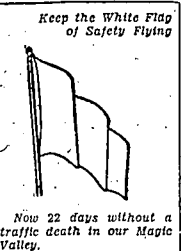


State Tenure Act Is Legal; Court Avows

essary to stop "worthless western marks" from flooding the east zone during currency revision. These emergencies could be found fended overnight.
Not Closed "Forever"
The Russians have never stated the routes were closed forever. It is the opinion of observers here the Soviets have made no attempt to plug the air route to Berlin because such a move would require force. The only way to stop a plane from flying is to shoot it down or force it to land. Alternately the airports might be seized. To do this, Soviet troops would have to invade the British and American sectors of Berlin.
Moves Not Desirable
No further retaliatory moves are left the western occupation commanders. They have cut off all supplies to the Soviet zone from western Germany, but these cannot be decisive.
Soviet loses through this retaliatory action cannot be compared with the enormous prestige they have lost.

BOISE, July 1.—American Legion officials have urged uniform pensions benefits for widows of World War I and II.

The northern rehabilitation American Legion clinic made the recommendation yesterday in the opening day of its meeting here. The clinic is being attended by Legion officials from Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana. Alaska is being represented by Washington members.

Under present pension law, World War I widows only receive pensions where the veterans died in action. World War II widows receive pensions regardless of the veteran died in action or of natural causes after the war.

Spud Price Help Declared at \$2.35

BOISE, July 1.—Idaho potatoes will be supported at \$2.35 per 100 pounds for U. S. number one grade in July and August, Harry C. Brandt, director of the Idaho potato production and marketing committee, said Wednesday.

He said this support is for potatoes graded and packed in new burlap or cotton bags and loaded for shipment in cartons or truckloads at country shipping points.

Brandt said support for potatoes graded U. S. number one and D or U. S. number two grade, 1 7/8 inches minimum diameter, packed and loaded as prescribed for number one's, will be \$1.75 per 100 pounds.

WASHINGTON, July 1.—The agriculture department has announced it will support growers' prices of 1948 crop wheat at a national average of \$2 a bushel at the farm.

This compares with a \$1.84 support price for last year's crop, and with an average of \$2.11 received by farmers of the parity price of grain as of July 1.

The July 1 parity price was determined to be \$2.22 a bushel.

N. Y. Riders Pay More for Subway

NEW YORK, July 1.—More than a million New Yorkers hustling to work on the city's complex transportation system fumbled for dimes instead of nickels in the mornings rush hour today.

The end of the 44-year-old five-cent fare, effective last midnight, was accomplished smoothly, the board of transportation said.

But many a subway and bus driver was confused. Riders who forgot to have a dime ready formed long lines at subway change booths. Many passengers transferring from rapid transit to city-operated bus routes forget to get transfers at the beginning of their trips. They had to pay additional fares.

Other riders on private bus lines put seven cents instead of nickel fares in coin boxes. Fares on city-operated buses went to seven cents.

Report Given On Farm for Burley Stake

BURLEY, July 1 — President Navel Baker, of Burley stake of the LDS church, has reported that crops on the church farm at Hunt are progressing with 300 acres planted in potatoes, grain and hay. Acres this year include 75 acres of potatoes, 150 acres of grain and 70 acres of hay. Baker said. Most of the work for the farm is donated. Supervisory work is under direction of Jay Marchant, who lives at the farm, along with 26 other people. The church plans to add a herd of milk cows to the ranch and a small orchard has been planted. Two large barracks buildings have been moved to the farm and are

being remodeled into six apartments to house workers. Herman Boes is supervising the building work. Plans call for the addition of a wash room and a utility building. The crops harvested are used for church welfare work, part of the produce being stored at the Burley warehouse and part being sent to the general storehouse at Salt Lake City. The 11 Burley wards participate in the project and many workers are donating their labor again this year. This is the third season of operation of the farm. Heavy equipment necessary for planting and harvesting has been purchased by the stake and is housed at the farm. Last year a parade of farm machinery reached many miles along the highway from Burley as the workers brought their equipment to the farm for harvesting or planting work. The first transcontinental telephone line was completed in 1915.

