'You Take It' Group in House Slashes Foreign Aid Plan Funds

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—The house appropriations committee today chopped \$563,000,000 from the administration's foreign aid program.

The committee voted a total appropriation of \$5,980,710,000 for European recovery and six other foreign aid projects. It decreed that this money shall last 15 months instead of 12 months proposed by the administration.

In the budgeting process, the committee cut China aid from \$163,000,000 to \$400,000,000. This brought its total slash over the half-billion-dollar mark.

Paul G. Hoffman, economic cooperation administrator, declined at a news conference to comment directly on the money cuts in his program but said that "the less money we have, the less recovery we get."

Before okaying the bill, the committee made a last-minute decision to require ECA to buy up the commodity credit corporation's surplus pool before it buys wool from any other source.

Higher Price Chairman John Taber, R. N. Y., said the bill would require credit paid for its 240,000,000 pound surplus.

The committee wrote into the bill a prohibition against use of any of the funds to build manufacturing plants in the United States to produce supplies for Europe. It also banned the purchase of any aid commodity anywhere at a price higher than that prevailing in the U. S.

Winds Off Pacific Flick Crests Atop Weakened Levees

PORTLAND, Ore., June 3 (AP)—The Columbia river system spawned a new flood in its headwaters today. Hundreds of miles downstream, winds whipping in from the Pacific flicked the crest of the old one over the tops of weakened dikes.

Warning of the new flood crashed like a body punch into tired residents of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and British Columbia who have been battling two weeks against the river's worst rampage.

From the Canadian Rockies down the Columbin's torturous 1,000-mile course to the sea, flood-battered cities and farm communities rallied to face the second round—all except those who have not yet won the first one. From present indications, Elmer Fisher, river forecaster, said the new flood will crest somewhat higher than the one whose peak passed here Tuesday at 145 feet. It is expected here next Monday at 29.3 feet—perhaps a little more or a little less.

Across the river at Vancouver, Wash., it is expected to touch 29 feet—145 feet above the levee where the Columbia begins to spew over her banks and nearly a foot above the old crest of 145 feet. It had been uncertain just what the rising headwaters of the Snake, Yakima and Columbia rivers would do. He still pinned his statement that the new crest would be less than the old on "present indications."

The original crest was causing the trouble in the heavily barricaded area around Clatskanie on the Oregon shore and Skamokawa near the river in Washington. It was here, on the 40 miles of its run into the Pacific—that wind-whipped waters rolled over the dikes when the crest was highest.

He explained that total expenditures up to May 31, 1948, for the state were \$22,900. Monthly expenditures for Twin Falls county with eight cases hospitalized in Boise are \$4,900, the group was told.

Second Area Test on School Merger Filed

The suit names the first defendant as the state school reorganization board and the first plaintiff as Ferrell Christopherson, Bliss taxpayer.

The case is designed to test the reorganization vote in the Tuttle, Hagerman, Bliss and Clover area. Although the total number of votes for the combined area passed the plan by a majority, the vote did not pass in Bliss.

Attorneys for the plaintiffs are attempting to have the entire vote declared null and void. Question Statute Other points raised by the plaintiffs in the case include the constitutionality of the statutes governing the school reorganization vote.

The first area test case of the school reorganization plan was filed early in May in Fairview also by James, Shaw and James. The suit was filed by a group of taxpayers in Blaine county who were included in the reorganization vote for Camas county.

Idaho Mining Men Oppose CVA System

SUN VALLEY, June 3 (AP)—Opposition to the Columbia Valley authority approved by the Idaho Mining Association in the form of a resolution.

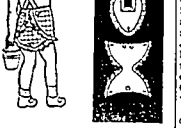

The Arabs undoubtedly due to British pressure and Britain's announcement that she will respect United Nations decisions as against her treaty commitments, have followed the fact that they are fighting a United Nations decision, as well as the Jews has had a negative influence. Now they are concrete truce demand is for a "freezing" of relative power for a transitional period.

U.S. Responsible
 U.S. pressure on Britain is believed responsible for the truce. This led to speculation Wednesday that the British might now act for a truce in respect to the pressure business, with the U.S. urging the Jews to meet this Arab demand. Such a request from Britain would be a ticklish matter in Washington.

The principal U.S. agreement on the immigration point, then, would seem to be in the Jewish military position rather than in any objective characteristics of the situation. The Jews have been conducting a cease and well executed campaign, but talk of Arab disarmament is less widespread now, and talk of growing Arab strength more prevalent. The Jews cannot be sure that their position for negotiation will remain as strong as it is now, when they occupy practically all the territory they want.

