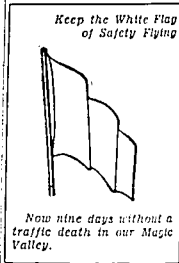

### Another Russ Act Backfires To Help West

The communists, whose coup in Czechoslovakia did much to assure congressional approval of the Marshall plan, have today the allies to put through another extremely important agreement.

It means the French assembly's approval of the London accords which, in the words of French Premier Schuman, will permit the integration of western Germany "into a United States of Europe."

There were several factors involved in passing the measure through an assembly still fearful of German economic and military revival, and of retaliation by Russia.

Accepted With Reservation

It was accepted on several grounds, but with instructions that the government continue to press for greater acceptance of French views during administrative negotiations. The assembly wanted to avoid a government crisis.

It was unwilling to sever away from England and the United States, now that France's early postwar ties with Russia have been broken.

It recognized that the United States and Britain have been concerned at all times to give France every assurance of safety compatible with their own situations. But the margin of victory was very small.

Issue Closely Balanced

The issue was closely balanced in the assembly when the communists, always looking for an opportunity to create a government crisis, injected themselves into a strike at the Clermont-Ferrand and tried to spread it to the rest of the country.

Resistant deputies recalled the riots of last December, and the fact that rejection of the German accord would be exceedingly irritating to the communists.

The principal French contention, one of long-standing, is for complete internationalization of the Ruhr, with allied operation rather than just control.

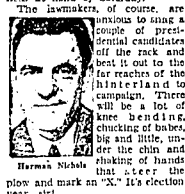

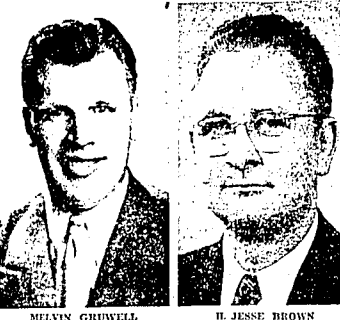

### POW Guard's Treason Trial Opens Today

LOS ANGELES, June 18 (AP)—The treason trial of Tomoya ("The Meatball") Kawakita, charged with a series of atrocities against American captives while a guard in a Japanese prison camp, opens in federal district court today.

U. S. Attorney James Carter, who will try the case personally, said he has on hand a score or more American marines, sailors and soldiers, who will testify to abuse they claim they suffered at Kawakita's hands while imprisoned in a POW camp on Honshu.

The American-born Kawakita, a native of Calexico, Calif., a farming community about 150 miles south-east of here, had volunteered that he be returned to Japan in 1943 and enrolled at the University of Tokyo. He received admission to the United States in 1946 on the representation that he had not participated in Japan's war effort. Carter says. Returning here, he studied for a time in the foreign trade school at the University of Southern California.

Seized by Ex-Prisoner  
Kawakita arrested in Oct. 1945—was engineered by an American ex-captivity prisoner in the Okinawa prison camp where American prisoners gave Kawakita the nickname of "Meatball." Bruce was sleeping in a downtown department store, and Kawakita, the man he said was a Japanese soldier, came in and captured him and his buddies. He humiliated and suffering while they were captives.

Bruce followed the Japanese-American from the store and obtained the license number of his car. He turned it over to the FBI which traced Kawakita to his residence and arrested him several months later. He was indicted by a federal grand jury in July, 1947, on a treason charge which carries a possible death penalty.

Biggest demand is in education, with emphasis on grade school teachers. There is also an acute shortage in high schools of science, commercial and home economics teachers.

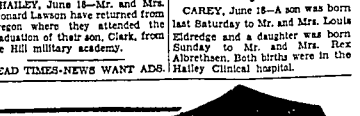

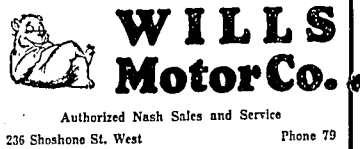

### Prewar Move Of Troops for Britain Bared

WASHINGTON, June 18 (AP)—The help we gave Britain "short of war" before Pearl Harbor included the transporting of 20,000 British troops from Nova Scotia to the middle east. The operation is described in the latest installment of "Secret Documents," "Secret Papers," appearing in Collier's magazine.

