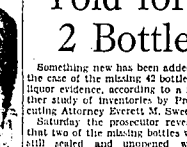

History Fails To Give Hint For Nominee

If you'd like to know in advance who is going to be nominated for President at the Republican national convention opening in Philadelphia June 21, you won't find much help in the history books. History lesson: Anything can happen.

Sometimes candidates walked into the convention hall as odd-ball favorites for the nomination and went away defeated as the laurels went to a dark horse.

The charts at right show how the voting went in five closely contested national conventions.

One of the big upsets of convention history took place in 1920 when Gen. Leonard Wood and Gov. Frank O. Lowden of Illinois battled to a stalemate for eight ballots. Then—the story has it—Republican leaders got together in a "smoke-filled room" and decided on Sen. Warren G. Harding of Ohio. Dark-horse Harding rolled on to the nomination in the 10th ballot.

William G. McAdoo of California seemed to have the edge at the opening of the Democratic convention that year, but the big prize also went to one delegated to a lesser place in pre-convention forecasts. He was Gov. James E. Cox of Ohio.

One of the hottest conventions in history—literally and figuratively—took place in the sweltering Madison Square garden of New York in 1924. Again McAdoo went in as a favorite, with Gov. Alfred E. Smith of New York running a strong second. For 70 ballots the Democrats covered out the stalemate. Then McAdoo support began to crack.

John W. Davis, a corporation lawyer and ex-ambassador to Britain, had won only a few votes on the first ballot, but as other prospects were tested and failed to win support, he began to move up. On the 10th ballot his name was established as the worn-down delegate's choice.

In 1932, Smith—who had been unsuccessful Democratic nominee four years before—went into the convention a poor second to Gov. Franklin D. Roosevelt. After the third ballot, Rep. John N. Garner of Texas threw his support to Roosevelt. The result was a Roosevelt-Garner national ticket. Wendell L. Wilkie put on a spectacular drive in 1940 to capture the GOP nomination on the sixth ballot. But first he had to swing over substantial blocks of early voters for Thomas E. Dewey and Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio.

At the start of the convention, Wilkie had had little support from the professional politicians. His victory proved a lot of unexpected things can happen when national delegates get together.

WASHINGTON, June 12 (AP)—A house committee was told today that if national park concessionaires sign proposed new contracts with the interior department they will lose possession of their properties.

H. H. Hoos, attorney for the western concessionaires, testified before the house public lands subcommittee that this situation results from an opinion by the department's solicitor.

Assistant Secretary Davidson commented, however: "I want to make it abundantly clear that the concessionaires' investments will be protected."

Erroneous Statements
Testifying after Hoos had said he believed the department was negotiating new "contracts" with concessionaires, who were taking over a loss, and preparing to operate profitable operations, Davidson declared "many misleading and erroneous statements" have been made as to the department's intention.

The proposed new contract, he said, is an effort to adequately protect the public interest.

Extension Recommended
Hoos recommended that all concession contracts be extended until the end of the 1952 season in order to take "the queezy" off the present operators and give them a fair chance to negotiate.

War Hero of U. S. Dies at Israeli Post

NEW YORK, June 12 (AP)—Col. David Marcus, an American hero of World War II and supreme commander of Israel's military forces on the Jerusalem front, has been killed in the holy land fighting.

The 47-year-old, West Point-trained officer was killed Thursday night—a few hours before the Palestine cease-fire order became effective.

A former New York City official, he was twice decorated by the United States government during the war.

Wide, Varied Service
He saw service in nearly every theater of operations, helped draft the surrender terms for Italy and Germany, and was a legal aide to the U. S. delegations at Dumbarton Oaks, Yalta, Tehran and Potsdam.

News of his death came from David Ben Gurion, Israel's prime minister, and was announced yesterday by New York representatives of the provisional Jewish government.

It was the first death officially recorded by the Israeli government of a former high-ranking U. S. army officer although several former American soldiers have died in Palestine while serving with Zionist forces.

Killed at His Post
Ben Gurion's message said that Marcus was killed at his post "in the hills of Jerusalem" while he was "trying to open the road to get food through to the people of Jerusalem."

A colonel in the U. S. army in World War II, Marcus was the distinguished service medal and the bronze star.

