Representatives Of Civic Groups Inspect Schools

Existing school facilities in Twin Falls were turned "inadequate and extremely dangerous" as more than 75 representatives of civic and social groups were conducted on an inspection of the high school and Lincoln school buildings Monday.

The tour, designed to give the representatives a firsthand observation of reported fire hazards and overcrowded classrooms, was sponsored by the civic affairs committee of the Chamber of Commerce. Preceding the tour, a luncheon was held for the delegates in the Park hotel.

Conducting the tour were A. W. Morgan, superintendent of schools, and E. H. Freeclove, city fire chief. These men pointed out the various inadequacies in classroom facilities and danger spots that might exist in case of fire.

During the luncheon meeting it was stressed that the main problem to bear in mind during the tour was that the junior-senior high school was heavily overcrowded and that certain necessary courses of study could not be offered because of these conditions.

Possible Disaster However, the interest of the group centered on the fire hazards conditions which Freeclove said could result in a disaster unless certain precautions were made. During the tour he explained that there are no fire escapes in the high school. The fire escape in the junior-senior high school was heavily overcrowded and that certain necessary courses of study could not be offered because of these conditions.

Freeclove told of a need for insulated fire doors, which when shut would prevent the fire from spreading through the building in a matter of minutes.

Idaho Power Ready to Start Building New Power Plant on Site Near Bliss

Construction of Idaho Power company's fifth new hydro-electric power plant near the Bliss bridge, the power plant will contain three generating units, the first of which is scheduled for installation in November, 1948. The other two units will follow at two-month intervals, and the entire project is to be completed during the early part of 1950.

A new \$3,000,000 transmission line operating at 220,000 volts, to be built in 1949 from Bliss to American Falls and will be inter-connected with the Bliss and other Hagerman valley power plants.

Estimates Made for Traffic Survey Cost

Although cost estimate for a study of three phases of the traffic problem in Twin Falls—judicial, traffic engineering, and police—was presented to the city council Monday night by a traffic expert.

Theodore Lovelless, field representative for the International Association of Chiefs of Police, told the council a study of the traffic situation here would cost from \$900 to \$1,500, depending on the number of phases taken up in the study.

Stressing the fact his estimate was an approximation, Lovelless said the objective of the study would be to map a general plan for the city to follow over the years to alleviate its traffic difficulties.

"No Cure-All" This is not a cure-all, he pointed out. "The study is the tool with which you can determine your immediate needs and map improvements for a year or several years from now."

In "excess our study would go over your police department, the city engineer, health, signs and signals and the various laws and ordinances governing traffic regulations."

He recommended to the council that they send a letter to the headquarters of the association in Chicago, Ill., to ascertain what phases of the study would be, according to the city's needs, and find out where the study can be undertaken.

Jerusalem, May 4 (AP)—British commands and tank forces poured into Palestine today to back up a shaky truce, while diplomatic and military leaders strove here and in Trans-Jordan to draft a formula for ending the war between the Arabs and Jews.

Negotiations for extending indefinitely the cease-fire order in Jerusalem bore little fruit. Flurries of violence at scattered points in Palestine emphasized the urgency of the search for peace.

A United Nations truce commission made up of the American, French and Belgian consuls scheduled talks with King Abdallah and Hajj Azzam Pasha, secretary general of the Arab League, today.

Five hundred British marine commandos, some of the toughest soldiers in the British army, were sent from the Suez canal zone to Palestine yesterday and today.

Reliable sources said still more troops were expected tonight from Cyprus. The British army is expected to arrive in Palestine in the next few days.

Abdullah said in a cable to U. N. Secretary-General A. G. R. Younger that he would "do everything in his power to bring about a permanent truce in Palestine."

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Murder Count Is Charged to Boise Mother

BOISE, May 4 (AP)—Mrs. Doris Levin Peterson, 37-year-old Boise mother, has been charged with the murder of a 1-year-old child in a new baby infant.

The baby was found strangled in a garage in a Boise alley April 24. Mrs. Peterson was released on \$5,000 bond yesterday.

She was doctor examined at a Boise hospital yesterday, where she had been in custody since her arrest April 24.

The complaint, filed by Ada County Prosecuting Attorney James W. Haines, charged Mrs. Peterson with "abandoning a newly born female child in an alleyway without clothing or shelter."

Mrs. Peterson has been employed as a housewife in Boise. She and her husband were divorced in California and she did not have any other children.

Her husband, Clyde Summers, said the baby had lived about 24 hours. He said the infant had been dead about 36 hours before he was found.

