Solon Wants "America" to Drop Music

WASHINGTON, May 29—(AP)—The "music, trash and nonsense" should be cut out of the state government's Voice of America broadcasts to foreign countries, the chairman of a House investigating committee said today.

"We can give our factual programs and news, but I very much doubt if it is the business of the United States government to provide entertainment to the people of representative countries," he said.

Clenoweth told a newsman he is "completely disgusted" with a recent series of "voice" programs, beamed to South America by the National Broadcasting company. Many legislators have called them a slander on a half dozen states and historical figures of the American past.

The Colorado legislator, whose legislative subcommittee is investigating the case, said he thinks entertainment features should be dropped from the five-million dollar program conducted by the state department.

"That should be at least the first step in cleaning up a messy activity," he said.

His said entertainment including music and so-called humorous sketches of American life and customs, now makes up about one-third of the "voice" program which was designed by the state department as a counter-barrage against Soviet propaganda.

Clenoweth said his committee will video its investigation in the next broadcasts beamed to Russia and other countries behind the iron curtain.

Mother of 13 Asks Divorce In Suit Here

Charging both mental and physical cruelty a mother of 13 children and wife for almost 30 years Friday filed suit for divorce in Twin Falls district court.

In her petition, Mrs. Emma Huff claims her husband, Fred Huff, deprives her without provocation and continually addresses her with vile and abusive language.

Since their marriage in 1918, Mrs. Huff said, she has been ill. Her husband has acquired a communal estate valued at an estimated \$12,000. But, despite this estate, she says her husband makes her do menial labor and denies her other priviledges.

The further alleges Huff has hidden \$5,000 around their ranch house and not only refuses to disclose its location to her, but also will not answer if it is safekeeping in a bank.

She is represented by Attorney Lawrence B. Quinn. Mrs. Huff asks the court for an injunction restraining her husband from disclosure of any part of her estate, \$500 for court costs and attorney fees and \$200 monthly support for her eight minor children.

Her divorce proceedings filed in district court Friday, Mrs. Margaret Harcourt charged her husband with treating her in a cruel and inhuman manner. She asks for the custody of their four minor children and other relief as the court deems just. The couple was married in 1916.

A third action was filed by Mrs. Dorothy Allison, who claims her husband, Leland Allison, repeatedly accuses her of committing adultery and abuses her and frighens their four minor children. She requests custody of their one minor child and other relief as the court deems just. The couple was married in 1927.

Both Mrs. Allison and Mrs. Harcourt are represented by Attorney Earl E. Walker.

General May Return After GOP Confab

TOKYO, May 29—(AP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur appeared ready today to plan his first trip to continental United States in 11 years, after the summer political convention.

As matters now stand he is awaiting another invitation from the senate appropriations committee to appear in Washington sometime after the national convention.

He rejected the committee's request to start home within a few days on the grounds this timing would appear to be "politically inspired."

There was a note of consistency in this position. The general has insisted his personal political ambitions were never kept separate from his position as supreme commander of Allied powers in Japan. This, of course, would virtually be impossible if he appeared around the time of the Republican convention in Philadelphia.

Available in July

But after June he said "I should feel free to place myself fully at your disposal" to clarify oriental issues which will be just as complex in July as now.

This seemed to make a second invitation inevitable. Any reluctance by the senate committee to send his guidance at a later date could be construed as a district rebuff for MacArthur and as convincing evidence the original invitation was meant primarily for political reasons.

Weed Control Chief Reports Project Work

Harry Gault, director of the Twin Falls county weed control bureau, Saturday reported progress made in weed-killing operations.

The county's four heavy duty sprayers are all in operation, with one each stationed at Bull, Pine, Twin Falls and Kimberly. These large sprayers are equipped with booms 16 to 20 feet long to cover as much area as possible on each run.

Spraying Stated
Starting Monday, the weed bureau will dispatch two crews to spray weeds along highways with sodium chlorate.

Spraying for white-top has been completed along the old Rock Creek trail from the Rock Creek station to Hoocram. Gault reminded farmers that now is the time to get white-top with the deadline coming next Tuesday. He recommends 2-4-D with a concentration of three pounds of pure acid per acre.

Urea Treatment
Gault also recommended that weeds in grain be treated now, particularly morning glory and thistle, without immediate action if the grain is ripened and a thorough watering if the grain has not been ripened.

Action in treatment of Canadian thistle in Rock Creek canyon has also been started. This year, air-borne is spreading spray instead of dust.

Pressure cookers will be tested from 1 to 5 p. m. Tuesday in the Knoll Grange hall, according to Florence Schultz, county home demonstration agent. Mrs. T. M. Knight and Mrs. C. E. Grive will be in charge.
