

Red Cross Report Shows 52 Missing In Vanport Area

PORTLAND, Ore., June 5.—Red Cross tonight listed 52 persons—15 of them children—missing from the Vanport disaster area of the flood-stricken Columbia river valley.

The new total is the largest announced since Columbia backwaters burst a dike and shattered the war-built city of 18,700 last Sunday afternoon.

The swollen river still is pounding lower valley dikes near the sea and a new crest is sweeping toward this metropolitan sector again tonight from the upper valley.

Auto Strikes, Kills Boy, 7, Near Rupert

The dead boy is Clifford Lee Schenk, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Schenk, Paul. He was struck by a car driven by A. N. Snyder, Rupert, according to the Minidoka county sheriff's office.

Gathering Apparatus
Inventor of a new type of the boy started out from behind the parked automobile driven by his mother, who was gathering up the crowd as the roadside with the child's grandmother and some friends.

Police services will be held at 2 p.m. Monday in the Rupert Lutheran church with the Rev. J. W. Green officiating. Burial will be made in the Paul cemetery under the direction of the Goodman mortuary.

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Burley Group Sets Plans for Summer Work

BURLEY, June 5—Summer recreation plans and means of financing were discussed at a meeting of the Burley youth welfare council Thursday.

Chairman Rulon Budge reported on work completed at the new recreation park west of the city, where the baseball field has been seeded down. The field will be ready for use June 27 for the Burley-Shoshone baseball.

Improvement program on the baseball field will take several years, Truman Bradley, secretary, told the council, and plans call for a fence, which will be constructed by the baseball association at no cost to the youth council.

Calls for Bleachers

Plans also call for the construction of bleachers to be built in the near future. At one corner of the five-acre baseball field there will be junior bleachers, and at the two softball diamonds in the two other corners. Plans also call for a new baseball diamond with a surrounding 10 acres to be used for a general play area.

The finance committee, headed by J. P. Parson, reported the city plans to make a one mill tax levy which would raise about \$2,500 for the recreation program. One of the main objectives of the recreation committee, headed by Don Shabo, is the employment of a recreational director, with a boy's supervisor and a girl's supervisor.

Pre-School Clinic

The health committee reported that a pre-school clinic will be held on June 14 for all children entering school in fall. Physical check-ups and inoculations will be given. Burley physicians and nurses are in charge of the examination. The PTAs group with the clinic this year.

Supt. S. Robert Bjorkman urged the council to adopt a statement of policy so activities of the various civic groups do not overlap. The council commended the Kiwanis club on the project. It undertakes in repairing the tennis courts on the west side of the city. The Rotary club is also working at the swimming beach early this summer.

Favor Swimming

The council discussed the possibility of having one main pool for the entire community. The council favored the building of a swimming pool. Chairman Budge submitted a drawing, made by Carl Pace, showing a modern swimming pool in the recreation area.

The main pool in the plan is 28 feet by 60 feet with a 10-foot bowl-diving area, about 50 feet long and a diameter of the semi-circle of 15 feet. Complete drawings of the recreation area, also made by Pace, were viewed by the council in connection with a long-range program of development.

The board of directors will meet in the near future with the finance committee to discuss the distribution of any funds available for the summer program.

Prices Hiked \$85 or More On '49 Fords

DETROIT, June 5 (AP)—Henry Ford II boosted prices on his 1949 model Fords nearly nine per cent today, possibly paving the auto industry on another upward spiral.

He said the new cars would cost from \$85 to \$125 more than present models. He did not list prices per model.

The new models are due on public display June 18.

Ford's announcement was not unexpected. The auto industry had freely predicted for some time that the new Fords would cost the public more.

The current model cost from \$1,154 to \$1,972 delivered, plus state sales, taxes and transportation charges.

General Motors corporation has said it will try to hold the price line on its current models despite the recent 11-cent an hour sliding wage settlement with its 225,000 CIO United auto workers.

