Minidoka Project To Be Considered In Colorado Meet

WASHINGTON, July 2 (AP)—An effort will be made to work out something definite for the Minidoka (Ida.) north side project at the reclamation bureau's program meeting at Long Lake, Colo., July 12. W. E. Warner, assistant secretary of the Interior, Gov. C. A. Robinson and Senator Dvorshak, R., Ida., said they would ask R. J. Newell, regional reclamation director, to come prepared to discuss the project. The interior appropriation bill carried \$147,500 for an investigation of underground water supplies for the area. By this means, the bureau has said it may be able to irrigate 25,000 acres in addition to between 12,000 and 13,000 to be irrigated from the Snake river.

Plane Beams Said Jammed Across Reich

BERLIN, July 2 (AP)—U. S. air force officials said today they suspect the Soviet Union is jamming possible Soviet interference with the radio beam used by American pilots flying food to the blocked Berlin.

Tito Rebellion May 'Tighten' Reds' Control

An outstanding question now is whether Tito's rebellion will lead to a preventive tightening of the Kremlin's screws on other satellites.

In other words, will Russia move to forestall other displays of independence? Could it lead to direct incorporation of the captive states within the Soviet union?

Last fall Czechoslovakia refused to accept a security council seat, which would have made her a Soviet puppet in the United Nations. She got her ears slapped off in Moscow for wanting to participate in the Marshall plan. It became evident at once that her days of comparative liberty were numbered. The Kremlin soon reduced her to the level of the other satellites.

Then "Little Joe," who had been acting more like Big Joe than any of the communist dictators, was kicked over the board. To the Kremlin, he must look like the unkindest cut of all. What can the communists expect from other captive countries where the patriots are merely held under a lid rather than subjugated?

Already there are reports of trouble in Romania. The collectivization fight, in which Tito tempered the application of communist policy to the wishes of his peasants, is also on in Hungary. The Poles, the Magyars, the Rumanians, the Serbs, all have known for centuries the unceasing fight for freedom.

Tito has shown no sign of turning away from communism. But he is challenging the concept of communism which makes it an international force whose creed transcends nationalism and governmental sovereignty.

He is challenging the right of the Soviet and its tool, the conformist, to dictate the policy of communist parties in the individual countries.

ALL WRONG BOT JOHN. Those who can remember back to World War I may recall a song called "They Were All Out of Step but Jim." Change the Jim to John and it might serve as a theme song for Representative Taber, chairman of the house appropriations committee and the man who wielded the big knife in trimming the ACA aid budget.

That appropriation is the fruition of the Marshall plan. And the Marshall plan was the subject of 10 months' discussion, inspection, hearings and debate. Mr. Taber was in on all of it. He even took a quick trip to Europe and returned with the surprising news that there was no hunger abroad.

That was in variance with the findings of the war's colleagues who took a similar junket, as well as the findings of other explorers to Europe. But apparently the rest of the company was all out of step.

The money needed for foreign aid and the amount and kind of goods it should buy were determined only after exhaustive inquiry. Experts and the members of the committee agreed. The President and his advisers struck a new balance. Then congress took a long and sharp look at this tremendous war-list. The final figure decided on was no rubber stamp of anybody's dictation. It appeared to be a fair and intelligent compromise.

Then—hay foot, straw foot—came Mr. Taber. With the blessing of the house leadership he started swinging the knife. When he got through a lot of people were up in arms, including many of his fellow Republicans.

The quarter-amputated ACA appropriation bill went to the senate. Secretary Marshall and ACA Director Hoffman repeated some of their earlier testimony. Mr. Taber defended his cuts, and the state department answered the defense in a public statement. The answer was that Mr. Taber must have got some figures wrong. Generally he picked out sums of money without relating them to the whole picture.

So the senate restored most of the house cut. The senate cut the amended bill. Mr. Taber announced that the figures he needed for ACA was enough. Never mind what all the close students of the problem had said. They were out of step.

THE BEAT WE CAN MAKE. Mr. Taber's explanations is that he wants the effects to work. He says that Germany's per capita grain consumption this year will be almost as large as ours, and that France and Italy will be about the same.

DIPLOMACY—John Forster Dulles of New York has been boozed for secretary of state. Dewey's nomination appeared inevitable. He has a long and distinguished career in foreign affairs, besides serving as secretary of state under Presidents Hoover and Truman.

