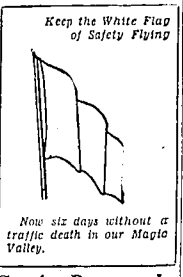

Red Promise On Lands Is "Cruel Hoax"

One of the cruellest hoaxes being played on some of the communistic and poor people of Europe is in the much touted matter of land reform.

The longing for a little land of their own has been one of the driving forces for years among the peasants under the old feudal agricultural system.

The Reds have made much of it as an attempt to win over the people of every country they have invaded. It was one of the chief baits held in the recent elections. Every peasant was promised that, under a communist regime, his landlord would be dropped, and he would be given his own plot of ground.

Joe Duesch's work. It doesn't matter how too well, especially in western country where cultivation of small plots is not the common habit of peasants. They have been told that they have to trade their liberties for it.

And then disillusionment. An example of what happens is given by emigrants from Estonia.

The Estonian people got their land in 1945 with assurances that "no power on earth" would deprive them of it. Only a few weeks later all went well. The farmers filled their quotas for the state and the communist government bragged that they had done it 10 months before it was supposed to have taken a year.

Collective Farms Set Up
However, as the Reds tell it, early this year the collectivists took a new turn. They decided that individual farming was not the answer, and began to set up kolхозes, Russian-type collective farms.

When the hungry peasants declined to respond as rapidly as desired, the communists knew how to put on the heat. They announced that machine and tractor stations and horse-leading centers, which allow the farmer to work his own land, would be broken out, unable to till his fields. But failure to meet government production quotas resulted in a collective farm.

Many, however, have tried to make shift, as evidenced by the fact that government is still forced to conduct an intensive propaganda campaign. Direct force has apparently been avoided for the time being.

Now, in Estonia it is said that collective farming of the Russian type has some advantages. Better machinery and professional direction increase production. Millions of Russian peasants are far better off in the better houses, and many of undoubted sincerity have fled to happiness unknown under the czar.

But they never, or seldom, have owned land. It is a different matter, as the Estonians say, that the man whose independence has made him the backbone of his nation and the keeper of its traditional aspirations to freedom.

U. of I. Planning By-Product Tests
MOSCOW, May 8 (AP)—A research project at the University of Idaho to explore the development of industrial wastes to the state for marketable by-product possibilities was announced today by Dean Allen S. Janssen, college of engineering.

The first study under the project will be the wastes from the multi-million dollar industry producing the chemical engineering department. Studies will also include food-processing industries with waste materials of potential value, Dean Janssen said.

A second research study will undertake to develop methods of separating rare metals from deposits of monazite sands in Idaho. L. A. Jobe, of the chemical engineering department, will be the project leader, with cooperation from the school of mines.

Weather Hits Air Planting Of Area Land

SHOSHONE, May 8—One of the coldest and driest winters in recent years has almost erased the efforts of the federal bureau of land management in planting rangeland near Gooding with seed pellets last fall.

More than 21,000 acres of land were air-planted with millions of clay pellets each containing five seeds.

A. A. Keith, district grazer, pointed out that preliminary check of the rangeland has shown that the cold and dry winter has failed to produce any noticeable amount of new range grass.

He said that even the ground under snow banks was dry. However, the range will be checked in another two weeks for any new evidence of grass germination.

The air planting operation in October, 1947, created a boom, for about 20 days, rained. Keith, located near Flat Top butte on the east side of the highway between Gooding and Fairfield.

Nachtall consisted of \$30,000 worth of patented pellet machinery; a 4,000 foot airstrip, two complete spray tests, several trailer boxes, four airplanes and an unlimited amount of clay soil.

The replanting operation was part of the government's program of re-vegetating fire-damaged rangeland. Keith said with a wet winter in 1948, the seeds stand a good chance of germination next spring.

"Klan Okay Happed "Today the United States delegates at Lake Success are talking about democracy and freedom a good deal as if they were personalities of truth and justice while the Ku Klux Klan in the capital of the state of Georgia continued to exist as a legal organization. "The voting United States segregation laws, which already have been codified, Senator Taylor was upholding mankind's law of equality, which has not been codified. This letter is the more sacred of the two laws."

