Mine Pact Accord Is Said Near

WASHINGTON, June 23 (UP)—Government labor officials said today John L. Lewis and soft coal operators apparently are nearing an agreement to avert a mines strike on July 1.

The officials, who may not be named, have been in close touch with the United Mine Workers' chief and operators who are engaging in serious bargaining talks for the first time in their current dispute.

Pact Ends June 30
An agreement would not necessarily mean that terms of a new contract are being decided. The present contract expires June 30. Lewis has proposed to keep the mines open by a temporary extension of the contract, provided operators agree to start paying \$100 monthly penalties to retired miners and will make retroactive to July 1 the terms of a new contract eventually to be worked out.

There was no suggestion from the officials as to how far their work might have gone in either direction such an agreement that would keep the pits open.

Developments Explained
Indications that some fruitful steps are in the making came from these developments:

1. President Truman's inquiry into the coal situation in the United Mine Workers' chief and owners to report on progress of the agreement.

2. The last extension came after Lewis had taken time out from morning talks with operators to receive the coal operators' proposal.

3. Although Lewis had taken the time to talk, the revived negotiations between Lewis and the coal operators were still active with no sign they had failed to make progress.

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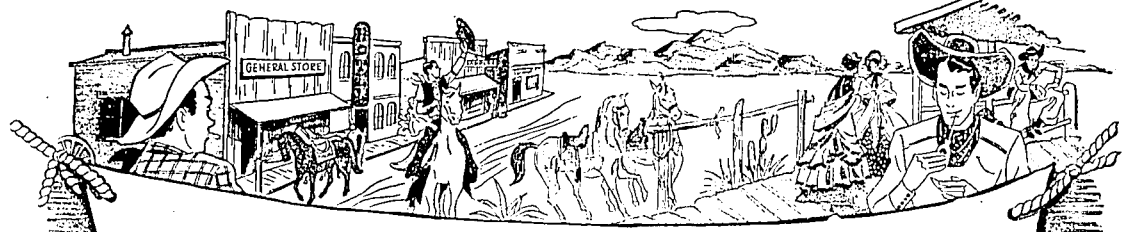

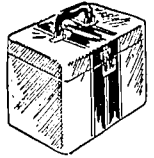

MIAMI, Fla., June 28—A 36-year-old radio announcer has given away his seven children to seven different Florida families through a bank today. He said he couldn't make enough money to support them.

Through his ad he found homes for each of his three daughters and four sons in a different southern Florida family. The families plan to adopt the Harvey children as soon as possible.

Harvey said his wife suffered from climatic fever at age 31 and was bedridden with arthritis from 14 to 17. Recently she underwent a serious operation after the birth of their youngest child last September.

The children are: Ellie Patricia, 8; Diana, 6; Charles, 5; and Thomas, nine months.

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Command for Air Defenses Given Revise

WASHINGTON, June 23 (AP)—The air force plans to reorganize the nation's air defense system, eliminating two present forces and consolidating others to provide "a modern adequate defense pattern."
The plan becomes effective July 1, the air force announced today. It is the result of a study started by the air defense command last year. The present six air defense commands were set up originally to coincide with six army areas of the United States.
"With vital areas dispersed throughout the nation," said today's announcement, "it was essential that each of four major areas should be under one air commander for air defense purposes."
The reorganization will do this: The 10th air force designation will be transferred to the second air force area and the second and 11th air forces will be disbanded.
The 10th will be responsible "for protection of vital areas in the middle west against attacks from the north, northwest or west, and will be based on the west by Wyoming and Colorado, on the east by Michigan and Illinois, and on the south by Kansas and Missouri."
The 14th, now embracing seven southwestern states, will absorb the five southwestern states as far west as New Mexico, to protect them "against air attacks from the east, southwest or south."
The fourth will protect approaches to targets within eight western states — Washington, Oregon, California, Nevada, Montana, Idaho, Utah and Wyoming.

