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Lewis, Operators Airplanes Boost Dewey Short by 33 Votes In Second Ballot; Recess Approved

WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP)—Soft coal operators, except for steel company mine interests, were reported today ready to sign a new contract with John L. Lewis giving miners \$1 a day wage boost and doubling the pension fund royalty levy.

A such a wage increase would be 12 1/2 cents an hour. Miners now receive a basic pay of \$13.05 cents for an eight-hour day or \$1,631 an hour. The new rate would provide \$1,405 for eight hours at an hourly rate of \$17.56.

The new contract would be 12 1/2 cents an hour and would raise an estimated \$100,000,000 a year. From this Lewis wants to pay his retired miners \$100 monthly, together with benefits for dependents.

Terms of the proposed contract were represented as coal operator representatives, except for Harry W. Moses, Lewis' chief negotiator, met behind closed doors with Lewis in the United Mine Workers' office.

Other features in the tentative proposal included: Retention of the controversial clause by which miners are bound to work only when they are "able and willing";

Formation of a union shop to the UMW subject to provisions of the Taft-Hartley labor act.

Continuance of \$100 vacation payment for miners eligible.

President Truman announced a fact-finding board has given Lewis and the operators until 2 p. m. (MST) today to reach a peace pact or a new contract or an extension of the present agreement under conditions requiring operation of the mines in July.

The new deadline represented a 24-hour extension of time. The board was to report to the president last night on results of its inquiry. While House approval of the new contract was given when the board reported "considerable progress toward a complete settlement."

Truman Gives Bill on Draft Date Not Set
WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP)—The draft bill has finally reached President Truman's desk. He has approved it and it is to be signed in the next few days.

Approval is regarded as certain. The House passed the bill in a 375-10 vote on June 23. The actual signing date, however, has been postponed for two days.

Until a final action is taken, the bill will remain in effect. The bill provides that no one will be inducted for 90 days after it becomes law.

The House Press Secretary Charles C. House said the measure reached Mr. Truman late yesterday afternoon. He said the bill is expected to be signed in the next few days.

Both Vandenberg and Martin left for Washington today. They were expected to be in the city before the bill was finally approved.

Fairfield, June 24 (AP)—First-fighting planes went into action in Camas county when they flew Thursday morning in an attempt to save the county's wheat crop from frost damage as temperatures dipped to a low of 26 degrees.

Kenneth Clark, local airport manager who directed the operation, said the planes were able to raise the ground temperatures above the freezing point. He said planes flying from 10 to 50 feet high kept air in motion as long as 16 minutes at a time to keep frost from collecting. Three planes from Boise joined in the operation. Planes from Twin Falls were in Fairfield too late to help.

Clark said in Fairfield from Twin Falls are scheduled to arrive in Fairfield tomorrow night to help with expected heavy frost Friday morning. A total of 12 to 14 planes may be used in the next operation.

The four planes Thursday projected 1,400 acres of wheat on the Lloyd Baron ranch and ranches owned by William H. Holt, Cliff Hollowell and Alvin Carman.

The planes started the frost-fighting battle at about 3:30 a. m. and continued for about 10 hours. Clark described the first morning's accomplishments as being "very successful" and said that the second operation would prevent any serious crop damage during 1948.

An estimated \$100,000 damage was caused in Camas county by the wheat crop during the 1947 season. The plan for the operation was made last week when several planes took part in an experimental flight. The information gained from the first report combined with information from the second flight, Calif. Clark and his associates mapped their plans.

When serious frost occurs, Clark plans to use one frost-fighting plane for every 500 acres of ground.

Road Will Be Closed While Repairs Made
U.S. highway 93 between the Perine Memorial bridge and Jerome will be closed to traffic Saturday through Sunday for repairs.

A sign will be placed at the Washington-Twin Falls morning motorists if the highway is open. Another road marker also will be placed at the Jerome bridge. Placemen will be placed at the bridge and two miles south of Jerome to warn motorists.

The strike would affect the shipping industry. The union is demanding a 15% wage increase and other improvements.

The election will be held in the county seat. The sheriff is responsible for law enforcement in the county.

Dewey Short by 33 Votes In Second Ballot; Recess Approved

CONVENTION HALL, PHILADELPHIA, June 24—The seventh session of the Republican national convention recessed until 4:30 p. m. (MST) today after Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York had surged to within 433 votes of capturing the nomination in the second ballot.

He received 515 votes of 548 needed to win after having received 434 in the first ballot. (Second in both ballots was Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio, with 274 in the second tally, a gain of 62 from the first vote count of 222.)

Harold E. Stassen was third in the first vote, but went down to 149 in the second ballot from the 157 he received in the first vote. Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg of Michigan tallied 62 in each ballot to place fourth.

