City Council Handed Petitions Demanding Abolition of 'Slots'

Abolition of slot machines and the repeal of all other ordinances is demanded in a petition handed to the city council Monday night in the first concerted effort to rid Twin Falls of a "demoralizing influence."

The petition committee led by Claude Brown, Jr., president of the petition committee, presented the petition to the city council Monday night, signed with several hundred names, specifically calling for the repeal of 506 ordinances 715 and 712 and the prohibition of "every other amusement device known as slot machines within the city limits."

Lewis Conviction Set Aside by Government Lawyers Fail To Pick Jury In Court Case

WASHINGTON, May 18 (AP)—The civil contempt conviction was set aside today by Federal Judge T. Alan Goldsborough at the government's request.

Goldsborough today advised a government request to dismiss the no-strike injunction which is in effect against Lewis and his union.

The government's surprise move had no effect on the fines of \$1,420,000 imposed on the union and \$20,000 on Lewis for criminal contempt for failing to obey sooner a court order to call off the recent soft coal strike "forthwith."

Gov. H. H. Wallace, who signed the law, is being appealed by Lewis and the union.

The government made its dismissal request at the very moment that Lewis opened negotiations with the miners to replace the one expiring June 30. The timing apparently was merely tactical.

The government reportedly would have preferred that Lewis were out under the injunction.

Goldsborough had asked the district court to set aside the injunction on the ground that the government had failed to pick a jury to try the case.

Twin Falls county commissioners are pondering a letter received from Commissioner R. C. Lewis of the state law enforcement department declining their request of 10 days ago for his personal investigation of the disappearance of liquor evidence held by the sheriff.

His reply, dated May 13, was received Saturday and discussed by the commissioners Monday afternoon. The reply was addressed to Chairman Kenyon Green, although all three commissioners signed the letter asking Lewis to make the investigation.

The commissioners' letter was dated May 13, the day when commissioners were asked, by a three-man committee, to investigate a letter from the Republican county central committee, to clear up the mystery of the liquor disappearance.

Only comment made by the commissioner Monday was that they will think the matter over and give their next regular meeting, Friday, before determining what further action they will take.

Shefford Brock R. Rayburn said Monday night that he had prepared a report on the county commissioners he is doing everything he can to determine how the liquor disappeared. The sheriff stated the commissioners asked for a written report of his investigation before their Friday meeting.

Associate Attorney Everett M. Sweely stated Monday night that when he was unofficially approached by the commissioners in the liquor matter he informed them that the function of his office is prosecuting law enforcement. He added that he has no investigators attached to his office and is entirely dependent on the sheriff's office when he needs investigative work done.

One of the commissioners' letter to Lewis follows: "This board would like a personal investigation of the disappearance of liquor evidence held by the sheriff."

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State Department Rejects Stalin's Basis for Confab

WASHINGTON, May 18 (AP)—The state department today rejected Premier Stalin's latest statement on peace "as encouraging" but that the issues proposed for settlement do not stand between United States and the Soviet Union alone.

Moreover, the department said in this government's first official comment on Stalin's broad statement, the issues listed have been under negotiation for two years or more in the United Nations, the council of foreign ministers and elsewhere. Other countries always have been deeply interested.

The department directly blamed the Soviet Union for failure to reach agreement.

For example, it said the Soviet Union had no hope with the present National Cooperative War Production Administration but rejected other nine members of the U. S. atomic energy commission.

After a week of trying to knock down the idea that the United States wanted to wage war against the Soviet Union, Marshall said the American delegation of outstanding differences.

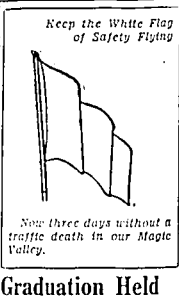

Synthetic Has Properties of Real Diamond

NEW YORK, May 18 (AP)—A new synthetic gem stone, which he calls the poor man's diamond, is reported by Jack DeMott of the fluorescent laboratories, Portland, Ore.

