Stone Goliath Stops at Final Resting Place

COOPERSTOWN, N. Y., May 19 (AP)—The Cardiff giant, once accepted by thousands as a "petrified human" before it was revealed as a gigantic hoax, found a final resting place here today after 70 years of wandering.

The stone Goliath, one of America's most sensational practical jokes, goes on exhibition in the Farmer's museum of the New York State Historical association. Nearby memorials to the giants of baseball history are housed in that sport's hall of fame.

The Cardiff giant, measuring 10 feet, 4 1/2 inches and weighing 2,900 pounds, is on view in approximately the same position in which it was unearthed in 1872 on the farm of "Stubbs" Newell, near Cardiff, in central New York.

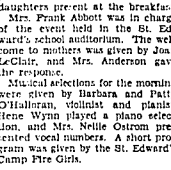

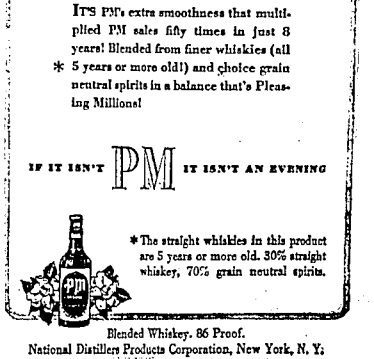

Atomic Tests Concluded at Pacific Base

HONOLULU, May 19 (AP)—Atom bomb tests at the Eniwetok proving ground have been concluded for the present and the next stage of atomic development will be in the design of improved weapons for delivering the bombs to their targets. It was indicated today.

Lieut.-Gen. John E. Hull, commander of Joint task force seven which conducted the tests, indicated in an interview that the Eniwetok tests also included some testable material other than the plutonium believed used in the five previous bomb explosions.

Only one clear-cut flat statement emerged from Hull's press conference, attended also by other officers. Hull said that none of the three explosions at Eniwetok was under water or aerial. This indicated they were surface explosions designed to test the power of new or improved fissionable material.

Dr. Daniel F. Horn, scientific director of the tests said that "unsuspected material"—possibly some new type of atomic explosive—also was tested at Eniwetok.

The ultimate purpose of the tests, Horn said, "is to insure the efficient utilization of national resources required for the development and application of atomic energy."

Hull added to this thought by saying that the material tested was the very latest in the U. S. arsenal and that "it can be said that the bombs worked."

Fornan said the tests proved experimental data for better understanding of the process of nuclear explosion and were necessary to form a sound basis for improved weapons design.

Doctor Says Serum May Halt Cancer

NEW YORK, May 19 (AP)—The development of a serum from human tissue that destroys or retards cancerous growth in mice was reported in Rome by an American physician.

The physician, Dr. Maxwell Maltz, New York City, a veteran in plastic surgery and skin grafting, made no claims that he has a cure for human cancer, but he said he believes that his work is a key that may open new doors to the general problem of cancer.

Two New Factors
In developing the serum, Maltz said that he discovered two mysterious factors in the human cell—one, a growth factor, and two, an anti-growth factor. These factors, he said, have nothing to do with the anterior pituitary gland which has long been proved to be the gland that determines the general skeletal stature of a human being.

Maltz also reported a type of serum that arrests up the healing of wounds, an achievement—if proved to be successful in human cases—that would rival possibly the benefits derived from various "wonder drugs" in medical science.

Tells Surgeons
His report was made at the opening session of the International College of Surgeons and was based on experiments with mice in which a serum, made from either human or mouse tissue, was used. He said that a second serum containing the anti-growth factor had retarded or destroyed completely two types of cancer in experimental animals.

Maltz said that the serum would soon be used in the most challenging test of all—whether it will retard cancerous growth in human beings.