After the no-decision second ballot, Republicans in league against Dewey moved for a recess. The motion was adopted by voice vote after Dewey's New York delegation said it had no objections.

Convention Chairman Joseph W. Martin, Jr., then ordered a recess at 4:35 p. m. (MST) until 4:30 p. m., when the balloting will start again.

Leaders of the key delegations, Michigan and California immediately scheduled a recess meeting to find out if they could agree now to back Dewey at tonight's session.

Dewey followed the afternoon session with a party of close associates in his hotel room. He had discarded his coat when he emerged to meet the reporters, after the two ballots had failed to get him the nomination.

U.S. Chief Undaunted By New Russ Moves
BERLIN, June 24 (AP)—The Russians disrupted the power supply and freight shipments in western Berlin today, but Gen. Lucius D. Clay served notice that no action short of war is going to force the Americans from this city.

Chy, the American military governor, said the latest move by the Russians indicates they are trying to put on the final pressure to drive us out of Berlin. He said this could not be accomplished "by any action short of war."

Russia, Satellites Resume Conclave
WARSAW, June 24 (AP)—Foreign ministers of Russia and seven satellite states resumed their work today on a blueprint for a separate state of eastern Germany with a government of its own.

The second session of a 10-nation conference of eastern European states opened this morning. It was being held under strict security regulations, with all delegates ordered to keep the proceedings secret.

State Department Raps Russ Action

WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP)—A State department spokesman said today Russia has taken "unilateral" action in the Balkans against the western powers in Berlin which "fundamentally" violate existing agreements.

Michael J. McDermott, special assistant secretary of state, said: "I think you all fully understand what the situation is. It is a situation of international law and the motivation behind those unilateral acts."

McDermott did not specify the particular government action in question. But he reaffirmed the right of the British, French and American governments to share occupational control of Berlin.

It was reported as certain that the Russian government will object to this government that the Russians are embarked on efforts to force the western powers out of Berlin.

Spaniel Saves Master From Dying in Well

BREMERTON, Wash., June 24 (AP)—Because of the love of his cocker spaniel, Dale E. Wilson is alive today.

Wilson fell into an abandoned 12-foot well one week ago while on a nightly stroll with his dog, Penny.

The dog stayed at the well's edge for five days, whining and barking and peering down as Wilson tried desperately to climb out.

By Sunday Wilson was exhausted and had forgotten what food tasted like.

By Sunday, also, Wilson's girl friend was madder than a hornet. She had a date for Saturday night and thought she had been "stood up."

The mournful Penny finally left the well Monday and returned home. There he met the angry girl friend who had called for an explanation. The sad-eyed dog tried to explain itself in a few feet towards the well a half-mile away. Then he would stop, whine and look back with pleading eyes.

Finally the girl followed the little dog to the well and looked down. She ran home and returned with a rope.

Attendants at the navy hospital here said Wilson is suffering from shock and starvation but will recover.

The girl refuses to tell her name. "She's Penny's name," she said. "She's the heroine, not me."

Bishop Declares Beauty Pageants "Totally Pagan"

WHEELING, W. Va., June 24 (AP)—Bishop John J. Sibley announced yesterday he would excommunicate any Catholic girl if she participated in a beauty contest.

He called modern beauty pageants "totally pagan" and "absolutely immoral."

The bishop made his statement in continuing reports he had told a Catholic girl to withdraw from a contest here or be expelled from the church.

Protesting what he called the "indirect exposure" of girls' bodies before the public, he told reporters: "How any girl can submit herself to that ordeal is beyond me."

"If mistresses were eliminated from beauty contests," he said, "the whole thing would fall to pieces."

Mrs. Gertrude Hestway of Wheeling had asked that her name be

withdrawn from the list of entrants of a contest set for next Monday night. She said she dropped out because of the bishop's stand in the matter.

HALF LACE CITY, June 24 (AP)—A key speaker at a national architects convention here today opened a campaign against high prices in the building industry.

Architects Prentice Bradley of Pittsfield, Mass., urged 700 delegates at the 80th convention here of the American Institute of Architects to join him in the high price war.

Bradley declared "today rising costs are a specter that disturbs our sleep, spoils our disposition and wrecks our jobs. To me, it is deplorable that there are so many people who want homes, well designed homes, even if small."

Cyrus E. Silling, Charleston, W. Va., also criticized the veterans administration at the convention. He said VA hospitals are performing architectural services, and not hiring private architects.

BOISE, June 24 (AP)—The youngest inmate at Idaho state prison is starting a 25-year sentence for armed robbery. He is Marvin Gehrke, 16, of Nampa.

