

Russ-U. S. Debate On Peace Parley Nearing Deadlock

WASHINGTON, May 20 (AP)—The peace exchange between Russia and the United States appears today to be hurrying into the same kind of deadlock that has blocked progress on all other issues involving the two great powers.

Moscow's latest declaration—Tass news agency dispatch evidently reflecting official Soviet views—represents the Soviet Union as standing firm that any negotiations undertaken should be on a two-power basis, covering a range of subjects from atomic energy to human rights.

By contrast, Secretary of State Marshall has made clear that any settlement which Russia is prepared to reach on major issues must be sought through the United Nations council of foreign ministers or other international agencies which have been grappling with these issues for the past two years or more.

### FEDERAL "STRIKE BREAKING"

"If the government is going to step in as a strike-breaking agency," says the president of the Switchmen's Union of North America, "it's about time that the American people start to get what they are going to do for the American working man deprived of his bargaining weapon."

That is an imposing generality, but it doesn't square with reality. And it doesn't justify a railroad strike, as it apparently was made.

From the practical viewpoint, there is no such concrete creature as "the American working man," any more than there is a similar one called "the American employer."

Even in the restricted sense of the working man as a union member, the generality does not apply.

Union members have varying responsibilities, just as they have varying jobs and wages.

It will not injure the public for the workers in a motory factory or even an automobile factory to go on strike and stay out until they get what they want. It does injure the public if union leaders, in industry-wide bargaining, shut down all the coal mines or all the steel mills or all the railroads to enforce their demands.

In the case of the railroads, the government has entered the picture as what the switchmen's president chooses to call "a strike-breaking agency." It did so because, as President Truman said, the strike by men as on railroads would be a nationwide tragedy, with worldwide repercussions, and because, as Justice Goldsborough said, such a strike would cause the country "to suffer irreparable injury for which it is no adequate remedy."

It should be pointed out that the owners of these basic industries and activities have the same responsibilities as their organized employees. They have no right, by industry-wide agreement, to shut down all the railroads or steel mills or coal mines or anything else. We are sure that the threat of a railroad strike started the American people thinking, but not about what they were going to do for the American working man deprived of his bargaining weapon. We imagine that they were thinking how dangerous that weapon would be if it could not be silenced, in a crisis, by the government's "strike-breaking" power.

Even the "American working man" needs have considered what such a strike could mean—millions of men unemployed, severe damage to our foreign policy, shortages, sky-rocketing prices and, if the strike lasted long enough, actual hardship and danger to health.

It may be theoretically wrong to limit the use of the "bargaining weapon" and to force the government into the artificial process of seizure. But the realities are still there to be faced.

If present ways of preventing paralyzing strikes had been tried, they could not have been found. We don't know what they will be—a ban on industry-wide bargaining (which would halt a railroad tie-up), compulsory arbitration with settlements enforceable by law, or something not yet proposed.

It will be objected to any such solution. But so long as the workers in our basic industries are willing to gamble with the nation's health and welfare to get what they want, something must be done.

It is hard to find a cure can be found that is bland and effective. But if it turns out to be bitter, labor will have to realize that the prescription is the result of some unions' self-indulgence.

Soviet-U. S. Troubles Blamed On Removal of FDR Policies

MONSIEU, May 20 (AP)—Tass says "leading circles" in Russia blame current Soviet-American difficulties on the United States government's departure from the policies of Franklin D. Roosevelt.

The official Russian news agency said in a dispatch distributed last night, it was in a position to report the opinion of these "leading circles" and that the belief there is that the Soviet-American deadlock is the result of the present Washington government's "aggressive attitude."

Under the administration of President Roosevelt, Tass said, "the most difficult international questions were settled among the United States, Britain and Russia for more than three years."

"The question therefore arises, why now is it considered impossible to reach agreed decisions of the powers on new, less difficult questions? It is not perhaps because the present government of the U. S. A. has departed from the Roosevelt policy and is pursuing a different policy?"

