Case Against Lewis' Union Is Withdrawn

WASHINGTON, July 14 (U.P.)—The government reluctantly withdrew its injunction proceedings against John R. Lewis today in the wake of a conditional contract agreement ending the strike in the steel industry coalition.

Justice T. Alan Goldsborough permitted the national labor relations board's general counsel to drop the plea for a court order "without prejudice to a renewal of the petition should subsequent events require it."

Lewis and Harry Moses, representing steel industry mills, signed a contract that would drop the union shop clause. Lewis agreed to change the provision if legal decisions held him liable for the contract without the election is illegal.

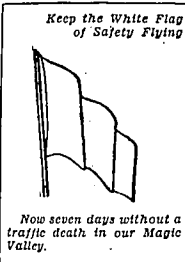

women should be appointed to work with civic officials," he said.

"Those who are qualified to bring the present outmoded juvenile laws up to date are the district courts and the state bar association," he concluded.

Principal Platt, who is now working for an MA degree, writing a thesis which will deal with juvenile problems. He reported on a personal survey he made in Twin Falls county.

He first pointed out that according to the federal department of child welfare 53 youths of every 1,000 are delinquent or 5 per cent of the nation's children are delinquent.

According to Platt's survey Twin Falls county's delinquency record is only one-tenth of the national average.

He stressed that 90 per cent of the Twin Falls county delinquents come from inadequate homes, 50 per cent come from broken homes, and of the delinquents only 20 per cent of the boys belong to the Boy Scouts and 10 per cent of the girls belong to Camp Fire or the Girl Reserves, 20 per cent belong to churches and 10 per cent of the girls belong to high school. with molesting, holding or arresting the clubs on their employes. The order makes the operation of chance prize games.

In seeking to have this order set aside, Seville in his supreme court brief supporting his request for a writ of prohibition, said:

"This is a matter of statewide importance, appeal from the injunction would not be possible until at least the fall term. Our gambling laws cannot be permitted to be suspended for any long time."

The brief also said the action was "not brought with any intention ... or desire to have the court consider the question of 'change of prize games.' The only question is whether a district judge or district court has jurisdiction for the issuance of an injunction against law enforcement officials preventing them from carrying out their duties."

The order makes the alternative writ returnable July 20. Attorneys were of the opinion, however, that there could be no hearing on the writ prohibition before the fall term of the court starting after Sept. 1.

TITO'S FAILURE

There have been some amusing as well as puzzling aspects to Tito's campaign fight since the first big blow-off. Communist parties in the other puppet states have been following the Moscow line and dutifully throwing bricks through Tito's windows...

Behind all the window dressing, however, the fundamental problem has not been solved. And that problem, according to Bogdan Raditsin, is Tito's failure to mobilize Yugoslavia. Since he formerly was the information director, Mr. Raditsin knows the situation. Probably no writer in this country who can speak freely and honestly knows it any better.

But it is not necessary to agree with him without thinking. Even when one discounts the mere insistence that all issues seem clear-cut, his opinion still seems logical. Tito's assignment apparently has been to industrialize as well as communize his country. Yugoslavia is a vulnerable outer bastion of the communist empire. It is poor and backward, sadly lacking in the strength and confidence that would be needed if war threatened.

But since the Kremlin has rung down the iron curtain between its step-children and the west, Yugoslavia has had to turn to Russia for help she must have in her start to strength, self-sufficiency and industrialization. She has to buy machinery, materials, not only for factories but for farms. No country's industry can be great or even adequate without a big labor force. And as this country's history shows, it cannot be great unless it has a big labor force.

Afterthought—The touchy civil rights issue. If Platform Chairman Francis Myers and North Carolina Sen. Clyde Haynes have their way, they will mention the issue in their platform. It will be a mere afterthought. They are bending and breaking and straining the Democratic platform to make it fit. It will be satisfactory to everybody save the people most concerned—racial and religious minorities.

It seems small wonder, then, that Tito was giving the Kremlin gospel a rather free translation in his effort to put his country on her feet. His vain and pompous way of going about it may have irritated the Kremlin all the more. It is not surprising that the Soviet leaders seem to have little faith in Tito. That Tito still professes their own ruthless, tyrannical faith.

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Three Fateful Polio 'Stages' Are Clarified

NEW YORK, July 14—Infantile paralysis has three fateful stages, the first of which usually resembles a common cold or upset stomach, Dr. Irving McQuarrie, Minneapolis, Minn., polio expert, reported today.

McQuarrie, professor of pediatrics at the University of Minnesota, led the first international poliomyelitis conference that the physician "must arrive at his diagnosis from various little signs and symptoms," which, by themselves, may be inconclusive, but together point toward the disease.

McQuarrie based his findings on experience in the serious polio outbreak in Minneapolis in 1946.

Diagnosis of polio, especially in the early stage, has been difficult in all epidemics. Medical science is attempting to find better diagnostic procedures.

McQuarrie said the first stage of polio often is overlooked because of the mild symptoms.

"It is a short period of fever and malaise, undistinguishable from a common cold or an upset stomach," he said. "This stage was definitely noted in only 35 per cent of the 464 polio cases admitted to the University of Minnesota hospital during the 1946 epidemic.

