Young Americans Urged to Put Things in Order for Induction

WASHINGTON, June 28 (AP)—If you fall within the 18 through 25 age bracket, there's one chance out of 36 that you'll be drafted in the first 12 months.

But between 200,000 and 225,000 young Americans should be putting their affairs in order—there'll be a uniform by the fall of 1949 and there are 20 months.

Approximately 7,300,000 others between 18 and 25 should check the draft August 17 and arrange with their boss to get off a few hours so they can register.

Eighteen-year-olds must register, though they may not be drafted until September 22 is the earliest date any one can be actually drafted, however.

All of this is taking place because Uncle Sam is building up his defenses.

In order that the army, navy, marine and air force can be sure of 36 adequate manpower—2,000, 882 men—congress passed the draft bill June 19.

Under the law of the land when President Truman signed it in his state June 24, it remains the law for two years. If the situation is such at the end of two years that the draft is still needed, congress must pass another law.

Under the present law, registration of all men 18 through 25 could start this August. But acting service officials said it would take about six weeks to organize some 4,000 local draft boards to do the work. That's where the August 16 date comes in. It's not official, but a "safe" guess.

Registration should take just a few days. Officials point out that 16,000,000 men registered in one day in the pre-war draft.

Then the draft itself comes. But the bill passed by congress says no one can be drafted until 90 days after the legislation becomes law. That's for two years.

So Sept. 22 is D-day—draft day—for men 18 through 25. Men of 18 can be drafted by a 10,000 of them can volunteer, and thus escape the draft later.

Officials assure there are 5,500,000 Americans in the draft age group today.

With only about 200,000 to be drafted on Sept. 22.

Ballot Queries Answered by County Clerk

(Editor's note: An aid to registration and balloting by Twin Falls county residents, it is suggested that voters clip this article and the accompanying outlines of county precincts for future reference.)

In response to questions from persons interested in the primaries and the general election Nov. 3, County Clerk Charles Bullis has prepared a summary of voter qualifications, times and places for registration, and absentee ballot information.

To qualify as a voter, a person must be a United States citizen, and have resided in Idaho six months immediately preceding the election. The age requirement is 21 years at the time of the election.

Can Register
Bullis pointed out that a person could register within 20 days if he will be 21 at the time of election. This means that some persons who cannot vote at the primary may vote in the general election.

Before a person can vote at either election, he must be registered. At a voter, Bullis particularly emphasized that having registered for city elections absolutely no hearing for voting in a primary and general elections handled by the county.

Emphasizes Point
To be eligible to vote in the primary or general elections, he repeated, a voter must be registered with the county registrar of city registration.

Registration is now open and will close at 9 p. m. Aug. 7, to allow election officials to get their registration books in order for the primary election Aug. 10. Registration will reopen Aug. 14 and will close at 9 p. m. Oct. 20, to bring the registration books up to date for the general election Nov. 2.

