

Area Labor Trouble Report Is Minimized by Sugar Firm Chief

Reports of labor trouble among Mexican nationals in the Jerome and Pocatello areas were minimized Friday noon by Harry S. Elock, local manager of the American National Sugar Association and chairman of the labor sponsoring board.

He described the difficulties as "a few squabbles" similar to those occurring each year at the start of the beet-planting season. He said the difficulties are being settled and forewarn to danger to the beet crop.

No labor trouble has been reported from other Magic Valley labor camps.

None of contention at the Twin Falls labor camp was the type of food served, Elock explained. Mexican nationals wanted Mexican style food while Negroes, Filipinos and California Mexicans preferred American food.

The difficulty was solved by serving two different menus, one for the American nationals and one for the others.

Between 100 and 150 workers at the Twin Falls labor camp were reported, but about half that number returned to work Friday.

Elock said the difficulties at the Mexican nationals' camp here were all workers, mechanics and carpenters. Elock said the workers had been returning on their way to a surplus of workers and that many agricultural workers were recruited from the area.

He commented that the national brought here this year are about the same as in any other years. Some proved to be excellent workers and others not so very satisfactory, he said.

Elock discounted that there were labor agitators among the Mexican nationals brought here and further discounted the possibility that the group includes agitators whom the Mexican government might desire to have leave that nation.

Contradicting Elock's statements, John Donahill, manager of the Jerome labor camp, said both side beet growers are facing the loss of their crops as a result of a critical labor situation.

"Beet choppers in that area went on strike Thursday, protesting a minimum wage scale of 42¢ per acre. This workers, after difficulties, Monday (Continued on Page 12, Column 2)

World Aid Reduction Blasted by Marshall

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—Secretary of State George C. Marshall said today that proposed congressional cuts in foreign spending would change the European recovery program into an "auree relief" project.

His statement, made at a news conference, came as house Democrats tried to restore a \$553,000,000 cut in foreign aid voted by the house in its committee.

Republican leaders doubted the money would be put back into the bill. On the other hand, they forecast no further cuts.

Other congressional developments:

Missouri Justice—Sen. James P. McPherson, D., offered an amendment to the draft bill a measure to overhaul the military justice system. Among other things, it would entitle men in court martial, permit accused men to have counsel, and give them the right to appeal. The house has approved similar measures.

Communists—The senate judiciary committee decided not to hold any more hearings on the communist-control bill. Chairman Alexander Wiley, R., Wis., refused to predict whether there would be any Senate action on the proposed measure before adjournment.

Monopoly—Sen. Joseph C. O'Mahoney, D., Utah, introduced a bill to make contracts with foreign governments, the U. S. government, O'Mahoney said, has the right to know what contracts have been made.

No guarantee—William T. Stone of the state department's international information section said "unfortunate" Voice of America broadcasts, like those which drew congressional criticism could happen again.

A company spokesman said the contract does not provide an immediate wage increase but allows the company to raise rates on either party end during the 21-month period.

Panel Urges OK For Sugar Pay

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—The senate banking committee today recommended passage of a bill authorizing a 12-cent increase in the price of Hawaiian and Puerto Rican sugar producers on their 1918 crop.

Commodity credit corporation officials said an act of congress is needed to make the payments. The officials said they are due under a contract that barred 1916 payments on 1917 production. The CCC makes the sugar price support payments.

All four producers were out of profit-making territory, they said, based upon prices paid for Cuban sugar, have been delayed.

BOISE, June 4 (AP)—Another Idaho Democrat has announced candidacy for state office—this time for governor.

Real estate dealer Frank J. Keenan, Boise, said, "I will file nominating petitions and declarations of candidacy for the office of governor on the Democratic ticket."

"My petitions are being circulated in various parts of the state and will be filed by the vote on the first day provided by law—June 10."

Test Planned

He said he would contest the constitutionality of a state amendment passed by the voters in 1914. The amendment changed the terms of state officers from two years to four.

Keenan was a former and stockman in Twin Falls county from 1915 to 1920 when he moved to Boise.

"It is my belief that the so-called four-year-term amendment is not valid. Should my petitions and declaration of candidacy be denied for filing by the secretary of state, it is my intention to seek recourse in the courts," he said.

May Refuse

Secretary of State J. D. (Cy) Bair had indicated previously his intention to accept any declarations of candidacy for the office of governor on the grounds that there was no general election.