stopped. The series of home stations included Ft. Hall, Albion, Rock Creek, Salmon Falls, Rattleshank (near Mountain Home) and Ft. Boise. Mrs. Stricker, who was pointed out the fare between Rock Creek and Ft. Boise was \$200. Rock Creek, when it was started, was part of Owyhee county, and later became part of Cassia county and now is in Twin Falls county. The area pioneer club member, long before D. D. Perrine's dream of an irrigated Magic Valley, when all fresh food was transported to the area by stage coach from Ft. Boise. "At one time the land could raise anything but sagebrush and jackrabbits would flourish on the land. "We had very little trouble with the Indians. Most of the trouble in the area was with about 600 Chinese who mined gold near Snake River," Mrs. Stricker said. "The medium of trade was gold dust and the Chinese in the area had a bad habit of retaining their gold with dirt." Her brother, Charles Wighamott, had the hardware business in Shoshone falls. She used to fish at the falls with her brother. On one fishing trip they found a large trout of a man in a cave near the falls, believed to be Men Chu the leader of the Chinese in the area. Mon Chu and a white man had gone over the falls in a rowboat while attempting to cross the river above the falls. Her brother wrote a book, "Ten Decades Back" on their life as pioneers in southern Idaho. Mrs. Stricker's brother directed Perrine to the section of the river called Blue Lake. Mrs. Stricker came to the area with about 20 head of cattle, the first in this section, and acquired a part of the land could support cattle. On Perrine's accomplishments in foresting the possibilities of the land she said, "Dirt was always a good promoter, even though he didn't have a lot of money." Next Sunday, the Daughters of Utah Pioneers will honor Mrs. Stricker with the unveiling of a plaque on the Oregon trail by the Rock Creek station. The inscription of the plaque reads: "Rock Creek station. Original building was erected by James H. Perrine in 1853. It was used by Herman Stricker in 1876. The first trading post west of Ft. Hall. Stricker on her 83rd birthday." Mrs. Stricker still lives on the spot a few hundred feet from the original Rock Creek station. The home is located five miles south and one mile west of Hansen.

'Legalized Gambling' Scored By Mayors; 'Slots' Included

SALT LAKE CITY, May 8 (AP)—Legalized gambling as a source of municipal revenue was scored by a majority of western mayors in conference here. Spirited debate on the issue today highlighted the closing session of the western municipal conference of the American Municipal association. Mayor William F. Devin, Seattle, told the conferees that his campaign against slot machines assisted in his reelection. However, Mayor L. E. Fanning, Idaho Falls, touched off discussion on the issue when he said his city expects to realize between \$12,000 and \$15,000 this year from slot machine license fees. The coin-operated devices were legalized by the last Idaho legislature. A majority of other mayors, although acknowledging the lucrative income, asserted there are better sources of revenue. "There were no Nevada mayors at the conference. Nevada also has legalized gambling," Mayor Harley E. Knox, San Diego, said that after slot machines were outlawed in New Orleans it was found that both retail business and collections of local churches were substantially. Other comments on the slot machine issue included: Mayor Earl J. Glade, Salt Lake City—"You can't grow money on opium." Mayor Fletcher Bowen, Los Angeles—"Slot machines do no one any good except all the city government. Any revenue you get is offset by the money that goes up the fire."

The conference adopted two resolutions before adjourning. One placed the western mayors on record favoring civilian defense as a local governmental responsibility. The other urged speedy consideration of federal legislation to compensate cities in some way for loss of revenue because of the presence of large, tax-exempt federal housing projects. At an earlier session, Mayor Knox and Mayor Quilley, San Diego, urged that city building codes be streamlined in order to stimulate new construction.

ACM estimates production will reach 10,000 tons of ore daily within three years, and eventually may reach 15,000 tons. This would be in addition to present output of mines that dot the hill.

