Federal Officials Reject Request to Nationalize Rails

WASHINGTON, May 26 (UP)—Government officials gave a cold shoulder today to demands by 21 railway unions for nationalization of American railroads. But they revealed that the White House is trying again to initiate settlement of the labor dispute which led to government seizure of the railroads two weeks ago in an emergency move to prevent a nationwide strike.

One high official, who declined to be named publicly, said presidential labor adviser John R. Steelman "is in touch with both parties" in an effort to bring about a settlement.

He declined to say whether the settlement, as emergency operation of the railroads, planned to negotiate with the unions itself or provide the new peace formula to the two parties.

Unexpected Demand
The demand for nationalization of the railroads came unexpectedly last night from presidents of 21 or 22 major rail unions representing 1,250,000 workers. It was a result of the collapse in negotiations between the railroad industry and the railroad unions representing engineers, firemen and switchmen.

The union leaders said the government had placed them in a position of a "strike breaker" by taking technical possession of the railroads and charging a court order forcing the three unions to call off the strike they had set for May 31.

Basic Departure
They said the government "has taken preparations for transfer of railroad ownership from private interests to the United States of America."

WALLACES "PRIVATE" DINNER
American politics has finally come up with something new. It's the record speech by a presidential candidate. The inventor and, to date, the sole possessor of this novel technique is Henry A. Wallace, who tried it out on a select few in Hollywood the other night.
Some of Mr. Wallace's backers gave a cozy little "private" dinner last week. It cost the guests ten bucks a head. But the press couldn't buy, beg or bully their way in. No, Mr. Wallace was going to talk off the record. And apparently they were going to pass the hat for any change the guests had after paying for the tickets. But, according to one source, it was explained that the press and reporters might inhibit potential contributors.

CHANGLED-Anyway, the GOP's souls report that Jewish sentiment toward the man in the White House work had been completely altered. In Truman's intended re-election, even though it caused dismay in London and Paris, and was given at the very height of the anti-Semitic campaign in the United States were arguing against such a move.
Although certain diplomats and military experts are still in the middle of the Truman-Hill Republicans have offered only minor criticism for the reason that they dare not antagonize the man who is the most powerful man in the world.
The civil rights program alone was not sufficient to satisfy the colored people. It is because Truman has made no determination to end Jim Crowism in the South, but two other developments will be better than any other progressive Republican will of Wallace.

Mundt honestly believes that the only way to eradicate the evil of communism is to abolish by law. Besides, it is a popular political issue and he has a long record of public service.
The political angle has been perfectly illustrated in the Green primary contest between Gov. Thomas E. Dewey and Harold Stassen. Stassen was attacked New York City as a center of communism.
Sixteen long since learned that rural and small-town audiences invariably applaud his demand that the Communist party be outlawed.
In his recent debate with Dewey he declared that the Mundt bill would outlaw the party. The authors of the bill deny this.
In discussing the bill with Mundt, I pointed out the parallel between the effort to eradicate the evil of alcohol by the prohibition law and the effort to wipe out the political evil of communism by outlawing it. He came back with this:

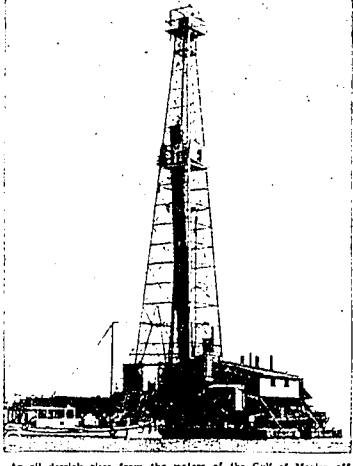
On Wrong Corner

Gulf Coast Booms as Wildcat Operators Drill in Tidelands

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—The oil industry is going to sea.

Instead of "wildcatting" for oil, operators and petroleum geologists today are "wildcat-fishing" in the waters off the Gulf of Mexico, and one of the biggest oil booms in history is in the making.

Alexander Deussen, veteran geologist and one of the best known Gulf coast experts, believes there may be as many as 15 billion barrels more waiting to be tapped in the shallow tidelands off Mississippi, Alabama and Florida.