Chrysler corporation, which gave its 250,000 employees a 12-cent an hour wage boost, has not said what effect, if any, this might have on its prices.

However, neither GM nor Chrysler, chief rivals of Ford in the lower-priced field, has brought out any drastically new model lower priced cars since the war. They plan to do so, probably before the end of the year.

When they do, sources in the industry predicted, they will follow Ford's lead in hiking prices.

It cost Ford \$90,000,000 in new tools to build the 1949 model, the company president said.

Million Dollar Fire Destroys 12 Businesses

DULUTH, Minn., June 5 (AP)—A dozen business establishments, including a four-story furniture store, were burned out today in a fire that spread rapidly through sections of two main Duluth business blocks. Damage was estimated at nearly a million dollars.

The fire apparently started in the basement of the Rudolph Furniture store. In a matter of minutes the whole four-story building was ablaze.

Spread Rapidly

Flames spread to adjacent structures, and buildings across the street, including the nine-story Duluth board of trade, were damaged. Sparks kindled many other small fires in a nine-block surrounding area. Nine occupants of apartments over some of the destroyed structures escaped without injury.

Three men engaged in fire fighting or rescue work were injured by falling glass or bricks. None was hurt seriously.

Estimates \$1,100,000

Estimates of the damage ran from \$700,000 by Fire Chief C. D. Goldsmith to "around a million dollars" by other fire department officials and insurance men.

Among businesses burned out were a bookling, electric company, cigar store, diamond shop, tailoring establishment, photo studio, hardware store, and a liquor store.

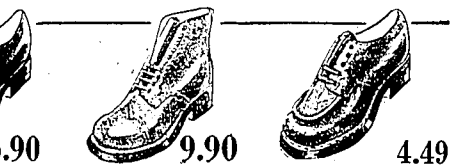

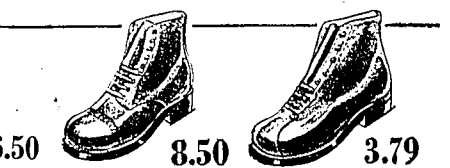

newspaper did not give me the headlines nor did they interpret the senator's remarks on possible candidates of the Democratic party and the Republican party to be of more than minor interest or importance.

"As I have said in the past, the papers I gathered that the senator, in response to a direct question as to who could be considered liberal candidates for the Democratic nomination for U. S. senator from Idaho, indicated that with the exception of Charles Gortner he felt that practically every person as far as liberal could meet the definition of liberal—amongst such possible candidates he merely mentioned the names of Supreme Court Justices Holden, George Donner, Mr. Logan, neche and myself.

"None who did the Times-Newspaper article that I believe to be a distinguished group of gentlemen as Supreme Court Justices Edward M. Holden, George Donner and Mr. Logan? As far as I know, no other newspaper in the entire state gave more than a passing factual statement concerning Senator Taylor's official mention of these men.

"I give the general public more credit than to be taken in by such a newspaper. However, I believe those who might be misled by such a story, unfair and untruthful representation allow me to make my position clear.

"In my political thinking I am an American first, a Democrat second and an individual last. Next I believe in the two party system and am a loyal member of one of those parties. I believe that the future of America can best be served and guided by the liberal policies of the Democratic party leadership.

"Furthermore, the Democratic party in the state of Idaho has indicated on two separate occasions that they believe my ideas and beliefs are representative of the Democratic party. The first occasion was in 1946 when the party gave the nomination for lieutenant governor. The second occasion was recently at the time when I was chosen as an alternate delegate-at-large to the Democratic state convention, which I shall attend as a voting delegate.

Armed with automatic weapons, machine guns and tear gas, police and bayonets, the troops struck quickly and three corpses and 40 major injuries in Shanghai. This pointed up more of the students on the campus.

The spokesman stressed once more the delicate nature of the cease-fire negotiations and indicated that the immigration ban might wreck the entire project.