Analyst Sees Little Hope of U. N. 'Force'

By J. M. ROBERTS, Jr. AP Foreign Affairs Analyst
TRYVE LIE's suggestion that the United Nations should be provided with a small guard force for use in such situations as now exists in Palestine has little chance of adoption.

It will run smack into the western conviction, based on experience whenever military cooperation has been tried since the war, that any such move which involves Russian participation is the height of futility even if it does not actually involve subversion.

Almost simultaneously with the U. N. secretary-general's proposal, the security council was coldly considering Russia's desire to contribute to the international group of military observers in Palestine.

Russia would certainly volunteer for participating in Lie's proposed force, and then the question would be posed with far greater impact than attaches to the Palestine matter.

Having made the mistake of letting the Russians into Berlin, Prague and other European areas which could have been occupied by the western allies, the United States and Britain cannot be expected to keep on compounding the error.

The big trouble, aside from the fact that Russia uses her participation in every international project solely for purposes of obstructing, is that a police force must have laws to enforce, and there are none.

The United Nations was created to keep the peace, not make it. Making it is the job of the big five. They must do it and can't do it in the face of Russia's campaign to subject the world to communist imperialism.

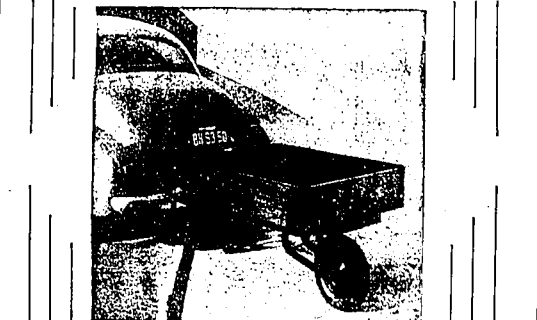

White Seeks Eighth Term In U. S. Post

LEWISTON, June 12 (AP)—Clayton I. White, 70-year-old Clark Fork mine owner, is seeking his eighth term as Idaho's first district congressman.

White announced his candidacy for the democratic nomination yesterday. He is the first Democrat to announce for the first district congressional seat. Rep. Abe Coffey, R-Ida., has obtained nominating positions and is seeking reelection.

White was first elected to congress in 1932 and served seven terms before being defeated in the general election in 1940 by Goff. The margin was 817 votes, the closest election in the state.

White said he was running at the "earnest solicitation" of his friends who desire an experienced and dependable representation at the national capital.

White said if elected he would advocate the development and utilization of Idaho's vast resources in land, water, timber and minerals. He added such resources are now largely under control of the federal government.

Since his defeat two years ago, White has engaged principally in the development of his lead-silver mine at Clark Fork.

White was first elected to congress in 1932 when he beat the veteran Republican, Burton L. French, who had served continuously from 1916 to 1932.

Dying Georgia Farm Is Brought to Life As 700 Men Revive 168 Eroded Acres

WINDER, Ga. (AP)—Seven hundred men using a million dollars worth of equipment completely rebuilt the worn-out 168-acre Carlyle Blaker farm at Winder in one day.

While a crowd of more than 50,000 watched—and sometimes got in the way—here are some of the things that were done:

The entire farm, half of which had been idle land, was revitalized and refurbished.

Every acre was subjected to one or more of almost 30 different treatments, according to the nature of the land and the purpose for which it was to be used.

A gully as deep as a three-story building was filled, leveled off and set to seed.

Three irrigation waterways were put in, and the land they watered was planted respectively to pecan grass, Ladino clover and cotton.

Seven acres were planted to cotton, eight acres to corn.

All trees on the farm were thinned, treated and classified.

The making over of this farm, a project sponsored jointly by the Atlanta Journal, the soil conservation service and Winder civic groups, is believed here to be much the biggest job of its kind ever done, and also an outstanding example of how to fight the farm-killing effects of soil erosion.

The army signal corps maintained communications, assisted by soldiers, sailors and marines. One equipment dealer estimated that his contribution of men and machinery cost him \$100,000. Another dealer supplied 80 tons of limestone that was spread during the day. In all, 64 major and 24 intermediate types of equipment were used.

Crowds began arriving around 8 a.m. The work was completed at midnoon, with time out for a formal program. Four or five projects had to be left uncompleted, but that was not for lack of time—it was because the crowds of spectators were so dense that it was feared somebody might be injured.

There was a light rain in the morning, but far from hindering the project, it is credited with saving the day by laying dust and holding down the size of the crowd.