This huge amount of oil is one-fifth of the world's present total supply, half as much as the fabled oil of Arabia, and two-thirds that of the U. S. now has left.

Until recently, the high cost of drilling in open waters of the Gulf kept oil men's feet dry.

Now oil is booming because, and more valuable. Peace-time requirements are at an all-time high and the international situation makes new domestic sources all the more valuable. Almost any oil, anywhere, can be produced at a profit, in a few years, if not now, oil men believe.

The Gulf tideland boom got started slowly, in the years before World war II. Now it is picking up speed.

Movie Moguls Losing Fears Of Television

LOS ANGELES, May 26 (AP)—The movie industry, long fearful of television's effect on boxoffice receipts, now is breathing easier today.

Video projection adequate for a full-size theater screen without the use of film was demonstrated for the first time last night in radio and cinema theatres.

This process, first under wraps for months, enlarges the television image by an optical system similar in principle to that of the 200-inch Mt. Palomar telescope.

Producers New Lure

Movie executives predict this advancement ultimately will provide theaters with a new lure.

Some 2,000 delegates to conventions of the Society of Motion Picture Engineers and the National Association of Broadcasters attended a historic showing of direct video, on a screen 29 by 15 feet. The image quality, unlike earlier efforts to adapt television to theaters, was amazingly clear.

New Series

The radio and film engineers, assembled in a Warner Brothers movie studio sound stage, saw on the big screen telecasts from KCTV, local Paramount station. They also saw pictures of themselves, picked up by video cameras recording the audience. Another phase of the demonstration was the projection of film developed within 10 seconds of its exposure to images on a five-inch television receiving tube.

Direct optical magnification for large screen projection was developed jointly by Warner Brothers, Twentieth Century-Fox and Radio Corporation of America. It is still in the advanced experimental stage.

But there they can easily locate themselves on the map because their positions are fixed. For underwater exploration they locate their positions at sea with radar lines from the land and drop their recording instruments through the water and once on the Gulf floor to take readings from the hard surface beneath the ooze.

Example, Sun, Shell, Texas, Standard, Shell and other oil companies are in the search for new finds in the tidelands.

Still to be determined is the question of whether the federal or state governments hold title to the underwater fields.

Last summer the supreme court, by a 6-2 decision, held that the tidelands off the California coast belonged to the federal government. Since then the situation has been more or less confused, with the Gulf states, especially Texas, contending that the decision did not affect their rights to tidelands off their respective coasts.

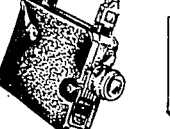

America and England Hold Key to Truce

Hope for a truce in Palestine depends more heavily than ever on the success of current Anglo-American negotiations than on anything the Arab and Jew are likely to do.

The crux of the matter was reached when British Foreign Minister Bevin asked in parliament yesterday how he would vote in the United Nations if the request for a truce is approved.

He said that he would vote in favor of the truce.

This is what Bevin and U. S. Ambassador Dennis have been discussing over the past few days. Not only in Palestine, but also Anglo-American relations are being involved.

American officials are pursuing a course of watchful waiting with regard to the effect of the truce on the Arab side. The Arab side is not expected, as long as they have British support, to settle for any truce that involves the partitioning which has been effected by Jewish arms.

If, therefore, the Arabs renounce the truce for a deadline, and if the British continue their military support, there is every indication that the United States will lift its embargo on the shipment of arms to the middle east. Foreign officials apparently had said as much to President Weizmann of Israel.

While this technically would permit shipments to both sides, its effect would be to put the United States on the Jewish side in the partition to the British arms on the Arab side.

There is no indication that the United States has presented its views to Britain in the form of an ultimatum, but there is little doubt that the representations have been strong. Where there was a quid pro quo offer—that the embargo be lifted if the British withdrew their support of the Arab—has not been indicated. That might be indicated by Dr. Weizmann's report that Truman gave him "some" hope. Apparently, the whole thing depends on the British.