CANDIDATES—A likely candidate for secretary of the treasury is Joseph P. Kamp, board chairman of the Chase National bank and a director in numerous financial, industrial and insurance companies. He was born in New York and is the son of the former president who wrote the tariff act which so antagonized Republicans.

POWER—Two cabinet posts which do not always get much publicity have leaped into prominence and controversy for the first time. Interior and agriculture. The tremendous development of natural resources during the war, the depletion of fuel supplies and the ranking assignment. The power supply and price inflation account for agriculture's higher rating.

CONSERVATIVES—Two active candidates are Rep. Ben F. Jensen of Iowa and Rep. John W. Bricker of Ohio on the federal communications commission but a former member of the house. Jones served as chairman of the committee on the communications and power problems, and was an avowed Ickes biter. Jensen now heads that important subcommittee.

DECISION—No particularly outstanding names have been suggested for labor or commerce. It is not believed that any decision on the nomination will be made until after the various labor groups have taken their stand during the progress of the campaign. The labor groups are expected to rebuild commerce in an attempt to boost world trade, and if elected, he will undoubtedly give long thought to making this appointment.

VIEWS OF OTHERS. BROTHERS IN DISASTER. The Vermont disaster has shown, overnight, how artificial are the social, racial and religious barriers which separate against each other. In the face of common disaster, the challenge of the disaster is to the humanitarian impulses of the unharmed, the people of Vermont were not found wanting.

"I never had any use for steam—and I still don't," he said stubbornly.

Few Veterans Alive
Few veterans of the era of sail are still alive. There are only two—Chase and George O'Neil, 81—among the 400 retired mariners living in the "Sailors Snug Harbor" here, a home for old salts.

"The others aren't sailors—they're just poor old crippled hodgepodes," said Chase. He talks neither of the seaman nor the ships of today measure up to those in the days of the clippers.

He raves away himself from his Maine home at 12 to work under sail. "It was in the Pacific Indian trade."

Loved Sail
"I loved sail and I guess I stayed with it too long," he said. "When I turned from sail to steam it was too late. I never did get to understand steam."

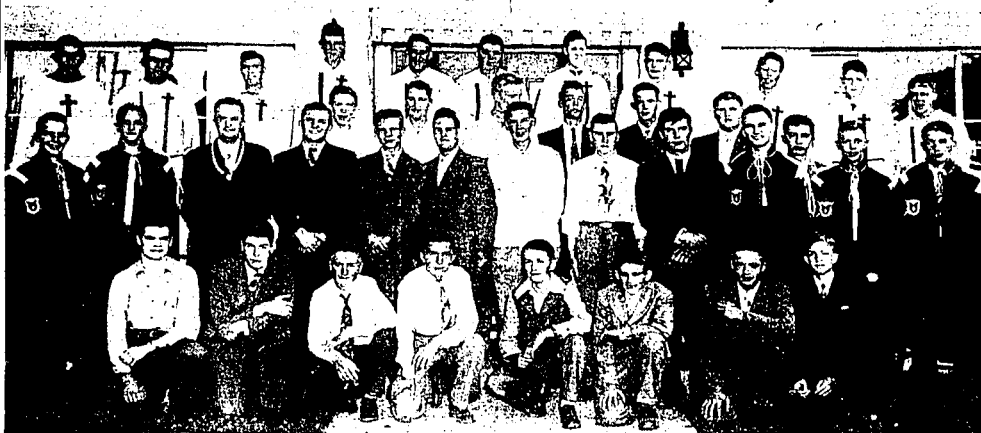
Chase spends his time now carving models of the graceful ships with crowding sails in which he spent his life.

"I remember there used to be three to five ships in San Francisco every day," he said. "They were small ships—only about 60 feet long. We used to have two to three hundred pigs and maybe a half dozen smokes on deck. About the third day the deck would be covered with flies, and the passengers'd begin to complain."

Life Cruel
"A sailor's life then was a cruel and prolonged duel with weather and ship."

Bean Studies Fund Okayed, Senator Avers

WASHINGTON, July 2 (AP)—Money has been allocated by the agriculture department for two projects to aid northwest bean growers, Senator Dworshak, R., Idaho, said yesterday.

Both studies will be conducted at a laboratory operated by the bureau of entomology at Twin Falls, Idaho.