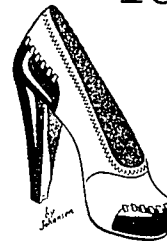

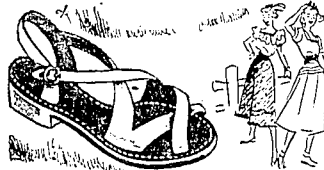

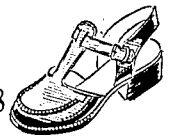

Must Approve Loan to Keep U. N. in U. S.

Congress does not approve the \$50,000,000 loan for construction of a home for the United Nations in New York before September 21 there will be a strong fight in the general assembly at Paris to change the seat of the organization.

People who talk of financing the New York building before September without a special session of congress, are not being realistic. And if it is not done before then the current talk of removal will become a full-fledged movement.

Private financing is out. The secretary general is expected to accept only the U. S. loan. He can't issue bonds, or do anything else without assembly action.

Finance Quickly

There is little doubt that the project could be financed quickly by popular subscription, but when that suggestion came up informally two years ago the U. N. delegates were overwhelmingly opposed, and there is no indication that they have changed their minds. They are not going to back the hat, nor have anyone paid it for them. They don't want the world's peace organization to look like a charity case.

The Arab states have been preparing to bring the matter up at Paris anyway. Opposed to the U. N. in the first place but willing to go to San Francisco, they are now anxious to escape what they call the whole area of Zionist influence.

Russ Will Help

Russia, of course, will be glad to help them. The Russians want to get as far from American influence as possible. A May at Lake Success to that one Russian, outstayed in favor of Geneva, admitted he had never been there but added:

"I may not know Geneva. I do not know New York."

Foes of removal will ask what the others expect to do about money somewhere else. And if the building at Geneva is suggested, will inquire as to who wants to back to a graveyard. They are sure the U. S. loan will come through eventually.

Two Thirds Vote

Any general assembly reversal of the decision to establish a permanent home in New York would require a two-thirds vote. The proponents of removal probably couldn't muster the strength.

But, because the U. N. loan got caught up in hot-minute maneuvering among the nationalists and internationalists for position at Philadelphia, the United States is likely to be subjected to days of highly damaging embarrasment in Paris.

The loan would not have changed the minds of the Arabs and the Russians about New York, but it would have splintered their guns.

'Atomic Process' For Getting Gold Based on Books

SPOKANE, Wash., June 23 (AP)—Dr. Harold H. Rector told a federal court jury today his "atomic process" for obtaining gold from black sand was developed by logical use of textbook information.

Rector, a chiropractor, testified as a government witness in the case against six defendants charged with conspiring to defraud northwestern investors of more than \$200,000 in a California mining venture.

Before he pleaded guilty on the opening day of the trial, Rector was the seventh defendant. The former Hanford atomic weapon employee testified that he had developed a method for extracting fine gold from sand by logically

using information gained from textbooks. He said the samples of gold-bearing sand were obtained from one of the defendants.

The process involved reducing the surface tension of mercury to attract all the gold in the sand, Rector said.

The results were astronomical, and he said a yield of about \$200,000 a ton, Rector said. He added tint tests at Sierra City, Calif., were not as successful, and that he "didn't feel" the gold recovered would pay for the mercury used.

Soviet Combs Europe Area For Uranium

BERLIN, June 23 (AP)—The Soviet union is sending 20,000 workers in a gigantic treasure hunt for uranium in Germany and Czechoslovakia, according to allied observers here.

The hunt is said to be almost fruitless. Although they are Europe's richest, the Czech uranium mines produce a maximum of only 15 tons of uranium metal each year, according to state department sources.

The German mines are said to produce about half that.

Centers in Mountains

The Russian search for the stuff of which atom bombs are made is centered in the Erz mountains, in a circular area roughly 20 miles in diameter, which bulges out on either side of the German-Czech border.

