## Pressure to Draft Like General Backing In National Drive

The pressure to draft General Dwight D. Eisenhower for the Democratic presidential nomination built up to rivet-popping intensity today. Something has to give soon, with the Democratic convention opening a week from Monday. The We-Wants-Like sentiment, already feverish among southern political leaders, appeared to be moving to Illinois, California, New York, New England and other areas with important chunks of delegates.

Eisenhower, secure behind the ivy of Columbia university, wasn't saying anything. He said, however, that the general was standing on the Leonard V. Flander, New Hampshire newspaper publisher who sounded him out about running for president on the Republican ticket.

He said at that time: "I am not available for and could not accept nomination to high political office."

Not interested. "My declaration to remove myself from the political scene is definite and positive."

With such plain words on the record, it was difficult for the general's friends to see how he could track even in the face of the mounting draft movement.

President Truman, who apparently is surging ahead with gathering speed. President Truman, who says he won't withdraw and who predicts his own nomination on the first ballot, took no direct action to back track even in the face of the mounting draft movement.

Outside the south, where agitation over the administration's civil rights program made the anti-Truman rebellion most obvious, the most ominous news for the President came yesterday from the South.

Mayor William O'Dwyer released a telegram, signed by James Roosevelt, and other Democratic leaders, calling on the national convention delegates to pick "the ablest and most manly candidate for the presidential nomination."

The telegram directed that "the ablest and most manly candidate" be selected.

### Finnish Reds Drop to Third After Election

HELSINKI, July 3 (AP)—Communist dropped to third rank among Finnish political parties today as counting returned in the nationwide parliamentary elections headed completion.

But it was believed that a new government will be formed on the same basis as the present one—a coalition including the communists, the social democratic and agrarian parties.

**Less Six Seats**  
The popular democrats (communists), also known as the democratic union, appeared to lose six seats, leaving them 45 representatives in the new parliament.

The social democrats picked up four for a total of 33, and the agrarians gained two for a total of 40.

About 1,140,000 votes of an approximate 1,700,000 votes cast had been tabulated in round figures, there were the results: social democrats 347,000; agrarians 346,100; popular democrats (communists) 270,000; conservatives 234,000; Swedish party 128,000; liberals 62,200; others 5,100.

**Conservatives Gain**  
The conservatives picked up three seats for a total of 32, while the Swedish party lost two and will have only 12 and the liberals lost one and will have only eight.

The count was on a complicated proportioning system, and exact figures probably will not be available for some time.

### Jury Asks Death For Wells Slayer

ELKO, Nev., July 3 (AP)—An all-male jury decreed today in the Nevada state gas chamber for Lazaro Vargas, 19, in the rape slaying of a young minister's wife.

The former Hungarian divinity student was convicted last night of first degree murder. The jury was out less than an hour.

Although first degree murder carries a mandatory life term, the jury—mostly cattlemen—added a specific recommendation that Vargas be executed in the gas chamber.

District Judge Taylor H. Wines set July 7 for sentencing.

Varga, who says he is a survivor of a coal concentration camp, received the verdict with a faced smile. He was convicted of the slaying last March 22 of Mrs. Billie Rahe Moran, 22-year-old wife of the Presbyterian minister at Wells.

### GOP Leader Predicts Tax Cut for 1950

WASHINGTON, July 3 (AP)—Chairman Harold Knutson of the house ways and means committee said today that Republican congress next year would make "substantial reductions in excise taxes" and possibly "a further cut in income taxes in 1950."

The Minnesota Republican made the prediction in a formal statement committing to a yesterday's treasury announcement of a \$8,400,000,000 budget surplus for fiscal 1948.

**GOP Made Surplus**  
Knutson claimed that the surplus was made possible by the economy drive of the Republicans in the 80th congress. He said the economies were effected "without any real cooperation from the administration."

"With the election of a Republican President next year, the country will be able to get back on a sound fiscal basis as waste in reckless spending of the people's money will be stopped," Knutson said. "It will enable us to provide further relief for taxpayers and remove from the budget the shackles put on by the Democratic administration."