"The Soviet public considers that the situation that has arisen is the result of the aggressive attitude adopted by the present government of the United States of America."

Wallace declared the bill is "menace" and "It must be defeated," he said. Wallace spoke here last night at a Progressive party rally and conferred with party and labor leaders. He was to leave for Seattle by plane this afternoon.

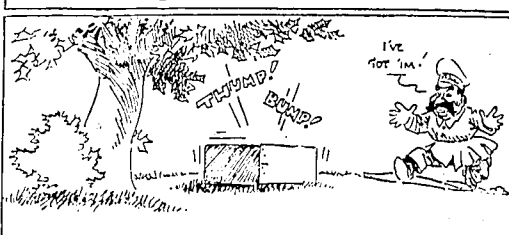

### Auditor Left Off Election List in Idaho

**BOISE, May 20**—The omission of the state auditor from the list of state officials to be elected for four-year terms as provided by constitutional amendment approved in 1944, was either a "typographical error or a clerical mistake," according to Secretary of State J. C. Price.

Price commented on the omission after an article written by John Corlett, Idaho State newspaper writer, appeared yesterday.

Corlett's article stated that Idaho Democrats are planning to petition to enter a full slate of state officials on the August 30 primary ballot despite the amendment.

**Court Ruling Needed**

The article stated that to get such a ticket on the ballot the constitutional amendment would have to be declared invalid.

Whether the omission of the state auditor invalidates the amendment would have to be decided by the state supreme court, the article stated.

Price said, "Every voter who read the amendment knew that he was voting for a complete complement of state officers. It is also very obvious that a complete complement of state officers was to be elected every four years was the intent of the legislature."

**Evidently Error**

He said, "I see no need of adding a reform of any office to any one filing candidacy for a state office in 1948. It appears to be very plain that the decision of the state auditor's office was a typographical error or a clerical mistake because it is included in the title of the enrolled bill."

The amendment provided for four-year terms for governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer and superintendent of public instruction, Corlett's article said.

### Pressure Canner Schools Set for Grange Members

The second school will be held at 2 p. m. Monday in the Twin Falls high school home economics room, members of the Mountain Brook, Knoll, Piler, Twin Falls and Hollister Granges are to attend.

Third training session is slated for 2 p. m. May 27 in the Bulli high school home economics room with Bulli, Cedar Draw, Northview, Deer Creek, Goodwin and Fairview Grange members in attendance.

Mrs. Schultz emphasized that pressure canners—in even-quot or larger sizes, not pressure saucepans or cookers—should be tested each year for the accuracy of their gauges and for the safety of the operators.

"I don't scream like just anybody," Miss Schwartz thins. "When I scream, my dear, I scream from the soul."

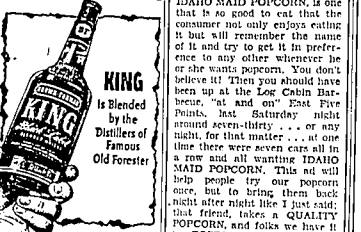
But it's just the idea that her old home studio would let anybody else do the yelling that hurts Sarah.

### Goff Opposes "Assessment" Mining Work

WASHINGTON, May 20 (AP)—The need for more production of strategic and critical minerals is too great, in the opinion of Representative Goff, to justify the expense of an "assessment" work. Goff has introduced one of several bills to suspend assessments until the mining claims for the year which will end June 30, 1948.

The law provides that a locator of a mining claim must do a certain amount of work, called assessment work, each year to hold the permit.

Goff said in a statement today: "I believe further suspension of assessment work is justified by a substantial shortage of metals and of men for the production of these metals. Assessment work ordinarily is dead weight, it does not produce anything and only rarely does it result in the discovery of valuable minerals."