President Signs "Old Farts" Bill

WASHINGTON, June 12 (AP)—The White House today announced that President Truman has signed the "old farts" bill.

This measure provides a formula under which public agencies may acquire surplus military posts, either by gift or by payment of part of the fair value.

Property to be preserved for its historical value may be transferred to a state or other public agency without cost. If the property is to be used for recreational purposes the government must be reimbursed for 50 per cent of the fair value.

Property to be used for educational purposes would be transferred under a formula set up by the war assets administration, which may allow discounts up to 100 per cent.

Among the properties affected, the legislation is Ft. Douglas, Utah.

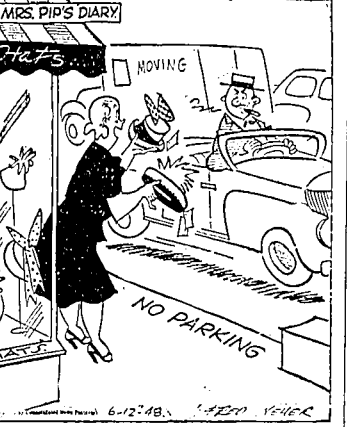

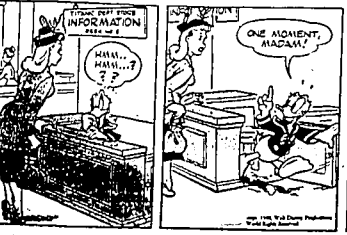

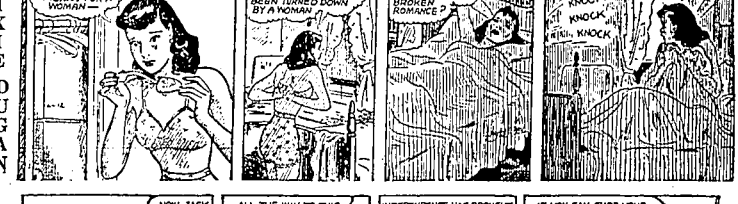

Other Bills Rejected
Numerous other bills calling for highway improvements, federal and state aid for farmers with mortgage property suffering unavailability crop loans and others were voted down by one house.

Roy Hopla, Arco, was president 120 tens of the senate and Dave Gray, Twin Falls, was speaker of the house. Dennis Mullins, Nampa, was secretary of the senate and Al Martin, Idaho Falls, was chief clerk of the house.

Idaho Solons Act to Obtain Aid for State

WASHINGTON, June 12 (AP)—Idaho's two representatives bagged today into action to get needed help for their home state.

Rep. Abe Gott, R., Ida., introduced a bill to get money for flood relief yesterday while Rep. John Samborn, R., Ida., urged construction of a badly needed forest road.

Gott said he will "beg, borrow and carry home" all the money he can get from the federal government for flood relief. He introduced a bill to authorize the federal works agency to coordinate emergency activities of federal agencies in the Pacific northwest disaster area.

Recommendations Included

Gott said the measure included recommendations made to various government agencies in reports from the flood-stricken area. The bill results from a conference with other representatives of the northwest, he said.

Samborn appeared before a house committee. He told the group that construction of an access road along the north fork of the Clearwater river would be financially profitable for the government.

Timber Made Available
The road, Samborn said, would make 6,000,000 feet of high quality, mature and over-mature timber available. The government owns 1,000,000 feet of this, he said.

Stumpage values would increase from \$2 to \$12 a thousand board feet, Samborn told the committee. This, he said, would mean a gain of \$4,000,000 to \$6,000,000.

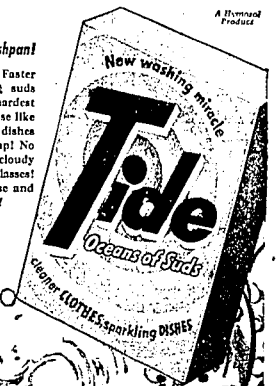

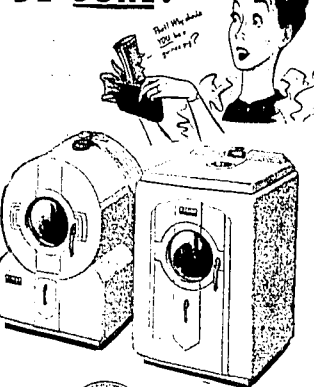
