"Our records show that wherever these patrols have been formed, traffic fatalities of this nature have become almost non-existent," he said.

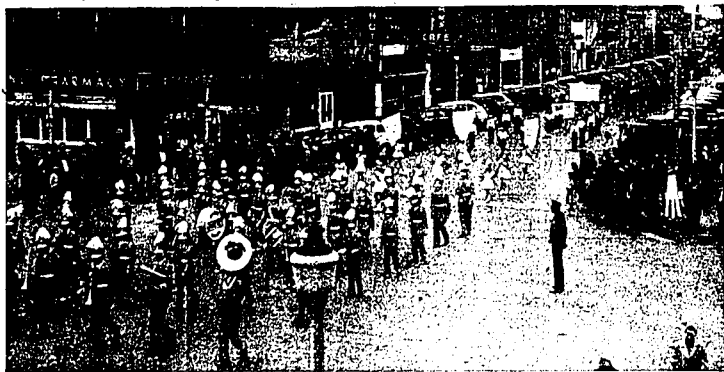
"In regard to the event staged in Twin Falls Saturday," Vaughn added, "I want to give my warmest thanks to all those who cooperated in putting on such a successful program."

New Tax Cut Rate Effective To Boost Pay

WASHINGTON, May 1 (AP)—The new federal income tax cut went into effect today, giving almost 50,000,000 Americans a boost in take-home pay.

From now on the government will take a smaller bite out of the pay-checks of those on the "pay-as-you-go" withholding system. This is the first noticeable effect of the \$4,800,000,000 income tax reduction voted by congress early this month over President Truman's veto.

Everybody who pays a federal income tax will get some benefit. About 7,600,000 of the smaller taxpayers will go off the tax rolls altogether.

The tax cut applies to paychecks you get after today. It doesn't make any difference when the money actually was earned. It's the date on the check that counts.

For example, a married man with two children who makes \$30 a week had had \$1.20 taken out of his check for federal income tax. But from now on there will be no deduction. He's off the tax rolls entirely.

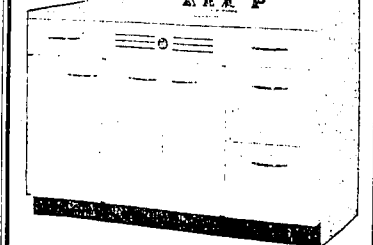

Course in Home Nursing Under Way Successfully

The first week of the Red Cross sponsored home nursing course in mother-baby care and family health closed Saturday with 25 local people receiving certificates. According to Eula Dutterin, assistant national director of the Red Cross home nursing program, who is here directing the course, the first week's program has been extremely successful, not only for those taking the course but for the instructors as well.

Twelve registered nurses from the northwestern area took the intensive teachers' training course given the previous week by Miss Dutterin, Nora Marco and Robin Walters, home nursing consultants from Washington, D. C. The nurses from out of town have remained in Twin Falls on leave of absence to instruct the six classes held last week. Other classes will begin this week and the next with local nurses as teachers.

The nurses report that the greatest benefit that they have derived from their teaching experience is learning to express their instructions and explanations in clear, concise statements. They have gained understanding of the needs of patients and are aware as never before of the misapprehension and ignorance that hinder many parents in the rearing of their children. Many humorous incidents are reported by the nurses to have occurred during the classes. Perhaps it is no coincidence that most of the anecdotes are about men enrolled. While receiving instruction on proper diaper technique, one father was instructed to place his finger under the diaper between the baby and the pin. "But I might stick myself!" was his complaint. Another listed "knitting" as one of the forerunning signs of pregnancy.

The instructors remarked that that course has been particularly stimulating because many of the students have expressed a great interest in the community facilities which affect family health. There has been voluntary investigation of the water and milk sanitation, sanitation facilities, immunization, food inspection, etc.

A display of up-to-date clothing and babies' equipment is on exhibit in the basement of the library, where the classes are held. Miss Marco has announced that this equipment is open to viewing by the public and also urges people to look at the books which have been arranged on a special table in the library.

This must be used to prevent pressure against the eyeballs and to prevent clouding of lenses. To remove contact lenses, either for the purpose of removing the liquid or to give the eyes a rest, the use of a suction gadget is necessary. Lenses may be inserted under the eyelids, however, with only the aid of the fingers.

Some people can wear contact lenses as long as 12 hours without visual fatigue; others need to remove these aids after two hours of wear.

Contact lenses are much more expensive than ordinary eyeglasses.