Ever Magazine

"The number of men required in Idaho for assessment work would be very substantial and must be drawn from the manpower now engaged in production. Under modern mining methods, permanent employment of the present agricultural statute undoubtedly is justified, but agreement on the present situation is difficult in the short time likely to remain in the present situation."

Goff said he expected the House public lands committee to act on the bill within a few days.

### Island Is Chosen 'Foot-and-Mouth' Research Center

WASHINGTON, May 20 (AP)—The agriculture department announced today that the Prudhoe Bay off the coast of Rhode Island has been chosen as the site for a research laboratory to study the foot-and-mouth disease.

The disease affects cattle, sheep, goats and pigs. It is now raging in Mexico, according to reports from the United States recently spent millions of dollars to confine the disease south of the border and prevent its spread to American herds.

Dr. Sumner, chief of the department's bureau of animal industry, said the decision on selection of Prudhoe Bay is not final. He said he will discuss the selection with Gov. John C. Pastor (Democrat) tomorrow morning. Meetings will be held with other state and local officials and livestock interests.

Sumner indicated, however, that Rhode Island's delegation in congress has approved the choice.

Congress recently authorized the department to set up a research laboratory on an island not connected to the mainland and specified to guard against spread of the disease.

### Russell Presents Measure to Help Marginal Mining

WASHINGTON, May 20 (AP)—Representative Russell, R. Nev., yesterday introduced a new bill to aid marginal non-ferrous mines, including all committee-approved amendments to his original measure.

In the fine print is the provision which makes sure that the President has some place to park his horses and carriage. The law was passed back in 1911, when such provisions were a little more practical. But if Mr. Truman, or one of his successors, become horse minded, the gentlemen's club corp. is compelled by law to locate bed and board for the beasts.

### Electric Eye Tells What's In Oil Wells

TULSA, Okla., May 20 (AP)—The latest in electric eye, the new device that tells what lies down to more than three miles when the underground in an oil well is shown through an international petroleum exposition.

For oil wells the eye is called the electric log. It has become so important that virtually no American well now goes without this electrical inspection.

#### New Models

The new models, shown by the Halliburton company, are slender steel pipes three to 18 feet long. They are lowered down wells, charged with electricity that flashes in their axes along the side of the pole. The circuit is completed by steel stakes driven in the ground at the top of the well. The electrical energy flows out through the sides of the well.

With this eye passes, and seen, is like the shelves of a store. If the store were two miles high with shelves in unbroken ranks to the roof.

#### Width Varies

These shelves in the well are different layers, or strata of rock. Some layers are no wider than top to bottom than a grocery shelf. Others may be many feet wide. Like grocery shelves, these rock layers each contain a different kind of fossil. The job of the eye is to read the labels as it passes, tell what they are made of, and exactly how thick, from top to bottom each shelf is. The "roads" of the oil well shelves are rocks, hard, soft, porous, sandy, shale and many mixtures.

#### Instant Record

The eye records them as it passes, instant by instant. The record is in the form of a pebbled line, recorded at the well top by a camera. This pebbled line shows constantly right and left in wiggles.

The swings tell how easily the electrical energy is flowing from the pole down in the well out into the formations directly around it. This outflow is farther when porous water than when passing oil, because water conducts electricity and oil does not.

PITTSBURGH, May 20 (AP)—His feet were tired, a veteran mailman told a U. S. commissioner in answering charges that he delayed the mails.

The carrier, Lawrence J. Thoma, 44, Etna, was ordered held on \$1,000 bond for hearing. Postal inspectors said he not only delayed the mail but also dumped some of it in bushes. Thoma said he intended to deliver the mail later—but his feet just got tired.

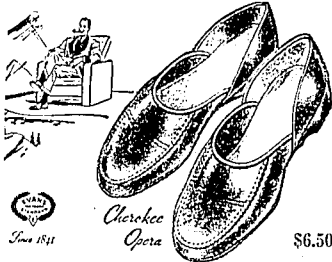
