

Slavic and Italian Soldiers Killed in Rift Near Trieste

ROME, April 27 (UP)—An Italian soldier and a Yugoslav officer were killed last night in a border patrol fight near Trieste.

Amid rising tension, British and American authorities tightened precautions today against any communist infiltration of their zone of the free territory for May day demonstrations.

The Italian defense ministry said the clash occurred in a narrow strip of territory which Yugoslav forces had seized "in one of their many sallies" out of their lines. Three other Italian soldiers were wounded in the brief skirmish, one critically.

The defense ministry said the Yugoslav force had returned to the body of the dead Italian soldier. Its commander said the Yugoslav commander had refused to leave his headquarters to talk to an Italian general who went to the scene to advise that the Italian-Slav military commission already has begun to investigate the incident.

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A high allied military government official in Trieste said extraordinary measures including block posts and restricting travel through the area will be in effect throughout the May 1 week-end. He advised the measures to the "exceptional public order situation created as a result of the Italian election and the kicking around of Trieste in the international political field."

### No Pain Felt By Girl With Rare Ailment

AKRON, O., April 27 (AP)—Burns, bumps and pin pricks mean nothing to Beverly Smith—for the tiny baby is jabbed into her arm every year of life, children's hospital officials here report.

Hospital physicians said Beverly cries when she is hungry or angry, but doesn't flinch when a pin is jabbed into her arm and she has no pain, she said. Beverly is a little over a year old.

The baby is not ill and is a bright and active child, mentally, the doctors believe, although her condition is as a state of indifference to injury of congenital origin. In other words, she was born with it.

Just One Year Old  
Beverly was one year old yesterday.

She is one baby who will never feel a spanking, they continued, and would be oblivious to the ordinary pain resulting from a broken bone or an appendicitis attack.

Physicians at the hospital said they believed only four or five other children in the world have been born with Beverly's condition. Noticed Instantly

The baby's uncanny immunity to pain was noticed by her mother, Mrs. Victor Smith, when the child bumped her head on the floor at the age of six months and did not cry.

Then one day soon after she laid her little hand on a hot stove, Mrs. Smith said, "she didn't cry then either, she just looked at me and laughed."

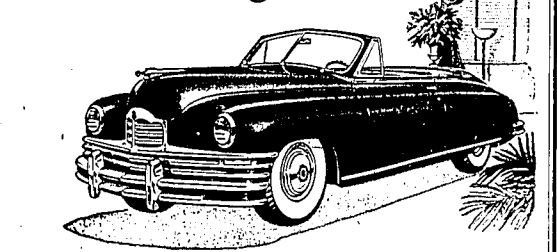

# 1947 Average Electric Bill Gain Is Told

WASHINGTON, April 27 (AP)—Last year for the first time since 1924—the average American family's electric bill failed to show a drop. Higher costs for fuel, a drop in a number of utilities, chiefly in northeast cities, to offset their charge for electric service.

This was reported today in the federal power commission's annual report on the typical residential electric bill. The survey covered 204 cities with a population of 50,000 or more.

**Average Bill \$124**

On Jan. 1, 1948 the average monthly bill for 25 kilowatt hours was \$124, up one cent more than a year before.

The bill for 100 kilowatt hours averaged \$264 and for 500 kilowatt hours averaged \$678. For both kinds of service the cost was the same a year before.

**These cities showed increases for all kinds of service:** Haysome, Camden, East Orange, Elizabeth, Newark, Irvington, Jersey City, Newark, Passaic, Paterson, Trenton and Union City, all New Jersey; Boston, Boston and Somerville, Mass.; Hamilton, O.; Miami, Fla.; New York; Phoenix, Ariz.; and Waterloo, Ia.

**Denver Bills Down**

These cities showed lower bills for all kinds of service: Covington, Ky.; Denver, Colo.; Manchester, N. H.; Norfolk, Portsmouth and Richmond, Va.; Pawtucket, R. I.; Peoria, Ill., and Wichita, Kan.

These cities showed higher bills for some kinds of service and lower for others: Baltimore, Md.; East St. Louis, Ill.; Lynn, Mass.; and St. Louis, Mo.

Presumably there was no change in the typical bills of other cities.

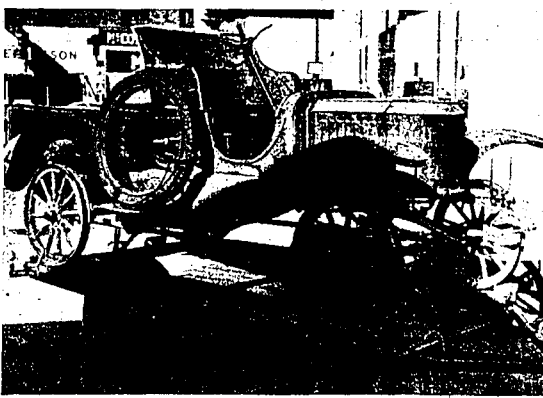

### Scribe Views Tito, Yugoslav Capital as Balkans Leads

(Editor's note: Osgood Caruthers, one of the few American correspondents who have lived more than briefly behind the iron curtain, describes in the following article, the first of four, Yugoslavia's important place in world strategy under the leadership of Josip Broz Tito, an ex-Communist avenger who took time out to lead the U. S. Navy to victory in the war. He has represented the AP in Helsinki and covered the trouble in Hungary. He is now in Belgrade, Yugoslavia, and is writing this series of articles.)

