Jews Storm, Nab Major Airfield as Arabs Reject Bid

CAIRO, July 10 (AP)—Jewish troops stormed and captured Lydda airport, a major prize of the Palestine war, today, and the Arabs announced they would not agree to a new 10-day truce.

Abdul Rahman Azam Pasha, secretary-general of the Arab League, said the Arab countries could not accept the proposal for another cease-fire made by Count Folke Bernadotte, the United Nations mediator. He said the Arabs could not even agree to a three-day truce extension.

4 Refuse Bid To Gather at Red Conclave

LONDON, July 10 (AP)—Following Russia's cue, four European Communist parties, announced today they are refusing to attend Yugoslav Communist party congress.

Martin Tito and his Yugoslav comrades in disgrace, supported by nine-nation communist information bureau, because they insist on equalizing European communist organizations and that just a place in the queue behind Stalin's party.

All Were Invited

PHILADELPHIA—Many Democratic leaders here concede somewhat sorrowfully but realistically that the convention may be the last old-fashioned convention of their kind. There is a brooding sense about the party that it must have departed upon the participants in Carter's last stand.

The abortive attempt to draft Eisenhower, a suspected Republican, was not known, gave definite proof of the Democrats' determination of bias to achieve a sitting President who reached his present position through political processes, and who has carried out his predecessor's principles to the best of his ability.

CRACK-UP—Both moves are interpreted as a crack-up of the Democratic party as a definite entity, and its transformation into a motley organization which will no longer simply hold office.

Only the more fanatical of the tactics adopted here by the anti-Trumanites constitute no leaders of the party apart from its death.

EXCITING SHOW

The Democratic nomination may be in the bag for President Truman, and probably is. But anyone who thinks the impending Democratic national convention will be an anticlimax to the Republican choice of a candidate may be in for a surprise. Even if you like Mr. Truman as the winner at 1-to-100 odds, it's a safe bet that there will be some fireworks.

A lot of voters can't remember any pre-Roosevelt Democratic conventions. But those who do will recall that some of them were pretty exciting shindigs. The party had always had a wide variety of political thought, and its maneuvering has tended to be of the open-field, not the smoked-filth-room variety.

TRUMAN—Unhappy President Truman is not the cause of this collapse. He is only the victim, as would be any man who came after FDR.

It was the Roosevelt-Truman might have been able to hold together the party for at least another election, and he might have won again. But for Mr. Truman the Dewey-Warren nomination, and the demands for Eisenhower and William O. Douglas.

Speaking at the concluding session of the western regional conference, Kline refused to admit this was a forecast that oleo tax opposition is on the way out.

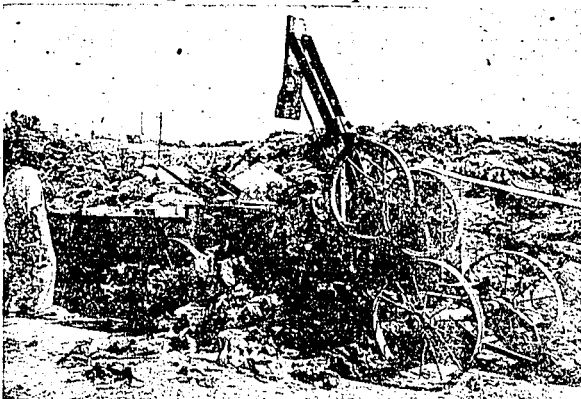
