Report of VD 'Clarified' by Workers Slate Strike

When public health officials reported that VD in Twin Falls county had dropped sharply in the past two years, it was charged by workers that the decline was due to a change in VD in the county which is slightly lower than the state, is considerably lower than in two immediate neighboring states, and is slightly larger than in two additional areas of comparable size.

That is the gist of a report received Thursday from J. J. Peterson, administrative director of the state department of public health, in response to a request made in a Time News item.

Started April 30, officials on April 20 presented a report on VD to county commissioners. It was stated that in a previous year the rate had changed to a much lower VD in the city and schools which they alleged was traceable to the Time News item.

In a series of statements which followed, county officials mentioned the Time News item.

The question asked Peterson by the Time News was: "Do you have records on school children you do have on records as recurring treatment for VD?"

He said that the state department of public health has an annual basis for the past five or 10 years. What evidence is there that VD is increasing in local schools?"

Peterson's answer was: "In reply to your first question regarding the prevalence of VD in local schools, the state department of public health does not compile statistics on the incidence of VD in schools."

"Our records do not specifically include this information, however, records for VD in schools are maintained through the U. S. public health service revealed that the state department of public health has a record of VD in schools for the past five or 10 years."

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Minnesota National Guard Called to Duty as Packers' Blower and Break up Plant

SOUTH ST. PAUL, Minn., May 14 (AP)—Gov. Luther W. Youngdahl ordered out the national guard today to halt three days of meat strike violence, after about 200 men invaded the Cudahy meat plant, smashed machinery and abducted 30 non-strikers.

Youngdahl signed a formal order mobilizing the guard for the first time in 14 years in a civilian emergency in Minnesota. At the same time he arranged meetings with representatives of the meat packers and strikers.

S. F. Officers Hunt Firebug After 7 Fires

SAN FRANCISCO, May 14 (AP)—Police today hunted a firebug who started at least seven separate fires in three residential apartments within a half hour early this morning. The firebug, mostly 100 residents of the Barbette apartments, 645 O'Farrell street, were rescued on fire ladders or made their way down fire escapes after a blaze which started in the basement fanned up four stories to the roof through an elevator shaft, blowing the only stairway.

Smoke Is Spotted Firemen and investigators of the police department's arson squad saw smoke from the Barbette fire shortly after 4 a.m. while still investigating an incendiary blaze three blocks away.

"It was just luck and quick work that saved those people," Fire Chief Edward P. Walsh said.

Two firemen were hospitalized with hands badly cut by flying glass.

No injuries were reported among tenants of the three apartments. Inspector Arthur Pittman said police were holding a 23-year-old war veteran who was seen at two of the fires. He emphasized that the man was not a definite suspect and declined to reveal his name.

It now appears that he acted without consulting Washington in giving to the press a statement which conveyed the belief that the United States had invited him to a conference to discuss relations between the two countries, an invitation which the Soviet union regarded with favor.

Naturally the announcement created a sensitive situation, especially since it placed the U. S. in the doubtful position of initiating what might be called a "hot" peace negotiation. Indeed one might say that the Soviet union might have had their effect in setting the pace before a much earlier date. The idea grows among observers that Molotov slipped into a very hot line, when, with the aid of Russia to secure America is already to discuss problems through the proper diplomatic agencies.

Palestine War Is Threat for Globe's Peace

AP Foreign Affairs Analyst
 The American people are today the able-bodied Jews of Palestine—men and women alike—who will be standing to the barricades, determined to defend their newly-proclaimed homeland against anything the Arabs may unleash.

With the ashes of 2000 years of history's bitter hatred in their mouths, they have within the past few weeks consolidated their military hold on former Arab lands on which they intend to pick up the long-broken threads of national existence.

Partition Made Fact
 While the United Nations has backed and filled and backed again over what to do about Palestine, the Jews have proceeded under the aegis of the retiring British government to make a fact of the partitioning which the U. N. has agreed upon but was unable to enforce.

The question today is, can they make it stick?

And as the handers of Palestine are mobilized the forces of the Arab states. They have proclaimed their intention of marching to rescue the Arabs of Palestine from Jewish domination.

If they do, it will be a development from the current armistice negotiations, pressures will be raised which will threaten the peace of the world.

At the moment, unable to agree on any direct action, the great powers are in the de facto position of letting the Jews and Arabs fight it out.

