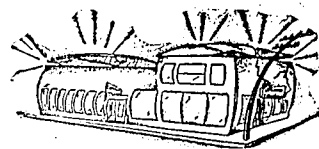

Explosives Test Will Be Started July 26 in Utah

BALT LAKE CITY, July 15—Army engineers will begin a \$3,000,000 underground explosives testing program at the Dugway proving grounds July 27.

The program is designed to furnish information data on construction of subsurface structures and tunnels which will resist the effect of powerfully concentrated explosions.

Chief purpose of the tests, officers said, is to determine how far underground men must go to escape the effect of atomic bombing. However, no atomic bombs will be used.

Public Relations Officer Clyde J. Gorman said the tests, originally scheduled for June 1, have been

postponed until late July because of delays in shipping recording instruments and other equipment.

Target sites, underground tunnels and other structures are all ready, he said.

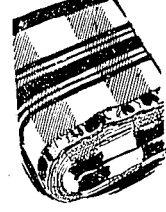

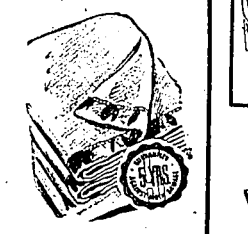

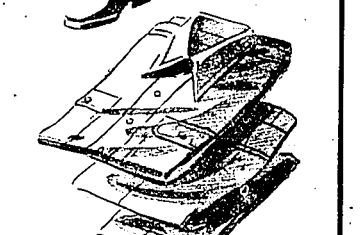

DUBLIN, Ireland, (The Irish, Lord love 'em, make rules so they may have the pleasure of breaking them.)

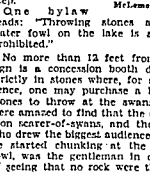
No better proof of this can be found than the rules and regulations governing St. Stephen's green, which are posted at every entrance to this lovely park, right in the center of Dublin.

APRICOT JAM RECIPE MAKES MORE GLASSES

This Easy Method Gives You More for Your Money

4 Cups Grand Fruit
1 Cup Sugar
1 Cup Lemon Juice
1 Package McFar, Jam
and Jelly Pectin

Wash and pit 4 pounds fully ripe apricots, grind. Do not peel. Measure exactly 4 level cups of the ground fruit (add water to fill last cup if necessary) into a large kettle. Add the McFar, Pectin and lemon juice, stir well and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), continue stirring, and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL for 10 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars. Pour into sterilized jars, seal with fresh paraffin.

NOTE: If you cannot get paraffin, use the following "hot seal" method: Pour hot jam into pint or quart Mason jars to the brim; screw lids on tightly (use 2-piece lids) and invert jars on lids until jam begins to set. This sterilizes lid, then shake jars well and set upright. This keeps fruit evenly distributed.

Unemployed List in Idaho At Low Point

BOISE, July 15 (AP)—The total number of unemployed in Idaho in June was estimated today by the Idaho state employment service to be six-tenths of one per cent of the state's population.

This figure was less than half the national average for the month of 1.5 per cent, the service said. It was estimated there were 3,000 persons unemployed in the state during the month.

This unemployment low was reported despite a decline in Agricultural demand for labor.

On July 1 the decrease in numbers of unemployed continued with 2,291 reported out of work. This number compared with 2,693 on July 1 last year.

There wasn't any change in job listings in the Kellogg-Wallace area but a small drop was reported in eastern Idaho. A decrease was also reported in south central Idaho despite increased demand from Twin Falls where chourpy and potato pickers were needed.

A considerable labor demand reduction is reported in southeastern Idaho by the employment service. The north central Idaho area showed a drop in labor demand although the panhandle indicated no change.

The decline at Lewiston was reported as the cherry harvest ended. It was offset by labor needs at Grangeville with increased openings in forestry, logging and construction.

100 Students Take Special SICE Course

SOUTHERN IDAHO COLLEGE OF EDUCATION, Aberdeen, July 15—More than 100 pupils representing 14 towns in Idaho and four towns outside the state are enrolled in remedial classes at the training school of the Southern Idaho College of Education, M. J. McVicker, director, reported Thursday.

Because of the unrestricted large enrollment, it was necessary to close registration for the training school on the second day. McVicker said.

Three regularly employed teachers, Laura Mae Bourg, Adria Woods and Alvin Schelke, are directing the youngsters in addition to their regular college courses.

Trated by Leaders McVicker explained that principals and superintendents from single valley communities have praised the work done by classes for younger students at SICE. Several students travel many miles every day to attend the classes.

The largest single group of students is transported by bus from Rupert, Paul and Hazelton, while the longest ride daily is made by a boy from Murtagh. Children from American Falls, Twin Falls and Jerome spend the week on the campus taking the courses.