This man-made stone, he says, will have more fire than a diamond. It will emit more of the light it receives than a diamond. It is harder than rubber, sapphires or any gem except a diamond. The hardness comes within half a point of a diamond, which is the hardest substance on earth.

Big Cost Cut

DeMott estimates that the cost will be less than one-hundredth that of a diamond.

The stone is not known to exist in nature. It is silicon carbide, a synthetic known for 50 years, but mostly as a dark, poor quality of gem quality. Recently, DeMott says, new forms have been discovered in England and in his laboratory. These include one that is water-clear, with the same form of cubic crystals that make diamonds. The latter he expects to rival and in some ways outdo diamonds.

Aids Average Man

"We may well regard the new gem material," he writes in "The Mirror," "as the poor man's diamond of the future. In short, silicon carbide will enable the average person to enjoy all the beauty and glory seen in a huge, perfect diamond.

"Synthetic rubies have enabled everyone to appreciate the practical purposes, a real ruby, in color, hardness and optical properties. Silicon carbide will serve the same function in the case of the diamond, and at a cost well within the range of the masses of the people."

BELOGRADE, Yugoslavia, May 18 (AP)—Ten former prisoners in the Dachau concentration camp were executed at Ljubljana yesterday for "spying for a foreign power," officials announced today.

PROPOSED CENSORSHIP

During the war, the American press operated under purely voluntary censorship, even though some of its members possessed information that was vital to the nation's security and the success of its armed forces.

Now, in time of peace, the House of Representatives has proposed to impose censorship on certain information, and to punish a reporter who violates that censorship with a \$1,000 fine and a year's imprisonment.

The author of this piece of legislation is Rep. Charles C. McNary, Oregon. The censorship provision is part of a bill which grew out of the charges against Dr. Edward U. Condon, head of the national bureau of standards. The Thomas committee wanted a letter from FBI Chief J. Edgar Hoover relating to Dr. Condon's loyalty in connection with President Truman refused the request.

The bill would permit a congressional committee to demand any confidential information by a majority vote of its members, including the contents of the house or the president of the senate. At the same time, a majority vote could classify any information a committee possessed as confidential.

This is both unwise and unrealistic. The custom of "leaking" information to the press is a good custom, and its references is not only old and accepted, but generally valuable. For example, the public was kept informed through "leaks" of the progress of some of the Dumbarton Oaks and San Francisco conference meetings that would have been kept secret by the U. As for Congress itself, a disclosure of progress in the private hearings on a bill can be valuable to the members as well as to the public. A running summary of confidential proceedings in the press lets the committee members know the public reaction to what they are doing. This gives them some idea of the sources of support, trends of opposition and so on, and they would not otherwise have until the bill was delivered from its vacuum of secrecy.

But, most of all, this bill of Mr. Hoffman's, if passed, would set a dangerous precedent of concealment that is out of place in a democracy. Every citizen, especially, seems to have his share of a "big" or "kept" members. This step of censorship would apply to them. It would be on one committee to exercise it, as well as to the responsible statesmen.

The members of Congress are elected by the people to make laws, the conduct of the people's government. They are engaged in the public business and, with few exceptions, should operate publicly. When their activities in time of peace concern the national security—perhaps the field of atomic energy—we think that the press can be trusted to safeguard that security.

"The press," says Mr. Hoffman, "has no all-inclusive right and privilege of disclosing information that is detrimental to the country." It might be argued that Congress has no all-inclusive right and privilege to withhold information from the country at the caprice of some of its members.

We trust that the whole house will make short work of Mr. Hoffman's would-be legal sanction of further secrecy and irresponsibility in government.

U. N. RIVALRY MUST END

The atomic energy commission reports that it has reached an impasse.

With these words, a branch of the United Nations conference failed for the first time in the U. N.'s troubled history. The deadlock on international atomic energy control has long been an actuality. Yet the admission of defeat, while not unexpected, is deeply disheartening.

It means, for one thing, that the world's brave and abiding hope in the U. N. has received a setback. Following the unhappy handling of the Palestine affair, it further deflates the world's great expectations and focuses attention more intently on the East-West rivalry that dominates world affairs.