"The bureau of plant industry will conduct one in cooperation with state agencies. It will aim at increased seed production of dry and snap beans through breeding and multiple resistance to insect damage. The department has allocated \$20,000 for the year's work."

In the other, the bureau of entomology and plant quarantine has been assigned to study means for control of the leaf hopper or white fly which is the cause of curly top virus. It was given \$10,000 for the year.

The programs were recommended by three representatives of bean growers who conferred here recently with Senator Dworshak and E. A. Meyer, head of the production and marketing administration. They were Bert Barlow of Hazelton, James Shields of Buhl and Carl D. Irwin of Kimberly.

WASHINGTON, July 1 (AP).—The planning of a street radio party this week-end for a fine, upstanding old-timer in the nation's capital. The Washington monument.

It should be quite a show—parade fireworks, a pageant, a radio speech by President Truman (11 a. m. M-F, Saturday) all recalling that the cornerstone of the great white needle was laid 100 years ago.

But it promises to be small potatoes compared with the truck raised on July 4, 1848, after the cornerstone-laying ceremony itself.

Backwoodsmen hoisted jacks upward on the street corners, blazes pranced and cartwheeled. Firecrackers popped and thundered at the houses of fertilized horses, and put crimson licks to scampering flight.

President and Mrs. Polk threw a glittering full-dress party in the White House. Army brass, loaded with honors from the Mexican war, harrumphed in dignified sobriety. Mrs. P. wouldn't allow any hard stuff in the house.

Fred outside. In the unlighted muddy streets, the common people whooped it up with no prohibition. They broke out between friends and upholders of slavery. Flight broke out from the simple, savage joy of fighting.

It was, said a newspaper reporter on the spot, "one of the most splendid and agreeable days Washington has ever witnessed."

Anybody who thinks congressional law is too slow should look nowdays should read the story of the Washington monument.

A monument to the soldier-president was first proposed in Washington's own lifetime. Congress voted and act for the purpose until 1876-77 years after Washington's death and 28 years after the monument was laid.

Old-timers at the monument felt of the senator who used to fortify himself with wine and climb the 533 feet, 8 1/2 inch obelisk.

"Because," he thundered, "this is the one way I can look down on that so-called 'the White House'!"

There then was the southern gentleman who came to town in 1935, when the monument was enclosed in scaffolding because the PWA was cleaning it.

He grabbed the telephone and called his own home in Idaho things "This is the last straw," he snapped. "I'm going to sell the Washington monument—he's got it packed already!"

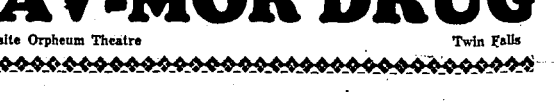
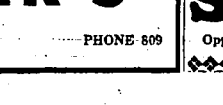
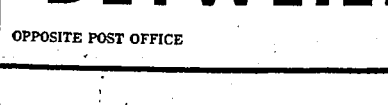

Huge Market Deal of Clerk Is Unmasked

WASHINGTON, July 2 (AP)—A mystery woman on the government payroll was reported today to have parlayed her \$44,000 salary into a \$10,000,000 market operation that netted her "substantial profits."

The story of her financial high-lucks was told by a special house committee investigating government employees. The investigation said she found an evidence that the lucky woman or any of the other 22 federal federal workers on the list had profited through "inside information."

Clerk for Navy

The report identified the female financial genius merely as a "clerk in the navy department."

Committee Chairman August H. Anderson, R. Minn., added a few more details. She's about 35, he said, well-mannered, but "prissy reticent about the whole thing."

"She said she had been speculating for a long time," Anderson told the committee. "She has been with the government more than 15 years."

Didn't Cover "Rust"

The report dealt only with her speculative activities in the two-year period ending Dec. 31, 1947—and did not cover any of her profits or losses in the big market break last February.

It showed that the lady played the field during those two years. She speculated in 1,785,000 bushels of wheat, 238,000 bushels of corn, 720,000 bushels of oats, 50,000 bushels of rye, 270,000 pounds of beans, 1,800 pounds of cottonseed, 25,200 bales of cotton, and 49 carloads of eggs.

Price About \$103,159.99

The market price of these commodities, the report said, was approximately \$103,159.99. It is estimated, the report concluded, "that this employee realized substantial profits."

The committee is continuing its investigation and its next report may indicate how the feminine speculator with far less extensive holdings cleaned up—and some lost their shirts.

