





### \$602,000 Cost Estimated for Boost in Rate

If the Idaho public utilities commission approves rate increases proposed by the Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph company, the people of Idaho will pay \$602,000 more each year for telephone services.

The company says the proposed increases are needed to meet the present and future needs of telephone users in this state through construction of new plants.

Construction needed. This construction will be expensive because of high material and labor costs, necessity of increasing rates because of increased cost of living and high cost of maintenance supplies.

The commission has set a hearing for 10 a. m. Monday Aug. 2 in the capitol building, Boise.

Largest Area Hit. The largest increase for residential phones in Magic Valley would be for rural residence phones connecting with the Twin Falls exchange. The rate for those phones would be increased from \$2 to \$2.75 per month.

Increases by town for residential phones include Buhl, 50 cents; Burley, 50 cents; Eden, 50 cents; Glenns Ferry, 50 cents; Gooding, 50 cents; Hagerman, 25 cents; Halley, 50 cents; Harlowton, 25 cents; Jerome, 50 cents; Kimberly, 50 cents; Murtaugh, 25 cents; Oakley, 25 cents; Shoshone, 25 cents; Twin Falls, 50 cents; except rural residence phones 75 cents; Wendell, 25 cents.

Business Phones. Comparison rates have been reported for business phones in various towns in Magic Valley. The present rates and proposed rates for one-party and two-party business phones include Buhl, \$3 present and \$7 proposed for one-party lines and \$5 proposed rates and \$9 proposed rates for two party lines. Other figures are the same as Buhl, Eden \$4 present and \$4.75 proposed for one-party lines, \$12.50 present and \$16.25 proposed for two party.

Prices for Farm Produce Nearing High of January. JOISE, July 12 (AP)—High prices are nearing the record high reached last January, the bureau of agricultural economics said today. The agency said the price index rose during May and June and on June 15 was 333 per cent above the 1910-1914 level and only three points below the record established last January.

Meat prices have taken the largest jump and are 424 per cent of the 1910-1914 average and 20 points above the January index. Grain, hay, fruit and vegetable prices were lower on June 15 than during May.

Cattle prices rose \$2.30 per hundredweight, hogs \$2.30 and lambs \$2.30, the bureau said. Dressed were recorded by weight, seven cents a bushel; oats, three cents; barley, 12 cents; potatoes, 15 cents; eggs, 1.5 cents a dozen; and butterfat, one cent a pound.

### Work Started Here on Unique 4-Floor Building to Cost \$700,000

Work started Thursday on the construction of a unique four-story structure which will cost \$700,000. Only the first floor will be walled in completely. The other three stories will be open on three sides. There will be a stairway clear to the top. The building will be only 12 by 12 feet in size.

This odd structure will be used as a drill tower by the Twin Falls Fire department. Fire Chief E. H. Freese believes it will be the first drill tower in Idaho.

Supporting the tower will be four 55-foot poles set in concrete to a depth of five feet. The first floor will have a 16-foot ceiling to correspond with business building. The other three stories will have 10-foot ceilings. The completed enclosed ground-floor will have a door, the other three will have doors or windows set in their "false fronts" to give firemen practice in forcible entry.

The ground floor will be used for gas and smoke-mask drills. Life rope practice under actual fire conditions. The other three floors will be used for hose and ladder drills, rope work and net jumping. The supporting poles will extend a few feet beyond the top and will be used for rope and net work.

Freese said that although ladders now used by firemen reach only 35 feet, the higher stories can be used in ladder practice work with Pomplar ladders owned by the department. These ladders are smaller than the standard ladder and are hooked over window frames

### Silver City's Natives Gain New 'Hobby'

SILVER CITY, July 12 (AP)—The handful of residents still living in the old mining town of Silver City have a new pastime—taking the numbers of Sunday night "draws" and shoeing them away from the locked buildings.

John Grete, Jr., native of Silver City and son of a member of the first party of pioneers who discovered gold in 1823, says he sits on his porch Sunday to shoe away with his loud voice the curious travelers who try to gain access to the locked buildings and carry away "souvenirs."

W. J. Hawes, also a native, wears a deputy sheriff badge and takes the license number of each invading automobile. They estimate between 20 and 75 carloads of Sunday shooers visit the long-quiet capital of the Snake mountain range.

Silver City in the 1820s was a bubbling mining camp of more than 10,000 people. Today the 50 prospectors and their families earn a living by reworking old mining claims and "grading" abandoned lodes.

The death knell was sounded for Silver City in 1910 when the trade dollar mine closed down. In 1934 came the coup de grace when the family seat was moved to Murphy.

Expert Lists Tips On Keeping Food

Where and how food is placed in the refrigerator is important for keeping it fresh and wholesome, especially in hot weather, Edna H. Weigen, Jerome county home demonstration agent says.

Priority on the coldest space in the cabinet, which is usually nearest the freezing cabinet, should be given to the most perishable foods for which a temperature of 40 degrees or slightly colder is recommended. These foods include fresh and cooked meat, poultry, fish, meat broth, gelatin dishes, milk, milk-egg-nog, dressings, custards and cottage cheese soft cheeses.

Modern refrigerators are designed to encourage this arrangement of food by providing full shelves for milk bottles beside freezing units and a covered compartment for meat just beneath. In general, these perishable foods keep best if covered. Uncovered meat should be loosely covered or simply taken out of its wrappings and placed in the meat compartment of the refrigerator which provides it with enough ventilation for good keeping.

Mrs. Weigen warns that when putting goods in the refrigerator one must be careful not to crowd them so closely together that the circulation of cold air from the top is cut off. Cooked food should cool to room temperature before putting in. In the refrigerator no atmosphere inside will not be heated and overwork the motor. As soon as warmer, as the food has cooled, it is advisable to get it into the refrigerator promptly.

The heating tower of a refrigerator is now more than 10 feet off slant.
