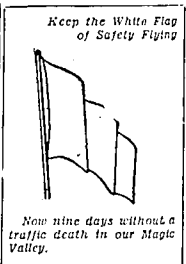
Wendell Scouts Set Scrap Metal Drive

4 Miles Win Special Race Against Train

GREENVILLE, Mo., May 24 (AP)—Engineer T. G. Patterson backed his Illinois Central Delta extra into the railroad station here today to find a tricky maneuvering a huge horde of fruits and vegetables.

"To mean to say that this long-eared lubber beat me into town," Patterson joked. But the rally was drawn out by a noisy brass band and the circus town.

The music, eating the prize-winning food was the anchor animal in a relay team of four miles which raced the train 2 1/2 miles to Cleveland, Miss., and this delta city.

Practical Service
Editor Hodding Carter of the Delta Democrat-Times had dreamed up the "contest" to attract to what citizens call poor train service between the two delta towns.

The Delta extra—consisting of a baggage and two passenger cars—had left Memphis at 8:30 a. m. (AP)

At 11:32 a. m., Patterson pulled in to the Cleveland station for a 15-minute wait. He chuckled and showed a broad grin as he watched the starting mile get a "ciddap" signal from rider Pat Fletcher, an underdog.

Special Letters
Fletcher carried a package with letters from town-folk to Santa asking for faster service by Christmas. One letter was a copy of the "Delta From Green." "Anybody Fletcher galloped his mile to the outskirts of town where the Delta waiter and a chauffeur in an automobile.

Fletcher passed on the saddle-buck and the automobile to the next town while Fletcher's mile took back to the barn.

The automobile pulled to the second mile rider who galloped his mile to the outskirts of town before surrendering to the Delta waiter and the chauffeur in the same automobile.

And so it went for the next two towns on the train's route. In all the four miles didn't run more than an estimated 100 yards.

Larry Pryor, a local cotton planter who sat atop the anchor mile got such a race into the railroad station from a post in the middle of the "Delta extra's 150 miles."

The mile pulled in at 1:22 p. m. The mile riders had the music won by "at least 10 seconds."

Truman Holds Some Support In Dixie Land

WASHINGTON, May 24 (AP)—President Truman had evidence today that some of the southern Democrats who have opposed his civil rights program still are willing to support him on other matters.

The evidence came in the form of 27 Democratic senate votes which sustained his veto of the bill which would have permitted senators to order an FBI investigation of key atomic officials.

Two Republicans—Langer, North Dakota, and Morse, Oregon, also voted along with Truman. They said, their votes weren't needed to give Mr. Truman his first veto victory this year.

GOP Wanted Help
GOP leaders had counted on southern major Democrats to help their civil rights proposals to help override the veto.

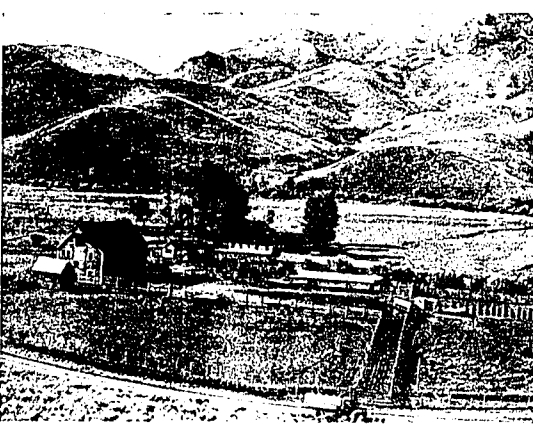
But only the Democrats joined the 38 Republicans voting to override. That was four short of the necessary two-thirds majority.

Among those supporting Mr. Truman's argument that the bill would invade his executive powers were such out-purport critics of his civil rights program as Sen. Olin Johnson, South Carolina, Hill and Sparkman, Alabama, and Stennis, Mississippi.

Eight Southerners
The nine Democratic votes cast against the veto came from eight southerners—Byrd and Robertson, Virginia; Eastland, Mississippi; Hatfield, Florida; McClellan, Arkansas; McMillan and Stewart, Tennessee, and Russell, Georgia—and Senator Downey, California.