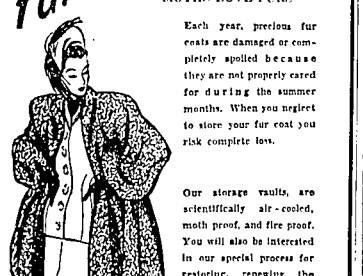

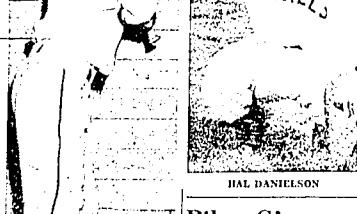

Varga Will Face Trial 'Soon' for Killing of Woman

ELKO, Nev., May 1 (AP)—Lazlo Varga, Hungarian refugee and former inmate of a Michigan mental institution, will face trial at a special court session soon for the March 22 rape-slaying of Mrs. Billie Fawn Morning, wife of the Precinct minister at Wells.

An expert murderer, her mutilated body was found by the search band on his return from services in a nearby town. Her infant child lay nearby unharmed.

Varga, already innocent and insolent by reason of insanity at his arraignment on murder charges yesterday, District Attorney Alexander Purnell protested that Nevada has no provision for such a double plea.

Judge Taylor Wines ruled there would be only one trial, with the insanity factor to be covered then. Varga has admitted participating in Mrs. Morning's slaying. But he says the mental slaying was committed by a mysterious "Joseph Black," who he said "looks just like me, and has fingerprints identical to mine."

U. S. Begins Forest Fires Annual Drive

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government has opened the sixth annual forest fire prevention campaign with some grim statistics.

Forest woods and range fires last year burned enough saw timber trees to build 80,000 five-room houses.

They destroyed enough polewood trees to provide a year's supply of newspaper for every newspaper in the United States.

Still Major Problem

Forestry officials said the above is evidence that forest fires, although decreasing in number, are still a major national problem.

Forest fires dropped to 172,000 last year, as compared with an annual pre-war average of 210,000.

Officials said nine out of 10 forest fires are man-caused. A 31 per cent increase in the number of persons visiting national forests now, compared with 1941, means there is greater necessity for caution to prevent increased fire losses.

Joint Announcement

The fire prevention campaign was announced jointly by the forest service, the agriculture department, the Association of State Foresters and the Advertising Council.

"We can't prevent the 10 per cent of our forest fires that result from lightning," Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson said. "But each one of us can be sure that he does not contribute to starting the other 90 per cent through a lighted match dropped in the woods, a neglected campfire or other inexcusable carelessness."

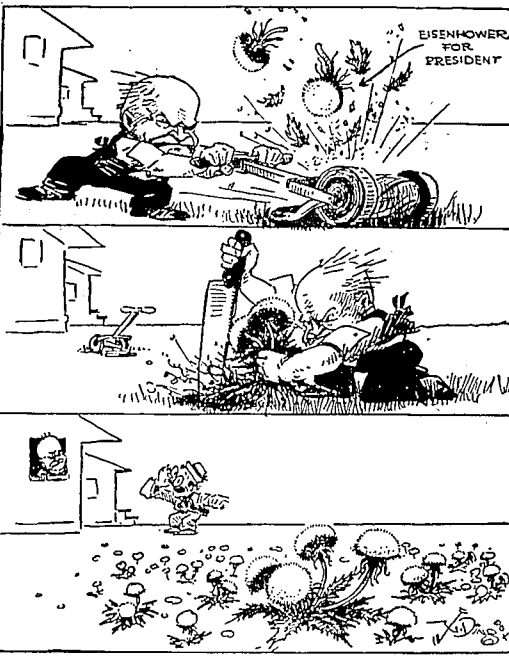

Mine Owners Ask Decision On Stockpiles

WASHINGTON, May 1 (UP)—The mining industry urges that the defense department decide at once whether the danger of war is great enough to demand additional stockpiling.

If so, the industry said late yesterday, congress should pass legislation at this session to authorize subsidy payments to mines.

Opposed to Pay

The industry for the first time expressed united opposition to the government paying above market prices to procure as a means of encouraging production.

At the same time, it acknowledged that such payments may be necessary in times of emergency.

The interior department's national mineral advisory council made the position known at its first formal meeting.

In a resolution presented to Secretary of the Interior Krug, it said:

"The council realizes fully that security requires a healthy and united mining industry and a national policy towards mining which will encourage the exploration and development of new deposits and the maintenance of ample metal reserves.

Altitude Given
"It is the consensus of the council: 1. That in times of peace, incentive production payments for

metals in excess of market prices are not economically justified.

"That under emergency conditions, if defense authorities now require additional metals and minerals for stockpile, production incentives—including but not limited to maintenance of manpower, tax reform, payments of premium prices or subsidies—may be advisable.

