BOISE, April 26 (AP)—A suggestion that state federations in the 11 western states organize political activity groups to defeat congressional voting for the Taft-Hartley bill was made Saturday at the western state conference of American Federation of Labor leaders.

The group also launched a campaign for the repeal of the law. E. M. Weston, Seattle, was re-elected executive secretary and Chyrenne, Wyo., was selected as site for the next meeting to be held in May, 1949.

Weston said the conference requested its stand for a six-hour day when surplus labor is available to fill the jobs created by the shorter work day.

Other recommendations made included: Establishment of a national minimum wage law of not less than 15 cents an hour.

Adoption of uniform industrial insurance laws in western states. Passage of disability compensation laws for workers injured while on the job.

Setting up of an office in Washington, D. C., to work with the American Federation of Labor on legislation affecting western states.

Ground Is Broken on \$75,000 Addition to Elks Lodge Hall

BURLEY, April 26—Mac Martin, crated ruler of the Durley Elks lodge, broke ground Wednesday afternoon for the start of a \$75,000 addition to the lodge home here.

The new addition, to be built on the rear of the present 10-year-old building, will follow the same line of architecture as the original building. 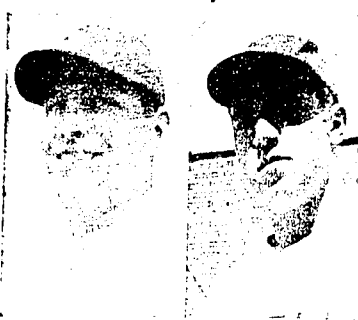
