Truman Sent 'Compromise' Bill for Draft

Truman sent a bill for draft which was derogatory to them in his filibuster speech.

Taylor had been talking against the bill since 2:17 p. m. Tuesday, except for a post-midnight break of five hours and 13 minutes. Senator, R. W. D., another congressman, gave him that breather.

The Idaho senator, candidate for vice president on Henry Wallace's third party ticket, took up the talking chores again at 5:23 a. m. and still was going strong just three hours later when he ran around on senate rules.

Taylor was reading telegrams backing up his opposition to the draft when his opponents got their chance. He had come to this message from Mrs. Frances Swadesh of New York, wife of a teacher and world war II veteran.

"Citizens of this nation can congratulate themselves on having one honest senator who respects his duty to represent the desires and interests of the people instead of the special interests of enemies of peace. God give you strength."

Senator Brewster, R. Me. broke in that day.

He pointed out that senators under the rules are not allowed to negotiate with members of the other conduct, and if they do it they lose the floor. Brewster said the message came in that day.

Senator Dies, H. N. Y., presiding at the time, upheld Brewster's point and finally directed Taylor to take his seat.

The Idaho senator, one-time "sunshine cowboy" in a tent show, was obviously worn from his talk marathon. He protested bitterly, but was stuck by his ruling and Taylor finally gave up. He stood with hanging head beside his seat for several minutes after the battle was lost.

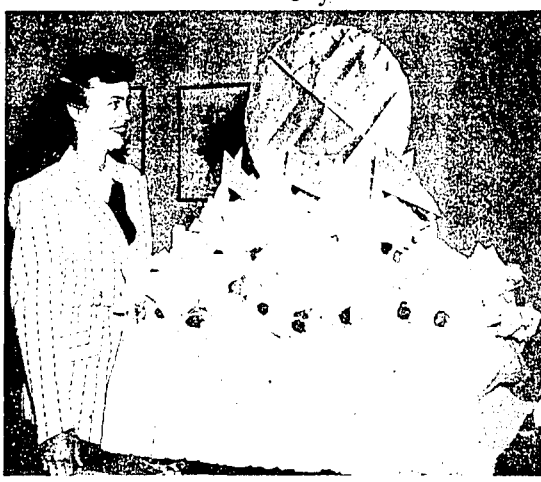
Then the compromise worked out by senate and house conferees was jammed through on a voice vote in a chorus of protests over procedure. The parliamentary situation got in such a tangle over that senator's lives had to recall an announcement that it had been passed. Then it was passed all over again.

After the senate shouting was over, Taylor told his colleagues he "ditched" during so he had done but "sincerely felt that this draft bill was jeopardizing our future as a democratic free people."

He added that those senators who supported his right to talk as long as he wanted to were following the "principles of democracy."

Taylor and Lauer did their long talk time in an effort to head off even the appointment of senate conferees to work out differences with house members before the bills passed by the two chambers.

Provisions of Bill for Draft Are Outlined

WASHINGTON, June 19 (AP) — Here's what the compromise 19-through-25 draft bill provides:

Registration—All men 18 through 25.

Drafted—Men 19-through-25 as needed to bring armed forces up to the authorized strength.

Service—24 months.

How soon—No inducements for 90 days unless President or congress declare national emergency sooner.

Termination—Act expires two years after enacted, unless extended sooner by congress.

Number—Army estimates it will need at least 225,000 men the first year after it starts.

Volunteers—18-year-olds can sign up for 12-month service and then join the reserves. That clears them from the draft later.

Declarers—No special registration for doctors and dentists as originally proposed. That those 25 or under must register.

Job rights—Same as in World War II.

Veterans—Those who served 18 months from Sept. 16, 1940 to date get benefits, pay air exempt, also those who served 90 days or more during "shooting war"—Dec. 7, 1941 to Sept. 2, 1945.

Draft boards—Like World War II but fewer will be needed.

Exile restriction—To be fixed by the President.

Exempt—Ministers, national guardsmen, organized labor members, conventional objectors, public officials and parents, agricultural and industrial workers covered by regulations the President can make.

Faulty men—The President, through the selective service director, will decide about deferring men with deficiencies.

Students—No high school students deferred until they graduate, drop out, or become 26, whichever is first. Colleges can't touch the current year.

Military justice—Army system unchanged to let enlisted men and warrant officers serve on courts martial, penalties reduced for many offenses.

Enlistments—Men 19 through 25 could volunteer for 24 months, or could enlisted reserves. General classification score out to 70 points for volunteers.

