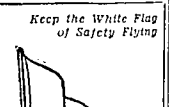
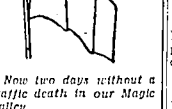

School Grads Are Informed Of ISES Aid

Job finding and recruitment facilities of the Idaho state employment service and affiliated services in other states were called to the attention of the high school graduating class and Twin Falls employers Monday by A. J. Meeks, manager of the local ISES office.

Realizing the great investment represented in the education of young people, the employment service this year has expanded placement, recruitment, and job development services on behalf of new graduates, Meeks declared. He further stressed that service to college graduates was also being emphasized.

"We want and expect to have the full cooperation of Twin Falls employers in this effort to locate suitable jobs for these new workers," Meeks said. The ISES manager stated the best and easiest way for Twin Falls employers to help is to survey their departments for possible openings for graduates and list their requirements with the office.

All state employment services in the nation are cooperating in the project, according to Meeks. He pointed out that this nationwide affiliation would be best to assist employers seeking hard-to-find qualifications and graduates wanting positions not available locally.

"We expect that the Twin Falls high school will graduate 183 students. While not all of these graduates will seek employment, possible steps should be taken by this community to assure those who seek good start after leaving school," Meeks concluded.

Price "Squeeze" Charged on Gas

SALT LAKE CITY, May 17—The Utah Cooperative association says major oil companies are attempting a price "squeeze" on independent distributors in this area.

The association said it has asked the small business committee of the Senate to investigate its charges, and also has referred the matter to the anti-trust division of the department of justice.

W. H. Robins, manager of the association, said the action was taken after conferences with the Utah state farm bureau and the Utah-Southern Idaho Farmers' union, when the association was refused assistance at the Wasatch Oil Refining plant after receiving 60,000 gallons for May.

The association, which includes 20 cooperative gas, oil and stations, normally receives 150,000 gallons in May, he said.

Robins charged the refusal was a "black-rope" method of forcing gasoline price increases.

Pasco Project Opens; Krug Lauds Event

WASHINGTON, May 17 (AP)—Secretary of Interior J. A. Krug heralded the opening of a "rich new frontier" in farming in the Columbia river basin.

Krug made his statement as irrigation water hit the first 5,200 acres of 1,000,000 acres of farm land on the Columbia project.

The initial unit near Pasco, Wash., holds 84 farms, of which about a dozen will be altered for sale to veterans, Krug said. The others are privately-owned.

"The 'Fracture' of Plans

"The lands are but a tiny fraction of the new agricultural domain which ultimately will be opened on the project," according to the secretary.

He said construction schedules call for irrigation of another 210,000 acres in 1952. This will include about 2,300 farms, Krug said, and "several hundred" probably will be for sale.

18 Miles of Canals

The Pasco unit is served by 18 miles of canals and five miles of concrete pipe from behind Grand Coulee dam. The reclamation bureau

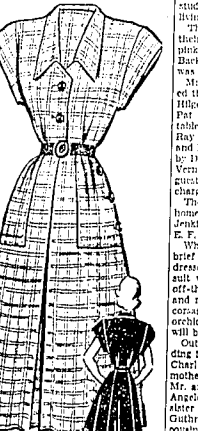

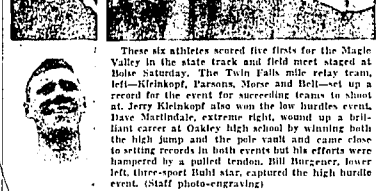

brown eyes wrinkled to punctuate his next statement: "Everything is in very good order."

Because the auditor found nothing out of line and believes he can convince an assortment of federal attorneys that there is indeed nothing out of line, the city of Twin Falls stands to become some \$37,000 richer.

Halley's Comet, Visible Again In 1986, Starts "Return" Trip

Astronomer, Extension Division, Oregon State University System

That spectacular comet of 1910, which for 200 years has been known as Halley's—but by earth dwellers only—is about ready to start our way again. It has now reached its farthest wandering into the depths of interplanetary space and is making the turn in preparation for another long close approach.

Halley's comet, known today, at least by name, to almost every high school pupil, was not discovered by the English astronomer Halley, or even named by him, but it was he who calculated the orbits of several comets which during a few hundred years previously had appeared about three-quarters of a century apart, and decreed all were "one and the same" object. He observed it carefully in 1682. After later computations he knew that it will with confidence predict its return in 1758.

Halley died 10 years before 1758, but his comet did not fail him. And it has since revisited our region of space in 1835 and 1910. Historical accounts indicate quite definitely that from 240 B. C. to 1910 every return, but one, is on record.

This comet makes a complete trip along its orbit around the sun on an average of about 77 years, but at times it is curving around the sun. It is expected to be at perihelion (nearest the sun) again about April, 1986.

The orbit of Halley's comet is a long, slim oval with the sun inside near one end. Only when the comet is in the general neighborhood of the sun is it visible from the earth. The closer it is to the orbit, around which the comet is now turning, is considerably farther out than the path of the distant planet, Neptune.

The comet travels most rapidly near the sun. It is now moving at a celestial "snail's pace," but will constantly increase its motion during the next 34 years, so that by the time it is curving around the sun in 1985 it will be flying at enormous speed. This corresponds to the motion of a ball whirled most verticilly into the air. It constantly slows down, almost stops at

Present Lack Of New Cars Will Continue

DETROIT, May 17 (AP)—A new automobile will be just as hard to get next year as it is today, only a business recession that could wash out enough unfilled orders to level supply with demand could upset this picture.

This is the conviction in many sources close to the car industry's merchandising division. They point out that the war years piled up a bigger market for automobiles—both in cars and trucks—than most industry leaders anticipated and that to this demand has been added a large number of new buyers.

The car makers are not worried about how many of their unfilled orders may be duplications. They figure the backlog now at more than 2,500,000. Even if a million of these were duplications, the remainder cannot be filled with this year's production.

Meanwhile new orders are piling up faster than cars are coming from the assembly lines. This is reported by the retailing divisions of most car manufacturers despite the refusal of thousands of dealers to accept new orders from any but old customers.

So, by all present indications, the auto industry will start next year with a backlog of unfilled orders. Some industry leaders say it will be 1,000,000 more than the average industry will be able to get immediate delivery from a new car dealer.
