### Exhibition of Irrigation by Sprinkler Set

BOISE, May 21 (AP)—The first sprinkler irrigation demonstration in Idaho will be staged today during the annual convention of the Idaho Reclamation association.

The demonstration, an afternoon affair, will be under the direction of E. B. Kern, assistant manager, Boise project, board of control.

Three large valley equipment companies will participate.

Although the sprinkler type of irrigation is new in Idaho, N. V. Sharp, president of the association, said there is an increasing amount of interest in this plan.

The demonstration will be preceded by a discussion led by H. H. Lewis, Washington, D. C., branch of operations and maintenance in the U. S. bureau of reclamation.

Lewis, a specialist in sprinkler irrigation, spent many years with the University of Idaho, extending service and irrigation engineering in southern Idaho.

Harry E. Polk, Williston, N. D., president of the National Reclamation association, will be the banquet speaker.

Numerous trips to Capitol Sharp said Polk has made numerous trips to Washington to appear before congressional committees on reclamation and has met with numerous regional and state reclamation associations.

The Idaho convention will run through Saturday.

Financial resources and construction problems were outlined for the Columbia basin inter-agency committee.

The committee heard reports on agriculture, mining and forest resources by members of state agencies and then went into executive session.

Four requirements State reclamation Engineer R. Kulp said four requirements were needed for full utilization of water under the plan.

These are: adequate storage for winter flow and spring runoff, coordinated multiple use of water for irrigation, power development, reclamation, canal and field water, and high pump lift.

Idaho's erosion and irrigation farming problems were outlined by Ray Peterson, extension service conservationist, and Max Peterson, experiment station irrigationist.

President Terms School Finances As "Disgraceful"

PHILADELPHIA, May 21 (AP)—President Truman condemns the financial condition of American public schools as "something disgraceful in the richest country in the world."

Addressing 2,500 persons, including 1,200 by pupils at Girard college here yesterday, the chief executive pointed to overcrowded schools and underpaid teachers.

He told the fathers school-children from 6 to 16 years of age were lucky to be placed in an institution founded 100 years ago by Philadelphia's Stephen Girard.

Mr. Truman remonstrated in a nine-minute, non-political speech that they received individual attention from their teachers. In some public schools, classes are so large the teachers do not know their pupils' names, he said.

Speaking extemporaneously as guest speaker at the college's annual celebration, he pointed out that these conditions exist in an age where individuals must be specialists to get along.

### War Mother Chapter Donates Needed Equipment to Hospital

The first piece of equipment—a thermic drainage pump—will be donated to the new Twin Falls county hospital was presented this week by the Twin Falls chapter of the American War Mothers association.

The pump, urgently needed by the hospital, will be used to assist recovery in abdominal surgery cases, according to Evert E. Moody, hospital superintendent, who accepted the gift from the organization.

At present, the hospital has no similar pumps in use. Moody said. However, they are in constant demand and the new machine is expected to prove a "very valuable asset."

Moody explained that up until the inauguration of the pump, patients were obliged to depend upon a cumbersome cavity bottle device called a Wainwright to drain the abdominal cavity after an operation.

The compact machine, which works on an electrically heated hot air-vacuum principle, will be employed to take away waste fluids that might otherwise cause infections.

"In the opinion of most doctors," he added, "these machines are real lifesavers and give my most hearty thanks to the American War Mothers for contributing it to us."

Funds for the purchase of the pump were acquired by the association through the sale of carnations May 3, the day before Mother's day. Mrs. Anna Peterson, chairman of the funds committee, was assisted by Mrs. Carl Conklin and Mrs. John McKelvie.

### Allied Control Unit in Berlin Is Quiet Now

BRUSSELS, May 21 (AP)—You'd think that with plenty of sticky to let a cent a drink the bar at least would be busy, but one of the quietest of the four units of the Allied control authority building.

That's the big building where four-power government for Germany operated until the Russians walked out in a huff March 29.

The days of the United States, Britain, Russia and France still fly there. At each entrance there are still four sentries, one from each of the occupying armies, but they haven't much to do and the Russian usually sits muzzled in a noel.

In the restaurant German waitresses stand around. They used to serve from 9:00 to 6:00 at lunch, but now this is down to about 9:00.

Until four-power machinery is received the ACA building stands as a monument to the failure of an experiment that began with high hopes and good feeling in the summer of 1945.

Since the Russians walked out there have been only routine meetings of the standing secretariat whose members sit together to do a little more than shuffle a few papers and hand a few notes to the table.

The big council chamber is not in use. It was there Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, the first American military governor, back-slapped "my pal" Marshal Gregory Zhukov, the first Russian military governor, back in 1945. Their colleagues then were British Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery and France's Gen. Pierre Kestler.

He will be returned to Soviet authorities.

The pilot said he had become lost. When he found himself over an area with American soldiers nearby, he thought he was over Okinawa peninsula airport.

He said he flew south until he exhausted his fuel.

He failed to reach, or perhaps overshoot, Taehon airport.

### NLRB Rules Out Shop Elections in States With Bans

WASHINGTON, May 21 (AP)—The national labor relations board ruled today that it can not hold union shop elections in 13 states which have bans or regulations covering the subject.

The board based an administrative order making the ruling. It is based on a majority opinion of three of its five members.

The order said the "fair-labor" act "in effect prohibits all federal laws prohibiting compulsory unionism... even where such legislation may affect employees engaged in interstate commerce."