Her husband, James Branson, said Mrs. Peterson in a statement to him and Haines said that she had a "nervous breakdown" in the night of April 22.

Blaine said the woman had told him she believed the infant was born dead.

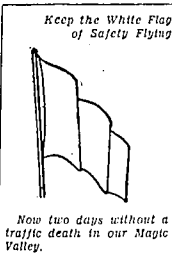

Public School Teachers Quit In Providence

PROVIDENCE, R. I., May 4 (AP)—Public school teachers went on strike today, closing the city's schools to 30,000 pupils.

The teachers struck to support their demands for a single-salary schedule.

Members of the AFL Teachers' alliance placed picket lines at schools throughout the city.

Members of the Independent Teachers' association had voted at a meeting today to honor the picket lines of the city's 1,200 teachers, about 600 are members of the AFL union and 400 belong to the independent association.

Officials said that less than 40 teachers reported to their classes today.

The teachers seek a salary schedule ranging from \$2,400 to \$4,600 which would allow 10 teachers in all grades. At present, elementary school teachers receive \$1,200 to \$2,400 annually; junior high school teachers \$1,400 to \$2,600 and high school teachers \$1,400 to \$3,000.

SEOUL, Korea, May 4 (AP)—Communism and western democracy are locked in a bitter struggle for control of the election scheduled Monday, May 10, in American-occupied south Korea.

The election is intended to create an independent Korean government. The issue in plain sight on the center of the stage is the contest between two major rival groups for control of the government—be it and authority to say how it shall be patterned.

Boycotted by Reds

The communists and pro-communists of south Korea are boycotting the election. They have entered no candidates for the 200 national assembly seats. They denounce the program in their papers and at party meetings.

Their pet phrase for it is "an American imperialist scheme to gain control of Korea."

Having Gangs Hold

Almost daily since then, roving gangs have swooped into villages throughout southern Korea, attacking police bases, election offices, and the homes of policemen and rights.

Can Gang Victory

If the election can be held in reasonable peace, and if a United Nations committee decides it was conducted in a free atmosphere along democratic lines, the next will claim a noteworthy victory.

Not only that, but modern kid book writers have a genuine cute with their pen. It's not just a few words, it's a whole world of it. "Gingers, there man." In one

room is directly over the auditorium and the gymnasium lies directly beneath, it is almost an impossibility to hold assemblies owing to resultant noise.

Cramped Library
In the library, Morgan showed the group how extremely cramped the students were as the room only holds 45 persons whereas the needed capacity is 100. In another classroom, he pointed out that an English class and the school newspaper staff were working simultaneously. Meanwhile, the typing room is so limited for space that only juniors or seniors are permitted to enroll in typewriting, while in practically every school in the country the course is offered in the ninth grade, Morgan added.

Morgan also showed the representatives the small classrooms on the junior high side of the building, the poor sound conditions in the speech department, the lack of convenience of the hot lunch kitchen, the agricultural shop which he claimed as only one-third of an adequate size, and the crowded gym space which practically makes team play impossible.

Lincoln Crowded
Following the tour of the high school, the group trekked to the Lincoln elementary school, where overcrowded classroom conditions were described as even more severe. The hazards were not considered so great, however.

Morgan told the representatives that Lincoln school enrollment jumped by 200 last fall and that if a similar increase should occur this coming year, the school will need six additional classrooms. The playroom, library and any available basement space would have to be converted into classrooms if this happens, he said.

The group was told by Claude H. Deweller, city affairs committee chairman, that another meeting would be called for June 7. In the meantime representatives were invited to meet with their organizations and present the school problems for any profile suggestions or recommendations. Then on June 7, the reports obtained from the various city organizations would be presented to the meeting, and a committee appointed to work out a final plan for solution of the problem.

Budgets of Idaho Colleges Debated

BOISE, May 4 (AP)—Budgetary adjustments for the third quarter of the 1947-48 school biennium were discussed by presidents of four Idaho educational institutions with the state board of education yesterday.

The board is continuing its meeting today.

J. E. Buchanan, president of the University of Idaho, said yearly financial operations of the university were discussed and plans made for the next biennium's budget.

Other institution presidents outlining their budgets were Dr. Carl McIntosh, Idaho State college; Dr. Raymond Snyder, Southern Idaho College of Education; and Glenn Todd, Northern Idaho College of Education.

Public Inquiry Is Set on Rail Rates

BOISE, May 4 (AP)—A public hearing will be held here June 10 on a request of railroads for intra-state freight rate increases.

William D. Fox, secretary of the public utilities commission, said the railroads in a revised petition had asked intra-state rate increases to correspond with the inter-state rate boosts granted by the interstate commerce commission.

