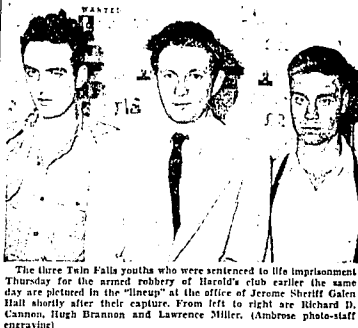

GOODING, May 28—Three youthful gunmen who held up Harold's club near Clear lakes early Thursday morning were behind prison bars Friday just 31 hours and 10 minutes after the hold-up, each sentenced to life imprisonment. The three youths, Hugh Brannon, 21; Dick Cannon, 19, and L. A. Miller, 23, all of Twin Falls, pleaded guilty to taking \$248 from the cash register of the roadhouse at gun point. They also were alleged to have taken three girls from two patrons and stolen a truck and a car.

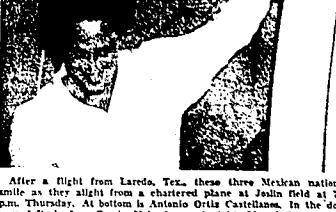

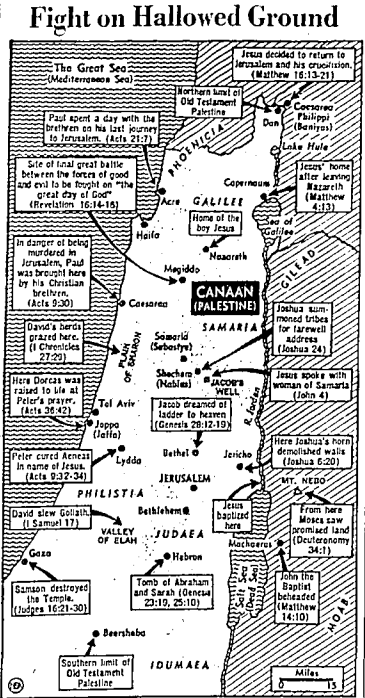

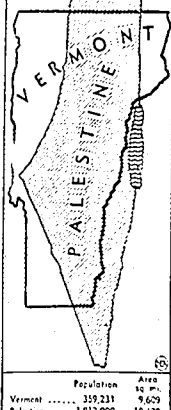

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Moffat Backs Home Fires Burn 158 Years

Wool Council In West Area

RUPERT, May 28.—The formation of a Rocky Mountain Wool council patterned after the cotton council of southern states, has been advocated by Howard Moffat, secretary of the Rupert Chamber of Commerce.

Moffat, who recently returned from a meeting of the Mountain States Association of Chambers of Commerce, said the formation of a wool council would provide protection for the western wool grower from being "short changed" by eastern wool processors.

He pointed out that for many years the wool producers of the Rocky Mountain states have been shipping their clip to Boston, Mass., mainly for scouring and processing, with the freight costs being paid by the shipper.

"Large sums of money have changed hands several times before the clipped or long cut ever reached the mills for weaving. The producer has been told that the waste between his clip or wool in the trace was of no value, that it ended up clogging sewers."

"The producer has never been told that at least 10 per cent of the clip furnished a valuable by-product known as lanolin and worth 25 cents a pound. Nor have they been told that the short combine also possesses a value to the processor," Moffat said.

"If the wool production in our western states continues on as it has for the past few years, it will be a very short time until the mountain states will have lost a raw material of great bulk in its economy," Moffat declared.

Moffat urges wool growers to band together in an effort to bring processing plants into the west.

"It is high time that the cities of the mountain states discuss their Chamber of Commerce and similar organizations and themselves to the battle of economy that will prove their survival," Moffat concluded.

Last year 3,000,000 pounds of wool or 48 per cent of the nation's output was grown in the mountain states.

WASHINGTON, May 28 (AP)—The government today branded some 30 additional organizations as subversive.

The list was prepared by Attorney General Tom C. Clark yesterday. It was sent to all government agencies today by Seth W. Richardson, chairman of President Truman's loyalty review board. Another group of about 60 organizations was designated subversive by the board last October. At that time he indicated that the list was not complete. The lists are used in connection with determinations of the loyalty of federal employees.

"There is a continuing study of these agencies," a report prepared by the federal bureau of investigation, Clark said in his report to Richardson, "and a continuing review of the officials of the department of the government and the preparation by the attorney general of lists of subversive organizations."

Among organizations added to the list today were:

- American Association for Reconstruction of Venezuela, Inc.
- American Committee for Protection of Foreign Born.
- The American Council for a Democratic Greece, formerly known as the Greek American center.
- American League for Peace and Democracy, directed by American League Against War and Fascism and predecessor of American Peace Union, both included in the November list.
- American Russian Institute.
- American Slav center.

"This is it," he said. "We're going to do something. The wool industry in the west has been too long confined to the backs of the sheep-raisers. That only half of it."

Another informant said, however, that Benes' doctors were worried over his condition and were taking precautions to protect his life.