Gehrke and his companion in the robbery, John C. Barber, 18, were sentenced for taking \$27 at gunpoint from a Nampa woman, Barber is serving a similar term.

They must serve one-third of their sentence before being eligible for parole.

Demand for Labor Still High in State

BOISE, June 24 (AP)—Despite a decline in statewide job listings, the Idaho state employment service said labor demands continued high during the past week.

Considerable demand was created by the harvest of cherries, green peas and strawberries in the Lewis and southwestern Idaho areas, the service said.

The decline in total Idaho job listings was caused by a dip in beet thinning labor needs. The service said on June 19 a total of 2,153 listings were reported which represented a drop of 233 from the previous week.

BOISE, June 24 (AP)—Idaho's first district congressman, Abe Mike Gregor Goff of Moscow, is formally in the race for reelection.

Goff yesterday filed his declaration of candidacy and nominating petitions with the secretary of state for renomination on the Republican ticket.

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Pioneer of Minidoka Project, 91, Has Never Called Doctor

By IDA CARLSON RUPERT, June 24. — Of all persons who reach the age of 91, few are so fortunate as Mrs. Sarah Hall, Walkerville, Mont., who says she has never consulted a doctor.

The pioneer resident of Montana and later the Minidoka project, only had her mother or a neighbor present when she gave birth to her nine children. She nursed the children through various epidemics, preventing among children as well as the more serious cases of diphtheria and measles without consulting any doctor.

The 91-year-old lady is visiting her mother in the city of Helena and old friends from the early days of the Minidoka project.

When asked the usual questions about the reasons for her long life, she replied, "The good Lord has blessed me with a strong constitution, but I have never lived anything but a plain home life. I have eaten anything I wanted with the exception of milk, which never seemed to agree with me."

Mentally alert, Mrs. Hall reads two daily newspapers a day without the use of glasses. She is up to date on all current events. Her hobby is making crocheted purses and in addition she spends her time sewing, mending, crocheting, piecing and other needlework.

She takes great pride in showing off her own flowers, vegetables and berries.

Mrs. Hall has tried every means of transportation except flying and declared she preferred "to keep her feet on the ground."

At the age of 7, she lost her birthplace, Kentucky, and crossed the plains to the west with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Reuben Richmond and two brothers and two sisters. They first settled at Altus, Okla., a large mining camp near Virginia, where the capital of the Territory of Oklahoma.

Analyst Sees Little Hope of German Unity

By DEWITT MACKENZIE
AP Foreign Affairs Analyst

Events appear to be moving rapidly toward a formal division of Germany into two states—one comprising the Soviet eastern zone and the other the western area occupied by America, Britain and France.

Russia and six satellite countries have been designated to hold a secret conference in Warsaw, and are authorized to discuss the question of a separate state in eastern Germany. They also are to discuss another assault on the Marshall plan.

Should Moscow create a separate state, it would be added to the satellite nations which Russia overran during and since the war.

Danger in Berlin

A most extraordinary and dangerous aspect of this situation is that the once proud capital city of Berlin lies in the heart of the Russian zone, although it is partitioned into four zones for purposes of military occupation. This not only would both eastern and western Germany be deprived of the capital, but the most important transportation center of all Europe would be cut off from the outside world by a Russian move which would formalize a situation which already exists in effect. The difference would be that hope of a United Germany would be killed, thereby dealing a heavy blow to general European economic rehabilitation.

Long a Krypton

Germany long has been a keystone of continental economy, and the western allies have been striving for unity in order to speed the general program of recovery.

The new Soviet project represents another offensive in her cold war against democracy. It would create a delicate situation, but would fall short of actual gunfire.

As things now stand there seems small chance of achieving a united Germany short of some development which will enable the people of eastern Germany to re-assert themselves and throw off the Moscow yoke.

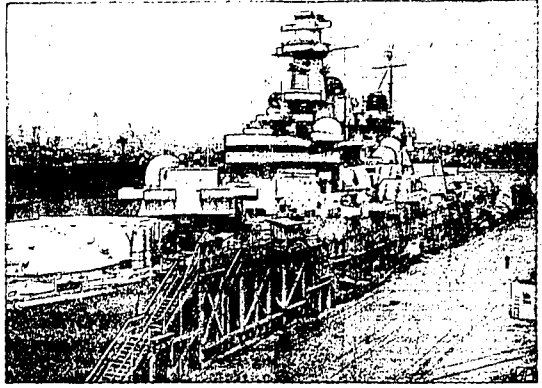





Ex-Aristocrat Is Now Plain Farm Spouse

BOISE, June 24 (AP)—An American girl is a far cry from an aristocrat in Brazil—especially for the daughter of a German-born aristocrat. Ask Hilda Stark of Boise.

