# Third Vote Win Gained By Stassen

PHILADELPHIA, April 28 (AP)—Harold E. Stassen picked up a substantial lead today in returns from Pennsylvania's primary election and appeared headed for his third victory over the field of Republican presidential aspirants.

The former Minnesota governor, who scored in the Nebraska and Wisconsin primaries, was running more than 10,000 ahead of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, N. Y., with three-fourths of the write-in votes counted from yesterday's balloting.

Sen. Edward W. Martin, Dewey's son-in-law, was running third although far behind.

None of the candidates name were on the ballot.

Returns from 9,295 of the state's 8,240 precincts gave: Stassen 70,914; Dewey 66,754; Martin 43,529; Gen. George A. Brehm 22,921; Sen. Arthur Vandenberg 13,890; Sen. Robert A. Taft 12,265.

Truman Falls 28,247

In the Democratic column, President Truman, whose name was the only presidential candidate printed on the ballot, was leading by a wide margin.

The returns were almost complete. Two counties made no provision for write-in votes, and other counties did not tabulate the returns.

There was a nip-and-tuck battle, however. Stassen received strong support from Philadelphia county in early returns, but later picked up encouraging votes for Dewey supporters.

Stassen appeared to have brushed aside a strong bid by Martin, former secretary and Washington associate in the White House, to carry the Republican "write-in" balloting.

None of the top Republican candidates were on the ballot in Pennsylvania and the state's big 71-member GOP delegation selected Stassen to lead the party at the national convention in June.

In 1944 the Pennsylvania Republican write-in accurately predicted the nomination of Dewey. He polled 10,000 votes compared to 1,500 for Stassen and 8,000 for Gen. Douglas MacArthur.

The Republicans elected 68 district and seven delegates-at-large for their national convention. The Democrats named 32 unpledged delegates, with a voting strength of 70.

"When we first went to work on the reorganization in the Fillet area," he said, "it was on a purely voluntary basis."

Saw Necessarily

"Out there we saw the necessity of something right, it seems to me that the school trustee reorganization was a necessary step. It was a necessary step to take in order to have a school system that would be able to take care of the needs of the community."

"Under the 1947 school reorganization law, which, incidentally, was passed in New York state, we saw the opportunity to consolidate the school system and reduce the budgets."

Friendly Basis

"So, on a completely friendly basis, we went to work on the reorganization. We wanted to be consolidated and who did not. Since we were an unofficially appointed by the trustees of the school districts involved, we did not want to include any party."

## Hot Potato of Slot Machines Well-Roasted on Forum Here

The hot potato of slot machine operation in Twin Falls was given further roasting Tuesday night by a forum over radio station KJZZ.

Mayor H. G. Lauterbach and Public Safety Commissioner E. E. Ellis, Nitschke presented the city attorney's viewpoint.

The Rev. Stanley Christensen and Ellis Cain discussed the question from a moral and business standpoint.

Principal bombshells dropped by the city officials were further expressed which may be made necessary by pending federal legislation to prevent airport pollution and to require fire protection airports handling passenger traffic.

## 700 Members of Valley's School Safety Patrols to Be Guests Saturday at Jaycee-Sponsored Air Show

More than 700 members of school safety patrols in towns throughout Magic Valley will be fêted here Saturday at a Junior Chamber of Commerce-sponsored picnic and air show.

Scheduled hereafter as an annual event, the festivities are being held in recognition of the vital role school safety patrols play in eliminating traffic accidents and fatalities involving school children.

Members of all school safety patrols in Magic Valley are invited to attend the achievement day celebration, held in state at 10 a. m. in the Twin Falls city park.

The all-day program for the youthful traffic officers was announced at a meeting of Junior Chamber of Commerce safety committee members, Police Chief Howard W. Gillette, G. H. "Safety" Davis, of the Simplot School Safety Foundation, and George L. Vaughn, Idaho state safety director.

According to tentative plans drawn up by Jaycee and Police Chief Gillette, the safety patrols will parade Saturday morning and then be entertained at a picnic luncheon in the city park. Later in the afternoon they will take to the police department and the Junior Chamber.

Official in charge of the program for the children are trying to arrange the schedule so the children may attend airport inauguration ceremonies as special guests.

State Safety Director Vaughn, who arranged with Davis a similar celebration in Postville last week to honor school safety patrols in southeastern Idaho said Tuesday, "In putting on an event of this kind, we feel that it is the least we can do to show these boys and girls how important their work is."

