# Pellet Seeding by Air of Light Catch At Gooding Shows Trade Approves Treaties; House Debates Draft Bill

GHOSHIONE, June 15—Pellet seeding by air of more than 21,000 acres of burned-off range land north of Gooding, Idaho, was reported today. Results of the pellet seeding are not known for another year or more. Keith pointed out most of the ungerminated seed comes from the area covered by frost action, creating other local soil movements. A veteran of 17 years of experience in range re-estab-lishing, Tisdale has worked extensively in the Canadian plains country in British Columbia, as well as in the United States. During a week spent in visiting the Gooding pellet seedings and several large drilled seedings of the bureau of land management near Gooding, Hunt and Rupert, he expressed renewed conviction of the need for some relatively fast, cheap and effective non-cultural

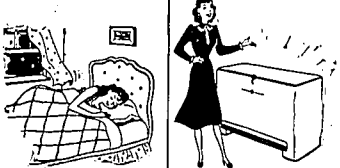

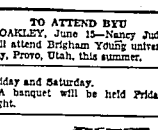

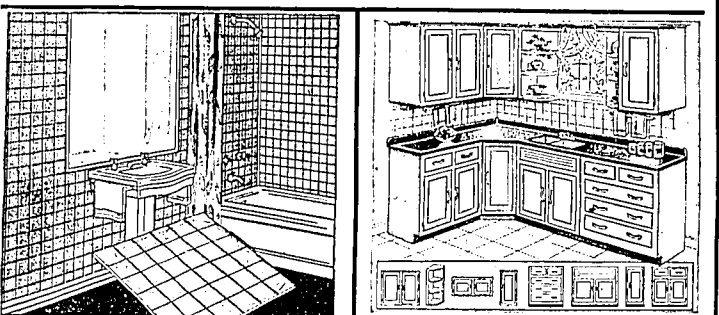

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### Straus Avows He's Required To Tell Plans

WASHINGTON, June 15 (AP)—Reclamation Commissioner Michael W. Straus avowed last night he is required by law to inform the general public of reclamation bureau policies, plans and opinions.

In furtherance of this requirement, he told the house subcommittee on publicity and propaganda, he has made "dozens of speeches" and used the radio, newspapers and other means of communication in addition to advising members of congress individually and to committee.

Chairman Harnett, R., Ind., told Straus that in his opinion the reclamation commissioner had no right to make speeches to local groups designed to incite them to "put pressure on congress" for or against pending legislation or for more appropriation.

Violation of Code He said such activity is a violation of the criminal code of the nation. Straus said he did not believe the committee will conclude that he has violated the criminal code.

He told the subcommittee "there is a well organized and highly financed vindictive campaign" to keep the bureau from collecting needed revenues and to punish bureau officials for trying to enforce the reclamation laws.

Verdict Without Trial Straus and Richard L. Bole, executive regional director of the bureau, expressed resentment of what they termed the committee's "verdict without trial."

They referred to the committee's recommendation of language in the interior department appropriation bill admittedly designed to remove them from their job. The language would require that the positions of reclamation commissioner, assistant commissioner and regional director be filled by engineers. Neither Bole nor Straus is an engineer.