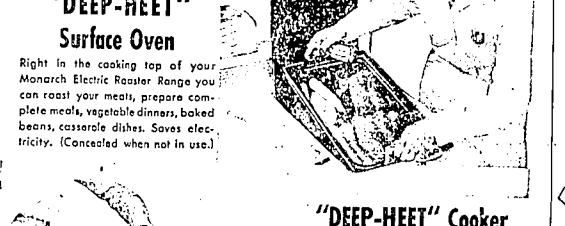
Count Polke Bernadotte, United Nations mediator, said the immigration question alone was obstructing agreement on a truce date.

Project openings for veterans during the year beginning July 1, with the number of acres and farm units on each project, are scheduled as follows: Klamath, Tule Lake division, Calif.-Ore., September, 1948, 7,278 acres, 30 units; Yakima, 1948, 706 acres, 16 units; Gila, Yuma, Mesa division, Ariz., February, 1949, 7,500 acres, 30 units; Idaho, Payette division, April, 1949, 4,000 acres, 40 units; Mindanao, Gooding division, May, 1949, 270 acres, 16 units; Shoshone, Heart Mountain division, Wyo., June, 1949, 1,000 acres, 17 units; and Haverhill, Wyo., June, 1949, 10,375 acres, 210 units.

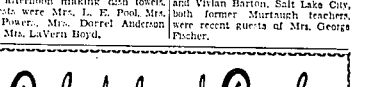

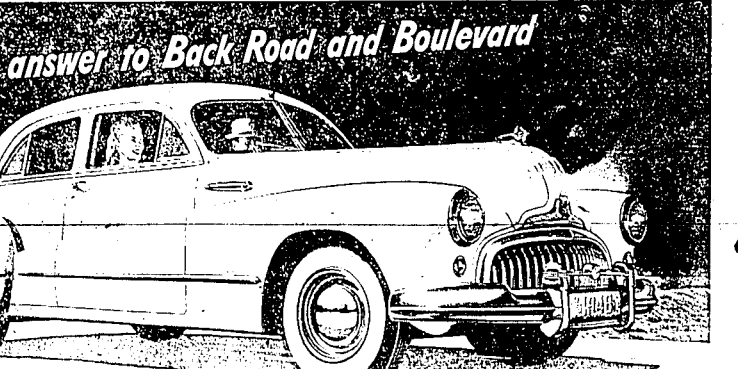

2 "Mothers" Claim Rights To Tiny Girl

SAN FRANCISCO, June 5 (AP)—A chubby, 13-month-old girl was claimed by two "mothers" today.

Mrs. Opal Storer entered her case in a juvenile court hearing yesterday, saying she gave birth to the child, Patricia Storer, at her home May 21, 1947.

But Mrs. Marilyn Lewis, 52, Torrance, asserted the child was delivered to her at the Storer residence on the same day Mrs. Storer was hospitalized, and her real name is Marilyn Marie Lewis.

The detective in the case backed Mrs. Storer, adding he had "never heard of Mrs. Lewis."

Bought Care

Mrs. Storer explained that when her husband lost his job last July she sought someone to care for Patricia and her other daughter, Sandra, a because she was working. Mrs. Lewis volunteered and later took the children to her home in Torrance, she said.

When the Storers asked for the children in February, Mrs. Storer told juvenile authorities, Mrs. Lewis returned only Sandra, claiming Patricia as her own.

Illness Hospitals

An attorney for Mrs. Lewis said "Mrs. Lewis says she has a horror of hospitals. That is why, she says, she had the baby at the Storer home."

Superior Judge J. L. Harris has set June 16 for determination of the case. Until then juvenile authorities are caring for both children.

Lincoln School Children Add Their Bit To Flood of U. S. Goodwill to Austria

The boxes of food and clothing were on their way to Salzburg, Austria, last week from children of the Lincoln school, giving one more little bit of the American spirit to the goodwill which our country is attempting in Europe.