"That defense authorities should immediately decide this question so that, if necessary, legislation can be obtained to authorize production incentives in this season of congress."

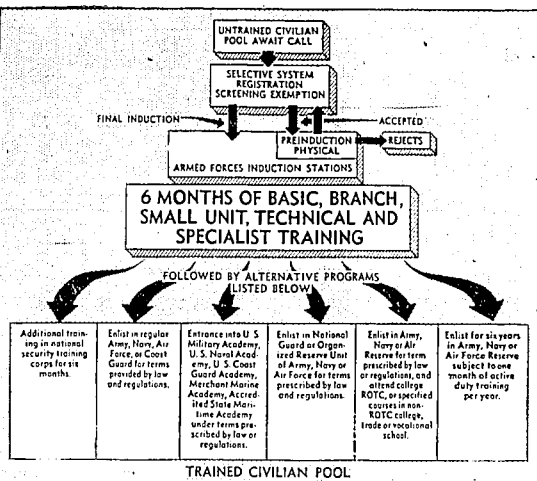





"Now that tiled entrance is really class." etc. Mrs. Wray and her staff certainly didn't spare the pieces when it came to putting out for this remodeling job. The front of the cafe is now built up four feet with three by six inch tile and stainless steel.
 The interior is a fine example of what can be accomplished when good materials are combined with artistic design and careful workmanship. The local architectural firm of Frank Paradise, Jr. (Hobbs O. East, Frank Ford and E. F. Drenth) did this job, with W. E. Foxmeyer as contractor. The ceiling, which has been lowered for air conditioning and indirect lighting, has 1,200 squares of one-inch slotted acoustical board. The beautiful wallpaper is hand-printed, a hyacinth flower pattern in airy greens and whites, with rust and charcoal background. The entire restaurant, including lunch counter, seats 125 people.
 New equipment for this is done in natural oak and saddle-leather piped with white. Behind the lunch counter is a new stainless steel backbar. And wait until you see the manifold down which can be drawn to make the back part

Stassen Displays Shrewdness In Ohio Battleground Choices

 WASHINGTON (NPA)—When election returns start rolling in after the Ohio primary next Tuesday, they will show that Sen. Robert A. Taft got at least 20 of the state's 53 delegates while ex-Gov. Harold E. Stassen of Minnesota got only 23 at most.

The casual newspaper reader may take this to mean that Stassen took a beating from Ohio's favorite GOP candidate of Ohio, but he would be quite right. The catch in the Ohio situation is that Stassen has GOP convention delegates running in only 22 congressional districts. That makes 44 delegates to be chosen, plus nine delegates-at-large, for a state total of 53.

The most Stassen can possibly win is therefore 23. Taft is a much bigger name in Ohio, and he has 30 delegates, carrying 11 districts for 22 delegates and getting eight of the nine delegates-at-large because his name is on the ballot in all 22 districts. Taft candidates are unopposed for election by Stassen men.

Several reasons are given by Stassen headquarters as to why the Minnesota did not enter candidates in all 22 districts and for all nine delegates-at-large. In the first place, Ohio is Taft's home state. Stassen says he didn't want to split the state party machine while open by a knockdown fight. Stassen did feel, however, that Ohio voters had a right to express themselves on the choice of candidate and to show that he—Stassen—had some following for his ideas on such diverse things as modification of the Taft-Hartley law, international cooperation and keeping the tax on margarine.

A better reason, politically, is that Stassen had no chance to carry the normally conservative Republican rural districts of Ohio. He therefore exercised good judgment by staying out of the race in districts where he didn't have a chance.

Stassen did not contest in Ohio's first and second districts, which take in the southwestern corner of the state and include Cincinnati, Taft's home town. Stassen also stayed out of the 12th district, which takes in the state capital, Columbus. But in every other district which includes a major city and industrial area, Stassen entered candidates. When Stassen announced he would enter the Ohio primary, Taft forces were at first sure, then in-

cluded to scoff. Rep. Clarence Brown of Blanchester, O., Taft's campaign manager, made a statement that Stassen couldn't win a delegate. At the recent newspaper editors' meeting in Washington, however, Brown admitted that Stassen might get half a dozen delegates in Ohio, indicating that anybody might be able to pick up that many.

Some political whippers are now predicting Stassen may get as many as a dozen. It is conceded that if Stassen gets six of Ohio's 53 delegates, it's a remarkable showing. If he gets a dozen it's positively sensational. And if he gets more than that, it will be a major Taft setback even though the Ohioan does get a majority of the delegates, which he can't fail to do.

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