Edward S. Sherwood, Hopkins' biographer, says this is what happened:

**FDR Reveals Plan**

Prime Minister Churchill asked American help to get 40,000 British troops to the middle east. President Roosevelt turned things down in sending American ships into British ports in order to do it.

Finally British ships took 20,000 men to Nova Scotia. And then American ships, manned by American crews, took them through neutral waters to the middle east.

This was two months before the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor.

**Stalin Was Worried**

Hopkins was Roosevelt's personal representative to Joseph Stalin in July 1941. Hopkins said in his notes that Stalin was willing to turn over all important Russian military resources to the U.S., including designs of heavy military equipment. He was willing, the notes say, for American army units to be placed under American command to fight on Russian soil.

# Boyle Is Not Worrying on Father's Day

By HAL BOYLE  
 NEW YORK, June 18 (AP)—What to give my old man on Father's day is no problem.  
 I can't give him anything. But like many men whose fathers have died, I don't like to tell him something.  
 Just what I don't know—unless it is how much he means to me when I'm growing up, and how often I have missed him since he's gone. Not to mean on any more, but to talk things over with. Or maybe take to a ball game.  
 My father was always big and powerful and young. He acted toward his five children more like an older brother than a parent. Until we were fully grown he could knock a baseball further than any of his sons and daughters.  
 He was the son of an Irish immigrant who had 17 children and spent his life in the coal business—digging it. Dad ran a trapline as a boy of 10, and earned his way ever after. He grew up to be a fine, genuine hunter in the waxy snow—simple, unassuming, completely self-reliant and unpretentious to his kin and kind.  
 Dad hated to exercise authority over his sons, or to punish us for minor misdeeds. He thought boys had to get a few bumps in the process of learning to put their strength against life, and he didn't think it paid to interfere or protect them too much. He had a strong man's impatience of cowardice in any form, and I would rather have died than cry in his presence.  
 Dad believed in God, the Democratic party and "boom times." He rarely saw the inside of a church but every night until his death he knelt by his bed and said the prayer he had learned in childhood. One prayer lasted him all his life.  
 Perhaps because his own schooling stopped at the third grade, dad was suspicious of education. He thought it sometimes gave people ideas too big for them. His suspicion of the higher learning also stemmed from the fact he once gave credit to a college graduate, and the man didn't pay his bill. But he could never refuse credit to a man with a hungry family.  
 Dad ran a number of grocery stores. He made considerable money, gave away some, lost the rest, made some more, lost or gave away that, and was back trying to make more when his last illness came. Neither misfortune nor fortune ever soured him.  
 "All I want is the same chance Rockefeller had," he said. He figured if he didn't do as well—then he didn't deserve it."

# \$10,000 Store of Gold Coins Is Uncovered

**BOISE, June 18 (AP)**—All of the nation's gold left in Fort Knox—about \$10,000 worth in gold coins has turned up in Boise.  
 The coins, in all denominations, were discovered in an inventory of the estate of a Boise banker, Anna E. Crane, Miss Crane, 62, died May 2.  
 The executor of the estate, William C. Dunbar, Boise attorney, confirmed the discovery of the gold hoard in a safety deposit box in a Boise bank.

 Miss Crane's will didn't indicate the existence of the gold. Her estate went to 17 individual heirs and several institutions.  
 The left real estate valued at \$12,000, according to an appraisal filed in probate court. Her personal property was valued at about \$25,000 by the appraiser.

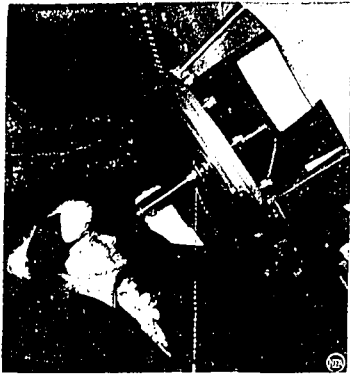