Keenan, Poetelle, former state treasurer, said she will file declaration of candidacy for the office of governor. He also said he would seek a court test if his petitions were denied by Price.

Goldsborough Orders Lewis to Start Talks

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—Federal Judge T. Alan Goldsborough today ordered John L. Lewis to bargain immediately with the Southern Soft Coal Producers association.

Soft coal operators expected that the judge's action would break the two weeks deadlock in soft coal negotiations and lead to a resumption of talks with Lewis next week on a new contract to replace the one which expires June 30.

In his informal opinion, Goldsborough dismissed all of the union's reasons for not dealing with Southern Coal Producers association and its president, Joseph Moody, an agent of significantly sufficient.

Neither, he said, is there sufficient reason to delay granting the injunction until after the national labor relations board hearing next Tuesday on charges that Lewis had violated unfair labor laws.

"Mr. Lewis' attitude is a tactical attitude, he wants to destroy the Southern Coal Producers association," Goldsborough said.

The United Mine Workers chief maintained that he would bargain with a separate southern coal group who offered the present contract but not the association since it was not a signatory.

"This is a situation," Goldsborough said, "that affects our entire social fabric. Anyone who has any idea of the condition industry was in before it was rescued would agree that labor not only has a right but should consolidate its strength to carry out its interest."

"But when the time comes when labor or any organization undertakes to carry out its interest to the point that it will disintegrate society then at that point it must relinquish its present advance interests to that point."

Truman Will Open 'West' Tour Tonight

ABOARD TRUMAN TRAIN ENROUTE TO CHICAGO, June 4 (AP)—An outwardly confident President Truman rode westward today for a 14-day tour of the West.

He will be in Portland, Ore., at 10:30 a. m. Tuesday, speaking for 10 minutes in the afternoon.

He told correspondents as he boarded the 16-car special train at Washington that he "felt better, I couldn't stand it."

"Mr. Truman had no parting message to his friends here," said a spokesman.

"You will get plenty of messages as we go along," he said.

Brief Stop

The train stopped briefly at Pittsburgh for an operational stop. Mr. Truman came to the rear observation platform to greet Mayor David L. Lawrence, national Democratic committee chairman, and other officials.

The President did not address the crowd.

The White House issued the following statement: "The president has questioned its possible effect on the political future of the gray-haired statesman."

Speaks in Chicago

His first major prepared address will be in Chicago on Tuesday. He shared interest with his prospective meeting there with Jacob M. Arvey, chairman of the U. S. House of Representatives Democratic central committee, and his ex-llier platform appearances at Fort Wayne and Gary, Ind.

Arvey, who has advocated Mr. Truman's election, said he would join the chief executive at dinner in the Palmer house. So will former Mayor Edward J. Kelly of Fort Wayne and Mayor Martin Keenan of Chicago.

The off-the-cuff platform talks, at Fort Wayne and at Gary were the first since the president held court on the voters on his pre-convention tour which will carry him to Los Angeles June 14.

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—The senate today passed a bill to raise old age pensions by \$5 a month but refused to lower the age at which the payments will start.

By a 77 to 20 roll call vote, the senate adopted an amendment by which the payments will start at 65 months. This would provide for a \$5 monthly increase in federal contributions for the aged and for blind and 43 a month for dependent children.

By a standing vote, the senate then passed a proposal by Senator Revercomb, R., W. Va., to lower from 65 to 60 the age at which old age benefits would start.

Idaho Guardsmen Arrive for Camp

PORT LEWIS, Wash., June 4 (AP)—An advance contingent of 10 Idaho national guardsmen arrived here today to begin training at Camp Lewis.

The main body of approximately 1,000 men is due here Sunday but will be held at their homes until reduced because of flood conditions in Idaho.

New Record Flood Crest Swollen Columbia

PORTLAND, Ore., June 4 (AP)—A new record crest rolled down the Columbia river today and a soaring damage toll was feared. Elmer Fisher, veteran river forecaster, said Vancouver, Wash., would have 30.8 feet and Portland 30.5 feet by Tuesday—both readings half a foot above the level reached last Tuesday in the initial crest of the disastrous flood.

He would not say next Tuesday's level would be the crest.

With dikes already weakened by the terrific pounding of two weeks' floodwaters, no one could say what the new wave would bring.