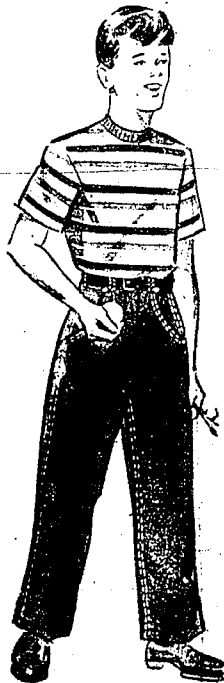

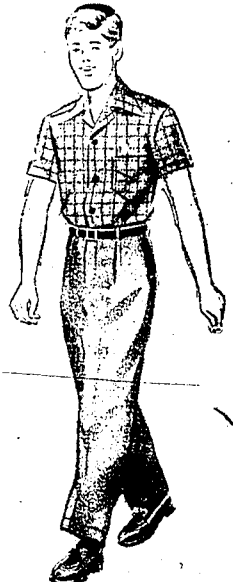

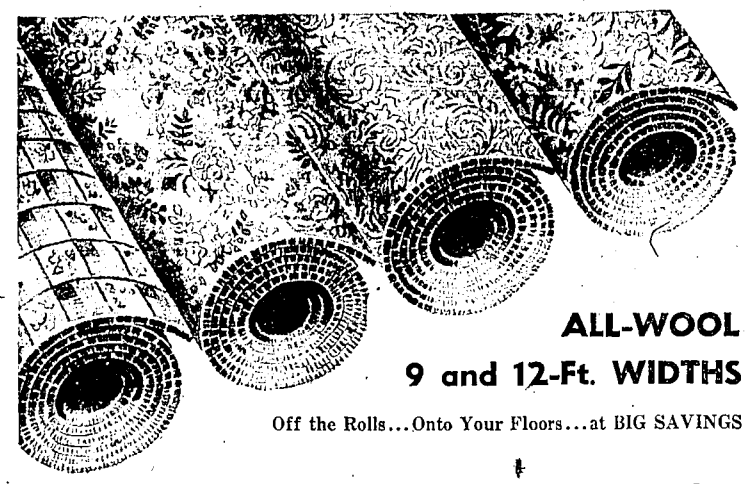

Higher Price, Less Supplies Seen on Meat

WASHINGTON, July 1 (AP)—Look for higher meat prices and less meat during the rest of this year, the agriculture department said today.

The meat supply always declines during the summer, the department pointed out in a report on the live-stock situation. At the same time, the general level of income is rising. During the first six months of this year farmers got 10 per cent more for meat than they did last year. They are likely to get still more during the second half of 1948.

As for future supply, the spring crop, which starts coping to market the latter part of this year, will be three per cent below last year and the smallest since 1941. The fall pig crop, coming along next spring and summer, is expected to be one per cent smaller than last year.

Livestock men sent 30,000,000 head of cattle and calves to slaughter last year—an all-time record. But Charles A. Hurnstette, a department meat expert, says this year's production may be the smallest since 1941. He pointed out that more cattle must be kept back from the market in the future if herds are to be increased.

Analyst Sees Confusion in Tito's Action

THEY say the chief failure to unseat the Yugoslav government, or perhaps in an effort to keep a slightly offended Tito from pulling the Yugoslav situation out of the mire now appear to be swinging over to the line that a party in international relations.

So many incidents have now been thrown into the stew created by the confusion that in Tito's regime that, as is frequently the case when communist ideology runs up against political facts, it doesn't make sense.

Two-Way Actions

Tito's party says it wants to be free of the influence of the same breath blast intervention in Yugoslavia's internal affairs, calls for a complete independence, and returns to the Moscow-disapproved campaign for a Balkan bloc.

And, of all things, the renewed Balkan bloc appeal is addressed to Bulgaria, which is ruled by General Dimitroff, a rival for the place in southeastern European affairs. Dimitroff is also the only anticommunist in the Balkan bloc. (Belgrade's reference to inclusion of Albania in the bloc means nothing, Albania already is a Yugoslav ally.)

No time to reply

Bulgary has had no time to reply regarding the bloc, but says with one side of her mouth her government is in the department, and the international crisis within the Communist party has nothing to do with the Balkan bloc. From the other side of her mouth her all-controlling communist national committee approves the cominform blast against Tito.

It may be some time before we are able to separate the real from the seeming in this crazy picture. The Marshall plan seems to be having its impact. Tito's unwillingness to force collectivization on his violently opposed peasants is a factor. Moscow and General Dimitroff both seem to have become painfully aware of Tito's size and independence. He has finished Zhdanov's "thought police." Setback in the communist-sponsored Greek civil war may be involved.

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Tot Is Happy Despite Rare Skin Disease

DENVER, July 1 (AP)—Maxine Perry, 11, doomed by an incurable illness, played happily in her home today, cheered by thousands of cards from mothers across the nation and by her own calm belief that "I am going to heaven very soon."

The little girl has been told by the family doctor that she may die at any time, "in days or perhaps months." Each Sunday the Rev. Carl Maler, pastor of the First Congregational church in Denver, comes to the modest Perry home to join the bright-eyed girl in prayer.

Prospect Counterbalanced
Maxine's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Chester Perry, said that the prospect of death had been almost counterbalanced by the well wishes of thousands of people, most of them mothers themselves, who had stamped the Perry home with "get well" cards, letters of encouragement and gifts.

"She used to be shy, and would stay in the bedroom when we had company," Maxine's mother said. "Now since so many nice people took an interest in her, she seems to have brightened up."

No Answer Found
The best doctors have searched for an answer to Maxine's slow battle with death. They found none. They told Mrs. Perry her youngster might die any time and probably within six months.

Since birth, Maxine's "skin deficiency"—which her mother explains "falls to cement together the layers of skin"—has made every ungentle touch leave an angry red bruise.

Maxine, who wears a pink ribbon jauntily in her blond curls, weighs only 40 pounds. Her round, pink face smiles despite the slight bruises on her cheek.

Universe Said Over 3 Billion Years of Age

PASADENA, Calif., July 1 (AP)—Research with the 100-inch Mt. Wilson telescope indicates the universe is 3,640,000,000 years old, a report to the American Astronomical society said today.

The earth, Dr. Guy C. Omer, Jr., said may be as much as 300,000,000 years younger.

He said the terrific nuclear blast which formed the universe sent out concentric circles of matter much as a stone tossed into a millpond.

Long Measure
The circle today may measure 120,000 million, million, million miles, Omer estimated in his report to 200 leading astronomers meeting at California Institute of Technology.

He said the explosion would make a convenient date for figuring time anything before that time being negative, and since positive.

Went Hazard Guess
Omer wouldn't even guess as to what form of matter the explosion originated from.

Dr. Otto J. Eggen, of Wisconsin's Washburn observatory, set forth a "simple relationship" between stars' brightness and their temperatures. The hottest stars are blue and the coolest are red, he said.
