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Auto Makers Hit 2 Million Output Mark

DETROIT, July 21 (AP)—The 2,000,000th passenger car of 1948 rolled from the auto industry's assembly lines today.

Later this week truck and coach production will top the 800,000 unit mark.

The industry is sharply accelerating its production tempo but it isn't keeping up with the demand for new cars and lightweight trucks.

They are not nearly as optimistic about the outlook for a steady flow of parts and sub-assemblies from their supplier concerns.

A substantial part has been taken in this year's production upturn by the so-called "independent" manufacturers.

Commenting on the operations of the "independents," Ward's Automotive reports noted that while they accounted for only 933 per cent of the total motor vehicle output in 1947, they jumped this to 1051 per cent in 1947 and to 22.18 per cent during the first six months of 1948.

Old-Time Tiff Brewing Over Road's Route

Where U. S. highway No. 10 transcontinental (Yellowstone) highway crosses No. 85 (North and south) highway in Idaho a regular old-fashioned controversy is developing between merchants affected.

Oral and written petitions of Coeur d'Alene businessmen lining North Fourth street—at one time the only main thoroughfare leading into the city from the west, by Spokane—recently besieged the city government with protest.

They did not like the new highway sign at the junction to the west, which changed four-lane Northwest boulevard route to No. 10 designation, redesignating North Fourth to No. 10 alternative.

They protested a big slump in business; tourist cabin owners complained of empty cabins.

Monday night the city councilmen entered round two of the controversy. As a result, and after long discussion, the council decided to meet again next Monday in adjourned session. The protesters then will hear the findings of the Coeur d'Alene zoning commission and the council's street committee, with state highway officials "listening in."

Neither route is up to federal specification, Mayor J. G. Adams told the council. The shorter Northwest boulevard needs elimination of several railroad crossings; North Fourth (also part of the No. 85 route for about two miles) is narrow, requiring tremendous expense to widen to federal requirements.

A warning was cast over champions of both the North Fourth and Northwest boulevard that if a solution is not reached there may come day be built a third route or by-pass to the city's northeast, providing a wide sweeping curve to connect with 21st on Sherman. This route would divert all traffic from the city center but provide a route meeting eventual federal highway specifications.

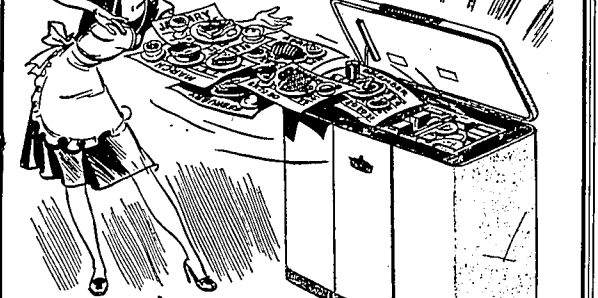

I'm using a vacuum cleaner with a mesh bag instead of the conventional bag designed to catch all dust and dirt. It's equipped with an over-sized hose and a larger motor. I just drive around until I find a likely place to stop. Then I connect the power lines. After tapping the power lines and hooking up the vacuum cleaner, I just drop the over-sized hose in the stream. Water sucked up by the vacuum cleaner goes right out the mesh bag and back into the stream. The fish don't.

25,000 Idaho Men Eligible In New Draft

BOISE, July 21 (AP)—An estimated 25,000 of the state's young men between the ages of 18 and 25 will have signed up in the nation's draft by the time registration is completed Sept. 15.

The estimated number to be affected by the peacetime draft was made by Idaho Adj.-Gen. John Walsh.

Gov. C. A. Robins, commander-in-chief of the Idaho military forces, said preliminary plans already have been made for the draft registration.

Preparations Made

He said all preparations will have been completed before registration starts Aug. 30. Draft-age Idahoans will register at their county seats.