**BY OSGOOD CARUTHERS**  
BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, April 27 (AP)—This ugly old city sits at the real crossroads, historical and political, between east and west.

It is nicknamed the "White city." It has been described in more high-flown terms: "Capital of the Balkans," "seat of vast continental empire," "Tito's stronghold," "springboard for communist expansion into Italy and Austria and France and Greece."

People on the outside give Belgrade the name — particularly people from western countries. Let's see what it looks like to the people — westerners and easterners both — on the inside, as I have been for nearly two years.

It is Belgrade the capital of the Balkans? Geographically, she could well be. Politically, she could well be. That is, if one travels in terms of a Balkan federation with Premier Marshal Tito as its titular head.

So this question brings up another: Is there a Balkan federation?

Tito said on his last visit to Sofia the future formation of a federation of Balkan and Danubian states had reached the stage of "a mere formal statement." Georgi Dimitrov, communist premier of Bulgaria, said on his last visit to Belgrade that a formal statement would come "when the time is ripe."

Then the great Russian newspaper Pravda, aiming directly at Dimitrov's statement, ostensibly pulled the props from under both by saying its board of editors didn't endorse the statement, since the step wasn't necessary.

Looking at the broad facts, most people here say that for all practical purposes the federation already exists.

What more is needed than cultural alliance, economic cooperation and mutual assistance pacts interlinking through customs, tariffs, and other things of the Balkan and Danubian countries?

A cautious union doubtless will come when the countries can stabilize their economies. And any formal declaration of a federation at this time might threaten the voting strength in the United Na-

### Monster Size Atom-Splitter Will Be Built

BERKELEY, Calif., April 27 (AP)—A giant new cyclotron, 20 times more powerful than the 4,900-ton monster now operating at the University of California, will be built here, the atomic energy commission announced last night.

The AEC is financing the \$70,000,000 project.

The plans were announced jointly by David E. Lillenthal, chairman of the commission, and Ernest O. Lawrence, well-known physicist. Lawrence is chairman of the radio laboratory of the University of California.

The huge atom-splitter will take five years to complete. Engineering is now under way.

The announcement states the proposed cyclotron will be "far larger than any such machine now in existence or any other now planned."

It would be 20 times more powerful than the most powerful cyclotron now operating—the 18-inch, 4,900-ton machine on the California campus. The new machine will produce atomic bullets of a force ranging from six billion to 10 billion volts.

This machine will be a major tool for basic research in the properties of atomic nuclei," Lillenthal and Lawrence said.

"New knowledge in this field is essential to the development of the release and application of nuclear energy."

### Pay-Raises for County Officials

Salary increases of \$200 per year for one county official and \$100 per year for four other county officials were approved Monday by Twin Falls county commissioners. The commissioners are required to set the salaries in April for county offices which will be filled by election the following November.

Salaries of the treasurer, assessor and sheriff were each raised from \$3,600 to \$3,800 a year. The probate judge's salary was increased from \$3,200 to \$3,300. The annual salary of the county superintendent of education was hiked from \$1,000 to \$3,200.

The new salaries will not take effect until the second Monday in January when the officials announced will take office. Salary of the county auditor was unchanged, inasmuch as that office has a term of four years, and will not come up for election until 1950.

Also unchanged were the salaries of the prosecuting attorney and county commissioner. Salaries for these officials are set by the legislature.

### By-Product of Sugar Given Chemist Prize

NEW YORK, April 27 (AP)—The chemical discoverer that changes sugar into building blocks, materials for nylon stockings and many other things, Dr. Leslie F. Wiggin, of the University of Birmingham, England, last night received the \$5,000 annual sugar research prize.

The award was presented by the Sugar Research Foundation and presented by the National Science Fund, Dr. Vincent du Vigneaud, famous Cornell Medical college chemist who made the presentation, said that Wiggin's research promises to turn sugar into a key raw material for many kinds of industry.

The objective is a market for surplus sugar. The sweet is one of the world's largest and fastest growing crops. The idea is not to change finished sugar into industrial products, but to convert surplus while they are still in the sugar cane stage.

Dr. Wiggin found ways to change sugar cane and sugar beets at low cost into levulinic acid. This is a white substance, resembling coarse salt, with no sweet taste. The acid is useful for many kinds of chemical products.

It will make about 30 per cent of the substances needed to form nylon. It will make 40 per cent of the ingredients that produce the zulla drugs.

This sugar product, it was announced, makes an anti-freeze, that promises to be as cheap, possibly a little cheaper, than some of the best winter auto fluids. The sugar anti-freeze will not boil.

Another product is a synthetic coconut flavor. The sugar acid can be converted into lactic acid and into raw materials for plastics that are transparent as glass. It also cures ulcers, makes several drugs used to treat high blood pressure, and solvents and wetting agents. The latter cause water to become so wet that it soaks swimming ducks to their skins and they sink.

The new bank's directors are practically the same group who had obtained a charter for the Yellowstone bank of Rexburg in the closing days of Gov. Arnold Williams' administration. E. F. Haworth, commissioner of finance, said.

"If the applicants of the charter comply with the banking laws of the state of Idaho, it is all right with us," J. L. Driscoll, president of First Security bank of Idaho, said in commenting upon the issuance of the charter.

Ralph Brecher, attorney for the First Security bank of Idaho, said he did not know what effect chartering of the new bank at Rexburg would have on the First Security bank's appeal to the state supreme court against chartering of the Yellowstone bank.

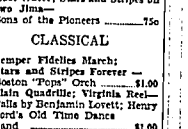