"We have found in looking over our records," he continued, "that in almost every instance where these safety patrols have been set up, the fatalities of school children have dropped 100 per cent."

The first safety patrol was created in public state in 1935. Since then the movement to establish them in all schools in the state has spread rapidly, he explained.

At the present time the safety division of the Idaho state department of law enforcement is working in collaboration with the Simplot School Safety Foundation to put numbers of safety patrols on all public buses, he added.

"With this innovation it is hoped to make traffic accidents involving school children a thing of the past."

## Jerusalem 'Safe'

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., April 28 (AP)—Arabs and Jews agreed in the United Nations today on a temporary cease-fire plan for the ancient walled city of Jerusalem.

The Arab higher committee and the Jewish agency said in the U. N. trusteeship council they will presently recommend to their colleagues in Palestine an immediate cessation of hostilities in the walled sector of the holy city.

# U. S. States Last-Minute Try for Halt

CHICAGO, April 28 (AP)—A strike that could paralyze the nation's railroad transportation system was called today for May 1 by two operating unions. The third union, representing engineers, was not mentioned in the strike announcement.

The announcement was signed by C. H. Keegan, vice president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers and C. E. McDaniel, vice president of the Switchmen's Union of North America. Keegan declined to comment beyond the announcement.

Asked the status of the engineers he said, "you'll have to ask the engineers union."

No representatives of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers was at the meeting.

Representatives of all three unions said last night that a strike date would be announced today.

The failure of the announcement to mention the engineers indicated the engineers might cut a lone in the strike plans.

However, no representative of the engineers' brotherhood could be reached immediately.

Meanwhile, immediate steps were being taken in Washington to halt the walkout.

The national railroad mediation board today announced its intervention in an attempt to avert the crippling walkout. All previous efforts to resolve the wage dispute through the elaborate machinery of the railway labor law failed.

## House Group Approves Law Against Reds

WASHINGTON, April 28 (AP)—Legislation to permit the estimated 100,000 members of Communist party branches and to expose party members and friends was approved today by the House of Representatives.

The committee hopes to bring the bill to the floor for action next week.

The Communist party would have to disclose the names of all persons who were members in the preceding year.

Communist affiliates also would have to register in the same period. They would not be required to submit affidavits of loyalty. But those would have to be kept available for inspection.

The committee agreed not to expose members of fronts on grounds some of them have been listed in the House report.

After the first registration, both the party and fronts would have to re-register with the government by Feb. 1 each year.

In addition, they would have to label their printed propaganda and broadcasts to show its source.

The measure is the first legislative step ever taken by this committee to combat communism in America.

### U. S. Slaying English, Says Word Expert

CHICAGO, April 28 (AP)—Americans are murdering the English language and it's a good thing, a word expert said today.

"In fact," said Prof. James B. McMillan of the University of Chicago, "it has done our speech more good than anything else I know of."

McMillan said he hopes "scientific, gadget makers and millions of other people are helping change our language into a "rich new form."

"American is a language all its own now," he said, "different from the more widely recognized than the English used in Britain. We use this to the way we kick it around."

According to McMillan, dictionary-writers probably never will catch up with the avalanche of new words pouring annually into the U. S. vocabulary.

He said "pre-bop" music, "prefab" houses, "EHT" signs, and "boon" are some of the words which have popped up so recently they have not been able to make the dictionary.

"This tremendous increase in vocabulary is the most striking linguistic change of our times," he said. "It is increasing because of the great activity in America—scientific, medical, and otherwise."

"Most people blame illiterate classes for introducing slang into the language," McMillan said. "But this isn't true. The more uneducated a person is, the more he will hang on to the traditional way of saying things."

McMillan also scored some members of the teaching profession who "try to tell their students the proper way to say something."

### Mexicans up Price for Old Cheat Racket

MINNEAPOLIS, April 28 (AP)—Operators of the Mexican prisoner fraud have boosted the ante to make up for the high cost of awing.

Before the war an American could "rescue" a prisoner in Mexico for about \$2,420. The bait was a share in a mere \$185,000 hidden in a secret compartment of a trunk in an American custom house.

Today, the cost is \$8,000 and the bait is a whopping \$285,000, according to a report of the Northwestern National Life Insurance company on current frauds and rackets.

Others Climb Also  
Other rackets have climbed on the inflation spiral also.

But the post-war revival of the Mexican prisoner fraud is the best example of the high cost of easy living. Here is the way the swindle works:

A banker, en route to the United States, has been caught and put in jail. But he was able to conceal \$333,000 in American cash under the false bottom of his trunk, which was checked at an American border custom house.