It also means that the responsible workable Baruch program of atomic control faces a long and indefinite postponement, with some question that it ever will be revived. At the same time, it does not mean that the Russian program will triumph. Except for the Soviet Union and the United States, there are U. N. members favor the American plan. There is little possibility that they would adopt in its place the plus, cynical "gentleman's agreement" put forth by one of the world's least trustworthy governments.

But if Russia had any acceptance of her atomic control plan, she has brought about an impasse. That probably suits the Soviet leaders just as well. Their tactics have forced the United States and their own people to an arms race. They have won what they needed most—time. For it is assumed that Russia's big problem now is to develop the industrial capacity to put her atomic scientists' knowledge of bomb production into practical operation.

This is a frightening prospect. But it is not a prospect created by the atomic energy commission's statement that Russian stubbornness has ended any present hope of agreement. The commission's failure has long been apparent.

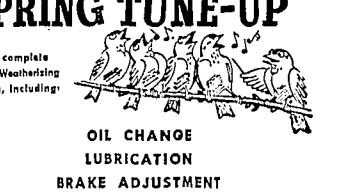

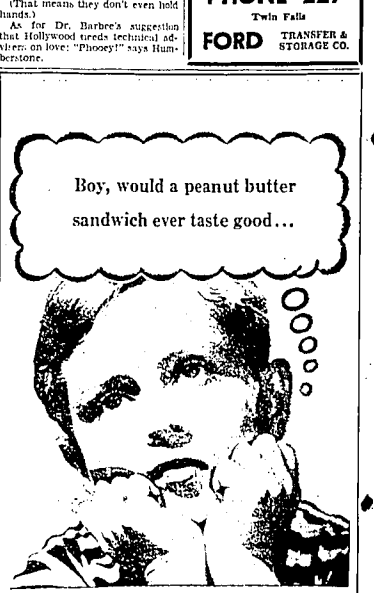

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Summer and Youth Boost Auto Deaths

WASHINGTON, May 18 (AP)—Deaths caused by automobile accidents start increasing in May. The increase in fatalities continues through the summer and into the fall months, traffic increase being responsible for a mounting death toll through August. Motor car travel declines in the fall, but fewer hours of daylight contribute to a continued rise in total deaths.

Accident records of various states show that 16-year-old drivers, on a percentage basis, are involved in three to nine times as many fatal accidents as middle-aged drivers. Why do youngsters have such a bad accident record? The Automotive Safety foundation says traffic research experts blame lack of driver training along with three characteristics of youth. The youth characteristics are:

1. Too much energy. This shows up in excessive speeding, vicious braking, cutting-in, wheel-spinning and other forms of energetic driving. These result in more frequent skidding accidents and line collisions.
 2. Inability to keep attention on driving. Youth finds it difficult to resist distractions. This leads young drivers to participate in entertainment of car companions or to wave at friends.
 3. Tendency to "show off." Excessiveness of the thrill desire.
- Safety authorities say these youth characteristics do not ordinarily appear in the police accident records. They are subject only to glance at the hands of qualified educators. The foundation says that Arizona, which has been expanding its high school driving training program since 1944, reports a sharp downward trend in high school car traffic fatalities. These numbered 23 in 1944, 11 in 1945, 6 in 1946 and one in a late date in 1947.

Improvement Noted
Delaware reports a tremendous improvement in the accident and violation records of trained young drivers in contrast to the untrained youth.

The foundation says that while there has been a great increase of public interest in high school driver education, only a fraction of the 25,000 high schools in the country offer adequate instruction.

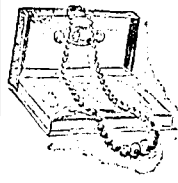

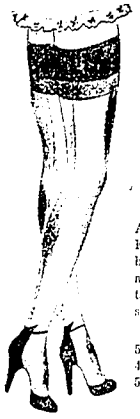

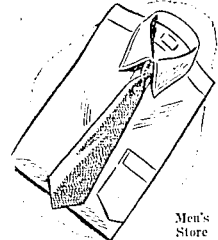