Holden Withdraws Senate Candidacy

BOISE, July 2 (AP)—State Supreme Court Justice Edwin M. Holden has changed his mind about being a Democratic candidate for United States senator.

Justice Holden said he was considering running for the office. Yesterday he said he was not a candidate.

In a prepared statement, he said "the people by constitutional amendment amended the constitution of this state out of politics and placed it on a high non-partisan plane. The purpose of the amendment was, of course, to take the court out of politics and at one and the same time, take politics out of the court."

"To keep the court on the high plane the people placed it, I would feel it necessary for me to resign if I became a candidate for the office. Therefore I will not be a candidate."

Bert H. Miller, another state supreme court justice, said last week he would be a candidate for Democratic senatorial nomination.

The last Fourth of July I really celebrated with a bang was the one in 1944, which found me in Brisbane, Australia. Fresh from many months on Bougainville, I sported a beard, the stripes of a sergeant, a tiger, first class, was my rank, a few hundred bucks in my kick, and a great, big duck.

Yes, a great, big duck, with webbed feet, a bill like a steam shovel and a honk reminiscent of a French laid horn.

I fell for it on the duck on the day I arrived in Brisbane, which was July 3. I won it at a raffish on Adelaide street. I paid a shilling for a chance, my number was drawn, and the raffish operators handed me this mighty mass of muscle and feathers. It was held at first sight between us, but as a man who had been eating Bougainville fare I was determined to keep that duck until I could get it cooked.

Unfortunately, I wasn't staying at a place where ducks were welcome. My home was the Red Cross club, and I was sharing a less than commodious room with a platoon of soldiers and sailors. We also had stacked cordwood in bunk beds which seemed to reach to the sky, and my bunk was a top one. To reach it I had to climb, monkey like, up the bunks of my comrades in arms. I am positive that my bunk, so high was it, some day will swim into the view of the man who ran the Palmyra telescope and be hailed as a new planet.

New Wonder: Radio Without Vacuum Tube

By HOWARD W. BLAKESLEE
Associated Press Science Editor

NEW YORK, July 1 (AP)—A new scientific wonder, a radio set with no vacuum tubes, that plays instantly when turned on, was unveiled yesterday.

The heart of this set is a few bits of metal, as big as match heads. These solid bits do the same work as intricate, conventional radio tubes.

Smaller sets are possible—but whether the size of wrist watches is not yet known.

The new sets, shown by the Bell telephone laboratories, does not need to warm up before it plays. It comes right on when the power comes on, and it does not glow like the vacuum tubes. It is not as bright as the fluorescent tubes, but it does not glow like the vacuum tubes.

The set still is under experiment. These solid bits are on the market. Bell scientists, who made it, have discovered a new principle of electronics and expect this principle to have many uses in addition to sets.

In many uses of radio tubes the set uses little metal cylinders, hollow, not much larger than the metal tips of shoe horns. At the base of each bit is a match-head size bit of metal that does the new radio miracle.

Workers Respond To Hartley's Plea

WASHINGTON, July 2 (AP)—Chairman Hartley, R. N. J., of the house labor committee, said today he had received "dozens of letters from union workers volunteering to tell the 'inside story' of communist leadership in labor unions."

The offer came less than 24 hours after Hartley, co-author of the Taft-Hartley law, urged union members to "come forward" and tell what they know about the infiltration of communism in unions.

Hartley made the appeal yesterday during hearings before a house labor subcommittee. Protection was promised any workers who volunteered to testify.

"I am sure that the house group will hold closed-door hearings in the immediate future, perhaps in New York city," he said in a letter to Maj. Gen. S. P. Merkulov, Soviet communist resume in the north.

ROME, July 2 (AP)—From the Alps to Sicily an estimated 3,000,000 Italian workers left their jobs at noon today in a last-day strike directed against the anti-communist government of Premier Alcide De Gasperi.

"There was no violence in the first hours of the walkout, which was led by industrial workers who closed every plant and factory, but special police squads were alerted in all possible trouble tonight, when population riots were planned.

Thousands of store employees, local sympathy with the industrial workers, and other labor groups went out in the first of a series of leftist-directed demonstrations against the government.

The labor situation is destined to half bring for economic reasons, stop plant shutdowns, and win general wage increases and domestic family allowances.

