U. S. Promises to Remain In Berlin Despite Sovietets

BERLIN, June 30 (AP)—The United States promised officially today "to stay" in Berlin regardless of the Russian blockade of Berlin, at the same time, the western allies are considering a direct approach to the Kremlin in an attempt to settle the controversy. The western allies' emergency air freight service drew a verbal assault from the official Soviet newspaper in Germany and some westerners feared a Russian attempt to restrict use of the air corridor food lifeline might be impending.

Official estimates put production so far this year at only a few units under 2,500,000. Most car makers say that "if nothing else doesn't happen" the factories will turn out at least as many vehicles during the latter half of the year.

Biggest Since 1929
If the prediction is realized, 1948 will go into the record books as the industry's record biggest production year. Largest single year's output was 2,538,420 cars and trucks built in 1929. That was the year the industry generally worked on a three-shift basis to meet the biggest demand it ever had known for passenger automobiles.

The car factories maintained an average of nearly 100,000 vehicles a week during this year's first half despite recurring materials and manpower shortages.

Many Shutdowns
The six months just ended saw nine Friday strikes tie up all Chrysler corporation plants; numerous short-work stoppages; two six-week shutdowns of all General Motors assembly plants because of materials shortage; a sharp curtailment of Ford output because of a three-model switch-over; a new round of wage increases and price advances on most cars and trucks.

So far only Ford has swung over to 1949 model production. Many industry analysts say fewer additional 1949 models will appear during the latter half of this year. The program in this respect, they say, has been changed materially because of the continued piling up of unfilled orders.

Model Change Unnecessary
The industry, of course, can sell all the cars it can make for the next two years or more. It does not need new models to stimulate an already enormous demand. But new model planning goes on for months. New tools are bought and once they are ready it is more economical to put them into use than to store them indefinitely.

Some car makers planning drastic model changes around next July. It is reported to have much new manufacturing equipment ready and standing by. When all the new equipment is ready, it is reported they will try to make the switch-over in a matter of days instead of weeks as in the past.

Two Mystery Diseases Are Breaking Out

NEW YORK, June 30 (AP)—Medical centers warned today that two mysterious diseases apparently are breaking out in their localized areas and may be reported the nation over in the future.

Each of the diseases resemble tuberculosis in that they leave scars on the lungs of survivors, oft-times mistaken for TB lesions.

"Jawbreaker" Names

Both ailments have names that are jawbreakers to pronounce. They have been considered so rare that medical centers hasn't got around to give them a layman's name.

One is known as histoplasmosis. The other is known as coccidioidomycosis.

For the sake of simplification, histoplasmosis will be known here as disease H, and coccidioidomycosis will be called disease C.

The warning that they were prevalent in their localized areas came from a Missouri medical group, and from two doctors of the New York regional office of the veterans administration.

One Found in West

The Missouri group said that disease H appears to be prevalent in the western United States, including such states as Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky, Tennessee, Missouri and Kansas, and that disease C is found in the arid areas of the west and southwest.

However, the Missouri doctors reported that disease C has now been reported at scattered areas in the United States, particularly since the end of the war. The New York doctors reported on two cases in New York City.

Stand by Tito Pushing Back 'Iron Curtain'

By J. M. ROBERTS, Jr.
AN Foreign Affairs Analyst
Tito can ride out the current storm of Russian disapproval, as suggested by the calm and apparent firmness of his hold in Yugoslavia, there is a chance that the iron curtain may be pushed back to the borders of Romania and Hungary.

At first glance it would appear that, if the Kremlin really decides to take over Yugoslavia or to impose another regime, it would have the power to do so. The fight apparently is on.
Communism Falls Goal
But what has been revealed so far indicates that communism has not succeeded in making itself the completely international force to which it aspires, and that nationalism is still its great stumbling block in eastern Europe.
Tito's party in Yugoslavia, while calling itself communist, has always displayed great nationalism. Political power is, to it, the important thing, not ideology. As head of the party, of the police and of the largest and finest army in southeastern Europe, as leader of the Yugoslav satellite state farthest removed from the red army, Tito is by no means helpless.

Russ May Use Troops
Some European observers have expressed the view that Russia is setting the stage for the use of troops to correct the "harmful position" Tito is accused of pursuing. If so, she is preparing to risk the outbreak of general war. The cards, to my mind, are not stacked just right for such an event now.

Even with Tito and his party appearing to buckle down to the central body of communist theory, the relationship between Yugoslavia and the rest of the Russian sphere will remain weakened and tenuous.