The British have said that they will stick by their commitments to the Arab until the United Nations declares Arab activity illegal. If the Arab defy the cease fire order it would be easy to infer that illegal activity later. But British-Arab relations are such that Bevin may present a positive U. N. declaration. Then he could tell the Arab that Britain still loves them, but must obey a U. N. mandate.

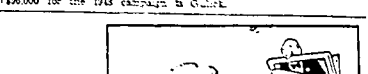

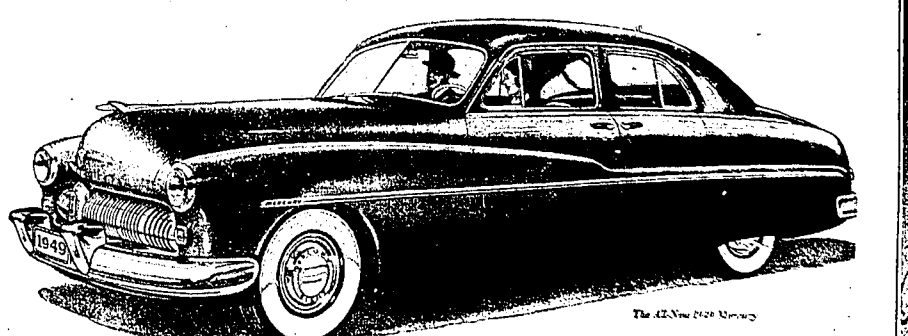

More, Too

In the other rooms and in the hallway were crammed hundreds of articles—old automobile tires, five-gallon tin cans, expensive glassware and china, broken crates, bottles, rag, rare books.

"I'm a bachelor, you know," the attorney McComber said, "and all was meant to sort of clean this place up, but you know how things will collect."

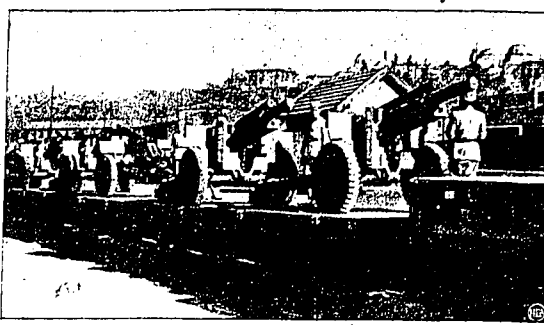

He looked up the names of those who have seen the U. S. and New Jersey in the house interstate and foreign commerce committee and said:

"First, I would like to see the U. S. and New Jersey, then when I was in congress, we had the Harman Nichols bill which gave the United States to give laws to you fellows are like Athens—you've got to see the U. S. and New Jersey. The committee recently sagged shoulders in union.

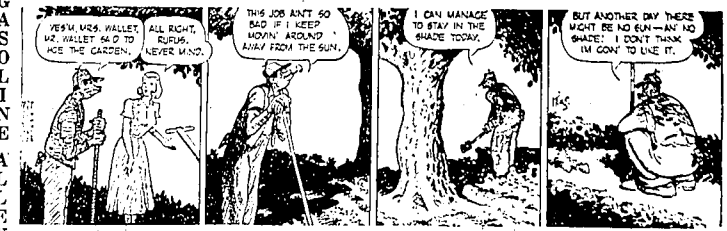

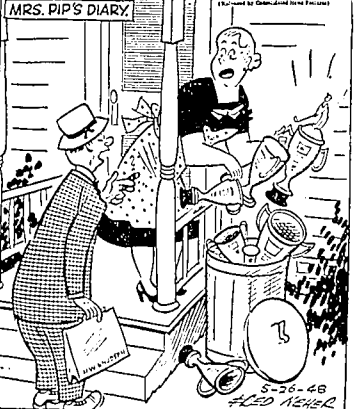

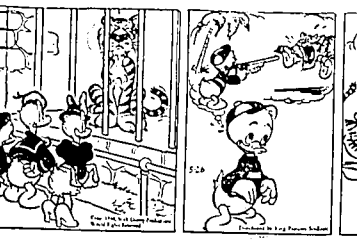