Victim Receives Letter  
The victim, who receives a letter from the banker telling all of this has been "rescued" of fifty by someone who knows "you well."

All the "kind American friend" must do is bring \$8,000 to Mexico City and meet the prisoner's brother-in-law. He will use the money to pay a lawyer and give a few official palms. The banker will be released, redeem his luggage and give the "rescuer" a third of the hidden money.

In actual operation, however, the "brother-in-law" disappears down a side street and the American friend returns home, sadder, wiser, and minus \$8,000.

# Radio Forum Airs Issue of Slot Devices

City's adults condition the city youth to perpetuate slot machines by depriving their own of food, clothing and parental attention. The mayor stated that the program by the city officials on the moral issue, and requested a local opinion vote to decide the issue, or taking the measure through bond issue and taxation.

Mrs. Lusterbach was Mayor Lusterbach who clarified the city's position. He stated that slot machines are licensed for the year of 1948. The mayor said he saw little use in local opinion disposal of slot machines here only to have a large portion of the money spent in slot machines in neighboring communities.

Mayor Lusterbach said he did not expect banning slot machines, but not on a local option basis. He suggested the initiative be banned by state action. He said he would like a detailed review of city finances and needs. The mayor said, "Frankly, we have cut down on our expenditures and it is imperative we get new ones in the right size."

Chairman of the Merchants' bureau of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, deified the effect of slot machines upon local business.

### Accounts More Delinquent

His examples included a statement by a department store credit manager that for the last 12 months receivable more delinquent each month, in many cases because of slot machines. He said he received similar information from a credit company manager. He said that many of the delinquent cancellations were directly due to slot machines.

"Slot machines cannot be considered as a first class means of raising money," Lusterbach declared. "I fear Twin Falls setting the pace," he continued. "To abolish slot machines on a state-wide basis would be a great boon to our community."

Last speaker was Nitzsche who reviewed the needs of the city police and fire departments. He said that Twin Falls, like many cities, is unfortunate in having an electorate who will put a man in office who will criticize and hamper his every constructive move.

He urged the "politically minded and the reformists" to pull with and not against city officials. He said the council would welcome constructive suggestions.

### Questions Telephoned

A feature of the radio forum was questions telephoned in, which were answered by the speakers. About a dozen were received.

John Peterson, mayor, asked the mayor how far the city would compromise morals to raise funds. The mayor replied the city would raise enough revenue to bring the police and fire departments up to date before slot machines are declared illegal.

John Peterson called in to find out how the city committee would financially if slot machines were declared illegal. The mayor replied the city would continue to operate as it did in the past, but would be asking for more help from city departments deploring continually.

The Hon. Mr. Christensen raised the possibility that the city is trying to raise funds too fast. Nitzsche replied, with the city's financial health to have a 10th class fire department. He declared it is compulsory to stretch the city budget over a period of years when the need exists now.

# Yugoslav Peasants Gain Under Tito's Giant Cooperative Plans

(Second of a series of four articles.)  
By OSKODG CARUTHERS  
BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, April 26 (AP)—A vast new cooperative movement is sweeping Yugoslavia, and under it more than a million Yugoslav peasants will be able to own their own land and to share the fruits of their labor.

The government has already announced that 65 percent of the population is embracing the movement. Although only some 2,000,000 of the country's 15,000,000 people are involved actively.

The government has more than 10,000 cooperatives, against half that many in 1945.

"Work and more work" and "excess that norm" have become national slogans. But even with this, more than 400 working days a year are lost.

It is not only the result of a grading system used by the cooperatives. Under this system, a day's work on one kind of job counts for more than a day's work on another kind.

At the end of the year, net profits minus the cost of the cooperative (taken its portion) are divided up according to the number of working days each member has accumulated.

I talked to a farmer who last year got credit for more than 400 working days. He wasn't a superman—only a bent, rather tired looking Serb of about 50 with a huge hairy beard and mustache and blunt, calloused hands.

He said he was content. Brought a generous cut in the surplus of stuffs, wine and rakijs, the local liquor, he carried for his family about 40,000 dinars clear profit. That's about \$400. He also was able to sell a good portion of the grain he received on the open market at higher than government ration prices.

# Fair Progress Told for Area Crop Working

BOISE, April 26—While spring crop work was retarded by weather in north Idaho during the past week, fair progress was made by crops in southwestern and south-central areas, according to a survey by the U. S. department of agriculture. The department said fall grain was growing up in both the north and east portions of the state and spring grains were being seeded or thinning in the southwest. The survey reported spring grain sowing had been started in the eastern part of the state but little progress had been made in the northern section.