Jan Benes has been a resident of Milwaukee for 19 years.

"My son has been writing me desperate letters about his home because his mother is ill," he said. "What can I do but go home?"

He complained bitterly that he was misquoted by a Prague newspaper which reported he had returned to Czechoslovakia because he was dissatisfied with conditions in the United States.

"How could I do that?" he asked. "When I arrived in the United States I was a poor carpenter. Today I own my own factory."

Dairy Future Termed Good By Area Man

JEROME, May 28.—Milk production in the United States has dropped to 133 pounds per day per consumer and this is insufficient to supply the growing demands not only in the United States but also those from abroad.

That was the statement of Roy D. Smith, general manager of the Jerome Cooperative Creamery company, in discussing the need for production which has fallen to lowest per capita level in 10 years.

Because of this condition marketing prospects for the dairy farmer are the brightest in the history of the industry, Smith declared.

Cow Population Decreases

"There has been decrease in the cow population on farms," Smith stated. "In 1945, the high point, there were 27,700,000 cows compared to only 25,455,000 today. At the high point in 1945, there were 6,720,000 heifer calves on farms for replacement in dairy herds. Today there are only 6,485,000, a number which indicates a continued downward trend in the number of dairy cattle in the next year or two."

"The government is buying dairy products to ship abroad. Also, there are developments in Central and South America and Asia that offer greatly increased markets for the American dairy farmer."

"On the basis of short and long range outlook for the dairy industry in the face of this greatly increased demand to meet business on the part of the dairyman," Smith continued, "immediate prospects for profitable dairy operations through this year are more favorable than in recent years. Recent adjustments in grain prices plus forecasts of much better grain harvests, which should ease the U. S. grain export requirements, are improving the milk feed-price ratio."

Attractive as Income Source

"Dairying as a long-range source of farm income is even more attractive than in the past. Price of milk in comparison with other major farm commodities over a period of many years has been the most steady year-around source of income—in addition to the benefits to the farm as compared to most grain cropping."

"It seems to me that the time has arrived to review feeding and management methods, survey the dairy farm with a view of increasing herds, and to take advantage of the best long-range dairy marketing prospects ever known in this country."

'Largest' Meteor Crater Is Found

SYDNEY, Australia (AP)—What is believed to be one of the world's largest meteorite craters has been found in western Australia, reports from an expedition party indicate.

The crater is 150 deep and more than half a mile in diameter. It is on the edge of a desert basin, 400 miles from the town of Broome, 450 miles south of Hall's creek, the nearest large airport.

It first was noted Aug. 21, 1947, during an air reconnaissance flight by Frank Reeves, Standard Vacuum Oil company geologist, and N. B. Gause, a geophysicist. On Aug. 27, 1947, Reeves and another companion, Dudley Evans, traveled by jeep to the crater.

"They decided after two hours' inspection that it was of volcanic origin."

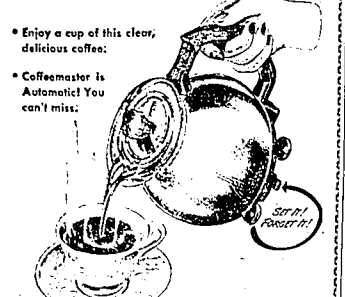

Science Is on Trail of Virus Disease Cure

WASHINGTON, May 27 (AP)—Scientists appear today to be on the trail of a chemical weapon against virus diseases.

Many bacteria-borne maladies have been conquered in recent years with such drugs, penicillin, streptomycin and other chemical agents.

But because virus function within living cells, it has thus far been impossible to develop a weapon against them which would not also destroy the host cells.

New Avenue Spread

Scientists of the University of California have, however, opened up new avenues of research which suggest the quest may not be fruitless. Their search has taken them deep into a realm of submicroscopic molecules existing on the very border of life.

Whether influenza, infantile paralysis and other kinds of virus are living things—like animal and plant cells, genes, and bacteria—or whether they are merely chemical matter is an issue on which scientists disagree.

Some researchers split the difference and call viruses the "missing link" between living and non-living matter.

Viruses reproduce. But apparently they do not carry within them the "life chemicals" which make reproduction in indisputably living things.

Borrow Substance

A survey of recent discoveries by the California scientists indicates that viruses borrow their key chemical substances from the living plant or animal cells inside which they operate.

In the absence of these mysterious agents of life, viruses cannot propagate. They do not, however, "live" in any crystalline form like any other inanimate chemical compound.

Introduce virus crystals into living cells and they begin to reproduce by division in the same way the cells do. Not until recently was it known that viruses can cause viruses to multiply.

SOUTHERN IDAHO COLLEGE OF EDUCATION, Albion, May 28—All 1948 graduates of the Southern Idaho College of Education who wish to accept teaching positions have signed contracts in Idaho for next year, according to figures released by M. J. McVicker, director of teacher placement.

U. S. Bath Habits Flayed by Expert Of Health Agency

NEW YORK, (AP)—This country may lead the world in the number of bathtubs but many Americans don't know how to take a bath properly, according to Harold J. Reilly, for 30 years head of a health service here.