Fisher said earlier when the headwaters of the Columbia and its tributaries began rising that if the earlier top were exceeded—"Vancouver and Portland look out!"

The floodwaters without the earlier attack but 40 blocks of the industrial waterfront area were under water.

Then the new level will flow out over more plants and streets.

Many down-river dikes were barely above water on the last crest.

Today's upward trend and the forecast came as thousands of men were strained to exhaustion in fighting the waters on a 100-mile flung front from Idaho's Montana border where one man died, and into British Columbia.

Two More Weeks

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Snake River Starting New Flood Rampage

IDAHO FALLS, June 4 (AP)—Snake river continued to rise today, and army engineers feared "extensive" flooding of farm land in the Monan area of Jefferson county. The Monan area, where more than 1,200 acres already are under water, said the Jackson reservoir would be full by Saturday and that 9,000 second feet of water would be released then.

Only 3,000 second feet has been let out of the reservoir during the past few days.

The Monan area is undiked and heavy rain has spilled over the banks.

Upstream, high water was beginning to damage levees in the Hebert area. Water was cutting behind rock riprap, but construction crews were throwing in new rock to hold the dikes.

River Washes Out Bridge in Blaine County

STAGE OF SNAKE RIVER

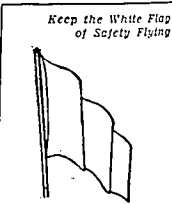
The level of Snake river was high Friday, shown by the Grand Shoshone falls (1022) second feet of water going over the falls.

"Summer has taken over. Winter has left. Spring was lost somewhere in the shuffle."

He pointed definitely unambiguously for the more stuffy politicians, he got Tiny Horn, extension horticulturist, to take us on a tour of the in-linar-covered grounds.

Horn, who seems to know lots about this horticultural stuff, got very enthusiastic about the activity and health of earth plants and trees. He pointed out that the landscaping of the grounds was such that something was in bloom practically all the time from early spring to late autumn.

Names shrubs
He pointed to flowering English hawthorn, spirea, duzela, cotton-aster, snowberry, dogwood, hydrangea, syringa, cordonia, forsythia, weigela and three dozen other shrubs and trees too difficult to remember.

Horn said the "latest blooms to beautify the statehouse grounds were those of the Australian copper rose."

Idaho's three presidential trees, planted by President Harrison, T. R. Roosevelt and Taft are doing fine. Harrison planted a water oak in 1831. Teddy dug a hole for a sugar maple in 1903 and Taft came out here with an Ohio buckeye in 1911.

Love in Bloom
Blair lagged along. And as we passed the benches on the statehouse west lawn he quipped: "And here we have budding youth . . . or is it love in bloom?"

Apparently the last throes of spring fever had gotten him too. But Jean Filer, secretary to the attorney general, was perfectly immune to it.

"I just don't look out the window," she said.

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Manufacture Of Phosphate Is Explained

Manufacture of industrial phosphate in Idaho which bids fair to become one of the most important in the state of Idaho was outlined in a Twin Falls Thursday night as W. T. Nichols, executive assistant to the president of Westvaco Chemical Corporation, spoke to members of the Kiwanis club in regular session.

Nichols was introduced by Fred Ingraham, program chairman for the day, pointed out that after the war the United States selected Idaho for erection of an initial electric furnace was made.

Stars This Month

The new plant will be built at Pocatello and construction is slated to start this month. It will be the first of several planned in the industrial manufacture of the product which will cost in the neighborhood of \$4,000,000.

Size of the one furnace, Nichols said, can be approximated by the fact that it will use about one-half as much electricity as is needed for all requirements in domestic power.

Nichols named the late C. J. Striker of the Idaho Power company, and J. H. Simpson, president of the company, of the Simplot company, as the two men whose initial groundwork laid in the new industry began started in Idaho.

Praises Power Firm

The speaker also praised the Idaho power company for "believing in the future of Idaho in making possible the great amount of power which will be needed in the plant operation."

The new plant, he said, will be primarily interested in manufacture of industrial and food grade phosphates as against the Simplot company manufacturing fertilizer. This two concerns will work together in the south Idaho district both utilizing the beds near Pocatello wherein is located from 65 to 70 per cent of phosphate rock found in the United States.

Corers Visit Area
The rugged country includes parts of the Salmon, Challis, Payette and Boise national forests. It takes in virtually all of the middle fork of the Salmon.