A similar nationwide work stoppage for half a day will occur July 6, when chemical workers will lead the agitation. The nation's electric power workers will go out from 9 a. m. to 11 a. m. July 7, although essential public services will be kept running. On July 8 the steelworkers will lead the walkout, and on July 9 the glass, ceramics and hemp workers of Italy will lead the last of the series of strikes.

Vet Bonus Voted By North Dakota

BISMARCK, N. D., July 2 (AP)—Results from North Dakota's primary election showed today that grants bonus, banned Catholic nuns as public school teachers and denied control of the state Republican party to the Non-Partisan league.

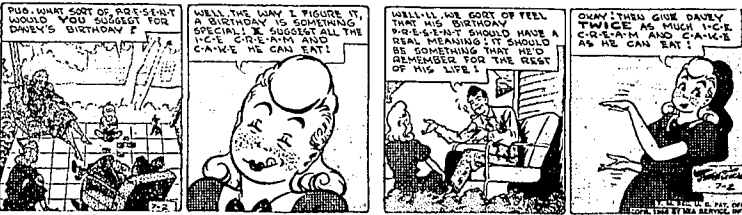

British Folk 'Set' for Life By New Plan

LONDON, July 2 (AP)—After next Monday, if government plans work out, two men, woman or child in Britain who for any reason is without means need remain destitute.

That is the high hope held out by government spokesmen, July 2 is the date set for the beginning of another ambitious social plan, the national insurance and assistance program.

Opponents Fear Plan

It's a date, say many economists and welfare workers, which should be a milestone in sociological history. Opponents fear it will be the beginning of complete regimentation and total regulation of individuals by the government.

However, the nation is committed to the plan. Everyone from the king to the youngest apprentice in the smallest shop will be insured and protected, and will pay for it whether he wants to or not.

Many Benefits

The program entitles practically everyone to a great variety of benefits, including pensions, unemployment, sickness and death payments, free medical, dental and hospital care.

The insurance plans are vital parts of the social security program. They include most of the essentials of the famous "cradle to grave" plan, which the labor government has been developing step by step, into five dovetailing projects: (1) National insurance, (2) industrial injuries insurance, (3) family allowances, (4) National assistance and (5) National health service (free medical and hospital care for everyone).

Real Town Is Slated at Site Of War Base

SALT LAKE CITY, July 2 (AP)—Kearns, Utah, today got the green light that may restore it to some of the glory it held as Utah's third largest city during the war.

The action followed announcement by the war assets administration in Denver that the huge former army air force overseas replacement center in southwest Salt Lake county has been awarded to Standard Surface, Inc.

New York playwright and businessman Arthur Caplan, organizer of the purchasing firm, said today his firm has already begun to clear old buildings from the Kearns site.

Caplan's group plans to build 100 new housing units within the next few months. He said two square miles of the new pacelime Kearns, Utah, will be dotted by homes, stores, grocery stores, commercial enterprises and possibly some industrial sites.

Caplan plans to arrive in Utah July 11 to supervise personally the construction of Utah's newest frontier city. Kearns housed 40,000 persons during its wartime career.

Heavy Toll For Spuds Below U. S. No. 2 Grade

TOKYO, July 2 (AP)—The U. S. army food corps announced officially today there were 12,288 casualties in Monday's earthquake at Fukui.

Tactical troops in the disaster area counted 1,595 dead, 2,662 injured seriously, and 8,021 treated for minor injuries, a corps spokesman said.

The count is still incomplete.

Shipment Banned For Spuds Below U. S. No. 2 Grade

IDAHO FALLS, July 2 (AP)—Potatoes graded below U. S. No. 2 will not be shipped in interstate commerce, under regulations governing 1948 Idaho potato shipments, Mel Stratford, manager of the Idaho Potato and Onion Shippers association, announced.

The regulations were released by the administrative committee of the association yesterday.

The order also requires that all potatoes including both rail and truck lots shall be inspected.

In addition, the committee recommended an order prohibiting the shipment in interstate commerce of any netted Gem or Russet Burbank.

varieties below a minimum diameter of two inches.

The two-inch minimum requirement must first be approved by the secretary of agriculture, Stratford said. The committee declared that the public expects a large Russet potato from Idaho and the inclusion in some packs of a relatively small percentage of potatoes below a two-inch minimum has been detrimental to the best interests of the potato industry.
