Magic Valley led the state with a death toll of five persons while the entire state counted 14 dead as a result of one of the bloodiest Fourth of July holidays in the state's history.

Conditions of Two Motorists Said "Critical"

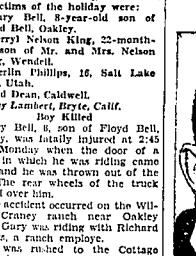