The T. H. Harley law bans the "closed shop" but allows a union shop if a majority of workers vote for it.

In a closed shop, only union members can be hired. In a union shop, the management may hire a non-union man but he must join the union after his employment.

### 105 Jews Warned Not to Leave Israel on Ship for New York

HAIFA, Israel, May 21 (AP)—Jewish officials said today they have warned 105 Jews, including 25 Americans, they will travel if their ship is not ready for New York on the United States steamer Marine Corp.

The ship is the same from which the Lebanese refused 69 Jews, 41 of them Americans, when she stopped in a Lebanon port on her way to Haifa. Jewish authorities made official representations on that return.

The ship is stopping at Alexandria, Egypt, said one official today, speaking of the return trip.

"And how do we know the Egyptians might not take off Jewish passengers just as the Lebanese did," said the ship's agents said they did not know when the will call or just how many Jews who have boarded because all go.

"Young Jews of military age might not take off possible immigrants in Egypt," an agent said. "We don't know how many will take the chance until the time comes for embarkation."

Agents for the Marine Corp said the must call at Alexandria because current passengers for Egypt have been credited to take care about there. U. S. consular officials said the American embassy in Cairo is being less informed.

A Jewish spokesman held the Lebanese had no right to board the ship, catch passengers, and intern them. This official said.

### 30 New Clues To Help Find Cancer Cause

BOSTON, May 21 (AP)—Science now has 30 new clues on how to grow to be backward, brainy, sweet or sour.

With them researchers hope to trace cancer and "all kinds of diseases" aiming at cure through controlling growth of elements in the human body.

The 30 new clues are recently identified hormones reported to the American Urological association by Dr. Cornelius Packard Rhoads, director of New York's Sloan-Kettering Institute for cancer and research.

**Affect Body Cells**  
Hormones are reactions produced by some body cells, like those of the glands of sex organs, which have a definite effect on other body cells.

"Thus they play a part in making what you are and how you feel about being alive."

Dr. Rhoads said in an interview: "Factors of certain hormones—mainly one we call hormone 18—in persons with cancer."

"But so far we do not know whether the abnormal excess cause, decrease or whether it results from the disease being in the body."

**Could Solve It**  
The answer to that mystery, Dr. Rhoads said, may not only solve the problem of cancer but of "all kinds of disease, high blood pressure, for example."

"If we can find out how the hormones make cells grow normally and how to keep cells from growing abnormally, we will have cancer stopped," he said.

### Candidates All Write in Style of Executives

CHICAGO, May 21 (UP)—Leon York stepped forward today and announced he had discovered that all the candidates for the Democratic nomination for governor have one thing in common. "They all write like chief executives," he said.

York is a handwriting expert. He worked on the Lindbergh kidnaping case and other famous criminal cases.

He said he was taking no sides in the political war. But he said the quality of the writing of the candidates showed the general qualities of leadership.

**Unusual Types**  
"From the rolling scroll of Thomas E. Dewey to the neat script of Earl Warren," York said, "the handwriting of the candidates shows a similarity of crisp, heavy pressure and small letters. These qualities indicate vitality, precision and constructive thought."

President Truman's somewhat jagged and somewhat irregular script showed broad appeal, which York interpreted as indicating liberality and interest in people.

**Desires Speed**  
"The lack of flow shows a desire to get things done in a hurry," York said, "while the 'w' in the 'W' reveals a certain mechanical ability."

In York's opinion, the outstanding thing about Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg's signature is the "f" in the word "writing," which shows a strong and sustained mental capacity. He said Vandenberg's although also showed grace, care and diplomacy.

**"Artistic"**  
York called Sen. Robert A. Taft's signature "artistic." It showed, he said, an interest in learning and a tendency to make quick decisions. Dewey's writing, which is somewhat irregular, according to York, as well as executive ability and business-type efficiency. All of the letters were formed in an unusual way.

### Father Flanagan Paid Final Honor

BOYS TOWN, Neb., May 21 (UP)—Father Edward A. Flanagan will be buried today in the little city where he proved to skeptics that "there is no such thing as a bad boy."

Tears welled in the eyes of the former tough boys of all races and creeds as the Rev. Edmund Walsh celebrated the solemn requiem mass for the 61-year-old priest who took them from the street.

Services were conducted for the 400 citizens of Boys Town privately this morning. Later the Rt. Rev. Mgr. Patrick P. Flanagan, the dead priest's brother, addressed the public ceremonies.

Father Flanagan died May 15 at an army station in England after many of a coronary occlusion while spreading his gospel of kindness to misfits.

He had made a month's study of Austrian youth problems and was investigating conditions of boys and girls born and raised in Nazi Germany.

### State Vegetables Later Than Usual

BOISE, May 21 (UP)—Idaho commercial vegetables were later than normal on May 1, the bureau of agricultural economics said today. Peas were generally in good condition but growth has been slow. The production of the early crop was forecast at 212,000 bushels, 20 per cent above last year. The increase is due to an acreage boost from 1,200 acres last year to 1,700 this year.

Lettuce fields have made poor growth with many spring seeded fields showing poor stands. Present acreage is forecast at 200 acres but some of it may not be harvested. Production is forecast at 80,000 crates, 15 per cent below last year. The lettuce harvest is expected to start about two weeks later than last year.