Some Democrats said the outcome indicates a trend toward greater party harmony than the past. A minority has displayed for some time—although Senator McClellan, Republican, said he isn't ready to make any claims one way or the other.

Historic McMonigle Ranch Is Sold to Twin Falls Resident

HAILEY, May 24 (AP)—The historic McMonigle ranch, located in Deer Creek gulch in the Wood river valley, has been sold to Ralph Randall, a Twin Falls, for more than \$100,000.

The ranch was sold by Mrs. Mary McMonigle, widow of Patrick McMonigle, who had claim to the ranch in 1876.

McMonigle left his native Ireland in 1858 when he was 13 years old and set sail for America. He first settled in Pennsylvania, but soon left for the western United States.

After six years spent in Montana working in mines, he decided to see if the tales of fabulously rich silver and lead strikes in the Wood river country of Idaho were true. He bought himself a saddle horse and set out for a pack outfit and headed west.

In the spring of 1876, after six weeks travel through country inhabited mainly by Indians, he arrived in Hailey. While spending a week resting himself and his horse, he met two other young Irishmen—the Kelly brothers. The three became good friends.

In exploring the surrounding country that spring he guided his horse to a ridge about six miles north of Hailey, looking down into a small valley.

Running east and west, the valley was approximately a mile wide at its mouth and extended back into the high peaks for at least four miles. In the bottom land there are a stream flowing through the willows. The slopes facing north were covered with a dense growth of fir trees which slope to the south were carpeted with native grass.

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At one time he had a good sized herd of cattle.

In 1888 he started what is today one of the oldest established herds of Hereford in Idaho. At one time he owned over 500-head of cattle.

As much of a menace to the early day stockmen as the Indians were the cattle rustlers. At one time rustlers stole a good portion of McMonigle's steers and when he and a sheriff's posse recovered them the animals had been debauched and the herd ruined.

McMonigle married a neighboring farmer's daughter, Mary McLaughlin, in 1829. They had five sons and three daughters through the years.

He later sold a part of his original claim to Dillon Dalton, who wanted a home on Deer Creek. Dalton purchased the hot sulphur springs and the land adjoining it for \$300.

The property was recently sold for \$110,000.

In May, 1932, the Bolton hot springs opened with a 20-room hotel and hot bathing pools. The property has been run as a resort continuously until two years ago, for many years it was known as the Clarendon hot springs.

Since McMonigle's death in 1926, his widow and three sons, Patrick, Hugh and John have operated the ranch. They have accumulated surrounding territory until the deeded property covered by them now stands at 5,585 acres. Each family has a large home of their own.

Two bands of sheep were added in 1926 to the ranch holdings. With the coming of the forest service the McMonigles obtained rights adjoining their deeded land on which the Deer Forest herd would graze during the summer months.

Sons of John and Hugh McMonigle have acted in running the ranch the past several years during their vacation months from school, making the third generation to carry on the ranch's operation.

The recent acquisition that the Deer Forest ranch on Deer creek had been sold marks the closing of 110 years of use of the very few ranches in this section of the country still held by the family of the original homesteader.

Randall, who also purchased the Clarendon hot springs, has started improvements on the springs. He will take possession of the ranch this fall.

Record of Bond Sales Fine, but Sturgeon Leads

EMMORE COUNTY may take credit for being the Magic Valley county leading the highest percentage of its quota in the security loan drive. Lincoln county may be proud of second place. Minidoka county may claim third place with the greatest increase last week, and Twin Falls county may lay claim to fourth place.

But Jerome county's Guy F. Sturgeon lays claim to buying the first \$500 security bond in Jerome county during the current drive. Minidoka also is listed as purchasing the first U. S. defense and victory bonds sold in Jerome county in all eight bond drives. In addition, she has a clipping to show she was the first subscriber in the victory loan drive of 1919.

Emmore, Lincoln, Minidoka and Twin Falls counties last week topped the state average of 24.5 per cent of the quota, according to Grant Hackett, loan drive chairman for Magic Valley. Their percentages are 41.25, 30 and 29 per cent, respectively. Minidoka county boosted its percentage from 16 to 30 per cent.