Thinning Ready  
The survey said early seeded sugar beets were nearly ready for thinning in the southwest and seeding had started in the east. Early fruits were in full bloom in the southwest and in the Lexington area. The survey noted improving growth in hay crops, pastures and ranges with livestock in good condition. The department said hay supplies were short in some sections.

### Heavy Precipitation

The department's weather survey for last week showed north Idaho points with the heaviest precipitation on Grayson and Bonanza, 1.46 inches, and Sandpoint 1.26 inches. Boise was high for the southwest with 2.21 inches. Hill City topped south central points with 2.07 inches. Blackfoot was high in eastern Idaho with 5.9 inches of precipitation, according to the survey.

### Sun Eclipse of Military Value Due on May 8

NEW YORK, April 28 (AP)—The first eclipse of the sun to have military value since that one that stopped a war in 185 B. C. takes place in the Pacific ocean May 8.

This eclipse will produce means for more accurate shooting of guided missiles and of ocean-spanning rockets.

In 185 the eclipse took place in eastern Anatolia, during a battle between Lydians and Medes. As Herodotus tells it:

Just as the battle was growing warm, day was suddenly turned into night. This event had been foretold to the Lydians by Thales of Miletus. When the Lydians and the Medes observed the change, they ceased fighting and were alike anxious to sue upon peace."

Herodotus says peace was made.

The announced purpose of the May 8 eclipse observations, as told by the National Geographic society, sponsoring the expedition, and Popular Astronomy, is more accurately to determine the shape of the earth and better to locate any desired point on the globe's surface.

At present such location is done with errors ranging from several hundred feet to one mile. It is hoped to reduce these errors to not more than 150 feet.

**Ereos too Great**

For military purposes, a calculation error of one mile in location of a distant target is an added aggravation in a problem already near the limit of solution. A mile miss may not seem much in a 2,000-mile shot, but it is a good error to get rid of. Ereos is a precision instrument could lose much effectiveness by a mile miss.

The astronomical observations will be made from seven stations along the path of the eclipse. The start is in Burma, where the eclipse first shows, the end of the track in the Aleutian Islands, 5,220 miles away five hours later and one calendar day earlier. The shadow starts on May 7 but crosses the international time zone to finish May 8.

Ralph Breidbach, Boise, attorney for the First Security bank of Idaho, which sued the Yellowstone bank to prevent its functioning, said that as soon as the charter is revoked he will move to dissolve the First Security appeal now pending in the state supreme court.

### West Europe Ponders Joint Anti-Red Unit

By J. M. ROBERTS, JR.  
AP Foreign Affairs Analyst

Western Europeans, progressing from economic union and joint defense agreements, are beginning to consider the possibility that a joint standing army may be the next step in warning Russia against continued provocation.

The London Observer, continuing the idea, would have the allied occupation troops, including the Americans, become the nucleus for such a force.

This is an extension of the desire for arms standardization and participation in the military guarantees which the western democracies are exchanging among themselves.

"Tangible" Desire Increases  
This increasing European desire for something tangible in the way of defense is an obvious factor in producing the feeling expressed by General Bradley and Secretary Forrestal that the situation is more urgent than it was a few months ago.

The firmer the stand the greater the impact when Russia next announces they are not prepared to sign because the impact will be too great.

There was quick public reaction to the Bradley and Forrestal statements that they are not sure now that there will be no early war. I am being asked whether they have received information not available to the public, or whether they are just trying to sell a rearmament program.

Unwarranted Inferences  
I think both questions carry unwarranted inferences. All of us have serious information, nobody knows for sure that Russia doesn't plan a deliberate war, although many think not. As long as that could be as long as war could start by accident, it is the business of Bradley and Forrestal to prepare.

They are the ones who would be held responsible for another Pearl Harbor. Better to be safe and wrong than optimistic and wrong. Forrestal makes it clear that he wants only the minimum required by the situation.

The Russians could mistake protection political disunity in the United States for diplomatic disunity. They could mistake our small military force in Germany for lack of determination. They might be emboldened to make a dangerous move anywhere along the worldwide line of communist containment.

### Impeachment Of Interior's Chiefs Asked

WASHINGTON, April 29.—Senator Downey, D. Calif., called for impeachment of both officials in the interior department and its reclamation bureau.

He told the house subcommittee on publicity and information that the officials "have been guilty of many high crimes and misdemeanors that should lead to their impeachment."