A scant 14 years ago Hilda was living a life of leisure in beautiful Sao Paulo, Brazil, the daughter of Meta and Wilhelm Stark, socially prominent and very proud.

Now Hilda is a plain farm housewife. She's got the job of managing eight small children and helping run the Cluff's Oriented area.

The other day Hilda got a letter which made her forget the dirt and grime of farming. . . a letter she was praying for these past eight years. It was a birthday message from her mother, the first she had ever get since leaving Brazil in 1940.

Hilda and her two brothers had been brought up in a luxurious South American home surrounded by maids and servants. She went to a private German school.

Then one day the Starks met the Mormon missionaries. Several years passed. A good looking young missionary from Utah—lex Cliff—was in town. Hilda had blossomed into a beautiful woman. They were instantly attracted to each other.

But shortly after arriving they got a big jolt. It was 1938 and there was strange political talk. Mr. Stark said he had retired from engineering and put his money in an ice cream business.

After a few months, Stark told Hilda to choose between him and her husband. She chose Rex and he got a job as machinist.

The Brazilian government passed a law that no foreigners could hold key positions and he was denoted. They had little money and were sick of Brazil.

So they decided to return to Utah. Hilda tried to make reconciliation with her parents. She asked them if they would like to see her two children before the boat sailed. They said no.

Thoroughly American That was 1940. Since then Hilda has become a thoroughly American housewife. She has learned English and many skills her proud parents relegated to the servants.

They're buying a farm near Boise. They're not six more children, or eight in all. Hilda, who never sewed a stitch before, makes most of the clothes. She cares 1,200 pounds of food a year and still has time to whip up an occasional Brazilian party or German meat dish.

She raises everything from violets to delphiniums. She holds several church jobs. She's lived more in 33 years than lots of us do in 60. But she still has two unfulfilled dreams. . . to get a hothouse to raise orchids like she used to pick in Brazil, and to become an American citizen so she can vote and go fishing without buying a \$25 alien license.

New 'Allergy' Is Discovered In Nail Polish

By HOWARD W. BLAKESLEE CHICAGO, June 24 (AP)—A new kind of allergy, a fingernail disease of women due to a new type of nail polish, was reported to the American Medical association today.

This trouble was reported by Doctors Douglas A. MacFadyen and Bernard Yaffe, of Probyterian hospital, Chicago, and the University of Illinois School of Medicine.

They said this nail trouble had been found among a few of the women using "base" polishes, which is something new, serving as a foundation for the usual colored polish. It makes the polish last longer.

The nails, said the doctors, become discolored, get hard, brittle, a bit thin, dead while in color and finally are likely to buckle into a cylindrical shape. The nails get well, they said, about four months after the women discontinue the use of "base."

Their tests show this is an allergy, that is some women get it, but most do not. This allergy is unusual because it affects nothing except nails and the skin directly under them.

Geographical Plan Being Followed in Dispersing Plants

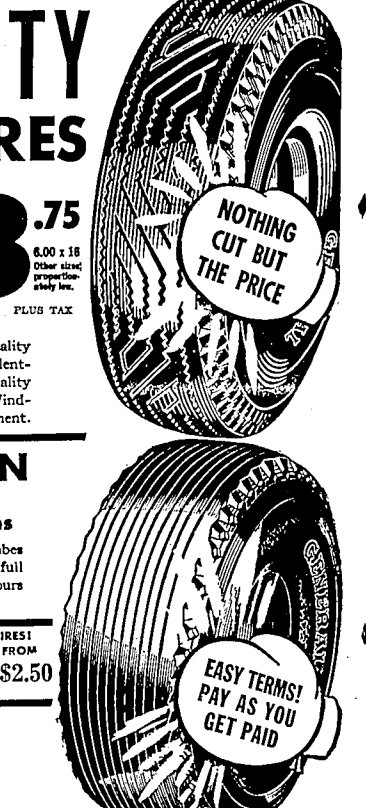

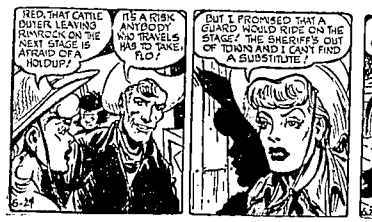

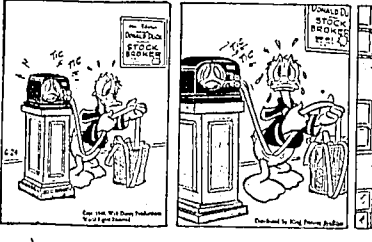
