## DP' Plan Is Okayed By House

WASHINGTON, June 11 (AP)—The house today passed a bill to authorize entry into the United States of 202,000 displaced persons during the next two years. The vote was 187 for and 91 against.

The number would include 200,000 from the international refugee commission to receive persons coming in from Italy, Germany and Austria, and 2,000 Czechs who fled their country following the recent communist coup.

A somewhat similar measure already has passed the senate and both bills now go to a conference committee for ironing out conflicting provisions.

The house defeated repeated attempts to amend the bill in order to extend immigration privileges to other European refugee groups, not in the displaced persons camps.

Under the house-approved measure, immigration would be limited to 200,000 of the 325,000 persons in the camps in proportion to race and religious groups.

The largest number would be Poles—about 62,000—and the next largest would be German and Austrian. The remainder would be divided among natives of countries behind the "iron curtain" who have refused to return to their homelands because of fear of political persecution.

Those admitted would be charged against the immigration quotas of their countries of origin. Fifty per cent of the quota for each country would be assigned to these displaced persons, along with the remaining portion for other immigration.

Sponsors told the house transportation had been guaranteed by church groups, and that various groups would be responsible for settlement of the DP's in states and territories "where are in 1946."

It would set up a special authority to coordinate their settlement in the continental United States and territories included.

## Kaiser Firm Grants Boost To Employees

DETROIT, June 11 (AP)—Kaiser-Franzer corporation and the Kaiser-United Auto Workers today announced agreement on a 13-cent raise. The contract would be met with Packard Motor Corp. company to work out final details of a new agreement.

DAW Director Alfred Ed Cole and Kaiser-Franzer officials said the agreement, which expires May 1, 1949, provides a 14 percent wage boost to the company's 1,500 salaried workers.

The K-F agreement came as representatives of 10,000 Packard employees met with company officials to discuss their benefits in a two-year contract with a 15-cent hourly pay hike, participation in the Chrysler corporation settlement.

At the same time it has offered \$75 to \$200 effective in its cars. The contract was not a mention of price increases.

The new social security fund in the K-F agreement supplies the present 1948 fund, based on 45 for each Kaiser or Franzer car turned over since last Nov. 24, will be distributed to eligible employees.

The contract provides that the company will pay the cost of the fund for each hour worked by employees covered by the agreement. The cost will be met by Kaiser-Franzer, which said that material costs had risen steadily in the past six months.

This added to the third-round increase in labor and salary rates, he said, "making it necessary to increase the selling prices of our products."

Meanwhile, General Motors and Ford announced that 203,000 workers will be laid off from one day a week because of material shortages.

## Columbia Rips Out Dike, Surges Over Airport in Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., June 11 (AP)—The Columbia river's flood waters ripped out a dike and swept over Portland's \$6,500,000 airport today. Torrential rains washed out highways in central Oregon and Washington. Two persons drowned in an Oregon stream. Wenatchee's 12,000 residents had only a single day's water pumping plant. A cloudburst flooded Yakima streets to business hours doors.

Fifty-five hundred residents of Sumas prairie in British Columbia died when a fire on Fraser river dikes weakened.

The toll of lives cut stood at 35 in the more than three-week rampage of waters mauling out of banks in the Columbia and Fraser river basins from the Rockies to the sea.

Today's break-through in a slough ended breaching off from the Columbia west surge eastward in a 10-mile lowland strip. # Muddled U. S. Trade Policy Jams Europe

By J. M. ROBERTS, JR. AP Foreign Affairs Analyst  
Just as reports on spring business begin to indicate that Europe has passed 1938 production levels in the fight for economic recovery, United States trade relations have become so muddled as to threaten a serious setback.

American aid and the promise of more have given European industry both the material and the confidence with which to go forward. Any threat to its continuance is bound to cause a period of uncertainty and waiting until the future are settled.

**Renascencing in Europe**  
This uncertainty does not center entirely around the congressional threat to reduce the appropriation for the recovery program, nerve-wracking as that may be in Europe.

U. S. reciprocal trade policy and the charter of the international trade organization, which is now pending congressional approval, are used in directly with European plans for expanding exports and balancing their international payments.

One important American administrative move which has received little attention in Europe is the matter of trade with the true continent.

**Trade Cut Off**  
Ever since the eastern European countries became definitely identified as Russian satellites, American trade with them has been drastically restricted, both for the purpose of giving priorities to our better friends and to avoid bolstering the strength of the enemy.

But the European recovery program definitely recognizes the necessity of trade between eastern and western Europe, and the policy has been going through a transition. Trade is to be resumed on the basis of supplying eastern Europe with whatever it can use to produce for the benefit of western Europe, but stopping short of providing war potential.

**Condie Retiring From State Post**  
BOISE, June 11 (AP)—Alton B. Jones, state superintendent of public instruction, has announced the resignation of John W. Condie, 63, assistant state superintendent in charge of certification.

