

But New Mexico farm land values were 26 per cent higher than in 1929; those of Colorado 11 per cent higher; those of Arizona 10 per cent higher, and those of Montana two per cent higher.

Department of agriculture figures show that, on the other hand, the mountain states were among the leaders in reporting increases in farm mortgage debts during the year of 1947. Arizona was second in the country in this respect, with a 20.3 per cent increase, being topped by Florida with 29.5 per cent.

Mortgage Debt Figures
Farm mortgage debt increases given for the other mountain states during 1947 were:

New Mexico, 15 per cent; Colorado, 12.5 per cent; Utah, 8.6 per cent; Wyoming, 5.8 per cent; Idaho, 2.2 per cent; and Montana 2.0 per cent.

All the mountain states, with the exception of New Mexico, however, showed decreases in farm mortgage debts as of Jan. 1, 1947, over Jan. 1, 1946.

School Levy Vote Set for Tuesday In Minidoka Area

RUPERT, April 24—Polls will be open between 2 and 8 p. m. Tuesday for the special levy election called for the reorganized Minidoka county class A school district.

Polling places are Rupert high school, Acquilla high school, Minidoka elementary school, Pioneer school, Paul school and Heyburn high school. Electors may vote at the polling place nearest their homes.

The election was called for approval or rejection of special levies of nine mills for the general fund and one mill for the gymnasium and playground fund. The 10-mill levy is generally the same as was approved in most of the former districts prior to reorganization. The law requires a vote when the levy exceeds eight mills.

If the 10-mill special levy is approved the total levy will be 18



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mills. Previously approved by the board was a four-mill transportation levy and a one-half mill levy for the teachers' retirement fund.

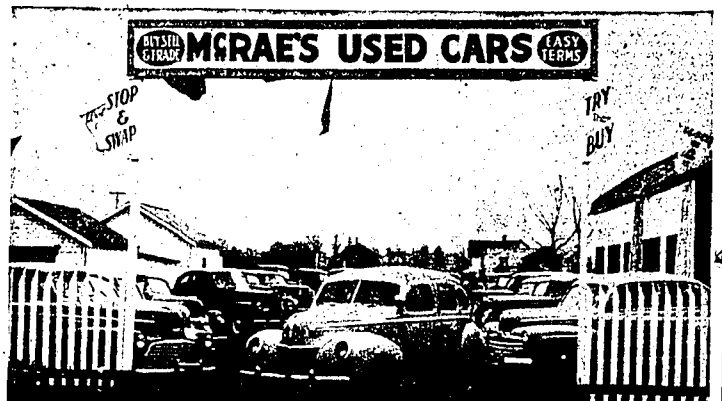

3 New Drugs Found to Help In Hay Fever

NEW YORK, April 24 (AP)—Science has three drugs to aid hay fever victims this year.

The newest of these is antihistamine, which in recent tests has shown to have fewer side-effects than the other two—benzadrin and pyribenzamine.

Dr. Martin B. Kleckner, Jr., reporting in the current issue of the Annals of Internal Medicine, official publication of the American College of Physicians, is comparing the three drugs at the University of Maryland.

120 Participants
He reported that the patients under study were military personnel, laborers at the depot, or civilians living in the area. About 170 persons participated in the test, the average time being 30 days.

He found that both benzadrin and pyribenzamine were more potent than antihistamine, but that the disadvantages in that they caused drowsiness. He found that antihistamine, while a weak agent against the so-called histamine (believed to be the villain that causes allergy), was effective in treating hay fever, running noses and the like.

Junie the Elk Broken to Pack, But Dies of Injuries After Fall

Hunters who fly into the primitive area ranch of O. A. Rambo next fall won't be startled by an elk attacking its head into the cockpit of the plane nor will they have to be alert for an elk painted with stripes of white kermine paint.

Junie the elk, who was a pet and pest on the Rambo ranch, is dead. During the winter she slipped on ice and fell, dying later from internal injuries, according to Loren Hoagland, ranch caretaker.