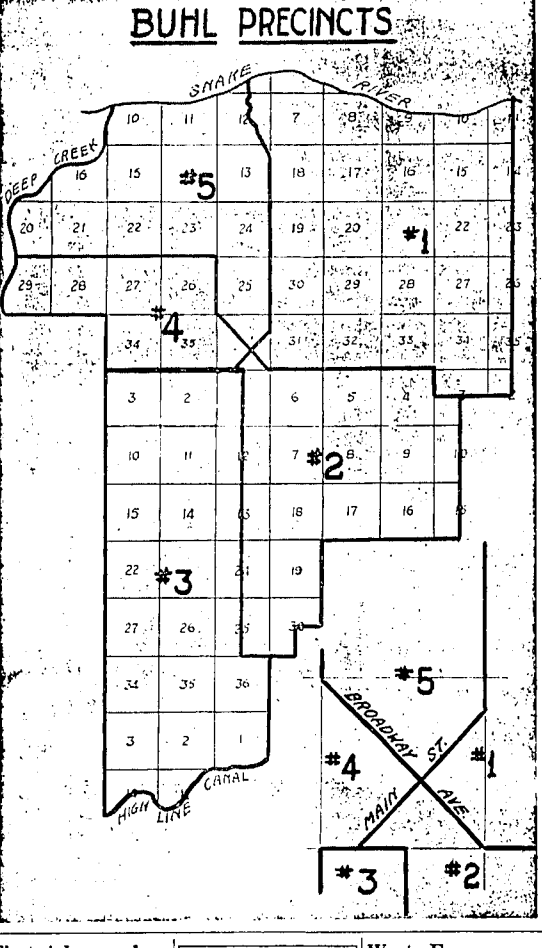
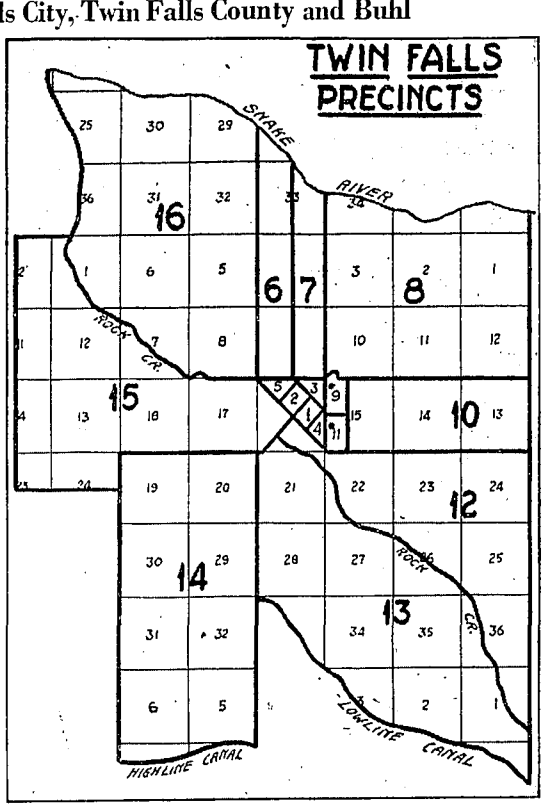
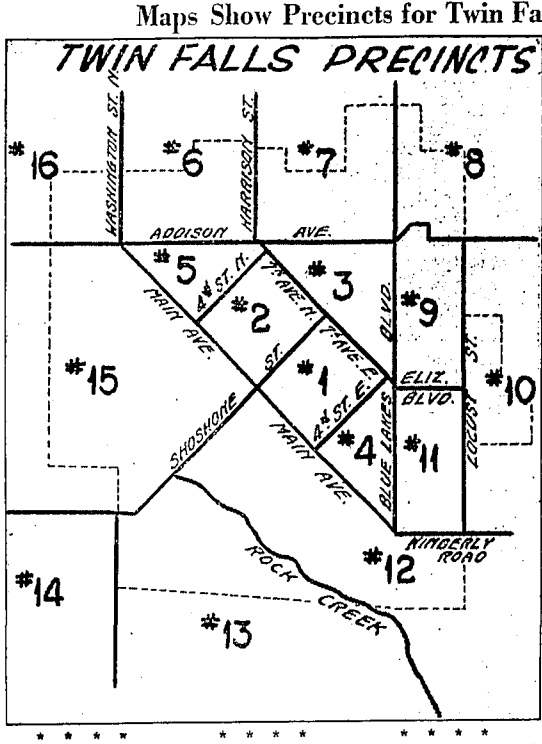
Still Registered
Regardless of re-registration, Bullis said voters who cast their ballots in the general election two years ago and who have not moved from their precincts are not required to register again.

However, if a voter did not vote in the last general election or if he has moved from his precinct, he is not required to register again. For those who have moved, they should go to the registrar of their former precinct to secure a transfer which they should then take to the registrar of the precinct in which they are now residing.

Boundaries Shown
Precinct boundaries are shown in the accompanying map. Registrars are to be located at their respective addresses below.

Absentee ballot privileges are available to persons who will be absent at election time or whose physical disabilities prevent them from going to the polls. Persons wishing absentee ballots should write to the county clerk's office for application blanks.

First Advance in Sugar Price Made

NEW YORK, June 26—The first advance in refined sugar prices by a major refiner since the industry was decontrolled last year was announced today by California and Hawaiian Sugar Refining Corporation.

The firm advanced its price of refined sugar to 7.65 cents a pound, effective at the close of business Monday. This is 15 points above the price on the Pacific coast and 25 points higher than in other marketing areas extending to Chicago.

When sugar was decontrolled, the selling price was 8.40 cents a pound. Prices drifted lower from that level but recent strength in raw sugar prices, if maintained, indicates a reversal of that trend. Currently, eastern refiners are selling at 7.90 cents a pound.

But, the institute adds, alcohol isn't the only cause of chromatinosis. It may be induced by over-indulgence in coffee and tobacco, or by nervous exhaustion, hysteria, or eye ailments.

Considerate
On one painting, "Careless Driving," which was labeled for \$15.00, he said in the caption, "I would have priced this painting at \$5.00, but I'm afraid some poor sucker would buy it."

Among the "screnhall art" were the following paintings bearing the artist's own description with the price and without frame:
"News Boy"—\$1.25, with frame \$4.51. This little scene is a masterpiece. However, it is completely disqualified for modern screnhall art because there is too much similarity between the painting and its title. Also it bears resemblance to objects that actually exist. The circles are too round, corners too square and the figure is not upside down. If you get any feeling out of this painting, the artist will not be responsible.

"The Nude Dog"—\$1.25, with frame \$4.51. This one was painted during one of my usual stomach spells, caused from an overdose of cheap hot dogs, thus the title, "The Nude Dog." The brushes were all dirty so I used an old rusty spoon. My choice of colors was made by spinning a bottle.

It seems a shame that modern screnhall artists should waste so much of their precious time when they could just as well let a donkey do it with his tail and get the same results. I would price this painting at \$5.00, but I'm afraid some poor sucker would buy it."

State Justice To File for Senate Race

BOISE, June 26 (AP)—State Supreme Court Justice Bert H. Miller, Boise, said today he had filed for United States senator on the Democratic ticket.