Condie has been active for 45 years in Idaho public school education and has served as state superintendent and as state high school supervisor.

Condie was active in the program of qualification of school funds, teachers' salary increases and teacher retirement.

He was superintendent of public schools and was an instructor at Idaho state college.

SANDPOINT, June 10 (AP)—Light winds taking up big waves on Lake Pend Oreille last night were blamed for the burning of a boathouse.

# Senate Okays Bill Providing Aid for Roads

WASHINGTON, June 11 (AP)—A two-year highway bill, authorizing expenditure of \$468,500,000 a year for federal and federal aid roads, received Senate approval Thursday.

The measure was substantially changed from the form approved by the house, and must now go to a conference committee.

The house-approved bill would have allowed \$500,000,000 a year for federal aid highways alone for each year of a three-year period, beginning July 1, 1949.

Another amendment to the house bill would permit states to use federal aid funds for forest highways on the federal-aid system without being matched by the state.

# \$70,000 Damages Listed for Forest From High Water

BOISE, June 11 (AP)—Damage to trails, bridges and recreation camps in the Payette national forest as a result of high water is more than \$70,000, supervisor Tom Matthews of McCall said today.

Fourteen bridges were damaged or washed out in the area north, east and southeast of McCall and Cascade by high water in tributaries of the Salmon and Payette rivers, he said.

Heavy damage has been done to trails as a result of erosion by spring freshets.

Forest service telephone crews are now mending isolated areas of the Payette forest this week to establish communications ahead of the fire season.

value, the proposed dam would house 10 generators with a capacity of 850,000 kilowatts and have provision for four more power units. Its reservoir would hold back 2,200,000 acre feet of water.

The report said the plan is submitted for consideration of congress "in view of the continuous and growing shortage of power in the Pacific northwest."

Provision would be made for fish of salmon variety that go up the river to spawn and for a fish hatchery. Access roads would be constructed and recreational possibilities of the project would be explored.

In Portland, Col. Theron D. Weaver, north Pacific division engineer, said the dam, on the Oregon-Idaho border about 111 miles south of Lewiston, would materially reduce downstream floods in the highly industrialized Columbia river area.

He said the project was not a "quickly" devised as a result of the current flood, but has been under survey and discussion for several years. Two public hearings on it were held last year. He said the cost estimate was based on 1947 prices.

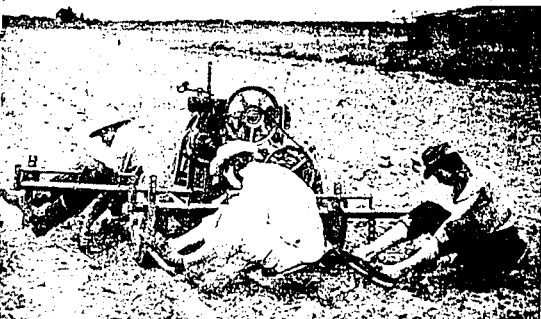

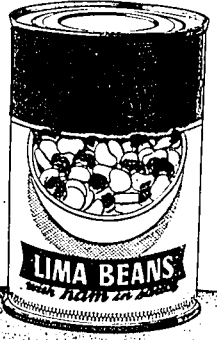

### Agreement on Dumping Four Acts Reported

WASHINGTON, June 11 (AP)—Senate Republican leaders were reported to have agreed secretly today that if Congress quits for the year on June 19 it will have to dump several four major house proved bills, including the anti-poll tax measure.

This word was given to a reporter by persons who attended Thursday's conference of Republican members of the senate.

Other legislation which some of the leaders said has been marked for death if adjournment comes before the GOP national convention includes the Mundt-Nixon anti-communist bill, the oleo tax repeal and the tideland oil measure giving states title to off-shore oil lands.

Leaders said they also will have to abandon a proposal for a constitutional amendment giving equal rights for women, because neither house has acted on yet.

This outline was reported disseminated at the closed-door Republican conference, attended by 42 of the senate's 61 GOP senators.

In the face of reported majority sentiment to end congress' work before the political conventions, leaders listed seven measures—plus the regular appropriation bills—for action before June 19.

On this list were the draft bill on which the senate voted Thursday, the Vandenberg resolution passing the long-range farm program, a power-plant pay rate bill, a highway program measure (also passed by the senate Thursday) and a proposal to extend the terms of atomic energy commissioners until 1950.

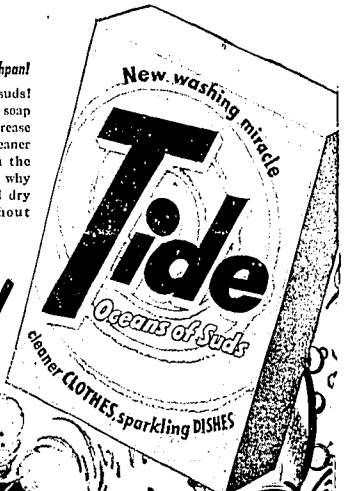