Russian youths and trusted Germans go into abandoned silver and sulfur mine shafts with uranium detecting apparatus.

When the detectors show the presence of uranium, German and Czech miners go to work on the vein.

Samples Taken

Samples are taken into one of the several Russian geological stations established in the area. The remainder is shipped to a processing plant between Chemnitz and Dresden for "rough cleaning," then flown to Russia.

So anxious are the Russians for uranium, that uranium detector operators are going through old piles of waste or thrown away when the mines were still producing salt and silver.

Working conditions in the mines are reported to be bad. Miners often work in knee-deep water, and wear hip-length rubber boots for protection. The Russians have not enough pumps to handle the water which seeps in from hidden springs above the mine shafts.

Cargo of Stingers On Way to Palau's To Destroy Beetles

WASHINGTON, June 23 (AP)—A man with two tin cans full of wasps raced through the sky tonight, bound for the Pacific.

Despite anxiety of airline officials, he has kept his stinging cargo beside him ever since he left three days ago, and he's not letting it out of his sight until he gets to the Palau Islands.

They're not ordinary wasps, explained Dr. Francis X. Williams, ready to report as he whisked through Washington on his 16,000 mile dash.

They're deadly coconut beetles which are causing great damage in Palau. He said, and the slight, quiet scientist is in a hurry because the wasps don't live long in transit.

"I don't know how many are still alive," he said gloomily, tapping his perforated gasoline can, "but I'm sure they'll be there, merrily prying in the screened tops."

It started out with 50 in one can and 10 in the other, but dizziness and cold kills them.

Dr. Williams personally headed each of the big black boxes to the ship for the navy and the Pacific command board of the National Research Council.

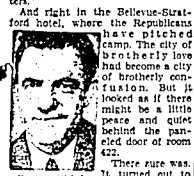

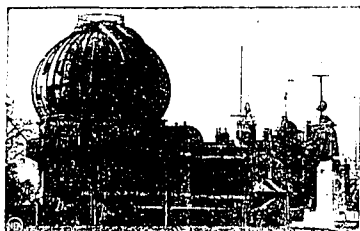

Mean Time Won't Begin at Greenwich Soon, but Globe's Clocks Still Set by It

GREENWICH, England, (AP)—Time used to begin here; soon it won't.

But the world will still set its clocks by the Greenwich mean time as it has for centuries past.

When King Charles II, with an eye toward British maritime supremacy in the 17th century, decided to establish an observatory, he picked the quiet countryside of Greenwich, a sleepy Thames-side village far out in the country from London.

He borrowed some bricks from Tilbury fort, some lead from the tower of London, got a little money from the sale of some spoiled gunpowder, and had his Greenwich observatory built for 500 pounds sterling.

His astronomers, who had to buy their own instruments, ran an imaginary zero meridian of longitude across their hill-top perch, and since that time the world has taken its time from Greenwich. Ships make all their position calculations from its zero line.

But King Charles wasn't farsighted enough. Spreading London is catching up with Greenwich, and the smoke of its factories plus naturally bad weather is obscuring its observations and threatening its accuracy.

So during the next five years the observatory will be moved, little by little, to the 14th century Hurlingham castle, 55 miles away. The actual clocks already have been moved to Abinger, 18 miles west of the meridian line.

Actual time at Abinger is one minute, 22.23 seconds slower than Greenwich mean time. But even the clocks in Abinger are wrong—thirty-thousandths of a second—slow for the best of their kind. Shippers over the land lines which

The observatory's modern clocks can be checked for accuracy to the fourth decimal part of a second.

But a 100-year-old pendulum clock, set with electric ticks off the seconds from Abinger over a relay system.

Time is checked from observations of the 133 stars which the International Astronomical union agreed should be used to make corrections.

Britain Seeks U. S. Tourists To Gain Cash

LONDON, June 23 (AP)—Britain expects about 500,000 tourists this year to spend between \$15,000,000 and \$40,000,000 (\$10,000,000 to \$16,000,000).