Land Board Okays State Sales Plans

BOISE, May 24 (AP)—The state land board has approved for sale several parcels of state-owned land and two timber tracts.

The timber tract included 915 acres in Adams county appraised at \$25,721, and 600 acres in Blaine county of low quality timber in a cut-over area for \$10,000.

Land in Lincoln county, 320 acres in Owyhee county, 120 acres in Caribou county, 22 acres in Blaine county, 20 acres in Bonneville, 60 in Clearwater and four one-acre plots in the Island Park subdivision of Fremont county.

The board disapproved the sale of 600 acres of state-owned land in the Craters of the Moon national monument, for federally owned land elsewhere in the state.

Credit Firm's 38,000 Cards Show Growth

Growth from 15 to 38 members and from one card to 38,000 was noted recently by Mrs. Louise Hughes, manager of the Twin Falls Credit and Adjustment Association, which is beginning its 24th year of operation here.

Principal business of the credit bureau, as it is commonly known, is making credit reports for retail merchants but the organization also makes character reports for employers and reports on businesses in this area for wholesalers.

Reports by Phone

The majority of the credit reports are made by telephone and give sufficient information for an association member to decide whether or not to extend credit. Mrs. Hughes pointed out that the decision is made by the individual merchant, with the bureau only furnishing credit information.

Before making any credit report, at least four telephone calls are made in order to verify the applicant's employment and at least three to check credit references.

Daily Average High

On an average day the bureau receives about 35 calls from members for credit reports. At times of heavy credit buying, the number of daily oral reports may reach 50. Mrs. Hughes said, between 15 and 20 written reports are mailed each day.

For some types of businesses requiring credit reports, written reports are made. They are a good deal more comprehensive and deal with the real question. The bureau uses special forms for its reports to various types of members to suit their particular needs.

Members Varied

Among the bureau's membership is nearly every kind of business from corner grocery stores to heavy machinery concerns. Large percentage of firms use credit reports before issuing their credit cards which are good throughout the nation. Banks, finance companies, government lending agencies all call for credit reports before loaning money.

Importance of maintaining a good credit record was emphasized by Mrs. Hughes, who pointed out that a person's credit report follows him wherever he goes. Much of the bureau's work is in obtaining credit reports from towns where newcomers have lived, and in sending credit reports to former residents' new locations. This is facilitated through a nationwide affiliation of more than 100 credit bureaus.

Card Shows Record

Basis for a credit report is the applicant's card on file in the bureau's office. It shows his previous credit collection accounts, property ownership, home address, employment, credit record and many other items affecting credit.

The 38,000 cards on file in the bureau have covered 100,000,000 dollars in credit. Jerome, Gooding, Lincoln, Blaine and Elmore counties. Keeping the cards up to date is a major task.

The bureau sends its members a weekly bulletin showing municipal, justice, probate and district court actions, deeds, mortgages and other matters of record.

Collection Agency

Another department operated by the bureau is a collection service for its members. Mrs. Hughes said the number of past due accounts turned in for collection is constantly increasing and said the accounts are becoming harder to collect.

She attributed it to the breakdown of major appliances and cars, necessitating purchase or extensive repair, coupled with the rising cost of living and less money in the pocket of the average man.

The collection department is managed by Mrs. Hughes' son, Bill, and his wife. Hughes was named a member of the board of directors of the Rocky Mountain Association of Collectors at a convention last week in Ogden, Utah.

Optimistic Outlook

Commenting on local credit conditions, Mrs. Hughes said she sees an optimistic outlook. She said local businessmen have faith in the stability of the nation's economic future and are showing that faith by continuing to sell with the customer's promise to pay as their security.

The volume of credit business here is growing every day according to the increasing in inquiries for credit reports. Although business men are optimistic, Mrs. Hughes said, they are not extending credit blindly but are demanding to know the paying habits of their credit applicants before selling on time.

However, she pointed out, credit business can not continue successful operation if their credit customers fail to pay their accounts as agreed. Credit customers can share local businessmen's faith in the future, she declared, by keeping their own credit records good.