The second stage, he said, is the pre-paralytic period. It shows the most intensification of the symptoms noted in the first period.

"It may be separated from the first stage (when the first signs have been noted) by a few days of feverless, symptomless days," he said. "In this stage appear the first signs of involvement of the central nervous system. Fever may be high, headache, intense, nausea and vomiting prominent."

During the second stage, he said, the child becomes irritable, and the signs point toward nerve-muscle ailment.

Symptoms in the second stage include stiff neck, and back, pain and tenderness in the muscles of the arms and legs.

"This stage," McQuarrie said, "either terminates in paralysis or the patient makes a gradual recovery."

The third, paralytic stage, he said, usually appears on the third or fourth day of the pre-paralytic stage.

"Diagnosis of Poliomyelitis," he said, "then becomes definite. Most paralytic cases are of spinal type, with paralysis occurring more often in the legs than in arms. The few with involvement of the chest muscles and the diaphragm are often in need of a mechanical respirator."

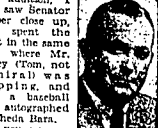

Active Work Reported for SICE Course

SOUTHERN IDAHO COLLEGE OF EDUCATION, Albion, July 13. An active summer program in training school department of the Southern Idaho College of Education has been reported by M. J. McVicker, director of the college's student teaching course.

Help to China Is 'Hopeless,' Experts Av

Americans working on the Chinese recovery program are beginning to learn what a vast and practically hopeless job they have.

Charles Sullivan, head of the survey mission, says results from the first \$60,000,000 will be negligible. Students of Chinese affairs will bet again that he learns the same thing about the forthcoming \$400,000,000 too. The recent 50 per cent drop in the value of the Chinese dollar is not the problem. It is merely a symptom.

Cannot Restore

When American experts began to figure what they could do to help China they had no hope of restoring the currency. They only hoped to prevent further deterioration. They figured this holding operation could be conducted for one year with \$510,000,000 in addition to the \$60,000,000 for immediate relief. Instead of \$510,000,000 they got \$100,000,000 and the holding operation became a mere delaying operation.

Even that has come to naught. There is a wholesale flight of capital from China. Fred Hampton, Associated Press correspondent in Shanghai, reports that every day, by plane, ship, donkey cart or back pack, great amounts of money move into Shanghai to seek conversion into wealth which can be sent abroad to Canton to buy Hong Kong dollars.

Shows Attitude

This flight of capital represents the attitude toward their own country of the private enterprises with which the Americans hope to work for recovery.

Talk of a "real" aid program for China overlooks some of the inherent qualities of the situation. An "old China hand" expressed it to me this way:

"How can you help a nation that doesn't exist?"

China an Area

He meant that China is not a country, but an area, largely wasteland, in which 400,000,000 people, mostly uneducated politically, scramble from one meal to the next. Some experts estimate that 100,000,000 people in China pay neither allegiance nor taxes to anything which could be called an organized government. The National government controls some 200,000,000 people. Communist-held territory embraces some 140,000,000. The rest are scattered around in vast, isolated areas in more or less tribal fashion.

"What do we do," I asked, "if China becomes a field of open Russian expansion and we feel it must be halted for the sake of our own future safety? Take the whole place over?"

"It would take 40 divisions, entirely supplied from the United States, to do this now without the Russians," was the reply. "It is impossible."

So is the "Chinese problem."

More Pay for Conservation Looms in '49

Farmers may receive nearly twice the assistance in 1949 for conservation practices as is available under this year's program, according to plans being developed by the agricultural conservation association, Ben Jansen, Twin Falls ACA chairman, said Wednesday.

Congress has authorized the use of \$22,000,000 for the 1949 program compared to \$150,000,000 set aside in 1947 for the current fiscal year, including administrative expenses.

Jansen urges Twin Falls county farmers operating under the conservation program to follow through with indicated intentions and his tributaries apply their best.

He explained that the county committee has the responsibility of seeing that ACA funds are used to obtain the maximum of soil and water conservation. Assistance given only when investigation determines an actual need of the farmer, he said.

It was emphasized that some farmers fail to qualify for assistance because they don't understand the requirements. Requirements should be carefully investigated and fulfilled before application is made for assistance, Jansen stressed.

GOP Cuts in Project Cash Hit by Utah

CONVENTION HALL, Philadelphia, July 14 (AP)—Gov. Herbert H. Maw of Utah charged today the Republicans are out to cripple or destroy many of the new deal programs that have brought "prosperity and security to the west."

"In the west we are not deceived," he said in an address before the Democratic national convention.

"We will be ready at the next election, and we will do our part to put an end to the destructive objectives of the Republican party by electing a Democratic President and Democratic members of congress."

Maw devoted much of his address to what he called efforts of the Republican congress to cripple western reclamation activities and to give "private power monopolies" the right to determine future public power expansion.

"A 40 per cent cut in appropriation for the Bonneville power administration during the first session of the 80th congress followed by a 16 per cent cut during the second session, together with restrictive regulations imposed by congress have proved to be an effective first step toward destroying the public power phase of the new deal program in the Pacific northwest."

Maw said, "With its demise would vanish the dream of an industrial empire in Oregon and Washington."