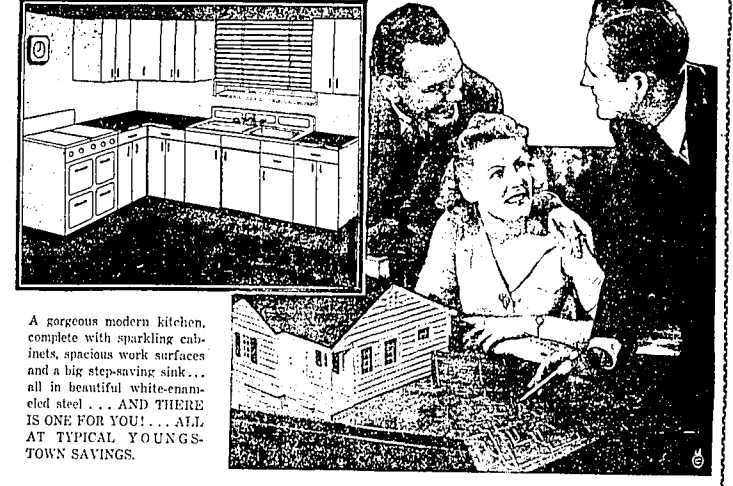

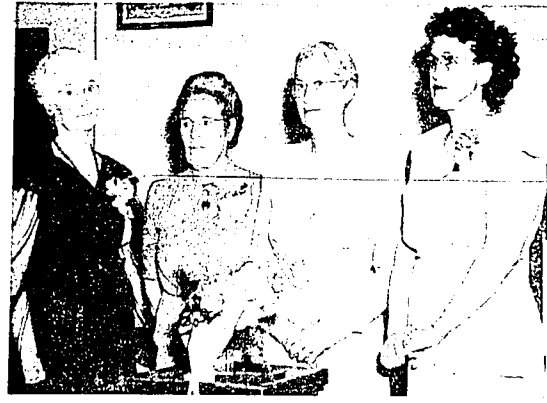

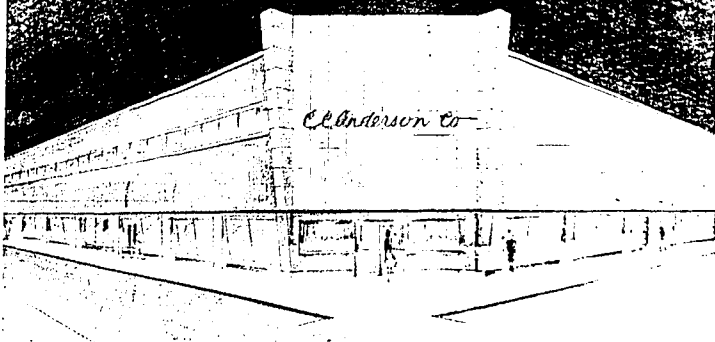

U. S. Steel's Price Cut Good, But People Do Not Eat Steel

By PETER EDSON WASHINGTON—(AP)—Big U. S. Steel corporation's public relations trouble again. This time it's over the announcement it will cut prices by 25-30 percent.

Last February the corporation was in trouble because it raised prices by \$25,000,000 a year. President Truman, his council of economic advisers, the departments of justice and commerce all jumped on that.

The steel industry as a whole was fed that making prices was bound to lead to new wage demands which, if granted, would lead to another round on the inflationary spiral.

So the steel masters went home to lick their wounds. And now, two months later, when they are right in the middle of negotiating demands from the CIO Steelworkers' union, they say they'll cut prices.

The consuming public is caught right in the middle between rival claims and statements of steel makers and steel workers. In such circumstances, one way out is to turn to supposedly neutral sources—like the bureau of labor statistics and department of commerce surveys.

Strange as it may seem, BLS figures indicate the steel industry may have a case. But, through other public relations or poorer public understandings, this story has not been put over.

Steel prices cover many things, from semi-finished slabs and billets to complete. A fair gauge is the composite finished steel price. Since Aug. 1, 1939—start of the preparedness drive—this composite finished

steel price has gone up in three or four principal raises by \$18.57 a ton. This raised the price from an average of \$46.22 a ton in 1939 to \$64.79, or 40 per cent.

In this same period, the wholesale cost of farm products 160 per cent and of all products in the BLS wholesale price index 110 per cent. Steel, with a 40 per cent rise, has had less increase than other products.

There is another angle to this thing, too. One reason steel prices haven't gone down is the steel sheet price. The principal reason steel prices have not been increased is that investors are reluctant to put their money into steel expansion.

Here's the way one government economist sees it: U. S. steel industry investment is \$4,500,000,000. Last year it made profits of \$29,000,000 after taxes, or over eight per cent. Producing 85,000,000 tons, that is a profit of \$4.50 a ton. At present construction cost, it would take \$3,000,000,000 to run a large U. S. steel capacity by 19,000,000 tons a year. If the industry could earn the same \$4.50 a ton on this new production, it would amount to \$45,000,000. On a \$3,000,000 investment, that would amount to only 1.5 per cent. No capitalist will bother with that.

The real difficulty in trying to understand this steel wage-price puzzle, however, is that it gets all mixed up with psychological factors. Steel is considered the hammer one barometer of industry. It sets a pattern for price reduction.

That, other industries follow, that's all to the good. But what's needed may not be so much of a steel price cut as a change in the way steel is used. More increase demands can't be saved away until the cost of things people wear and eat is brought down.

Timing psychology also enters the picture. General Electric, having cut prices twice, is in a good bargaining position to resist demands for wage increases.