Governor Robins said it has been definitely decided that Idaho should have a draft board in each county manned by volunteer board members. Volunteer help also will be asked to assist in the registration at each county seat.

Backlog of Men

The governor said the state has a backlog of men who served on draft boards in the last war. He said they agreed to remain in a reserve status. There are only three counties in which there were no draft board reserves. Governor Robins said.

"In all but six counties," he said, "we have at least two members with experience. In 27 counties we have at least four members each."

The governor said he has already begun to make use of the property division of the treasury department in procurement of office supplies for the various boards.

United States military governor for Germany, before the message goes to the capital.

Mr. Truman is expected to confer with Clay shortly after his arrival in Washington.

Rosa listed several points which the President will urge upon congress and which were in the legislative process when the regular session adjourned.

1. Federal aid to education.
2. A minimum wage of at least 75 cents an hour.
3. Displaced persons legislation.

A displaced persons bill was passed at the regular session, but Mr. Truman wants it amended.

Rosa said that a measure providing \$300,000,000 in federal aid to states for education was "put through the senate" by Sen. Robert A. Taft, R., O., and is now in the house education and labor committee.

He reminded reporters that the minimum wage was previously recommended by Mr. Truman and was included in the Democratic platform.

He said pending legislation on the minimum wage questions is acceptable "with possibly some slight amendments." No new bills are necessary, he said.

Rosa said an amendment to the displaced persons bill will be recommended by the President because he felt it discriminated against Jews and Catholics.

The amendment to be offered will be designed to correct what the administration feels is a gross defect.

It probably will provide for admission of more displaced persons than the 205,000 permitted by the original bill over a two-year period. The Democratic platform called for the admission of 400,000.

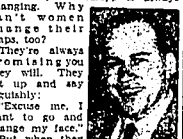
Canvass for Vote Ended at Jerome

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Price of Steel Is Boosted by Leading Firm

PITTSBURGH, July 21 (AP)—United States Steel boosted its prices to an all-time high today by increasing the cost of all flat-rolled steel by an average of \$9.24 a ton.

U. S. Steel sets the price pattern for the entire industry, and other large producers were expected to make corresponding raises. Thus the price boost eventually will be reflected in all finished products such as automobiles, refrigerators and electrical equipment.

The raise was to compensate for a nine per cent wage increase granted its workers last Friday, corporation President Benjamin F. Fairless said.

Cut Wiped Out

The new 2.5 per cent price boost wiped out the average cut of \$1.23 per ton the company made last April in an effort to halt spiraling wages and prices, and also imposed additional increase of about \$3.00 a ton.

It was the third time since the war that U. S. Steel increased wages and then prices, setting the wage-price policy for all the steel industry. Largest producer in the United States, "big steel" manufactures approximately one-fourth of the nation's basic steel.

Geneva Boost Told

At Geneva, Utah, the Geneva Steel company, U. S. Steel subsidiary, announced new price systems which paralleled those issued by the parent company in Pittsburgh. (The new price schedule: Carbon plates: 2.4 cents per pound; carbon structural: 3.25 cents a pound, and pig iron foundry: \$43.50 a gross ton.)

2 Fliers Killed in Search for Plane

Fred P. Jenkins, 27, Tooele, and Harold E. Benson, 30, Salt Lake City, yesterday were directing— from an air-ground party headed toward what they believed was the wreckage of the missing plane.

A sudden downdraft sent the search plane, piloted by Benson, crashing to the ground in the rugged Wasatch mountains near Park City.

The ground party continued, but found only the wing of an army bomber which had crashed in 1941. Still missing is the plane in which Joseph Gauthier of Salt Lake City left Ogden last Sunday.

Schuman Fall Hinders Plan For Recovery

The fall of Robert Schuman, middle-of-the-road government in France comes at a particularly inopportune time. Neither the left nor the right in France can take over without shattering one or more of the bases on which European recovery is being built.

The spectacle of George Bidault, going home to an uncertain fate right in the middle of the Hague conference on international military and economic cooperation, comes as a particular shock.

