Organizations and service clubs might be good sponsors.

The plan would give recruits the option of enlisting for two or three years. At the end of their terms, the two-year men could claim bonuses for \$1,000 each, and the three-year men could get \$1,500.

Or, if they preferred, they could take advantage of the educational, loan and other benefits of the "GI bill of rights."

In addition, the services would be required to accept recruits having a score of 70 or higher in the army's general classification test. This test is to determine adaptability and ability to learn. The services now turn down men scoring less than 80.

The reaction of Chairman Gurney, R., S. D., of the senate armed services committee to Allen's proposal was prompt and blunt. He said: "You cannot buy certainty. If you want to break the country that is a good way to do it."

Representative Vinson, Co., ranking Democrat on the house armed services committee, called the Allen plan "just an effort to avoid the issue of a draft."

On the other side, however, three house armed services committee members who voted against the draft bill Monday endorse of Allen's plan.

The tour would precede the President's speech at the University of California, Berkeley, on June 12. According to Magnuson, the President will visit Seattle, the Columbia river basin reclamation project, the Hoodlum atomic project, the mining district around Spokane, and probably a visit with Gov. Mon Wallgren at the state capital in Olympia.

Comment Declined

The White House in recent weeks has conscientiously declined to discuss the President's trip beyond his June 12 appearance at Berkeley.

The picture, however, has fallen together as various prominent Democrats have come in to see the President about topics in their state.

Apparently, Mr. Truman will make a full-fledged five-month tour, beginning in early June.

She indicated that in the law of supply and demand, Pascan declared that a person buying and selling for himself believes prices should be controlled although a person selling his own labor or goods, believes prices are not high enough.

Heussen pointed out that decontrol has not solved problems of production and consumption as promised by industry but that the situation has become worse in the two years of decontrol. Quinn wanted that temporary power tends to become permanent and controls over economic life should be strictly viewed even for temporary gain.

Analyst Sifts Prospects for Critical Year

President Truman says the present year may well determine the world's future.

The chief executive expressed this striking view Monday in a message of greeting to the members of the AFL Unions' National convention in Washington.

He did not say he expected him to such belief but left it to our readers to decide whether or not they see what decisive events are on the cards in this year already is one-third spent.



Naturally our first thought is that the remaining eight months may well bring us to the crisis in the cold war between Russia and the democratic world. Any further great movement toward the English channel might easily be fatal to world peace.

Can Italy and France—both strategic states in the democratic bloc—overcome the double handicap of fierce economic depression and the assault of powerful Communist parties which take their orders from Moscow?

Can England pull herself out of her economic tail-spin and reestablish the military strength essential to the tenure of western democracy? Present indications are that the answer to both these questions is in the affirmative.

And while we are on this subject of reconstruction let's not overlook that upon American strength hinges the fate of democracy. Any display of weakness due to internal depression might be an invitation to disaster. It might produce the world conflict we are trying to avert.

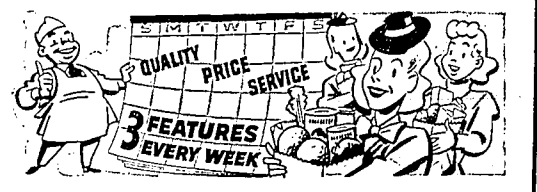

 Police had violated Taylor's civil rights by barring him from the entrance marked for Negroes. They claimed the trial was contrary to the provisions of the 14th amendment and contrary to the U. S. supreme court ruling on segregation handed down this week.

Birmingham has city laws strictly segregating whites and Negroes at public gatherings.
Defense Claims Denied
 Prosecuting Attorney Tom Haley denied defense claims that "the city of Birmingham is on trial" and insisted that this was a routine disorderly conduct case.

A crowd of 200, including 100 Negroes, packed the courtroom and some 200 others waited outside. The Negroes sat across the aisle from the white benches.
 Judge Hall said the courtroom was the "largest since 1945" when he tried 125 nuns on charges of scolding football tickets.

Corrected Judge
 The only time Taylor spoke directly to the court was to correct the judge, who referred to him as "the renegade from Utah."
 Birmingham policemen testified that Taylor attempted to shoulder his way past them through the Negro entrance. He striped over several strands of barbed wire on the Negro church lawn, they said, and then came up swinging.