Too Much at Stake
 But world interests are too much at stake for that situation to last through any sort of long conflict. The only parts of the middle east are too much at the cross-roads of the eastern and western worlds. Compulsion is too eager to step in anywhere there to discredit and neutralize the situation. The western nations are bound to try to prevent their oil and strategic interests.

Despite all their boasts, the Arabs may not be able to conduct a concerted campaign. There are political, religious, and tribal feuds and rivalries among them. They fear the opportunities which war will open to communists. They know that death fighters are loath, and fear repercussions at home from their people.

But the Arab leaders also fear the Hitt, they ride back down again. They are coming under martial law as home as though the situation was a foreign conclusion.

The Cudahy plant is across the Mayo-carry river from South St. Paul where dozens broke out yesterday along marked pickup lines in front of the Swift and company plant.

Employees of Cudahy, along with the Swift and company plant, workers of the CIO United Packinghouse Workers union, have been on strike since March 16 in a wage dispute.

Union spokesmen at South St. Paul, unharmed shortly after the raid, de-clared any knowledge of the incident.

OAIL, Tex. (UP)—This little west Texas town is in a county without a school, bank, doctor, lawyers, preachers or railroads. County Judge C. S. More than 90 per cent of the county's 316 square miles is used as rangeland, with one spread about covering 200 sections.

Few residents lament the fact that progress seems to have passed them by. They seldom look with envy at the sleek new automobiles that whiz down U. S. highway 140, which forms the main street of Gail. They just figure that the fellow who studies through life the fastest will get it over with the quickest.

The total enrollment of Sunday schools in the Idaho States is estimated at nearly 23,000,000.

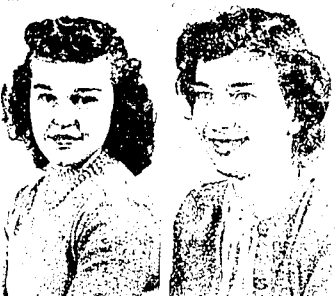

Florida Finds Huge Deposit Of Phosphate

DAKOTON, Fla. (AP)—The largest phosphate deposit in the world was discovered today in the heart of the state.

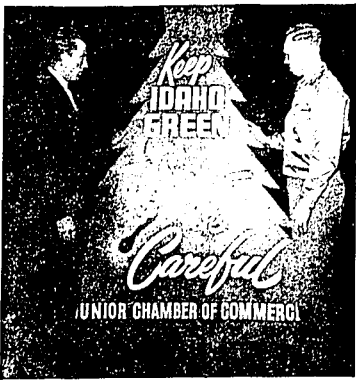
Rich deposits of phosphate, urgently needed to fertilize soil drained of its productive capacity during the war years, lie here beneath the heart of Florida's citrus fruit belt. The deposits are near the present town of Winter Haven and Lake Wales.

To help meet the demand for fertilizer, National, one of the world's largest phosphate mines, expects to begin full-scale production this month.

1,500,000 Tons Yearly
The ore, from which Sulfuric acid is produced, will produce a year, with from the bones and teeth of animals fish and mammals, the basis of the construction of a plant's growing plant. Scientists say the ore will yield the same amount of fertilizer as the old Florida phosphate deposits.

Largest Deposit Found
To investigate phosphate, National, which was named for the mother of Louis Pasteur, president of International Mineral and Chemical Corporation, used one of the world's largest dredges. It has a bucket that takes 20 tons of earth at one bite.

Leo Hodder, Lewiston, former state Jaycee president, and Hout Anderson, Boise, chairman of the state Jaycee committee, both members of the governor's committee, also spoke.

Experts Decry Pennsylvania Taxes 'Spree'

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP)—Pennsylvania has more local taxes these days than you can shake an empty pocketbook at.

Under the commonwealth's new local tax law, barely a year old, cities, boroughs and townships have slapped imposts on a wide range of things from incomes to juke boxes. Yet while the rush for added municipal funds seems momentum across the state, the men most familiar with government finance structures admit the future of the law is uncertain.

The Pennsylvania Boroughs association warned that some taxes had been levied on the wrong items, others were overlapping and some were just plain confiscatory.

The association called a meeting to caution its members on the hazards. Manipulation of the taxing power, the president of the association said, might lead to its repeal in the 1940 legislature.

More than 50 places have adopted or are considering taxes on coal production, the chamber said, 20 had imposed income taxes and 55 had adopted amusement taxes, while 22 are thinking about it.