Downey said he will present documentary evidence to prove:

1. That representatives of interior and the reclamation bureau have engaged for several years in a far-flung and constant campaign of dishonest publicity to derive the people and the public officials of our nation concerning conditions in California's Central valley reclamation project.
2. That in this campaign they have "wasted many millions of dollars" appropriated for reclamation construction.
3. That they have "repeatedly violated" the anti-lobbying law.
4. That they have "misstated their accounts and corruptly and deceptively misrepresented their financial position" in official reports.
5. That the bureau shut down work on the Central valley project last year when ample funds were available "in order to bring congress into disrepute."
6. That the bureau has employed "incompetent, inexperienced and unworthy individuals in important administrative positions."

# Arabs Set for 'Bloodletting,' U. N. Debates

By J. M. ROBERTS, AP Foreign Affairs Analyst

While the United Nations debates, the Arabs are making a wholesale bloodbath in Palestine.

Scattered death victories in guerrilla fighting in the past few weeks have angered the Arab nations to frenzy. Whether their unified determination to settle the question by arms is sufficient to blanket their mutual jealousies is a big question. Syria, Egypt and Saudi Arabia are so suspicious that Abdallah of Trans-Jordan intends to turn the Jordan into one of several territorial acquisitions for himself, but Trans-Jordan and Iraq have the main force, and can go ahead themselves even if the previously announced joint expedition command falls to hold together.

The Jews are determined to defend their little enclave in the Middle East, but even while describing this determination Moshe Shertok, head of the Jewish agency's political department, admits in the United Nations that "our forces may be limited."

There is a possibility of compromise that the Arabs are making a lot of noise to influence the world powers, and that they will hesitate to move their regular army in direct violation of the United Nations decision and in the face of Britain, announcing its determination to defend Palestine until the mandate ends May 15.

That both sides apparently realize that an enforced truce of some sort is only a matter of time, with the major powers anxious to bring the Palestine matter and get back to their own knotty Jewish and Arab are determined to have the case when the "freeze" comes.

Faced with an outbreak war, the time for a freeze would seem to be now.

Representation in the present session is not to improve the United Nations consideration of the case is deteriorating into a committee-subcommittee system.

It is doubtful that international action can be taken in time even to save Jerusalem, much less Palestine.

About the only hope is that the Jews and Arabs, actually fighting with 2000 hour, would agree to let the whole matter drop for a time right where it is now.

Most large gem stones—four to eight karat or larger—have been cut here for years. The melee and industrial diamond cutting trade centered in Antwerp and Amsterdam.

But when the Germans invaded the low countries they ended the diamond trade there. American dealers had to set up schools to teach American cutters to deal with the small stuff.

"There were 500 diamond cutters in the United States in 1940," said Baumgold. "Today there are 2,500. The business hasn't gone back to Europe, although everyone predicted it would."

Diamond cutters are tightly unionized and make from \$250 to \$750 an hour for a 28-hour week. Top cutters on the large stones make up to \$200 a week or more.

The only thing that can cut a diamond is another diamond. Diamond dust from the last diamond, rubbed with oil on a wheel.

Diamonds are a mass rather than a class business. Only 15 per cent of it is on the heavy level—over \$100 a stone.

"The government is stockpiling diamonds again," said Baumgold. "They are a strategic mineral."

He wouldn't go into any detail. The two things diamond dealers dislike discussing most are the extent of government purchases and those by married men who buy diamonds for women they aren't married to and don't intend to marry. Smart buyers tend to get diamonds for their wives at one store and those destined for other women at another shop. It cuts down embarrassing errors—the kind a man doesn't like to make.

Two customs the dealers are trying to encourage: the buying of "marriage" diamonds for women's wedding rings and the practice some wear has developed of giving their husbands gold wedding bands containing one to three diamonds.

"They figure it's worth the money to them if he wears the ring that suits either women that their man's off the matrimonial market," said one dealer cheerfully.

War has changed the diamond market in several ways. Few people know or remember that the diamond is the hardest thing on earth—stronger than a banker's heart in a depression. Industry has found nothing to take its place to cut and grind metal.

"Before the war 95 per cent of the diamonds here went into the gem trade," said Baumgold. "Only 5 per cent went into jewelry."

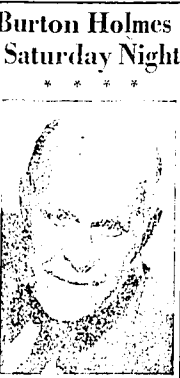