Patrolman W. W. Carey testified that Taylor said, "You ... can't do this to me."
 Judge Hall rebuked Taylor and sent the witnesses that work for social equality and a breakdown of racial barriers.
 He told the clanking cowboy renegade that "quar playing is a better political activity than breaking laws in the state of Alabama."

Trial Delayed
 The trial, scheduled for 7:30 CST, was delayed for more than an hour while Judge Hall disposed of numerous disorderly conduct, gambling and drunkenness cases.
 After the trial Taylor went on a local radio hookup with an appeal to Alabama voters to support the new party "and to escape from the small, special-interest clique which controls Alabama through the voters."
 He accused Birmingham police of using the "old technique of divide and conquer, setting caste against caste and race against race" to keep control of the city.

Wallace wound up an intensive campaign tour of the midwest here last night. He heads into southern states next.

At a press conference, Wallace told reporters that he would return to speak to southern audiences which were segregated racially.

"I say that the sentencing of Glen Taylor makes certain the doom of the Democratic party," he said. "No party can claim to be liberal and still stand for Jim Crowism."

"Glen Taylor was not violating any law; he was upholding the basic law of the land—the constitution of the United States."

In his speech last night, Wallace charged once more that "the oil trust, more than any other group, is responsible for today's world trouble spots."

MORE LAND TO BE GIVEN IRRIGATION
 WASHINGTON, May 5 (AP)—Legislation to authorize construction of the \$10,250,000 Kennebec division in Washington state was passed today by the house. It now goes to the senate.

The project is designed to irrigate 96,700 acres of land and to supply supplementary water to 4,500 more acres.

The measure was approved by a vote of 285-100 without opposition.

BOISE, May 5—A tremendous increase in productivity of land surrounding Kennebec, Wash., would be possible with the approval of the Kennebec division of the Yakima irrigation project.

The bureau said the cost of the project at 144 acres will be \$10,250,000.

The Kennebec division will be the fourth of the divisions of the Yakima project in south central Washington. The Sunnyside, Bleton and Kittitas divisions have been completed and the Hcca division is under construction.

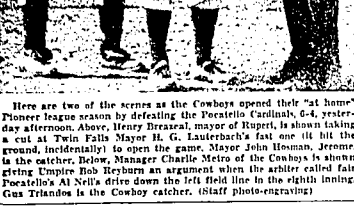
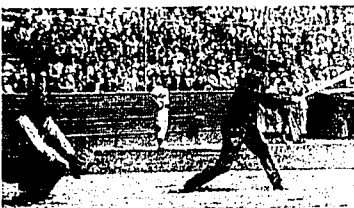

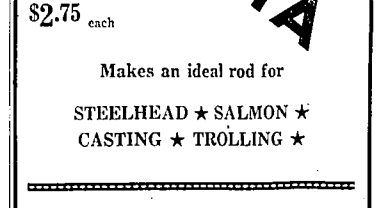

Nichols Says U. S. Solons Are Best-Fed

State Income Tax Revenues Are Up

BOISE, May 5 (AP)—P. C. Neill, state income tax director, said the apparent Idaho tax revenue increase amounts to approximately two million dollars.

Neill said since actual collections from all sources to the present date are in excess of \$42,000,000, it was safe to predict the total biennial receipts will exceed \$15,000,000. This would be six million more than was collected during the previous biennium.

Of the increase as of April 30, Neill said expenditures accounted for more than \$1,250,000 of the two million dollars.

He said the increase in revenue from individuals was due entirely to the increase in the number of returns filed. He said the average individual tax increase is only 31 cents more than for 1946.

Gamblers Told to "Play It Square"

CARSON CITY, Nev., May 5 (AP)—Nevada, where gambling is legal, warned the heavily patronized Lake Tahoe operators today to "play it square" or face stiff penalties.

Armed with new power, the state tax commission warned the big slot tax operators to attend to the requirements of a special meeting of the operators.

William Moore, commission member, said a number of operators had failed to pay their taxes. He said it was "a hell of a situation" that 10 per cent of Nevada's slot machines have to advise citizens to gamble only at certain Tahoe places.

He suggested that operators agree to the payment request to look at slots and at card decks.

"Even take off the wheel and let them examine it," he said.