Britain expects at least 100,000 tourists from America to spend £70 to £80 (\$230 to \$253) per head in this country.

"We make no bones about it," an official of the travel association said. "We want the dollars."

In 12 months, Britain turned out 6,000,000 pamphlets and more than a dozen travel firms had spent thousands of pounds to lure tourists to these shores.

With an annual grant of £300,000 (\$1,200,000), stepped up from £250,000 (\$1,000,000) last year, holiday trade adopted a large sum to the travel association and the

propaganda machines began to propagate. From the energetic travel association headquarters in Piccadilly, "Come to Britain" literature poured by the ton. Overseas travel agencies, shipping companies and airlines displayed the colorful literature, slipped up "Beautiful Britain" posters and awaited results.

Scenery Strayed
The 20-year-old travel association promised no breakfasts or free room sodas. In fact, it emphasized that Britain is poor, her hotels drab. But it pointed out the blizzard scenery, the sporting events, including the Olympic games, salmon fishing in Scotland, hiking everywhere.

The bait has been successful. The tourists are flocking in by sea and air, and eastbound passage before air returns from the United States is hard to get. Travel from the continent is well-booked, too.

"I shall build up a picture of the next war. The atomic war will be a struggle to eliminate one ideology in favor of another.

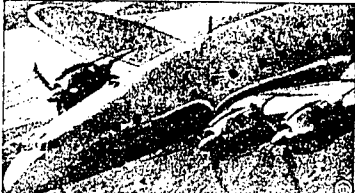
"Peace can come on earth if another nation accumulates sufficient atomic bombs and tries them to destroy the United States.

Air Tourists May Not Catch Up With Supersonic Speeds

By DOUGLAS LARSEN
 WASHINGTON (AP)—It will probably be several decades before the man-in-the-street will be flying with the altitudes even close to the speed of sound—760 miles an hour at sea level.

And he may never fly faster than the speed of sound in commercial planes.

This is in spite of the fact that the air force today is making regular flights between 600 and 1,000 miles an hour in the famous, tiny X-1 experimental plane. Exactly how fast the X-1 has flown is a military secret. But the air force has

announced that the plane has flown "far faster" than the speed of sound. And it has also revealed that the present power of the plane is capable of pushing it up to a maximum speed of 1,000 miles an hour.

The man who claims that close-to-the-speed-of-sound is on for the commercial air traveler, and that perhaps faster-than-sound for the airlines will never be, is Carl F. Standard Propeller division, United Aircraft corporation.

In an article titled "Is the Propeller Here to Stay?" in the magazine "Aviation World," Baker ad-

The question of whether jet and rocket motors have doomed the airplane propeller to the fate of the horse and buggy is one of the hottest arguments among aviation experts today.

Those who say that the airplane prop is on its way out point to such things as the amazing flights of the X-1, which, powered with rockets, has no propeller. And they also point out the fact that approximately three-quarters of all the liners which the air force is buying today are jets, without propellers.

The only planes the air force is buying with propellers are trainers, cargo carriers and a few bombers.

It is Baker's contention that supersonic speeds are too expensive to attain to have a commercial value. He writes:

"For a speed increase of 50 per cent from the subsonic into supersonic . . . owing to the advent of compressibility shock, the drag increase is tremendous and a power increase of approximately 800 is required. Therefore it seems obvious . . . that it is uncommercial to contemplate carrying passengers or cargo through the trans-sonic into the supersonic speed regime."

Baker draws these final conclusions on the future of the propeller and on the future of aviation in general.

"The majority of all airplane cargo and personnel will be carried in planes operating in the speed range of from 100 miles-per-hour to sonic velocities.

"Regardless of the powerplant, these aircraft will have con-

ventionally designed propellers as their propulsion device.