A Tower of Strength

The foreign minister has been a tower of strength in the French cabinet of indecision over the future of Germany, the federation of Europe, the firm allied policy in Berlin and rearmament of western Europe.

The Schuman government had done so much to give a widespread feeling in the United States that France, with her multiplicity of party shading, was politically mature and an undependable partner. Washington economic authorities were beginning to see a chance for happy surprise over improving French conditions. The Paris government had tackled long range economic and financial reforms which were considered essential if the Marshall plan was to have any effect. Schuman put through monetary reforms in the face of communist screams that he was killing the common man for the benefit of bourgeoisie. Although the communist congress in the largest cohesive bloc of seats in the assembly—183 out of 418—he was able to keep them out of the government. France had moved over from a neutral position, which sometimes bordered on cooperation with Russia, to a regular if not too staunch position beside the western allies.

May Ask Aid

There were some slight indications that President Auriol might ask Schuman to attempt to reform his government. However, this would require renewed cooperation of the socialists, who have 103 seats in the assembly, and by the De Gaulleists. But the extreme leftists among the socialists are now in control of their party, having forced the government resignation despite the pleas of their leader, Leon Blum. And the De Gaulleists are determined to take power themselves.

The socialists are definitely opposed to French rearmament, one of the keys to the entire American-European defensive program upon which Bidault was working at the Hague. The De Gaulleist rightists are just as violently opposed to the reconstruction of Germany as the key European industrial recovery.

Fear Berlin Policy

Even the Schuman government was fearful of a strong policy in Berlin and now the leadership which kept France tied to Britain and the U. S. on this point is gone, at least for the time being. With this added to the obvious reluctance of the Hague conferees to defy Russia, the United States may find herself seriously handicapped in that respect. It will be a new factor to be considered when General Clay arrives home to make his report.

Until the French situation shakes down the other allies will be virtually handicapped.

Deadline Set On Insurance For Veterans

July 31 is the deadline for veterans to reinstate national service life insurance policies, Don A. Duval, Twin Falls senior contact representative said Wednesday.

Several thousand Idaho veterans whose policies have lapsed will have a chance to reinstate any amount of term insurance, from \$1,000 to \$10,000 in multiples of \$500, if they apply prior to Aug. 1, Duval said.

To obtain this protection and receive dividends which the VA will issue within the next few years, the veteran must fill out a form stating that his health is the same as at the time the policy lapsed, and pay two monthly premiums. Physical examinations are required only

in a few cases, the representative said.

After July 31, reinstatement will be granted only to veterans whose policies lapsed less than three months previously. Any lapse in excess of three months will require a physical examination to qualify the applicant as a suitable risk, he added.

The Twin Falls VA office, 249 Main avenue east, is open from 9 a. m. to 3 p. m. Mondays through Fridays, and will remain open all day July 31 to handle last-minute reinstatements.

There were some slight indications that President Auriol might ask Schuman to attempt to reform his government. However, this would require renewed cooperation of the socialists, who have 103 seats in the assembly, and by the De Gaulleists. But the extreme leftists among the socialists are now in control of their party, having forced the government resignation despite the pleas of their leader, Leon Blum. And the De Gaulleists are determined to take power themselves.

The socialists are definitely opposed to French rearmament, one of the keys to the entire American-European defensive program upon which Bidault was working at the Hague. The De Gaulleist rightists are just as violently opposed to the reconstruction of Germany as the key European industrial recovery.

Even the Schuman government was fearful of a strong policy in Berlin and now the leadership which kept France tied to Britain and the U. S. on this point is gone, at least for the time being. With this added to the obvious reluctance of the Hague conferees to defy Russia, the United States may find herself seriously handicapped in that respect. It will be a new factor to be considered when General Clay arrives home to make his report.

Until the French situation shakes down the other allies will be virtually handicapped.