**Bilateral Report**  
Knutson ridiculed advanced treasury estimates on the budget picture. He said the original treasury estimate for fiscal 1948 was for a \$202,000,000 surplus.

Knutson characterized President Truman as "the greatest peace-time spender" in the nation's history. "His requests for money to be spent have exceeded even those of predecessor, Franklin D. Roosevelt," he said.

### Third Party Sets State Meeting to Discuss Policies

BOISE, July 3 (AP)—Idaho's third party will hold a district meeting at Coeur d'Alene July 11. Sam R. Evans, the party's national committee chairman for Idaho, said today.

He said the party members will discuss policy and probably will determine whether to advance nominee candidates for the three congressional posts in Idaho this year.

Evans said Ben. Glen H. Taylor, the third party vice presidential candidate, will attend the meeting. He said delegates to the party's national convention in Philadelphia July 23 will be selected at the conference.

Evans said about 50 third party members from southern Idaho will attend the meeting.

Evans said "some of the boys up north want to put up congressional candidates this election and that will be thrashed out at the meeting."

### Jersey Takes Lead in June Milk Figures

Top honors in milk and butterfat production in June went to Fib, a registered Jersey owned by L. A. Hansen, Twin Falls, according to Carl Daloo, official tester for the Dairy Herd Improvement association.

Fib won individual honors by producing 1,290 pounds of milk and 928 pounds of butterfat.

**Holstein Second**  
The Jersey Holstein owned by Soren Jensen, Buhl, was second with 1,827 pounds of milk and 893 pounds of butterfat.

Thirty-two herds were represented, according to the complete June report, with 628 cows in milk and 52 cows dry. The average per cow was 914 pounds of milk and 34 pounds of butterfat.

**President Okays Vets' Pay Rise**

WASHINGTON, July 3 (AP)—President Truman has signed into law a bill to increase veterans' disability pensions.

One hike penalizes disabled veterans as well as dependents. The other raises all pensions for peace disabilities from 75 to 80 per cent of the rate for combat and for all other disabilities.

A 100 per cent disabled veteran with a wife but no child will get an increase of \$21 a month—from \$138 to \$159—if he suffered disability during wartime. His increase will be \$18 a month if he has a pre-war disability.

Other monthly increases for wartime disabilities include:

- Wife with one child, \$35 a month; two children, \$45.50; wife, three or more children, \$56.

**Meat Yield Said Lower in Idaho**

BOISE, July 3 (AP)—Idaho will have a meat supply this year that will be 10 per cent under 1947, V. D. Kennedy, assistant extension economist of the University of Idaho, said today.

Kennedy said there are fewer cattle on farms and ranches and fewer cattle put on grain feed since last summer. He said there are also fewer hogs on farms and ranches and fewer pigs crop was lower than last year.

During the first quarter of 1948, he said, the average number of cattle below the same period last year, Kennedy said.

### French Engineer Sees Fertilizer Made

**Chief Learns Farmers Lax**

Thursday was the deadline for Twin Falls county farmers to eradicate or control their noxious weeds. On Friday, Harry Gray, county weed control director, made a brief aerial survey and reached the conclusion that many farmers failed to meet the deadline set by county commissioners.

Gray said notices will be sent to farmers who have failed to comply with weed regulations and warned, "they can take care of it, or the county will. We're not going to let these weeds go to seed, especially Canadian thistle, which blows all over."

The law gives the county weed bureau the power to effect noxious weed control or eradication through whatever means become necessary, he pointed out. On future aerial surveys, he plans to take his aerial "men." "We may not be able to see weed patches from the roadside," he declared, "but we certainly can from the air."

Gray, who pilots his own plane, said he will have to arrange for morning glory in bloom on his Friday flight. "What wasn't white with morning glory was purple with Canadian thistle," he added.

Most farmers who told the weed bureau they had made arrangements for small patches of weeds on their farms have lived up to their word, Gray said, but warned an aerial survey is a sure way of finding those who have not gotten around to take care of their weeds as promised.