"A lot of people actually do damage to themselves by lack of proper bathing knowledge," Reilly said. "They seem to think that sitting in a hot tub, using a lot of perfumed soap, shivering under a cold shower and drying by the brisk rubbing of a rough towel are essential parts of being clean and healthy. Actually, some of these things can hurt their health."

Sitting in a hot tub is all right as far as it goes, but that doesn't mean you're getting clean, he explained. The dirt that has come off

is still with you when you get out because you have been sitting in dirty water. Tub bathers should finish off with a cooling—hot cold—shower and, of course, rub themselves dry with a towel.

"Cold showers are never advisable except as a treatment by a physiotherapist for poor circulation," Reilly added. "Brisk drying overheat the body to the point where, if you go near a draft of dress immediately and go outdoors, you are likely to get some kind of muscular ache or a cold."

U. S. Adjusts Marshall Plan To Trade Ban

BY J. M. ROBERTS, Jr.
AP Foreign Affairs Analyst

The United States apparently is moving to adjust the conflict between the Marshall plan and the heavy American restrictions on trade with the Russian sphere in Europe.

At this meeting in Paris last fall the western nations accepted as fundamental that much of the recovery plan's success would depend on increased trade with eastern Europe.

But at the same time the United States was determined not to strengthen the Soviet hand, either economically or militarily.

It was understood, however, that the policy would be kept elastic pending the time when the need of economic cooperation with the west would tend to pull the eastern satellite countries from behind the iron curtain.

Reviewing Whole Field

Now it is indicated that the U. S. is reviewing the whole field of export controls. Equipment of nearly \$400,000 worth of industrial equipment to Finland has been authorized, and there are reports that this is merely the start in resumption of trade with the satellites. Poland may get the \$1,000,000 shipment of machinery in Europe which was halted when a typical communist-style election locked her fast in Moscow's grip.

The Finnish goal is obviously designed to strengthen the Helsinki government's hand against the communist camp, and to give power there. But there is a considerable school of thought which has always contended that the necessity of trade, not political penetration, would eventually tear the greatest holes in the iron curtain.

British Seek Trade

Britain, even while gradually copying the U. S. line that you can't do business with Russia, has never lost sight of this idea in its flexibility. She has continued to increase her business with Russia and the satellites and encouraged the shipment of Polish coal and other eastern products to western Europe. Britain is now reported to have an agreement whereby she acts somewhat the role of purchasing agent, putting Russian traders in touch with world supplies.

None of this means that there is any possibility of including Russia or the satellites in the European recovery program.

But the United States spheres will be allocated for the purpose of producing a return to western Europe. It will be limited to goods which it is least likely to help Russian military preparations.

The program might even develop into something of an offset, tending to bring the satellites back into Europe, far from representing a slackening of the effort, it may actually mean intensification.

Teamsters Claim 2,000 Members of Airplane Unions

SEATTLE, May 28 (AP)—The AFL teamsters union today laid claim to 2,000 of the 14,000 members of the Aero-Mechanics union (Ind) on strike for more than a month as the Boeing airplane company plant here.

In its publication, the Washington Teamster, the union said:

"The teamsters union determined to take, at the Boeing plant, the jurisdiction awarded to it by the AFL charter grants in the days when the machinists were in the A. F. of L."

The move brought sharp criticism from Harold J. Gibson, president of the Aero-Mechanics union. He said the teamsters had 12 representatives in the field to organize the Boeing workers.

Gibson declared that the teamsters can't settle a question of jurisdiction. He said the national labor relations board is the only agency to determine "who has jurisdiction."

Meanwhile, Boeing claimed more than 2,000 men were back at work in the manufacturing division. Gibson disputed the figure, declaring his latest count showed only 300 on strike had gone back to work.

The strike was called in a dispute over pay increases and seniority rights.

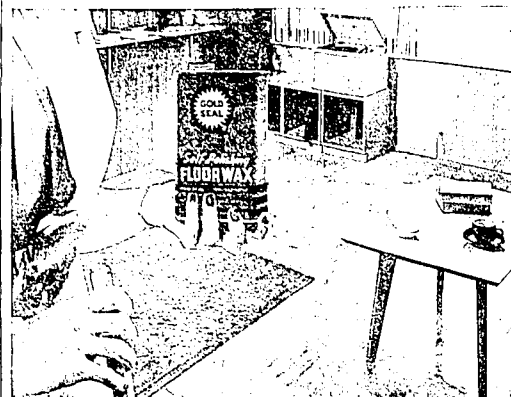

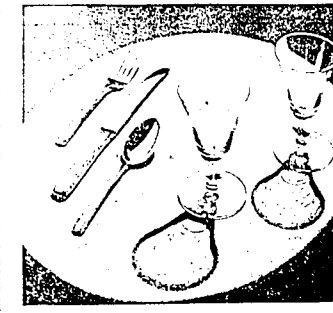