Wallace at long is a different matter when you travel abroad and air what you consider dirty linen to other folks—at a price.

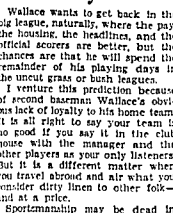

To continue the baseball parallel, Stalin would always be backing up or hitting around the bases and on his left and neglecting to come to the aid of the third baseman—let's call him Einstein—on his right.

Let us now consider the second baseman of this proposed Stalin double-play combination, one Henry Wallace. He played Three-I ball in Iowa without too much success for many years and then suddenly advanced to two much for him. It went to his head and his arm.

Whereas he was a fairly steady if not sensational player in Iowa, he started making grandstand catches shortly after he reached Washington. The spectators never could be sure where he would throw the ball.

Eventually, he had a demoralizing effect on the Washington team, and Manager Truman had to get rid of him. Given his unconditional release, Wallace signed with an out-law outfit—the third party—and now is pitcher, catcher, moundsman, ticket taker, and popcorn and peanut concessionaire for the league.



Wallace wants to get back in the big league, naturally, where the pay, the housing, the headlines, and the official scores are better, but the chances are that he will spend the remainder of his playing days in the uncut grass or bush leagues.

I venture this prediction because of second baseman Wallace's obvious lack of loyalty to his home team. It is all right to say your team is no good if you say it in the clubhouse with the manager and the other players as your only listeners. But it is a different matter when you travel abroad and air what you consider dirty linen to other folks—at a price.

Sportsmanship may be dead in this country but not that dead.

Now for the first baseman—a canglier, high-pockets fellow called U.S.A. He has been pulled off first base because he is too good to get thrown to fall for this one. He has been in the dirt with his glove to save a pitch too many times to like the looks of the Stalin combination again.

At least millions of us fans hope I think that what he will do—and I am playing for too many to get a reputation for class, go out and earn a reputation for wild hitting, honest throwing, and on-the-level fielding, and then he'll consider signing the boys up.

U. S. Air Forces Making Plans for Unusual Airplane

WASHINGTON, May 24 (AP)—The Air Force is working on designs for a new high speed plane that would be piloted by a man lying on his stomach.

The advantages of piloting a plane from a prone position are many, according to Maj.-Gen. Malcolm C. Grow, Air Surgeon.

He said preliminary tests showed that men could lie prone for eight hours or more in perfect comfort. Some men reported after the tests they were less tired than if they had been in a sitting position.

A pilot in a prone position can dive and execute other sudden maneuvers with far less chance of "blacking out," Grow said. The reason for developing ships whereby the pilot would lie down is simple. Taylor Says U. S. Policy Overseas Is Embarrassing

SALT LAKE CITY, May 24 (AP)—Idaho Sen. Glen H. Taylor, third party vice presidential candidate, today stated that U. S. foreign policy in recent weeks "was most embarrassing and humiliating."

Stopping over in Salt Lake City briefly on his way to a National speaking tour, Taylor declared that this nation's policy was particularly "embarrassing" as far as Palestine is concerned.

"To have a delegate to the U.N. admit publicly that he does not know what is going on in Palestine as far as the U. S. is concerned, and to have the rest of the delegates laugh at his face is most humiliating," the senator declared.

Taylor said that the state department's attitude of recent weeks toward Russian overtures were also extremely embarrassing. However, he said, "I am just as happy, it would be better to wait until Mr. Wallace is President; it would do more good."

Taylor said that Wallace strongly would show itself in the balloting next November, and that the third party was rapidly gaining ground, despite efforts on the part of 1400 leaders and others to curb "enthusiasm."

An enterprising slot machine operator with headquarters around the center from the United Press explained the machine's workings like this:

Get Smokes

You drop a five-yen slug, pull down the bar, and, if very lucky, you get two sevens on the revolving drum. That entitles you to two packs of "peace" cigarettes (they're wonderfully worth 100 yen).

That's the best you can possibly do. Two sevens is the grand prize. The manufacturers call the double-seven "all mighty." Watching two machines spin for half an hour I didn't see it turn up once.