U. S. Steel and the rest of the industry that follows its leadership are in a bad position. They raised prices when there was a demand for cuts. When they cut, the reduction was \$3,000,000 less than the previous rate.

Furthermore, the steel industry cut when it was right in the middle of negotiating demands for "substantial wage increases." The steel industry as a whole can argue its head off that the time has come to stop rising costs—meaning wages. It can claim—it has been claimed for U. S. Steel corporation—that its present price cuts are equivalent to five cents an hour for all of its employees.

WASHINGTON, May 8 (AP)—Ever since there have been barbers, there have been jobs about barbers. You know. The man in the white coat who bends you up about politics as he applies the clippers where you don't want them. The barber who wants to sell you every bottle of stibium on his shelves. It is again time to say back to Roman times. Clearly, the books say, was asked by his barber how he wanted his hair cut. In answer, the great man replied, "Well, the jokers over."

Jobs Over
Your barber doesn't dare try to sell you hair tonic these days, says Ben Curtis, 40. Near, in fact, the good guy lately daren't venture an opinion about Russia, or the Brooklyn Dodgers, or Lana Turner.

If a barber wants to sell a bottle or two of hair tonic, he must show a certificate that he is not a doctor. Curtis informed the house. He produced the certificate, too. It's put out by the people who sell barber supplies and it tells the barber what he's up against in the matter of federal tax.

A \$10,000 fine or five years in jail or both if he cracks open a bottle of hair tonic which he bought for resale.

The barbers, said Curtis, are in danger. "They just throw up their hands and cannot operate under such a law. They do not sell at retail."

Curtis has a bill to remedy this. It would take away the 20 per cent federal tax on bottles containing hair water and beauty shampoos. It would do away, the congressman said, "with the necessity of signing those obnoxious, frightening certificates."

House Okay Seen

There is some hope, however, Curtis said, that the house will pass his bill. Then the barbers of the nation can relax. They can uncork a jug of 66-proof dandruff remover with no fear of stalling the law. In their new freedom, they may even resume their historic status as authenticators, economists, fashionists and life after death. You can almost hear them now—talking as they sell up to Dr. Baldy's hair-restorer to the skies. Or hadn't you noticed that they ever stopped?

Osteopaths Can't Distribute Drugs

BOISE, May 8 (AP)—Osteopaths have not been granted authority under Idaho state laws to dispense drugs and narcotics. Don J. McClellan, assistant attorney general, said in an opinion. The opinion said it is generally provided by statute and held by court decision that an osteopath can neither prescribe nor give drugs or internal curative medicines. The opinion had been requested by Mrs. Stefania S. Mulliner, state director of occupational licenses.



Disease-Free Seed Potatoes Imported From Canada for Use in Magic Valley

The first shipment of imported seed potatoes—45,000 pounds of Canadian-kenny Netted Gems—ever brought into Magic Valley was unloaded Friday at a Twin Falls warehouse.

Tested and found to be completely free of any potato diseases, the cartons of spuds was purchased locally by Frank H. Adams, manager of the Idaho Growers' association.

Mr. Adams, who came to Twin Falls 44 years ago, said "in all my years in the growing business, there are without a doubt the best potatoes I've ever seen." He was joined in praise of the potatoes by G. K. Hogan, federal-state supervisor of inspection, and J. H. Stanley, the grower who will raise the spuds on his Salmon tract farm.

The three men are present along with Richard Pruden, field representative of the Idaho Crop Improvement association, when the 75-pound bags of seedlings were unloaded and put aboard farm trucks.

Picking up one of the spuds, Adams said, "I first ran across this brand on a trip through northwestern Alberta three years ago. The potatoes are rated at a 65-acre experimental station, sponsored by the Canadian government.

The station there," he explained, "parcel out the potatoes to small homesteaders which are rapidly filling up the areas around the park. Most of the land has never been farmed before and the ground is free of contaminating diseases."

Mr. Adams said raising the potatoes here on such a large scale still has the element of chance in it. He said small amounts had been

planted here in the past two years with favorable results. The 45,000-lb. shipment which 29 far has cost Adams a total of \$2,000, less in whether the potatoes will contract any of the diseases prevalent in the Idaho-grown spuds.

However, he and Stanley, the grower, said they were optimistic about the results, and expected the potatoes to be good for seed after four growing cycles. The standard blue tag variety is good for only one cycle as seed.

When they grow too big for use as seed, Adams concluded, they should surpass the table varieties in quality.

Only about 32,000,000 acres of this country's 1,950,000,000 acres are really good cultivatable land.