Justice Miller, 47, times elected Idaho attorney general, still has two and one-half years of his six-year term on the bench remaining.

He was first elected attorney general in 1933 and was reelected in 1934. From 1935 to 1940 he served as regional attorney for the fair labor standards act offices in Seattle.

He was again elected attorney general in 1940 and reelected in 1942. After passing up an offer to fill the unexpired term on the supreme court bench held by Judge William M. Morgan, Boise.

Justice Miller was candidate for the supreme court in 1944 and elected in the primaries on the non-partisan ballot. He is a native Idahoan.

There were indications Justice Miller would be opposed in the primaries by E. L. Gaumer, Salmon, state commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Gaumer said earlier he had taken out nominating petitions and contemplated filing for the U. S. senate.

TVA Power Not Bugaboo to Residents, Scribe Learns; Demands Are Built up

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP)—Critics describe the Tennessee Valley authority as an enemy of private enterprise. But many residents of the valley insist that TVA is the most helpful friend private enterprise ever had in this section.

Treated of injuring private business, TVA's friends insist that the system has created a new frontier of consumer demand so great that it may take years to supply.

Floyd Jones, manager of the Gibson County co-operative, with headquarters at Trenton, Tenn., believes this he can show any visitor, with facts and figures, just what a big boost TVA has been to private enterprise in his section.

"Pet Milk company has opened a dairy processing plant in our neighborhood," Jones says. "It processes 67,000 pounds of milk a day from 849 farms in four counties."

"At present there are only four milk coolers on these farms—but 125 others are in the market for milk coolers. At present only 10 have dairy water heaters, but approximately 200 others want dairy water heaters. Only a few have law driers and feed grinders now—but most are in the market for hay driers and feed grinders."

"That's business," Jones says. "Private business, private enterprise. It's business for the big manufacturers of electrical equipment." And it all can be traced directly to the work of TVA and the presence of TVA power, he added.

Other questions asked were jail sentence for drunken driving convictions, confiscation of offenders cars and cancellation of drivers licenses.

The ordinances, in so far as they pertain to liquor, are not within the scope of the punchboard act, are covered by the department as of no effect."

Planets Hold A Mysterious Charm for All

"The 'beginning' of our orderly planetary system has always held a mysterious charm for students of the starry skies. Theories regarding the processes of this far-away event have been varied. The most recent, the dust-cloud hypothesis of Dr. Fred L. Whipple of Harvard, has lately been given considerable space in the national magazines, scientific and otherwise.

Passing over the more ancient attempts at explanation, let us note first the beautiful nebular hypothesis published in 1857 by the brilliant French astronomer Laplace.

He assumed that the entire space from the present sun out to—and beyond—the orbit of the most distant planet, was once filled quite uniformly with a hot, gaseous nebula.

This entire mass in some way got to rotating in the same direction the planets now rotate around the sun. As it contracted toward the center it rotated faster and heated, and finally the outer portion broke off and left a detached ring "rotating on its own."

Later, a ring inside of this broke off, then another and another, until after the final contraction only our central sun remained. Finally the rings collapsed into the planets we now know.

The planetary condensations also left rings which collapsed into moons—all but one, which still remains around Saturn.

Laplace's theory was widely accepted until around 1900, when Professor Chamberlain and Moulton of the University of Chicago proposed the planetesimal hypothesis.

They believed that in the distant past our sun existed without planets. Then from the depths of space atomic-size dust grains charged into our region and passed so near our sun that large amounts of material were ejected from the latter.

Most of this ejecta, planetesimals, finally collected into the planets.

Many legitimate objections now confront both theories. Dr. Whipple suggests that since it is known that between the stars there now exists diffuse dust and gas, probably equal in mass to that of all the stars combined, it is quite possible that stars and planets may have formed from extrastellar dust clouds. He seems, however, to assume the existence of some stars before his process will start to work.

Light exerts a faint pressure—comes! falls pointing away from the sun furnish an example—so the existing starlight tends to drive widely-scattered gas and dust toward their shadow zones where they form dust clouds.

Gravitational forces finally exceed light pressure and the mass cloud, perhaps trillions of miles in diameter, begins to contract. (Just such contracting dust spots seen fairly certain on some astronomical photographs.)

Temperature increases with contraction. Denser portions develop the contracting cloud and spiral inward. These finally become the planets. The final contraction forms the sun. Some resemblance of Laplace's nebular hypothesis is seen here.

The Palisades dam, to be constructed on Snake river near the Idaho-Wyoming border when water distribution problems have been worked out, will look like the one sketched here. The project will make available supplemental water for 650,000 acres in Snake river valley already irrigated and a full supply for a block of new land, produce hydroelectric power and provide flood control benefits. The completed earth-fill barrier will be 268 feet high above the ground surface and 2,100 feet long. The mass of earth, totaling 12,000,000 cubic yards, will create a reservoir with a capacity of 1,400,000 acre-feet. A spillway tunnel, 21 feet in diameter and capable of by-passing 105,000 cubic feet of water per second, and also a 45,000-horsepower power plant will be constructed near the left abutment.