Fox said on March 12 the commission ordered special rates to be invoked for the hearing, compelling railroads to submit detailed financial records for past year on operations of intra-state traffic.

Protest Bust
A group of home owners from Maurice Park petitioned the council to improve the surface of the two streets to keep dust down by passing auto, from blowing into their homes.

With the baseball season at hand, the citizens said they face five months of continual dust until the surfaces of the streets are either paved.

Unable to promise a definite remedy because of shortage of employees in the city engineering department, Street Commissioner Truman Greenwald said some road work could be provided by adding more gravel to the streets and maintaining a constant truck on the night baseball games at the park.

Blat Appointed
In other business brought to the attention of the council, C. D. Vande was appointed as the new airport commissioner. The Vande had previously been in charge of the public works department, but his duties were taken into the city. A number of monthly and yearly reports were read.

The parking meter collector, John D. Stephens, reported the 33rd parking meters in the city have been averaging a monthly income of \$3,000 for the past 18 months. At this rate, Stephens said, the city could pay for the meters by adding more machines which were installed at a cost of \$3,500 and will be paid for by next September. He explained that the city is paying for them on a contract basis.

Books Approved
Receipts, revenue and expenditures by the city during the fiscal year were approved by Clyde Kroon, public accountant. Monthly reports submitted to the council, it was reported by Judge James O. Pauphey that the city is bonded by its office in fines and bonds. Dr. D. A. Johnson, meat inspector, said 247 animals had been killed and 248 parts condemned. City Sanitarian Charles E. Cotton had reported a condition in cafe during March.

The council also approved a motion to buy burglary insurance for city property and to issue a notice for claims for damages incurred in the construction of the new runway and the sewer trunklines.

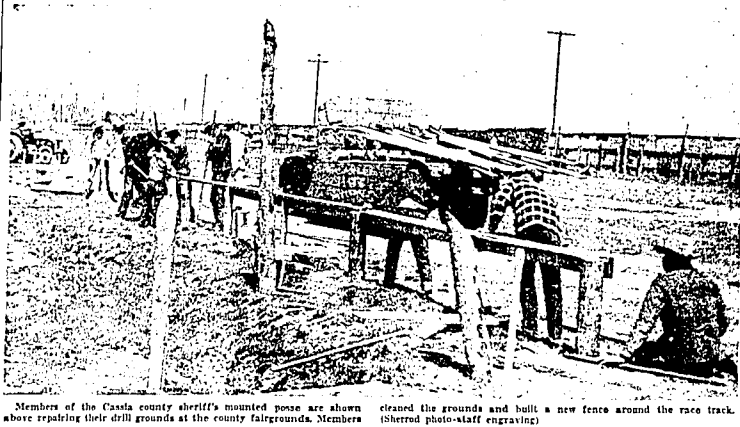

U. N. Path Is Long, Rough, Chief Asserts

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., May 4 (AP)—"The United Nations way is a hard way, a long way..." Secretary General Trygve Lie said in a speech the other day in answer to those who complain that the U.N. is slow.

"The United Nations way is just as right today as it was three years ago, and it will be just as right three years or 20 years from now," they added, quoting the U.N. chief again.

"They resent charges that the U.N. is on the rocks, that it has accomplished nothing, and that its machinery never has and never will work. Actually they resent the phrase 'like failure'."

"It has been working ever since the winter of 1946, when U.N. began operating in London," an official said. "It too had the world does not know how discredited and how fruitless some of that work has been."

He remarked two weeks ago that critics of the U.N. should suspect a substitute if they want to abandon attempts at international collaboration.

"The choice did not and does not lie between world government and a cooperative organization of sovereign nations," he said. "The United Nations and still lies between the United Nations and no world organization at all."

"There is nothing wrong with the United Nations charter except failures to live up to it. There is nothing wrong with the machinery... except failures to use it."

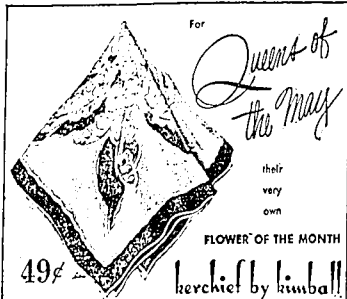

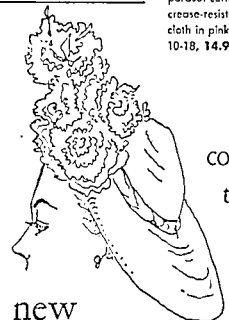