Reserves—Draftees go into inactive reserve for five years after discharge, unless they volunteer for another year in service or join an active reserve outfit for three years.

GOODING, June 19 — H. D. Jackson, incumbent for five successive terms, Saturday filed for reelection to the office of probate judge.

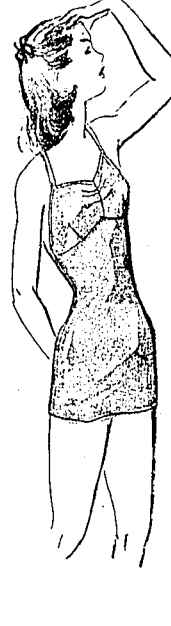

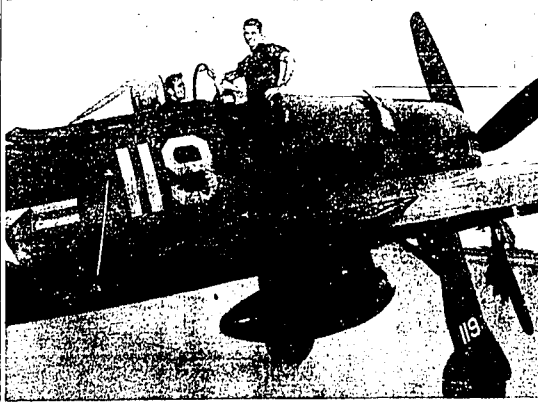

Conventions stories would fill an encyclopedia. But one of the high points in convention history was recorded in 1912 at Teddy Roosevelt's Bull Moose third party convention in Chicago. 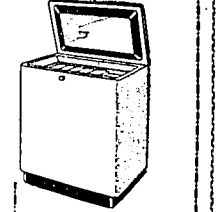

Beet Growers Plan Pleas to Farm Bureau

SALT LAKE CITY, June 19 (AP)—Western sugar beet growers planned an appeal direct to the secretary of agriculture today in behalf of their industry.

Facing with labor shortages and decreased prices, representatives of 17 beet growers associations in nine states said the effect of the sugar consumption estimate of the secretary of agriculture was causing them concern.

Under the 1944 sugar act the secretary is required to estimate sugar consumption to prevent dumping of foreign sugar into the domestic market. The 1948 estimate has been reduced from 7,000,000 tons in January to a flat 7,000,000 tons at present, said J. E. Bowen of Boise, Idaho, chairman of the conference.

In the same period, Bowen said, the price of sugar has dropped approximately \$1.10 per hundred pounds.

Beet growers operating under sliding scale contracts with processors are dependent on a high market price of refined sugar to obtain adequate return for their beets, Bowen explained.

This year for the first time since the war no government price guarantee is included in contracts, he said.

After Cellar Room in Vienna, DP's Discover U. S. Warmth

CLAREMONT, Calif. (NEA)—American hospitality is such small things as the hometown newspaper running an explanation of how to pronounce a newcomer's name. It is welcoming calls from neighbors, who come calling with a jar of homemade strawberry jam in one hand and a rough map of the neighborhood in the other.

That is the discovery of four Russian Ukrainians who have been adopted by the small college town of Claremont, in the center of the orange groves of southern California.

With the war they became displaced persons. For three years they lived in one cold basement room in a Vienna DP camp. But through the aid of welfare agencies they became the "adopted family" of Claremont, and were brought here from the Vienna camp a month later.

Now the family is self-supporting. Jobs to work at and an odd frame house to live in were provided for them by the college. The 70-year-old grandmother, Mrs. Elizabeth Ginejko, stays at home and takes care of the house while her daughter, Mrs. Adela Sawycka, and her two granddaughters, Tatiana, 24, and Natalia, 17, go to work by five each afternoon the four

The Claremont newspaper has acquired the names of the newcomers with taste of cottage cheese, and a mock ice cream made of cottage cheese flavored with vanilla and sugar.

Claremont, though its co-ordinating council, had planned for a year to "adopt" a European family.

The council is composed of college, civic and church members.

Then they heard of the Sawycka family. One daughter, Tatiana, was secretary to a niece of a council member in the Vienna office of the international refugee organization. After the Sawycka family was recommended to the Claremont council, arrangements were completed in almost miraculously short time.

To the Sawyckas, displacement is an old story. In 1917 Mrs. Sawycka and her mother fled from the Holubovky to Warsaw. In 1914 they were forced to flee Warsaw, and were captured in Vienna by the Nazis.

Now the four refugees think they have reached the end of their long search for home and security.