Tito Already Dictator
Tito already has what amounts to a military dictatorship. His economic situation is such that he is expected looking longingly toward his neighbors who are being bolstered by the Marshall plan.

He is still faced by strong though ineffective resentment among important segments of the neversubmitted population of Croats, Serbs and Slovenes.
To them, subjugation by force appears to knock down to the ground the appearance of calm and of continued Tito control in Yugoslavia may be a hoax. If it is not, the first question which the western nations will have to solve is whether and how they can help Yugoslavia in pushing back the iron curtain.

- 4 Cups Ground Berries (Any Variety)
- 2 1/2 Cups Sugar
- 1 Package M.C.P. Jam and Jelly Pectin

Wash, stem and grind 3 quarts fully ripe berries, or crush completely one jar at a time so that each berry is reduced to pulp. Measure exactly level cups crushed berries (add water to fill out last cup, if necessary) into a large kettle. (For Strawberry Jam and Black Raspberry Jam add 1/2 cup lemon juice to each 4 cups crushed berries). Add the M.C.P. Pectin, stir well, and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), mix well and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside, stir and skim for 5 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars, allowing 1/2-inch space for sealing with fresh pectin.

NOTE: If you cannot get paraffin, use the following "hot seal" method: Pour hot jam into glass jar. Then pour the jelly, screw lid on tightly (use 2-piece lid) and invert jar on lid until jam bubbles to top. This should keep jars bubble free and set upright. This keeps fruit evenly distributed.

By now he's tired of the country himself but still figures it's fine for the family. But is it? The country is a dangerous place to foreigners.

Little sister gets sunburned and cries all week. Then a bee stings her and she cries some more. Then she cries because she misses her playmates in the city. She's homesick.

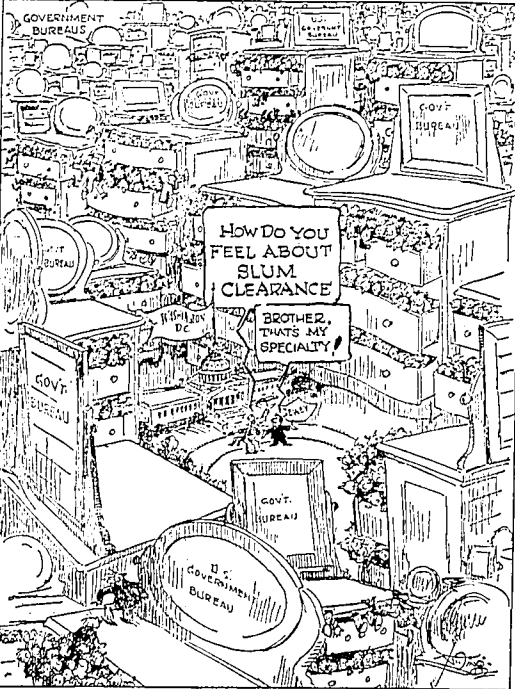
Junior almost drowns in a swimming hole. He's chased by a bull in the next pasture and tears his knee on a rusty wire going over the fence. Off he goes to a doctor to keep from getting lockjaw, but if ever there was anybody needed lockjaw it's Junior.

And mama? She's sick of ants by day and mosquitoes by night.

"I can't cook another day on this damned stove," she said. "When are we going to quit playing Swiss Family Robinson?"

So another empire dream crumbles. The family treks back to the city, and the merry rabbits, field mice and chipmunks move in again and take over what is left of that "little place in the country." When papa

Savant Avows Chivalry Just Polite Flirting

CHICAGO, June 30 (AP)—Chivalrous men at heart are nothing but "woolies," a Northwestern university professor said today. Girls should watch out for them, he warned.

"Chivalry is just a polite way of flirting," Prof. Bergen Evans said. "It is essentially courting and not kindness, as so many people seem to think."

Evans, who has spent years debunking popular misconceptions, said the rules of etiquette unfortunately do not permit a man to address a strange girl with "Hello, babe, how's about a date tonight?"

Resort to Tricks
To launch a romance, he said, a man has to resort to tricky methods of the chivalric code. Evans said this is much longer than the direct approach but in many ways a lot more fun.

Chivalry was popularized by the knights of the middle ages, Evans said, but the idea was distorted by the romantic writers of the 19th century.

