Mexicans Group Calls on City Council To Arrive For Analysis of Huge Budget By Planes

As many as 500 Mexican nationals will be flown here to thin sugar beets in Magic Valley, it was announced Monday night by Harry A. Elcock, manager of the Amalgamated sugar plant.

First flight of four especially chartered planes will leave here early Thursday morning, each carrying 31 workers. The workers will continue arriving at the rate of 124 per day until they are here.

The Mexican nationals will work on 30,000 acres in Magic Valley, and will be housed in various board camps including those at Wendell, Jerome, Gooding, Buhl, Hazelton, Burley, Paul and Twin Falls.

Elcock said a company representative is now in Tampoico, Mexico, recruiting the workers. They will be taken the 400 miles from Mexico to Laredo, Tex., by bus. The 1,000-mile trip from Laredo to Jose City will be made in concentrated C-47 transports.

The long dry spring just recent here has been a serious fact for growers of beets, Elcock said, and the crop is quickly approaching its peak.

During the past week about 1,000 acres of beets have been thinned by local labor and 200 imported from Mexico, Elcock said. The 200 Indians are working in the Burley-Rupert area. They were brought from their concentration near Gallup, N. M., Elcock said.

About three-quarters of the Indians are housed in the Burley labor camp, and the rest are housed on the farms where they are employed.

Grants Pay Increase To CIO Auto Workers to Prevent Threatened Strike

DETROIT, May 25 (AP)—General Motors corporation granted a unique 11-cent an hour wage boost today to avert a strike of its 225,000 CIO production workers. The company said the formula would cost it about \$75,000,000 a year. But GM called it "the new approach to the living cost problem." A GM strike had been set for Friday by the CIO United Auto Workers.

Workers who were the walkout averted, but the settlement raised hopes for a quick end to the 11-day-old strike of 76,000 Chrysler corporation employees.

On the basis of past history, it is anticipated that the GM formula may set a 1948 wage pattern in the 1,000,000-man auto industry and other important segments of the national economy.

General Motors had agreed to resume bargaining with the UAW-CIO Wednesday. The best previous Chrysler offer, the union was told, was a 6 percent increase.

The other member of the auto industry's big three, the Ford Motor Company, scheduled a 6 percent increase in its wages.

General Motors and the union were close to a deal on Friday, but the announcement of the settlement.

It brings the average wage in General Motors plants to about \$14.61 an hour. The UAW-CIO originally asked GM for a 25 cent an hour increase.

General Motors would not say whether the wage increase would be a step toward a long-term agreement. The UAW-CIO says it will accept the offer only if the company agrees to a 10 percent increase in the cost of living by then.

Mercury Will Be Visible in Next 10 Days

By J. HUGH FREEST "That considerable number, young and otherwise, who often regret they have never sighted the planet Mercury, may during the next 10 days spot this elusive little wanderer in the western twilight—providing the cloud gods cooperate. On May 23, Mercury will set over one and one-half hours after the sun and may be distinctly seen considerably below and to the right of Venus, the strikingly brilliant object which has been in the early evening sky all spring.

On May 30, the little world will appear considerably nearer Venus and will be up until two hours after sunset, but will be somewhat dimmer than a week earlier. Although it is getting nearer to us, its telescopic shape is becoming a thinner crescent, so sends less light our way.

Venus need no other description than that given above. A line stretched in imagination across the heavens through Mercury to Venus, and then extended on upward and southward will, in order, eventually pass through yellow Saturn and reddish Mars. The four are almost in a long straight line.

Venus far outshines a combination of all the other three, which in order of brightness on May 23 are Mercury, Saturn and Mars. By May 23, Mercury will have faded to Earth's brightness.

As the moon from the magnificent line of four bright worlds, only one other naked-eye planet remains. This is Jupiter, in luminosity second only to Venus. Jupiter rises in the southeast around 10 p. m. By sunrise it is low in the southwest.
