Firms Handed Responsibility To Train Vets

Schools and business establishments given training to veterans under the GI bill of rights have been given greater responsibility for conducting veterans' educational programs under a new policy announced by the veterans administration.

Edward Elliott, training officer in charge at the Twin Falls VA office, said the VA has received its training officers of all responsibility for direct supervision of veterans training under the GI bill.

Under the new plan, schools and job establishments will be required to furnish effective education and training to each veteran they accept. They will be held responsible for providing the VA with reports of the veteran's attendance and progress.

Special checks by the VA will see to it that veterans' rights and to correct possible fraud against the government. Elliott said that the new VA policy will make it possible for a training office to detect more time to the needs of disabled veterans training under the vocational rehabilitation act, a program entirely separate from the GI bill of rights.

### Russians May Force Parley, Analyst Says

From a strict interpretation of America's most recent statement of policy the Russians have thrown a curve ball which, if not quickly taken, the U. S. is going to have to stand up and take a cue.

Secretary Marshall and President Truman have made it clear that the message to Moscow's last week was intended as a warning, not an invitation to another of the conferences which the Russians use so well as propaganda forums. The three-always end in frustration. But Moscow was quick to grab the opportunity of making its position on the subject of the U. S. own unilateral publication of its own interpretation that the U. S. had initiated an appeal for a compromise peace.

"U. S. Is Gully"  
He said, in effect, "You are the guilty party. You will have to bring your views around to ours, but old, lie-headed Russia will be glad to listen to your conference and lead you down the proper road."

Molotov's statement that Russia intended to keep doing just as she has been doing in "neighboring and other" countries emphasizes the truth of the reality of trying to do business with Moscow.

World reaction makes it clear that Secretary Marshall's idea of "keeping the door open" through normal diplomatic channels and through the United Nations will not satisfy public opinion.

This opinion says in effect:

Ready for Parley  
"Russia has opened the door for further parley. As long as there is a threat of war in the air, parley whether or not there is hope of success. In the present condition of the world, nothing that offers the faintest hope can be left unmade. At least, long as there is talking, we're not fighting. If we accept the thesis that there is no hope in negotiation, then war becomes inevitable."

People speak with their heads, from the records of Potsdam, Yalta, Tehran and Lake Success, the futility of parleying with the communist imperialists. The present parley itself has been created by Russia's famous habit of interjecting any word and any act to suit herself, and by a violation of diplomatic candor. But the public heart refuses to give up hope.

A report will be made at the meeting by the subcommittee on maturity regulation. The report will discuss in detail whether such regulations would assist in stabilizing the Idaho potato market during the early portion of the harvest period in western and eastern sections of the state.

Discussion of the progress being made in acquiring a potato breeding station in the state also will be held. The committee is investigating the possibilities of improving the present varieties of Idaho potatoes through plant breeding.

### Home Wiring System Helps Wives' Work

NEW YORK, May 13 (AP)—A new electric wiring system that makes it possible for a housewife to turn on the coffee percolator in the kitchen before she gets out of bed was announced today.

Engineers of the General Electric company, which developed the new system, also listed other conveniences. They included:

**Light System Explained**  
Front and back door lights may be controlled, not only at the doors, but from the kitchen and master bedroom; the radio set may be controlled from the telephone location, and the entire house lighting system may be switched on from the bedroom if an intruder enters.

**Helps Farm, Industry**  
The new system, according to the company, also will have application on the farm and in industry. For instance, on the farm, the lights in a barn may be turned on from any entrance, and yard lights may be controlled from any farm building. In offices and factories, the lights near windows may be turned off without affecting those further from the windows, and lights through the building may be controlled by the night watchman.

BANGOR, May 13 (AP)—Police today recovered three of 28 cases of gold valued at more than \$2,000,000 which had been stolen from an international ship on a Wednesday night in the biggest holdup in U.S. history.

