Land Project Bond Plan Is Creating Stir

WASHINGTON, June 21 (AP)—Senator Clegg's bill to sell bonds to finance future reclamation construction draws a "no" response from fellow westerners in congress.

But that, apparently, was what the Washington Republican expected, for he told the senate he hoped the proposal would be studied during the congressional recess.

He didn't claim the bill was perfect. Under the measure, bonds would be issued immediately and enough sold to the public to provide funds for completion of a new bond issue under way. He figures that would be \$100,000,000.

When, whenever a project was authorized, enough new bonds would be sold to take care of its whole cost. Some legislators thought the program might take control of the development program out of the hands of congress and that it would provide an opportunity for a government bureau to "run wild."

Representative Goff, R. Md., said congress would be selling public lands and appropriations committees, tries to keep the construction program on a balanced basis.

It can, he said, adjust the speed of construction to the availability of materials and the need of labor for employment.

He said, however, the program would sell well. "If it will save the taxpayers money," Goff commented, "certainly it would have no objection."

He mentioned that city utility projects and state road building are often financed in this manner.

For 1949, congress appropriated \$24,500,000 for reclamation activities. Only \$12,557,860 was allocated to construction but the bonds—if that is ever adopted—would have to carry a considerable part of the administrative overhead as well.

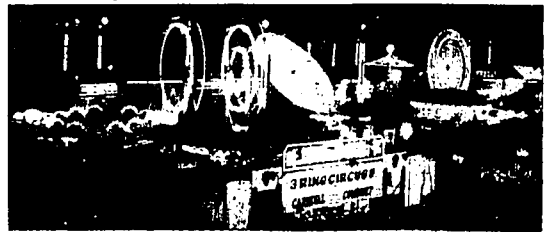

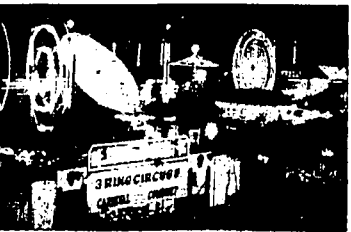

The weather didn't look too much like circus and carnival weather Sunday here. The Siebrand brothers combined circus and carnival pulled into Twin Falls, but the show will open at 7 p.m. each day this week at Frontier field.

It takes 55 big semi-trucks to haul all the equipment of the circus-carnival. Twelve of the vehicles have a capacity of 25 tons each.

The circus part of the organization doesn't include any wild animals, but it includes an hour and one-half show that does include just about every other sort of act ever presented by a circus. There are 28 top-notch circus acts, according to M. Jack Potter, Siebrand publicist.

A total of 18 rides and 15 shows are included in the carnival portion of the show. New rides featured here include the "Flying saucer," "new caterpillar," "electric scooter" and "saw ride." And the children will find such old reliables as ferris wheel, merry-go-round, whip and hammer.

A special matinee will be held Saturday, the final day of the show in Twin Falls for children. Tickets to the matinee have been distributed by local merchants for children under 12 years old. The matinee opens at 2 p.m.

Idaho's Polio Rate Shows Slight Gain SALT LAKE CITY, June 21 (AP)—California and Idaho both have reported slight increases in the incidence of polio, an officer of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis reported.

Rollison W. Lincoln, regional director for the foundation, conferred with Frank B. Emery, Utah director. "The increase is not an indication of the trend polio will take during the coming months," Lincoln said. "It is too early to say what state might be hit with an epidemic this year."

Lincoln, on a tour of nine western states, said efforts should be stressed during the hot weather months to prevent epidemics. The epidemic period will start soon and continue for four or five months.

Rupert Herd Tested on Milk Production RUPERT, June 21—A 10-year-old registered Holstein—Priceland owned by Leo H. Van Evers, Rupert, has completed a year of production testing in an official herd improvement registry program under the supervision of the University of Idaho.

An average of 368 pounds of milk and 11.09 pounds of butterfat were recorded from the herd. Milking was done twice daily.

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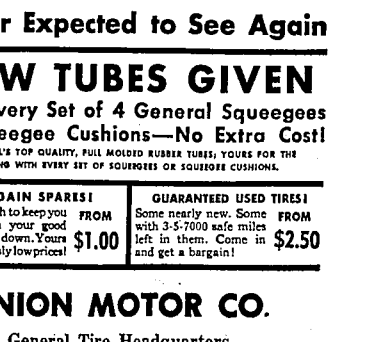
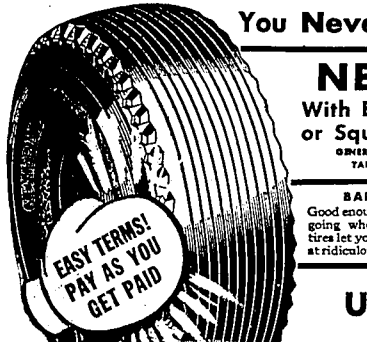

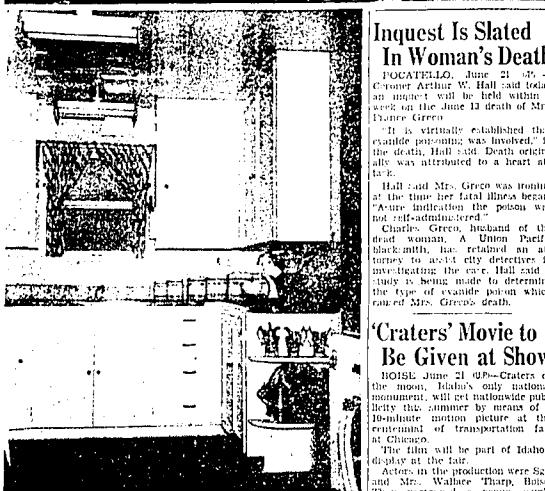

Textbook From Library Used To Construct New Home Here

The housing shortage, plus a lack of building experience, presented no dilemma to one Twin Falls man. Faced with need for a dwelling a year ago, James Sidwell, 24, here, turned to a textbook from the public library, located at a suitable site at 336 E. 1st avenue west, and began building in his spare time. Last week the house was completed.

Sidwell started the project last Aug. after finding no homes to his liking that were within his pocket-book capacity. Consulting the library he located a book entitled "Carpentry and Joinery," by Nelson Burbank, giving him complete instructions from drawing plans to the finishing touches. Using this source entirely, he has erected a model two-room house with bath and basement at a cost of slightly less than \$4,000, figuring out of lot and including his own labor. The property is now valued at \$6,200.

Progress was slow for Sidwell, since regular work at the Motor Company body and fender shop allowed him only evenings, Saturday afternoons and Sundays for work on his project.

By the middle of November, however, he had it finished, cedar shingles on and the roof ready. The Sidwells moved in Feb. 1, and between book-keeping and making a living have had the house, an attractive well-observed and installed fixtures since that time.

Here a general description of the house: It is 22 by 26 feet in size, living room 11 by 15 feet, kitchen 9 by 11 feet, bedroom 10 by 12 feet, and bathroom five by seven feet. It has a three-quarter basement, where Sidwell's workbench is conveniently located. The kitchen is fitted with built-in electric stove, sink, and cabinet. The cabinet doors, also built by Sidwell. The bathroom has a porcelain tub with shower. Bedroom has a built-in wardrobe, and linen drawers on rollers. The entry from the back door and basement is large enough for a pantry and utility room.