The huge federal aid program, which has been recognized as a necessity as the communist threat has increased, does not overshadow the significance of the generous efforts of these local children. Their contribution reflects a true friendship which may in the long run determine the actual success of the European aid program.

The latest Lincoln school project began in April when the children read enthusiastic thank-you notes from the third grade in a Salzburg school, who had just received seed packages and letters from the Lincoln youngsters.

Written in a native German script, the letters from Austria were ornamented with drawings of mountains, flowers, rural scenes, and the castle which centers the town. Some of the letters were written in English, and a translation accompanied each of the others.

Descriptions of the mountains, their scenery, their families, and the music festival held each year in Salzburg, bishoprics of Mozart, were given by the children. They told of their favorite school studies, and the fairy tales they like best. Almost without exception they expressed an interest in the United States and a desire to make friends with American children.

Impressed with the gratitude of the Austrian boys and girls, the Lincoln school immediately began to collect the articles of food and clothing, including 22 pairs of shoes, which were mailed Tuesday by a representative of the Junior Red Cross.

Realization of the two service projects came from Mrs. John Rasmussen, a former Twin Falls woman, whose husband is a lieutenant colonel in the occupation forces. Because of her interest in the welfare of Europe's destitute, Mrs. Rasmussen was named chairman of school aid in a special committee under distribution started by members of the American Goodwill to Austria organization.

She has energetically promoted her department and much aid has been given to the children of Salzburg from the U. S. warehouse in Austria, from Americans now living in Europe and from her friends in this country.

Since Mrs. Rasmussen's sons attended Lincoln school in Twin Falls, she joyfully turned to that school to help with her project. Money for the three bundles of seeds was raised by the children in a paper drive during the winter. The clothing and food collections were gathered since April by the Junior Red Cross. Paper drive receipts financed the mailing of the packages and in addition provided \$60 to be sent to the national children's fund of the Red Cross.

In a letter to her friends in Twin Falls Mrs. Rasmussen told of some evidence of the growth of friendship between the United States and the Austrian community.

In March the entire faculty and a group of children from the Salzburg school were taken on a tour of the American school, where Mrs. Rasmussen's 8-year-old daughter attends. Mrs. Rasmussen and the Lincoln instructors were impressed with the emphasis placed on the study of other countries, by the easy relationship between children

She mentions Blue Bird girl exchange letters, Camp Fire "party boxes" and other examples of American goodwill, which she describes as "little cables of friendship and understanding indicating the great international bridge of the future that these children may see to completion."

The first time we heard a great symphony. . . . Hearing! While we have it, unimpeded by time or injury, we should appreciate it to the full.

DiPont hangs out at the Flier service station of Paul Turpin. He's a colorful canine citizen of Magic Valley and looks like an overblown fox terrier.

"He's just a Duke's Mixture," said Miss Mrs. Turpin, when we asked about DiPont's ancestry. The pooh has a tan complexion and carries his tail at such a rocky angle that it makes you laugh.

At his master's command—and if he's in the mood—"Patsy" will rise on his hind legs and walk gravely to and fro on the service station platform. He will also pose on his hind legs up in the window and never blink an eye until his master says the word.

Another delightful dog-citizen of our area is Lucile, the Brittany spaniel of A. D. McMahon of Jerome. The day we met Lucile she was demure but polite.

"I'm a lot more interested in that man McMahon than I am in you," she seemed to say. "What I want to know is, where is he going? Not hunting without me I hope!" Lucile was a beautiful brindie color, and her breed is rare around these parts.

Two other canines we met recently were way in there in the orchard area, and the kind of little people who belong with satin, sapphires and luxury. They were the Demos belonging to the Lawson Lockharts. Both were imported from England, excited, energetic, sly, sly, gorgeous, little friskies you never saw.

The Lockharts' also have several lively Pekes, and when these little fellows get together there is something in the backyard.