### Frenchman Comes to Valley to Inspect Big Fertilizer Plant

By HARRY ARNOLD

Claude de Montgolfier, father of three boys, saw his first baseball game here when the Cowboys beat the Reds 1 to 3 in a game which displaced nearly every fan of American baseball.

But de Montgolfier, whose ancestors early in European history brought papermaking processes from China to France, didn't come here from his suburban home near Lyons, France, just to learn about baseball.

He has spent the past several days inspecting the Idaho Organic Fertilizer company's pilot plant here and organic-treated farms so that he can take back to France the process of making organic fertilizer. De Montgolfier is a metallurgical and chemical engineer and although he comes from a long line of papermakers, his specialty is chemical fertilizer work. He said he feels the development of organic fertilizer processes is extremely important to France, for that nation cannot rely entirely upon mineral fertilizers and because organic fertilizer is a better product than the manure from which it is made.

Accompanying de Montgolfier here was John P. Martin, New York representative of the International CEO company, a French industrial concern that is manufacturing for France and North Africa. De Montgolfier will be licensed to use the process in France by the International CEO company and they will work together in developing the process.

Martin has inspected fertilizer plants throughout the country, and said the digester used here is the first he has seen. He said he believes it is the only one used in this country and one of the few in the world.

Organic fertilizer manufacture starts with organic waste materials such as manure, vegetable waste, garbage and sewage sludge. These waste materials are inoculated with selected bacterial cultures which convert the waste to humus containing bacteria necessary to plant growth.

In a local process, manure and feed house cleanings are treated with bacteria bought from the fertilizer laboratory. A gallon of bacteria is sufficient for hundreds of pounds of the product.

Technically, the process is known as "decomposition," but Edwin Rathke, secretary of the local firm, says it is merely hurrying Mother Nature along. Martin and de Montgolfier have been shown the local plant by Mrs. Rathke, Charles Silverwood, manager, and Walter Larson, president.

Although there is considerable local usage of the product, most of

It is shipped to hop fields in Washington. De Montgolfier was taken to see the Elmer Tyler farm near Piler as a typical diversified American farm. Along with a variety of other crops, Tyler has several acres in hops.

The digester at the local plant, which so impressed Martin and de Montgolfier, was described by Mrs. Rathke as a \$40,000 investment. It is 18 feet in diameter and 21 feet high. It has eight decks where the materials, moving from top to bottom, are aerated and separation takes place.

De Montgolfier and Martin were also quite interested in a compaction machine invented by Mrs. Rathke. It is similar to the digester but is small enough for individual farms or garden use. De Montgolfier grew a good future for such a machine in France.

This is de Montgolfier's first trip to the United States, and he said he is tremendously impressed with the dynamic qualities and liberty a stranger feels in this country. The ease and simplicity of American life also impressed him. While his is in this area he plans to visit Sun Valley and Yellowstone national park.

Turning back to his first interest, de Montgolfier stated he is impressed with the large amount of development work which has gone into the local production process. He said he feels usage of the process is essential to the continued well-being of the soil. In his opinion, the extensive use of chemical deplores the wastefulness of building it up.

Booster by the construction of three large business buildings, estimated cost of building activities here during the first half of 1948 is only \$2445 less than the \$1,228,800 total for the entire year of 1947.

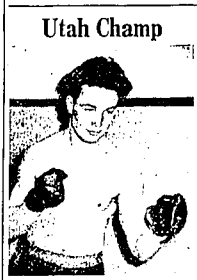

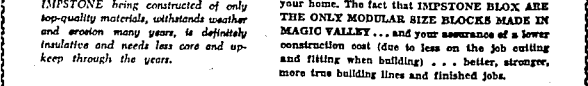

### Beet Fields in Rupert-Burley Area Thinned

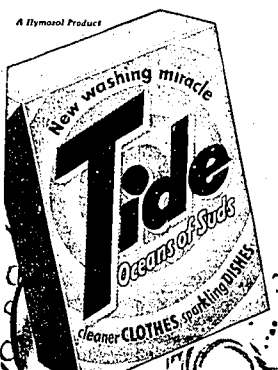