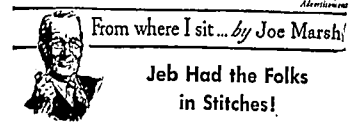

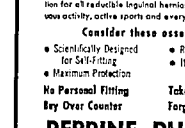

### Boyle Reveals Selling Secrets Of Brush Men

By IAL BOYLE

NEW YORK, May 13 (AP)—"If you push enough doorbells you'll sell enough brushes,"

That is the simple sales formula of Alfred C. Fuller, the original Fuller brush man, who has built a multi-million dollar business.

Fuller, now 63, started in the basement of his sister-in-law's house in 1920. He made the brushes on a \$15 second-hand machine in the afternoon and evening, peddling them the next morning.

He doesn't have to push doorbells himself anymore. He's so wealthy he doesn't even have to answer the door himself when a Fuller brush man rings his doorbell to try to sell him a brush.

7,000 Salesmen

But this year some 7,000 Fuller brush men across the nation will push approximately 42,000,000 doorbells to sell housewares, nearly \$20,000,000 worth of brushes.

What is the door-to-door salesman who has taken the place of the old-time itinerant peddler and knocks more often than the postman?

The brush company recently pulled some of its 7,000 dealers and came up with this picture:

Average Age 50

The average Fuller brush man is 50 years old, has a high school education, and his own home, earns \$10 a week. He has been married 12 years, has a boy and a girl, owns a 2 1/2-room house and a low-priced car 7 1/2 years old with 32,000 miles on the odometer.

He owns two radios, has been selling brushes for four years. His favorite hobbies are fishing, gardening and hunting, but he may collect seashells or pictures of steamships. This probably reflects a get-away-from-it-all feeling.

Three Were Mayors

Some 25 per cent saw military service, 35 per cent belong to a fraternal lodge, one out of five has held a public office. Three have been mayors. Three were ministers and one was a Rural Community mounted policeman who lived off the horse.

The Fuller brush man works five days a week, pushes 42 doorbells a day, gives free to every prospect a vegetable scrubbing brush that costs him three cents. He has at least 2,000 families in his district, calls on them three or more times a year, sells one out of every six housewares which answer the door.

### Late Crops Shift 210 Indians After Arrival at Burley

BOISE, May 13 (AP)—Mining, logging, wholesale and retail trade and schools registered the largest gain in job openings last week, the Idaho State employment service reported.

The service said one of the latest seasons in years continued to hold back agriculture, forestry and construction labor demand. Farm labor demand continued at the reduced level of last month, the service said.

Recruitment of Mexican agricultural workers for Idaho began at Aguascalientes, Mexico, this week, the employment service reported, and workers are expected to begin to arrive in the state shortly.

The Amalgamated Sugar company bought 210 Navajo Indians into the Burley area but because of the increase of the sugar beet crop there, they have been transferred to theampa-Nyca district, the service said.

The employment service predicted there would be sufficient labor available to fill the state's large acreage of sugar beets.

### Boycott Law Is Upheld by Court Ruling

BOISE, May 13 (AP)—Idaho's 1947 law prohibiting secondary boycotts in labor disputes was upheld yesterday by Third District Judge C. E. Westlund in the first legal test of the act.

The judge overruled conducting of four Western Electric company employees, charged with conducting a secondary boycott in picketing the Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph company here in May, 1947, and ordered them to appear Saturday to enter pleas.

The four—J. E. Abel, George Hill, James D. Toxne and J. S. Gaselman—were convicted in the justice court of J. M. Lemper, and appealed to the higher court.

Westlund held that the 1947 law was "within the powers and prerogatives of the Idaho legislature under the Idaho constitution," and act also prohibits secondary boycotts.

The Idaho law bars picketing of any firm not a party to a labor dispute. It was alleged in the complaint against the four Western Electric men that no labor dispute existed between them and the telephone company and that the company was not their employer.