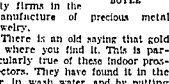

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Greenbackers Base Push on Funny Money

CHARLEVILLE, N. Y., June 3.—John C. Root, president of the Greenback party, is conducting his campaign this year on a budget limited to "peas and butter."

Running under the slogan "Stop Boom-Bust!" Root is pledged to an eight-point program, including curbing the money supply, halting inflation and paying pensions to 12,000,000 persons—all without raising taxes.

Root said he will make campaign trips only where expenses are paid by those requesting trips and talks.

Dr. Joseph "Funny Money" promises to fulfill his campaign promises by taking funny money out of circulation. In the monthly newspaper, Money, which he edits, "funny money" is simply money.

"Officials of the U. S. treasury say we have emitted and printed about \$2,000,000,000 in cash money."

"About \$11,000,000,000 is all the cash money in all this country," treasury officials say. "But we have on deposit in the banks \$15,000,000,000. How can we deposit 14 times as much money as we have in the whole country?"

The answer is easy. All except the \$2,000,000,000 in cash is made of paper. "Funny money" is manufactured in commercial banks with a touch of the Federal Reserve. It is just bank bookkeeping, figures in bank books. That's why we call it funny money."

Doesn't kid Root? "I don't," Root said. "I don't kid myself about winning the election and moving into the White House."

The place of minor parties in American political life, he said, is in the "educational and presiding standing; unless God seeks to use us to accomplish the impossible."

Root gives Henry Wallace a party an important place in today's political picture. "He will be elected president and get about 10,000,000 votes, which he will healthily protest to brass hat rule."

Root is retired school teacher who now describes himself as a "substance man." He lives on a small farm here, about 10 miles south of the state capital at Albany.

For 12 years he has been editor and publisher of a newspaper, probably his writing in Money which brought him the presidential nomination.

His one of the few generals who looks as sharp in civilian clothes as he does in his uniform. The last thing in the world you would suspect is that he is a grandfather.

But the steady classification of Vandenberg's close with his looks. One general who has been his friend for years observed: "It is easy to get acquainted with Van, but hard to get to know him well. Most people who are living close to General Bradley or 50 other general officers whom you could name."

But what has that to do with the man's class? He led the forces that beat Japan, so what does it matter if he is brusque and overbearing while doing so? After all, the men who are criticizing him are the same who are occupying their tombstones (paid for by their families) when MacArthur is a knock-kneed dandy to occupy many pages of history books years and years from now.

"I don't think Truman is the greatest man who ever lived," the man said. "But I would like to tell you this: He's the President of the United States and you're just lucky to be a double feature film. He has something you ain't got."

It seems after 11 or 12 years General MacArthur is finally coming home. It would seem to me about time. But a lot of people and a lot of newspapers have interpreted it as a play for the presidential nomination. If that's true, what's wrong? Spazens is selling his war record to the thousands of other office-seekers. I may be wrong. I don't think any one of them has a war record to match General MacArthur's. Call him a jerk, call him corny, call him anything, but always remember to add one thing—

Antarctic Ice Cap Reported As 'Thinning'

OSLO (AP)—A remarkable thinning out of the polar ice cap in the Antarctic is reported by a Norwegian expedition which found bare stretches of earth on an island thickly covered with ice only 20 years ago.

The news was brought back to Norway by an expedition which came into the area some months ago when the research vessel, the Brattgard, was intercepted by Argentine authorities near Deception Island. The ship was retained pending permission to operate in what were declared to be Argentine waters.

Report said exaggerated.

Capt. Nils Larsen of the Brattgard said on the return of his ship from the Antarctic that the Brattgard had had evidence of climatic changes in the South pole region similar to those reported from Arctic waters. The evidence was gathered in extensive surveys of the Brattgard's sea, the Amundsen sea and on Peter I Island, over which Norway has claimed sovereignty since 1920. Larsen first landed there in 1922.

Hikerson said observations on Peter I Island showed that many glaciers had been considerably receded since 1920. Many places which were covered with snow and ice at that time are now bare. He noted that the evidence of a retreating in the polar climate was confirmed by a southward movement in the border between the tundra and the polar water.

Several nations, including the United States and Great Britain, are interested in the area, which is believed to contain valuable mineral resources, possibly including uranium.