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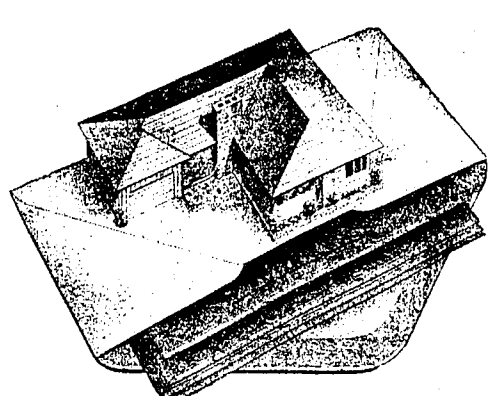
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Even Seekers Of Presidency Wonder Why

WASHINGTON (NSA)—On a recent "meet the press" interview, presidential candidate Thomas E. Dewey was asked why he wanted to be President. American Mercury Editor Lawrence Sanders, who asked the question, pointed out that it usually took years off a man's life.

W. J. W. Dewey, for eight years been trying so hard to get it in a measured word its spoken with such emphasis there could be no doubt of their sincerity. Dewey answered, "It is a very slight idea." If any of the other half-dozen active applicants for this job were asked the same question, their honest answers would have to be pretty much the same. For the record, these candidates and the dozen others who secretly hope that the political lightning will strike them might try to hand you the line that it was the call of duty, the highest honor the nation had to bestow, or the need to save the country from a crippling and distressing depression. Down down inside, they all know that's the bunk. Merrill Smith, who covers the White House and the President for United Press, has just written a book about this man-making job. He calls it "A President Is Made In Idaho." In good reportorial style, Smitty points out why the President has to be all things to all people. The book goes beyond that, however, in detailed explanation of why no body should ever want the job.

The \$75,000 salary, plus \$30,000 a year travel and entertainment expense, sound nice but mean little if it costs more than that to run the place. In spite of the White House staff of 500 the government furnishes free.

Will Hays called election to the presidency a sentence of death. Smitty figures that the average President, elected at age 54, dies at 68. The average man of 54 can expect to live till he is 72. So the job takes five years off his life.

No farmer works an hour longer as the President. Office workers would scream at the hours of a presidential secretary. "From 4 a. m. till midnight, except when they were late." The President must be all smiles when he feels like the wrath of God. He must see delegations whom he doesn't want to see, including Indians who change to their feathered headdresses in the wash room. All of them know more about running the job than the President, and tell him so.

He gets from 1,000 to 2,000 letters a day, hauled in three truckloads. He has to sign his name from 200 to 600 times a day, to mail commissions, private relief bills and laws passed by congress. He gets cuffed by the hundred, including fish, fowl and bow ties. Better than a baby a day is named after him, and the parents tell him about it, expecting some kind of acknowledgment in return.

The social responsibilities are a job in themselves. On top of the usual routine of luncheons, dinners, receptions and clam bakes which the President must attend at all times for political purposes, there is a

normal season. It begins in late November and runs to Lent. It includes dinners for the cabinet, the judiciary, the president of the senate, the speaker of the house and two for the diplomatic corps. Then there are judicial, diplomatic, congressional, army-navy, press and federal agency receptions. Visiting foreign dignitaries rate other receptions and dinners. At some of these functions the President must shake hands with over 2,000 people in one evening.

All these affairs are run according to strict protocol and set social custom.

The President has no private life. The White House has 60 rooms on four floors, but two of these floors have big rooms in which state occasions are held, and through which dignitaries may traipse on certain days of the week.

The President's living quarters are the 11 parlor and bedroom suites on the second floor. The President and his family are virtual prisoners here. They are constantly guarded by the secret service.

Whenever the President travels, this secret service protection is increased. Wherever he goes, the job follows him—even on vacations. Recent Presidents have averaged from 10,000 to 20,000 miles a year. Every fourth year a President running for reelection must get out and campaign actively, as President Truman is now doing on a coast-to-coast riding around the country. Every where he goes, every crowd he faces must be with the knowledge that some crank may take a shot at him.