"The idea that the knights of old fought dragons and black-hearted warriors because they were disproportionately devoted to the weak and oppressed is so much bunk," Evans said. "Knights fought for fair dummery only because they wanted to woo them."

Males Reluctant
Chivalry usually is displayed in proportion to the attractiveness of the woman or girl involved, Evans said. Men are very reluctant, he said, to give up their seats on a bus or street car to women who have little sex appeal.

"If they do," he said, "it is an act of pure kindness, not chivalry. It might also be a matter of shame. A man feels like a heel if he doesn't give his seat to a lady carrying a lot of packages."

Air Force Jet Planes Ready Ocean Flight

WASHINGTON, June 29 (AP)—American jet fighters will make their first transoceanic flight next week and conduct limited maneuvers in Germany, the air force announced today.

Eight P-51 Shooting Stars from the 56th fighter group will make the 5,200-mile trip from Selfridge air field near Ft. Glenn, Mich., to Paderborn, Germany, via the north Atlantic via the Cape Cod, Ireland and England. They will leave about July 7.

2 Bombers Go Along
The nearly 60-mile-per-hour fighters will be accompanied by two bombers, fitted out for rescue and weather reconnaissance work, and three transports carrying men and supplies.

While in Germany, the planes will be in charge of Lieut. Gen. Curtis E. Lemay, theater air force commander. The P-51s are scheduled to leave Selfridge under direction of Col. David C. Schilling, 56th group commander and wartime 6th air force ace. They will be in Europe about two weeks.

Groups Assigned
These jets precede by a month a 75-plane group being assigned permanently to Germany from the Panama canal zone. But that group, the 48th, will be ferried by rail, the State department and air force sources said. No diplomatic importance should be attached to the jet mission. The department gave routine clearance for the flight and the 48th is to be based at the British air station for a stopover at the royal air force base at Odiham.

Truman Approves Highway Aid Bill
WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—President Truman has signed a bill authorizing a \$400,000,000, 600,000 federal aid highway program.

The measure allows the expenditure of \$400,000,000 a year for each of the two years following July 1, 1949. Funds appropriated and allocated under the act must be matched by states.

As originally proposed in the house, the bill would have authorized a three-year program at \$200,000,000 a year.

A revised amendment, which would have permitted states to use federal aid funds on an unmatched basis for construction of national forest highways, was stricken from the final version that went to the president.

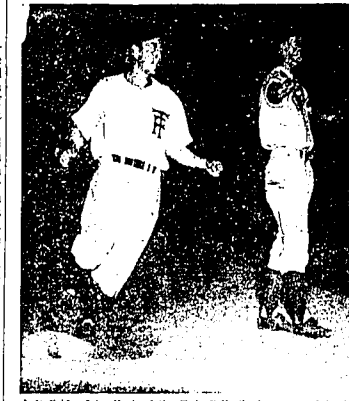

Farm Bureau Plans Aid for Flood Victims

WASHINGTON, June 30 (UP)—The agriculture department said today it will consider additional payments to Columbia river farmers who wish to plan special drainage, seeding or other techniques because of damage from the recent flood.

The time for approving such payments has gone by, but the department said it still will consider them. They are made by the production and marketing administration if farmers promise to initiate certain improvement measures.

Forms in 50 counties of Washington, Oregon and Idaho were affected by the flood, with at least three types of farming in jeopardy, the department said. These are irrigated grain farms in the Kootenai valley of Idaho; a large dairy farming area west of Portland; and the Okanogan valley area in Washington, where entire orchards were destroyed.

The department said its emergency loans to flood-stricken farmers will be administered by the farmers home administration state offices at Portland, Ore., Salt Lake City, Utah, and Bozeman, Mont. Applications should be made at a local county office. Loans will be

For emergency purposes only, not for farm expansion. Congress appropriated \$2,000,000 for flood relief. 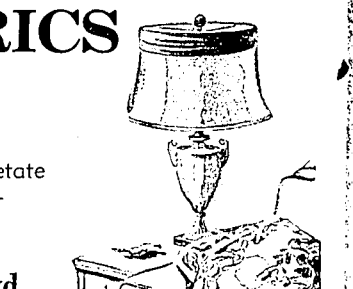

WASHINGTON, June 30—President Truman Tuesday signed a bill allowing the interior department to give financial aid to school districts for extra costs caused by reclamation bureau projects. The department will pay additional expenses which are due to increased student loans during construction. He also approved legislation authorizing a \$2,000,000 fund to aid schools which have war bonded enrollments.