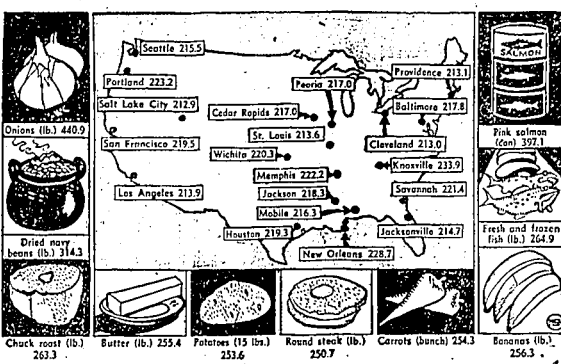

 PHILADELPHIA, July 15 (AP)—The President of the United States makes \$75,000 a year. He sure earned every cent of it last night, when he was not and away here in Philadelphia. Mr. Truman was due in to say a few words to the Democrats—thanks for nominating him for the presidency.

Where do you suppose the biggest man in the world would up? Out on the sidewalk in a deck chair in front of the convention hall? It's kind of a long story but along kind of interesting.

Mr. Truman put the notes for his acceptance speech in his duffel bag, waved a pleasant goodbye from his balcony at the White House and left for Philadelphia. That was around 7 o'clock last night.

News in Schedule
 At that time, he hadn't even been nominated. There was a little mix-up in the time schedule. The convention was late in getting started. So at 8:44 p.m. the sleek presidential special pulled up at Wilmington, Del., to await developments. It left at 8:55.

Developments didn't come too fast. The President, it is said, worked over his notes. He knew he was in. Nothing left in Philadelphia but the roll call.

It didn't come very fast. Not only that, but people who were in the anti-Truman camp were kicking up some dust on the convention floor. Somebody passed around the words and music for a song called "Let's Send Harry Back to the Farm."

Arrives in City
 Then the President arrived in Philadelphia—the city of brotherly love.

More trouble. It was raining. It was hot. The time was not yet ripe. Those Democrats, aware of the value of the free radio and television time were filling the air with a lot of fancy chatter.

So the big little man had some more waiting to do. It was stuffy in the lobby. Mr. T. asked a small boy to please fetch him a chair. The boy did and Mr. Truman sat down out on the sidewalk—under an umbrella.

He sat there until they called him in to make his speech.

Here are the present grades and the new titles: Master sergeant or first sergeant, new title same; technical sergeant, sergeant first class; staff sergeant or technician first grade, sergeant; sergeant or technician fourth grade, corporal; corporal or technician fifth grade, private first class; private first class, private; private, recruit.

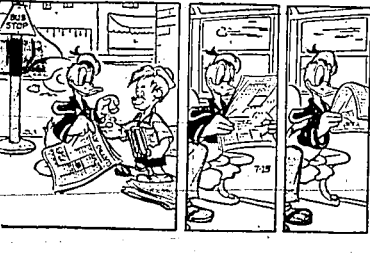

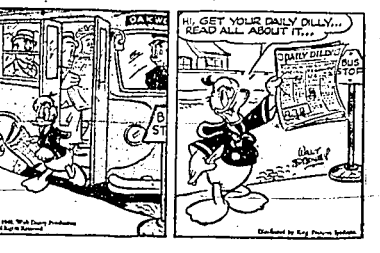

It gets in their blood, a Chicago department store executive said today. Actually, he said, they are "bargain addicts."

They may not need a thing, T. Tachna said, but they'll charge like the light brigade when the "sale" sign is up. The store usually doesn't receive for a week.

Plans Trampled
Store executives, sale directors, managers, and clerks spend weeks gearing for a storewide sale. But the best plans are trampled into ruins in the first onslaught, said Tachna.

"For some foolish reason," he said, "we always work out a plan that calls for keeping the crowds organized. We also attempt to lay out the merchandise so that it will survive the sale in some kind of order."

But the plans are of little help, he said. By the time 200,000 women pour into the store, it's everybody for himself and "no heeds" with the merchandise.

"Catcher" Goods
One veteran shopper said she was unable to crash through to the drapery counter. She stood on the sidelines and as goods flew up in the air she grabbed them.

Another woman brought her young daughter with her to help out. When she spotted something she wanted, she would send the youngster wiggling through the crowd to get it.

In general, said Tachna, the most successful shoppers are hefty, middle-aged women who are addicted to bargain sale shopping. They follow the bargains and know all the tricks of the business.

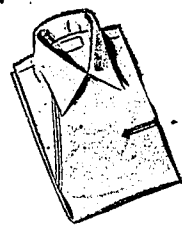