Nothing was left but the trunk, and that junk of root all covered with dirt. Figured I'd haul it off. Well, next morning I got up and what do you think? There was that old poplar standing straight as a soldier sort of razzily with all the limbs gone, but the roots and the dirt had pulled it right up again!"

Hope of Truce Success Dims, Analyst Finds

Hope of a workable truce in Palestine seems to be fading, and the possibility that it would produce a settlement even if effected seems even more remote.

Word that Count Bernadotte, United Nations mediator, is finding it necessary to reconcile Jewish and Arab reservations before a cease fire hour can even be set indicates strongly that the parties are maneuvering more for political position in the U. S. than for peace.

The Jews, of course, would be glad to stop shooting if the Arabs would require the state of Israel. To the Arabs that would spell complete defeat.

Both sides seem to have accepted the idea of a truce, but with reservations under which they could accuse each other of violations within an hour after it started.

The root of things, or Bernadotte's inability to produce any cease fire agreement at all, would throw the whole thing back in the lap of the recently council.

There, under the resolution calling for the four-week truce, the question of sanctions would arise immediately. The United States and Russia would probably demand that the Arabs be named aggressors, and call for all members to break diplomatic relations. The Arabs will fight this with the claim that they were ready to obey the truce order if the Jews would stop immigration of men of fighting age and return the political position to the point where it was before the Jewish state was proclaimed.

In seeking to reach an agreement which will stop the shooting, all parties will be seeking to avoid the appearance of actually imposing a final settlement on the Palestine question. But the actual effect of sanctions would be to enforce participation, which was once ordered by the United Nations, then dropped and finally effected by the force of Jewish arms.

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Truce Would Fortify U. N., Analyst Says

Agreement for a four week armistice in the Arab-Jewish war will, if made to stick, be a matter of genuine gratification from several viewpoints:

1. For at least the period the other world war was grinding out of the smaller conflict will be greatly relieved.

2. Even a brief cessation in the bloodshed, and a temporary destruction of relics which are sacred to three great religions, will be a godsend.

3. It will have secured the neutrality and, equally important, the dignity of a bitterly divided and weak United Nations.

4. Within that month some sort of bargain perhaps might be made between the Jews and the Arabs.

Of course, the Arab insist that they won't recognize the new Jewish state of Israel and that it must be abolished. However, the creation of Israel is a fait accompli, a fact which is confirmed through its recognition by 16 nations, including the United States and Britain.

There is no way in which the establishment of Israel could be undone, except by force of arms, and that would mean war to a finish, since the Jews have sworn to defend their state to the end.

Now no one questions the bravery of the Arabs or their willingness to fight. They have been famous warriors throughout the centuries. Still one does question the wisdom of trying to settle by the sword an argument whose end cannot be foreseen but might be a global conflagration which would wreck the hopes of both Arabs and Jews. Another world war might change the entire complexion of the middle east to the disadvantages of Arabs and Jews.

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Car Shortage To Continue 3 to 5 Years

DETROIT, June 5 (AP)—The men who should know think the present scarcity of new automobiles will continue for another three to five years.

Sales manager of the heavy-vehicle producers base this opinion on several factors, including:

The growing list of unfilled orders; steadily increasing use of automobiles and production prospects.

Without exception orders are piling up faster than assembly lines can turn out the cars. Many car makers report orders since last Jan. 1 alone call for more vehicles than

they are likely to build this year. That means next Jan. 1 will show no reduction in the overall backlog of orders.

Total registration of passenger cars already is well above the pre-war high mark. Authoritative estimates place the present figure at about 31,000,000 compared with the 1941 record mark of 29,500,000.

Most traffic sources agree that by 1953 there will be more than 33,000,000 passenger cars on the nation's highways — if the highway system is developed to accommodate them.

There appears to be a growing conviction that despite a greatly expanded capacity the industry is not likely to make 3,000,000 passenger cars in any of the next five calendar years.