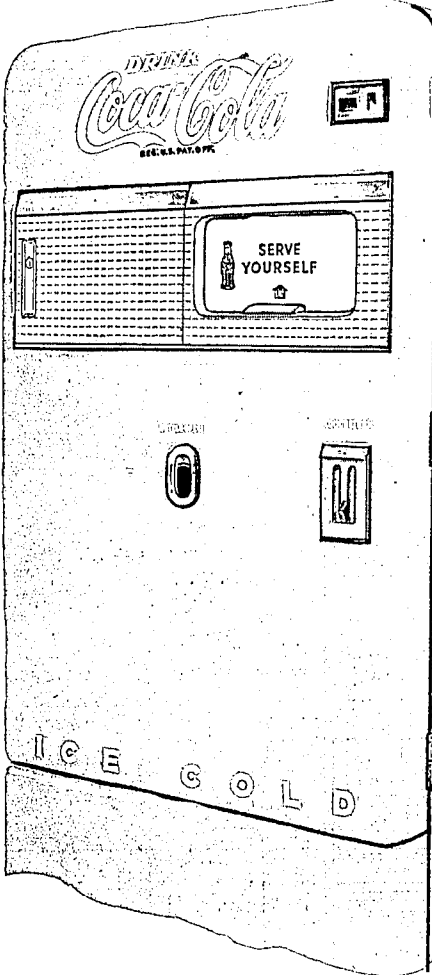

Head of New State Devotes Life to Work

By HAL BOYLE

NEW YORK, May 19 (AP)—Many years ago a boy was born in Russia who had a great dream.

The boy was a Jew. His dream was that his long, wandering people again would come home to Palestine.

And into his dream the boy poured his school hours, his long life. But the dream a man gives, his life is rarely enough time in the way he wants it.

Now did it to the boy—now Dr. Chaim Weizmann, presidential president of the world's newest state, Israel.

For his entire career was devoted to creating a homeland for the Jews without bloodshed. He thought they had known too much of bloodshed. But already—less than a week after declaring their republic—his people are being, chafing with invading armies.

The din of distance battle doesn't reach the aging 72-year-old scientist as he lies in his hotel room here. But it does hurt his heart. He has always hated violence and terrorism, always fought for peace.

He is a strange genius of many talents—this elderly chemist, statesman and money raiser.

To the average American Dr. Weizmann is only a half-familiar figure. But for a generation his name has sounded like a bell to millions of oppressed Jews in many lands—a bell to freedom, a bell to guide them from the dirty ghetto and the fatal pogrom.

Born in Russia, educated in Germany, Chaim Weizmann became a leader of biochemistry in Stein-



Wallace Declares Stalin Interested In Gaining Peace

OAKLAND, Calif., May 19 (AP)—Henry A. Wallace says Premier Stalin "is genuinely interested" in bringing about peaceful relations with the United States.

The third party presidential candidate based his statement on an open letter Wallace sent him.

Stalin said he was ready, if the United States is willing, to use Wallace's letter as the basis for face-to-face negotiations designed to end strained relations.

"I think it is particularly significant that Premier Stalin's reply to my open letter followed so closely on the heels of criticism of that open letter appearing in the Russian press," said Wallace in a statement he read last night at a meeting in furtherance of his presidential campaign.

He called his letter "an objective presentation of the world crisis."

British Navy Tells Details of Second 'Dunkerque' Operation

LONDON, May 19.—The admiralty told today how the British navy executed 59,000 troops from nine Greek beaches in April, 1941, despite German mines and dive bombers.

The dispatch, written by Adm. Lord Andrew Broune Cunningham shortly after the event, called it "this marvellous operation." His account showed that in this second major evacuation by the British—the first was Dunkerque—the navy accomplished what it set out to do.

"Had our enemy shown more enterprise the results might have been very different," Cunningham said.

By April 17, the necessity of withdrawing the British became apparent, Cunningham reported. The Greek army in the Epirus region had collapsed, the Allied air force was "completely inadequate" and German air superiority resulted in the "entire immobilization of our armies by day."

The principal Greek harbors could not be used because of bombings. So "only 14,000 were taken from the recognized wharves or piers, the balance from open beaches in landing craft and ships."

On April 21 and 22 there were heavy air attacks on the harbors and 23 vessels, including two hospital ships and a Greek destroyer, were sunk, Cunningham said.
